






MARINE CORPS MARATHON (MCM) FORWARD





The people were very friendly and welcome us back anytime we want.



We were able to learn much about the history of the region and the people. One interesting fact was the reason for the streets to be so narrow was to help shade people from the heat of the sun during the summer. The Art Gallery gave us a glimpse into the artistic abilities of the people.



They use a number of things from the most recent past as part of the art work. The Aquarium has one of the largest salt water tanks. We were able to see several different species of fish including some great white sharks. The Maritime Museum allows us to see how mush this region depends on the sea. There are several different ships that span the life of the region. Some are very small fishing boats to very large cargo type ships. We were able to walk onto these ships and almost feel what it was like to sail on these ships. There is no better place than onboard ship for Navy personnel. There are several different malls that we have been able to go to while here. Yes, some are larger than others, and some are pricier than others. Most of us have found we like one mall over the others. We find ourselves more at home since it
