

Whether you're a parent or educator, use these resources and tips to prepare for the new school year.

Check-Ups and Immunizations

It's a good idea to take your child in for a physical and eye exam before school starts. If your child will be participating in a sports activity, your family doctor may have to sign a release form to permit your child to participate.

Most schools require your child's immunization shots are up-to-date. Remember that each state has different immunization requirements. Let your healthcare provider know if you have any questions or concerns about the vaccines your child is scheduled to receive.

School entry may require documentation of immunization records, so be sure to contact your school ahead of time to find out what might be required, and be sure to bring any school forms for your healthcare provider to fill out and sign. Failure to keep immunizations up-to-date could result in your child not being able to attend school. It's also helpful to keep a copy of the records for yourself and your child's school.

Financial Assistance for Families

There are several programs and resources available to ease the financial burden of going back to school,

including low cost lunches and affordable health insurance. Find out if your family qualifies for the National School Lunch Program or subsidized health care

Homework Help

Homework can provide many benefits for children. It can improve memory and comprehension, develop study skills, and teach children how to manage time. You can help by making sure your kids have a quiet, well-lit place to do homework and provide assistance, but not complete answers. Learn how to help your kids with homework and succeed in school.


Shopping for School Supplies

During the month of August, some states offer a "sales tax holiday," which means that certain products won't be taxed during a set period of time. 

5 Questions

Station School Liaison Officer

Elena McShane

1. What is the role of the school liaison, and how does it benefit the base community?

USMC School Liaisons are the link between military families, local schools and the Marine Corps. Our top priority is to provide parents, students and educators timely and relevant information to enhance learning and promote academic success. School Liaisons identify and coordinate community and installation resources to reduce the impact of the

mobile military lifestyle on military school-age children and families. School Liaisons educate local schools about the many challenges military school age children (K-12) experience such as frequent transitions from school to school, family separations and deployment of a parent.

2. What ways has the School Liaison Program been able to educate the Yuma school administrators and teachers about the transitional challenges that military school age children often experience?

For the last two years I've collaborated with our Marine Corps Family Team Building trainers to create "LINKS for Teachers." This two- hour training educates teachers and administrators on the military lifestyle and the educational, social and emotional effects it can have on our military connected children. By the end of this summer, eight schools will have received this very valuable training. This summer we are also providing an educational workshop specifically to school counselors. I also make it a point to schedule meetings several times per year with all of our Yuma School Superintendents and Principals of heavily military-impacted schools in order to communicate parental concerns and provide suggestions for improvements that will benefit our military children.

3. What are some tips for parents to help them determine the best school for their children?

The educational needs and desires are different for each family and child. When new incoming families contact me for the first time seeking advice, I encourage them to assess their family situation first such as determining their options for housing, the need for transportation and before & afterschool child care. Most of our Yuma schools allow for open enrollment, which means that our families have many educational options available to them to include public, charter, private, home schooling and online schools. Depending on the age of the child, parents must consider the following important things when looking for the best school to fit their child's needs: The availability of programs such as Gifted, Special Education, AVID, Sports, Clubs, AP, Dual Credit and Honors Courses. It is also important to consider high school graduation rates, class sizes, safety and disciplinary programs as well as academic performance on standardized tests and Arizona Department of Education school rankings.

4. What are some milestones in the MCAS Yuma School Liaison Program since it was established in 2008?

MCAS Yuma now has a much stronger relationship with our local educational agencies. I am pleased to see how the School Liaison Program has been instrumental in building relationships and partnerships between our commands and our Yuma Schools. In particular it has been exciting to work with community members the last three years to provide the live web broadcasting of all 6 area high school commencement ceremonies so that deployed parents and families far away could watch their loved ones graduate. Other milestones are assisting VMA-214 to adopt McGraw Elementary School, collaborating with PAO to facilitate more school fieldtrips to our installation, as well as providing support to our local schools with more Marine volunteers. Finally, it was an honor to be invited by the Arizona Superintendent of Education to speak in Phoenix at the first Arizona Department of Education workshop dedicated to the transitional issues facing our Arizona military connected children. This workshop was the catalyst to the Governor's recent establishment of the State Council for the Education of Military Children.

5. What recommendations can you provide parents as they help their students prepare for a successful 2012-13 school year?

Establish bedtime routines, establish a designated homework area with adult supervision, monitor the television, check your child's backpack each day, keep backpacks in the same place so children don't forget to take them as they walk out the door, breakfast is the most important meal of the day, allow children some down time to eat a healthy snack prior to beginning homework, utilize your school's online parent communication tool to check for academic progress and communicate with teachers, have high but realistic expectations for your children, praise their successes, seek out help from teachers when necessary. Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunities for Military Children

The Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunities for Military Children directs the governor of Arizona to enter into a compact with other states to remove barriers to educational success that are imposed on children of military families (military children) because of frequent moves and deployment of parents. Forty-three States belong to this Compact.

The Interstate Compact enacts the following provisions:

• Facilitates the timely enrollment of military children because of difficulties in the transfer of education records from a previous school district or because of variations in entrance or age requirements.

- Facilitates the student placement process by allowing waivers to ensure that military children are not disadvantaged by variations in attendance requirements, scheduling, grading, course content or assessment.
- Streamlines qualifications and eligibility for enrollment, educational programs and participation in extracurricular programs for military children.
 - Facilitates the on-time graduation of military children.
- Promotes flexibility and cooperation among the educational system, military parents, and military children to achieve educational success for the student.
- **Note- The compact applies to public schools only

Governor Jan Brewer Establishes Panel to Help Meet Unique Education Needs of Children in Military Families

From the Office of Governor Brewer

PHOENIX – It's the eve of the start of another school year, and that can mean plenty of anxiety and sleepless nights for students preparing for class in a different school. The unfamiliar setting. New teachers. Different

Now, imagine going through that stress and worry every few years. That's the reality for thousands of Arizona children who have one or more parents in the Armed Forces. Due to regular deployments, transfers and other unique stresses of the mobile military lifestyle, these children face special challenges in their education.

To help meet these challenges, Governor Jan Brewer signed an Executive Order establishing a State Council on the Education for Military Children, July 27. The Council will provide a forum for these families to discuss their needs, and will offer recommendations to the Governor on steps the State of Arizona can take to assist military families in minimizing the educational disruption to children during deployment and relocation. Currently, an estimated 9,890 children from military families attend Arizona K-12

"I'm proud that Arizona has a strong military community, with installations employing more than 83,000 active-duty personnel, reservists and civilians across our State," said Governor Brewer. "But I also recognize that children in these

households may face unique academic challenges, especially due to their frequent relocation. Through the work of this Council, the State of Arizona can take the actions necessary to minimize disruptions so that these children receive the education they deserve while their parents serve our Nation."

The average military family moves three times more often than its civilian counterpart. As a result, it is estimated that most military children will enroll in six to nine different school systems between Kindergar- representatives of Arizona's military installations, school ten and high school graduation. Every time a student transfers, they face not only the stress of making new friends and becoming accustomed to a new school, but also more mundane challenges associated with records transfer, variable academic and graduation requirements between schools, missed milestone assessments

Ensuring our military children have the best access to the best education is just one way we can strengthen our Army and our

Nation. Ultimately, all of Arizona's children will benefit from the efforts of this Council to smooth student transitions associated with relocation."

Pursuant to A.R.S. §15-1911, the State Council on the Education for Military Children will function in compliance with the now 43-state Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children in removing educational barriers often imposed on Arizona's military families.

Marine Corps Family Team Building: Helping Uniformed Families

Marine Corps Family Team Building (MCFTB) is a department within MCCS aboard MCAS Yuma. As part of the Family Readiness Program, MCFTB's mission is to enhance the readiness of Marines, Sailors and their families, and foster their personal growth through education and training.

MCFTB offers a variety of classes and workshops for adults, teens and children. While many of these classes are determined by USMC Headquarters, several MCFTB offerings have been developed locally according to the needs of MCAS Yuma Marines, Sailors and their families. MCFTB also works hand in hand with Family Readiness Officers and Command Teams to promote family readiness by providing unit-specific trainings, workshops and events.

Marine Corps Family Team Building is comprised of five programs: Family Readiness Program, LifeSkills classes and workshops, L.I.N.K.S., Readiness & Deployment Support and Children's Programs.

The Children's Programs are one of the most unique and wonderful things about the MCFTB here in Yuma. The goal in the programs offered is to supply children with the tools needed to positively and successfully cope with the military lifestyle... especially

during times of separation and deployment. In addition to Pre-Deployment classes and Return & Reunion classes for children, MCFTB also offers support for children throughout times of separation and deployment through a group called, "Hearts Apart for Kids."

Hearts Apart is a small group of children (ages five years and older) with deployed parents who meet weekly to explore feelings, express concerns, and learn strategies for helping themselves cope with the absence of a loved one. Through discussions, are activities, and games, children will find answers to their questions and comfort in the knowledge that they are not alone in the circumstances they face.



August is Child Support Awareness Month

of the importance of both parents participating in the Child Support Program.

In recognition of Child Support Awareness Month in California, the Child Support Directors Association (CSDA) is pleased to be coordinating efforts with county child support departments that are working with parents to find solutions to child support matters.

As child support professionals, we know times are tough. California's economy has struggled mightily over the past several years and as a result, so has California families. Two groups hit hardest by the economic crisis are single parents trying to raise a family on a tight budget, and parents struggling to pay court-ordered child support in the midst of a struggling economy.

According to CSDA Executive Director David Oppenheim, "As

child support professionals, we know first-hand that times are tough. Single parents desperately need every penny of support owed just to keep paying the bills and parents paying support are finding it ever more difficult to secure and keep a good-paying job."

CSDA encourages parents to drop by or call their county child support department. County child support professionals are dedicated to working with both parents to find solutions to child sup-

port matters. At the local office, a parent can make a payment, request modification of current support, request release of a professional license, inquire about a payment plan and, in some cases review a case for a potential compromise on an overdue balance.

In August, some local child support departments will also be initiating special projects to reach out to parents delinquent in their support. These efforts will include directed mailers, reminder calls to pay support and targeted outreach urging obligor parents to contact the county child support department.

The consistent payment of child support has been demonstrated to have an extremely positive impact on the lives of children receiving support.

Studies have shown that children who receive support have better outcomes in school, are generally healthier, and typically have a better relationship with both parents.



The pups are taught self-respect, discipline, responsibility and more. After an astonishing transformation these Devil Pups return to society as better citizens and improved individuals.






