
Kids Helping Kids

Students at Khost Orphanage and Elementary School will enjoy a more comfortable winter this year due to a special gift from the students of Highland Hills Middle School in southern Indiana. Highland Hills students began thinking of ways they could help the people of Afghanistan nearly two years ago as one of their teachers was preparing for a deployment to Khost Province. After hearing stories about the level of need in Afghanistan, the students and staff at Highland Hills developed a plan to help. The school organized a fundraiser and was able to send over \$1,200.00 US to the Provincial Reconstruction Team (PRT) in Khost Province.

The soldiers of PRT Khost met with government officials and village elders throughout the province for several months to determine how the gift could be used to support the children in Afghanistan. It was determined that the best place was the Khost Orphanage and Elementary School. This school teaches both boys and girls up to the fifth grade. There are approximately 300 students at the school. Of these, approximately 40 students are orphans who live at the school.

The first portion of the donation was used to buy fabric to make clothing for the 70 girls who attend the school. Each student received enough fabric to make two dresses. The mothers made the dresses for the students. In addition to the fabric, shoes and other clothing articles were purchased for the girls. In many cases, these are the only clothing items the girls will receive this year.


The remaining donation was used to buy school supplies, 200 thick wool blankets, 150 pairs of shoes, and toys for the school. The supplies filled six boxes and totaled approximately 180 cubic feet. These boxes were loaded onto a large flat bed truck. Soldiers, students, and staff spent about an hour unloading all of the supplies. Outside, soldiers scanned the crowds near by and the mountains in the distance. Every soldier in the convoy came to Afghanistan with the hope of helping the people of Afghanistan while protecting the people at home. This type of mission provides an opportunity for soldiers to feel good about the work they are doing.



As winter comes to Afghanistan, the supplies that were delivered will make a positive impact on the lives of the children at this school. They will remember and appreciate the work and kindness
