SENIOR LEADERSHIP

Brig. Gen. Allyson R. Solomon was commissioned in 1986 through the Academy of Military Science at McGhee Tyson Air National Guard Base in Knoxville, Tenn. Prior to being commissioned, she was an enlisted member for seven years. As Assistant Adjutant General-Air, General Solomon is the principal advisor to the Governor and the Adjutant General of Maryland on matters pertaining to the Maryland Air National Guard



and overall commander of the Maryland Air National Guard. She was appointed to her present position in June 2008. In addition, she serves as the ANG Assistant to the Secretary of the Air Force, Manpower and Reserve Affairs and was recently appointed as a member of the Air Reserve Forces Policy Committee.

Brig. Gen. Scott L. Kelly received his commission in 1983 as a graduate of The Citadel in South Carolina. After completing undergraduate pilot training, he flew the T-38 as a First Assignment Instructor Pilot. He subsequently served in the Persian Gulf War as an A-10 fighter pilot assigned to the 74th Tactical Fighter Squadron. From 1991 to 1994, Gen. Kelly served



with the Maryland Air National Guard as an active duty liaison/advisor. In 1997, he left the active Air Force to join the Maryland Air National Guard as a full-time Active Guard/Reserve member. He was appointed to his current position in April 2012.

Chief Master Sgt. Glenn D. Hart graduated from Perry Hall High School in 1973 and enlisted in the Maryland Air National Guard as a Communication Specialist on Aug. 24, 1974. In 1976, he crosstrained into the aircraft maintenance career field. In 1995, he was selected as the Air Force Crew Chief of the Year. As State Command Chief, Hart is the personal advisor to the Adjutant General and



the Assistant Adjutant General—Air on enlisted issues and a key advocate for the Maryland Air National Guard enlisted force. Chief Hart was awarded a Community College of the Air Force degree in Aircraft Maintenance Technology. He was appointed to his present position in July 2009. Since 2013, he has held the position of Senior Enlisted Leader of the Maryland Air National Guard.

Chief Master Sgt. Harold E. Stewart entered the Maryland Air National Guard in April 1977 as an Air Freight Specialist. His background includes various duties in airlift operations, computer network operations and communications security, including nearly 6,000 flying hours as an Aircraft Loadmaster. Before assuming his current position, he



served as the Chief Enlisted Manager for the 175th Network Warfare Squadron. He received both his bachelor's and master's degrees from Capitol College in Laurel, Md., and his Community College of the Air Force degree in Transportation & Traffic Management. Chief Stewart has served in his present position since November 2009.

AIR NATIONAL GUARD FIRE DEPARTMENT ANSWERS CALLS OUTSIDE GATE

7/26/2013 - Baltimore -- A call comes in. A freight train has derailed in a neighborhood right outside Baltimore, it is on fire and black smoke can be seen for miles spreading across the city. More details are unknown at this point, but one thing is for sure, help is needed to control the blaze.

Members of the Maryland Air National Guard's 175th Fire and Emergency Services with the Martin State Airport Crash Fire Rescue Station at Warfield Air National Guard Base in Middle River, Md., answered that call May 28, along with first responders from across the county.

"These firefighters were ready within a moment's notice and did their part to help suppress the towering fire," explained Senior Master Sgt. Wayne Viands, 175th Fire and Emergency Services fire chief.

The firefighters were ready to risk their own lives in order to keep the surrounding community safe, and this wasn't the first time they've responded to emergencies taking place outside their gate.

"We have a good working relationship with the Baltimore County Fire Department, as well as the surrounding volunteer departments, and we respond to provide support to them whenever called to do so," said Viands. "Not long ago, we were called to a truck accident in the community, and using the 'jaws of life,' extricated the driver who was trapped inside."

This relationship is due to a mutual aid agreement with Baltimore County, which allows them to request help during times of crisis, said Staff Sgt. Michael Dowling, a lieutenant with the fire station. The Martin State Airport Crash Fire Rescue Station's jurisdiction includes the Warfield Air National Guard Base, as well as Martin State Airport, but if the county calls, these firefighters are ready to respond.

Additional incidents that the fire department members have responded to in the local community include other vehicle crashes and fires, as well as medical calls at Martin State Airport and even a carbon monoxide leak. Not all the



requests for support are emergencies, though. They have also participated in parades in the local area with their fire trucks, explained Dowling.

"This department has grown a lot in three years. It's expanded," said Dowling. "The past couple years, we've been communicating better, and that's why we've been getting more calls off-base."

While the fire department may be answering more calls in the surrounding communities, they also work to protect their fellow service members and respond to emergencies on-base on a regular basis. These incidents have mostly been medical calls and have ranged from heat and cold injuries, to falls and cuts, explained Dowling.

Additionally, the members of the 175th Fire and Emergency Services also fulfill their obligation to their country and are prepared to deploy in support of ongoing wartime contingencies, as well as natural disasters, said Viands. More than 10 firefighters recently deployed overseas, and in the past, firefighters supported Hurricane Katrina, to assist with humanitarian relief. They also remain current in their training to perform search and rescue operations in areas

affected by natural and manmade disasters such as tornados, hurricanes, earthquakes or terrorist events.

All of the members of the fire department are required to be part of the Maryland Air National Guard and fulfill their one-weekenda-month obligation to the military, but full-time members serve as civilians working as state employees.


"You don't have to be a firefighter in the military to be a part of the fire department, you just have to be a member of the Maryland Air National Guard," explained Dowling, who works with the emergency management office here on military training weekends.

"Once they are a member of the Maryland National Guard, they will be sent to the Louis F. Garland [Department of Defense] Fire Academy at Goodfellow Air Force Base for 14 weeks to receive very rigorous and physically demanding firefighting training," said Viands.

"These firefighters are trained and ready to engage in fire suppression, rescue and other emergency or humanitarian operations when called upon to do so by the Maryland National Guard, the state of Maryland and the United States of America", added Viands.

One thing is for sure, if there is an emergency in the local community, members of the Martin State Airport Crash Fire Rescue Station are always ready for the call.

status state and federal entity. While in state status, it is a component of the Maryland Military Department and reports to the adjutant general of Maryland. The Governor of Maryland is the commander-in-chief of the Maryland militia, which includes the Maryland Air National Guard except when called up under federal mobilization orders.

The Air National Guard also serves as a reserve of the U.S. Air Force. When mobilized, units of the Maryland Air Guard are allotted to various gaining major commands and report through the regular Air Force chain of command to the President of the United States as commander-in-chief.

With the exception of the 135th Airlift Group, the 235th Civil Engineer Flight and the 175th Network Warfare Squadron, the 175th Wing and each of its subordinate units are gained by Air Combat Command. The 135th Airlift Group and its subordinate units are gained by Air Mobility Command, while the 235th Civil Engineer Flight is gained by U.S. Air Forces in Europe and the 175th Network Warfare Squadron is gained by the Air Force Space Command. These forces may be deployed worldwide.

The Air National Guard's federal mission is to maintain well-trained, well-equipped units available for prompt mobilization during war and provide assistance during national emergencies (such as natural disasters or civil disturbances). During peacetime, the combat-ready units and support units are assigned to most Air Force major commands to carry out missions compatible with training, mobilization readiness, humanitarian and contingency operations.

State Mission

Under state law, the Air National Guard provides protection of life, property and preserves peace, order and public safety. These missions are accomplished through emergency relief support during natural disasters such as floods, earthquakes and forest fires; search and rescue operations; support to civil defense authorities; maintenance of vital public services and counterdrug operations.

Local Mission

Participates in and supports community service projects and events throughout the local area through volunteerism and partnering with local business and government.

HEADQUARTERS

In 2013, Joint Force Headquarters-MDANG (JFHQ-MDANG) supported the full spectrum of state and federal military taskings executed by units of the MDANG. The JFHQ-MDANG chief of staff served as the Dual-Status Commander for the 2nd annual Cyber Guard Exercise, hosted by the U.S. Cyber Command and involving the Army and Air National Guard, Army and Navy Reserves, National Security Agency, Department of Homeland Security, Federal Bureau of Investigation, state and local officials, and simulated industry partners. JFHQ-MDANG leadership worked closely with the 175th Wing leadership to mitigate the effects of the Air Force's divestiture of the C-27J program, and subsequent inactivation of the 135th Airlift Group.

The plans and programs branch published the MDANG Strategic Plan. This document provides an overarching vision for the MDANG and a pathway into the future to guide subordinate organizations in establishing their own plans and objectives. This plan is complemented by the MDANG Strategic Communication Plan, prepared by the state public affairs officer to provide an integrated, holistic approach to internal and external communication across the force. This branch continues to forge relationships with the Maryland Army National Guard, the Maryland Joint Staff, and the Maryland Emergency Management Agency.

JFHQ-MDANG managed many key personnel programs, including the Outstanding Airmen of the Year, Hometown Heroes, Senior Officer Career Management, Force Management and Selective Retention Programs. Significant changes to MDANG force structure made for a challenging year for the MDANG recruiting and retention team, with 264 members transferring to other components or retiring due to the inactivation of the 135th Airlift Group. Due to the tremendous efforts of everyone involved, all former 135th Airlift Group members that desired to remain a part of the MDANG were able to do so. The team also added 100 new members to the ranks this year and congratulations go to SSgt Alexandria Woodring for winning the Maryland Recruiter of the year for FY13 for her success in completing 30 accessions.

The Maryland Air National Guard human resources officer (HRO) directed all joint Maryland National Guard full-time human resource programs, supporting all Army and Air full-time employees and providing oversight and coordination on joint staff

personnel issues and reporting. This office also serves as the J-1 staff, providing support to the Maryland Joint Force Headquarters Joint Operations Center during federal and state emergency operations and exercises. Major changes to MDANG force structure and extremely uncertain budgetary issues drove activities this year.

The HRO was responsible for guiding HR activities related to the loss of nearly 100 full time technician and AGR members from the inactivation of the 135th Airlift Group. Movement of all these personnel was accomplished without resorting to Reduction in Force actions. Significant HR oversight was provided in the standup of two new MDANG organizations, the 175th Network Warfare Group and 175th Intelligence Squadron and the appointment and placement of key fulltime leaders for these new organizations. The HRO was also responsible for the MDNG administration of two historically significant federal employee furloughs that impacted nearly all of the approximately 700 member MDNG technician workforce over the course of almost half the work year.

Four members of the state headquarters staff served as part of the joint 32nd Civil Support Team stationed at Fort Meade, Md. They provided Chemical Biological Radiological Nuclear Explosive (CBRNE) expertise in support of a variety of exercises.

At the national level, JFHQ-MDANG personnel include the commander of the Joint Prisoner of War/Missing in Action Accounting Command, the deputy director of the National Guard Bureau's Domestic Operations and Force Development, the deputy director for Nuclear, Homeland Defense, and Current Operations on the Pentagon Joint Staff, and the Air National Guard assistant to the Air Force assistant surgeon general for dental services.

At the Maryland National Guard (MDNG) level a member of the JFHQ-MDANG staff has been selected to serve as the first ANG member to be appointed as the MDNG Senior Enlisted Leader, a joint assignment advocating to the Adjutant General on behalf of all enlisted Soldiers and Airmen in the Maryland National Guard.

Assistant Adjutant General-Air

Mission

Serves as the principal advisor to the governor and adjutant general of Maryland on matters pertaining to the Maryland Air National Guard. Also serves as the commander of the

Maryland Air National Guard. The general is responsible to the adjutant general for the overall management of the flying program and ensuring the units of the Maryland Air National Guard are organized, equipped and trained to support federal and state missions.

State Command Chief Master Sergeant Mission

Advises command leadership on quality-of-life issues and concerns of the enlisted Airmen. Forwards appropriate communication from National Guard Bureau command chief master sergeant to Maryland National Guard senior leadership. Forwards all concerns and issues to state and wing senior leadership or NGB command chief master sergeant, as appropriate. Active participant in the State Force Management Plan concerning enlisted members.

State Public Affairs Officer

Mission

Advises assistant adjutant general-air and senior staff on all aspects of public affairs. Directs state public affairs functions, including media relations, command information and website content. Supports ANG special and extraordinary news opportunities with local, national and international news media.

State Air Surgeon

Mission

The state air surgeon (SAS) is a qualified Air Force flight surgeon who enhances the ability of the ANG to properly perform its state and federal missions acting as the primary liaison between the assistant adjutant general-air, the adjutant general, the National Guard Bureau air surgeon and the medical units. The SAS works with the Army state surgeon and other SAS in the FEMA region to identify medical capabilities and to coordinate the use of medical assets for homeland defense and support to civil authorities.

Delivers professional, candid, independent counsel and full-spectrum legal capabilities to the assistant adjutant general-air, HQ staff and commanders.

175TH WING AND SUBORDINATE UNITS

The 175th Wing continued to deploy personnel all over the world in 2013. Through many challenges the wing proved to be a ready and reliable group of airmen that would be ready to answer the nations call at a moments notice. The wing proved ready through meeting the challenges of a Unit Compliance Inspection and a Health Services Assessment.

The 135th Airlift Group continued to remain a professional and well trained organization within the Maryland Air National Guard. In a year that saw the C-27J inactivated from the wing the members of the airlift group maintained a level of professionalism and kept up with training making them a relevant and effective part of the MDANG. When called upon they answered the call and performed admirably in providing relief efforts to parts of New York and New Jersey that were hit the hardest by Super Storm Sandy. Throughout the year they flew a total of 707 hours. They carried out 16 missions totalling 158 hours. They transported 181 passengers and air dropped 24 people. They carried and delivered a total of 12 tons of cargo in 2013.

The 175th Operations Group and 175th Maintenance Group successfully deployed 4 A-10C aircraft and 37 personnel to Exercise Saber Strike in support of a strategic training

exercise in Estonia. This mission will build a close and lasting relationship with the Estonian Air Forces. The 175th Operations Group participated in their first Virtual Flag exercise. Virtual Flag is a large combat employment exercise conducted in a virtual battlespace. It is designed to provide operational and tactical warfighter training in a combat environment. The 175th Maintenance Group continued modifications and upgrades to the A-10 with Suite 7B which included the Helmet Mounted Cueing System (HCMS) and the LARS v12 CSAR radio. The men and women of both the 175th Maintenance and Operations Group are the true heroes in achieving mission milestones and are committed to adapting to everchanging mission needs.

The 175th Network Warfare Squadron coordinated international cyber defense familiarization, awareness, and training and provided short and long term process improvements to the Country of Estonia's Cyber Defense League. The squadron provided guidance to their newly created Cyber Defense League which resulted in full utilization of their volunteer civilian cyber experts providing computer network defense for their country. In addition, the squadron mentored senior advisors within the Estonian Ministry of Defense to leverage their commercial sector to contribute to the Estonian National Cyber Defense posture. The 235th Civil Engineering

Flight once again deployed to Afghanistan and designed and executed numerous projects enhancing both military infrastructure and civilian quality of life.

The 175th Wing continues to successfully execute expanded wartime and peacetime missions with outstanding professionalism, knowledge, and technical skills that directly contribute to meeting state missions and national defense strategic objectives.

The chaplain office hired a full-time wing chaplain. By doing this they were able to provide added care to all airmen assigned to Warfield Air National Guard base. The chaplain team offered a variety of opportunities for individuals interested in joining the religious community including worship services,

religious education, fellowship, and study groups.

The wing safety office continued to provide

an aggressive safety program therefore preventing safety mishaps on base. The Wing safety team is always out and about the base providing safety guidance and leadership.

175TH OPERATIONS GROUP


uring 2013, the group's personnel continued to train for all aspects of their job to remain eligible to be worldwide deployable. The training continued in a year that presented different challenges including sequestration and a Consolidated Unit Inspection. Throughout these challenges the 175th Operations Group maintained professionalism and their willingness to do whatever it takes to get the job done.

In June, the group sent four aircraft and 81 personnel to Estonia to participate in Exercise Saber Strike, a EUCOM Close Air Support exercise, with our Baltic partners. The joint exercise demonstrated the partnership between Maryland and our counterpart in Estonia.

The operations group sent six A-10's and a total of 90 personnel to Nellis AFB to support the A-10 Weapons School Combat Search and Rescue (CSAR) phase. They flew as both CSAR assets and as supporting strike assets for the schools syllabus. During the deployment, the group accomplished qualifying some of their pilots in CSAR sorties. As a result of this deployment, 100 percent of the pilots in the operations group are CSAR qualified.

The Operations Group also qualified their pilots in Dry Lakebed (Austere Airfield) operations in a deployment to Nellis AFB. They sent four A-10s and 36 personnel to this deployment. Dry lakebed training is a special requirement for the A-10 and they were able to qualify 14 pilots in unimproved surface operations. The group has the most qualified A-10 pilots in this training in the Air Force.

The group participated in Virtual Flag 13-4 and 14-1. They sent 10 pilots to the exercise which is performed at home station by linking pilots into a network of simulators around the world. The Group received an Excellent in the Consolidated Unit Inspection. The Intel



and AFE shops were "Superior Performers" for the group. Tech. Sgt. Seth Randleman was named the 175th Wing NCO of the year for his performance in the year and during the UCI.





235TH CIVIL ENGINEERING FLIGHT

he 235th CEF wrapped up an incredibly successful year providing outstanding engineering and fire protection support to combatant commanders and Headquarters staff.

The 235th supported Exercise Patriot 2013 in July 2013 at Volk Field, Wis and Ft. McCoy, Wis. Patriot is a National Guard exercise that tests the Guard's ability to support local and state first responders in support of multiple emergency situations, to identify strengths and weaknesses in current emergency response plans. More than 1,100 military members and civil authorities participated.

The 235th CEF completed critical tasks for HQ United States Air Forces in Europe at RAF Fairford in England and Moron Air Base in Spain in September 2013. At RAF Fairford, the unit reviewed and validated the annual airfield waiver package submissions for the installation. At Moron, we developed a beddown plan for a Marine quick-reaction batallion.

The 235th CEF assisted the Pentagon's

Joint Chiefs of Staff (JCS) Engineer Division with management of the Exercise Related Construction (ERC) Program. The ERC program is a JCS construction program that provides funding for construction of facilities overseas in support of joint exercises. These projects are typically constructed using military troop labor to provide construction experience to military engineer forces. The 235th CEF analyzed ERC program quarterly reports, assisted with planning and execution of the annual ERC conferences, and drafted a revision to the ERC program governing instruction (CJCSI 4600.02A).

The 235th CEF provided engineering support services to our host base, the 175th Wing, by reviewing construction submittals and performing quality assurance for the Operations, Training, and Medical Facility at Warfield Air National Guard base. The 235th CEF also performed design reviews for the renovation of the existing 175th Wing Headquarters building.

The 235th CEF provided support to the

Maryland Joint Force Headquarters by creating memorandums of understanding (MOUs) from the Joint Reception, Staging, and Onward Integration (JRSOI) surveys that the unit conducted last summer. The MOUs will enable the use of key airfields for JRSOI missions. Additionally, the unit surveyed ingress and egress convoy staging areas for the JRSOI sites.

The 235th CEF also redesigned the planned tent city locations for the Warfield ANGB JRSOI plan due to new constructions.



On Sept. 16, 2011, Connelly chose to have the leg removed below the knee.

"(When the accident happened) I was upset. I didn't think I would be able to return to work. I didn't understand how it would affect my life. I was scared," said Connelly. His friends were scared but supportive. "They didn't know how to help. My family stuck by my side and is very supportive."

Connelly started a rehabilitation process to walk, and then run

Connelly competed in the Texas Regional Games which are used for qualifying for the Paralympic Nationals in San Antonio, Texas June 14-16. He will, however, compete in the Endeavor Games at the University of Central Oklahoma June 6-9 to make a second attempt at qualifying in the 200m for the Paralympic Nationals.

"My goal for now is to make the nationals. In the time frame I have I will probably not win nationals. I am a beginner at running and at this point I do what I can do," said Connelly. His goal is to win nationals in a future year with the ultimate goal of the 2016

Paralympic games in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

"I would like to stay in the military and compete for the Air Force team. I would like to work down at Walter Reed as a physical therapist," he said. Most wounded military members with amputations go to Walter Reed Military Hospital in Bethesda, Md, to receive and learn how to use their prosthesis.

To stay in the military, "I had to do a PT test and prove to medical that I can do my job without assistance. The worst part was the paperwork. I had to prove myself to the base medical review board," said Connelly. His next step is to be medically worldwide deployable.

Lt. Col. Tom Donnellan, deputy commander, 175th Maintenance Group, talked about Connelly's progress to stay in the military. "He has to do what all Airmen would do to stay in the military."

"I couldn't imagine waking up one morning missing a limb. He has been able to overcome it. The military has seen a lot of this," said Donnellan. "Losing your limb affects your whole life. He was in good physical shape to begin with. He had the mental capability to deal with the accident. He trained to do his job with his limitations."

"He is a young troop and no one wants this to happen. He is squared away and knows what he needs to do to stay in the game," he said.

He is also participating in a study by the University of Florida on prosthesis. The study helps develop the devices not only for him but also for others who need the devices.

He is testing three mechanical feet. They put him on an obstacle course that the Tampa police SWAT uses which includes walking/running on treadmills. The performance of the foot is then evaluated under these conditions. During these tests, his vital signs are monitored to see how his body works with the devices. "The study is to see how the different feet perform in stress related conditions," said Connelly.

Donnellan likes that Connelly is working to improve prosthesis that both civilians and military members may use in the future. "I hope by working the kinks out of the new prosthesis, it will benefit him and others."

Although Connelly has received support from a lot of people, one person stands out: Tech. Sgt. Kandyce O'Meally.

"I saw him walking around with a prosthetic leg and I didn't know who he was. I approached him and asked him if I could ask him a few questions. We started talking and I discovered he was into track. I learned he wanted to go to Rio in 2016 - the Paralympic games in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil," said O'Meally. She is a main-

tenance management data analyst in the 135th Maintenance Operation Flight.

"I asked how he was going to do it and what his plans were. In the conversation, I let him know I had some contacts in the track world from when I trained during college," she said. She got him in contact with someone on the Paralympic committee.

"She helps me out at times when I need it. I have a lot of paperwork to fill out and she helps me out with that. She is a great person. She helps me out when I am down. She gives me motivation. She is a great hearted person," said Connelly.

"I see a hard working kid. I see a kid with a lot of motivation and drive. He is never down. Life dealt him a hand, not a bad hand, not a good hand. Just a hand and he plays it well," said O'Meally.

"I think she has been very beneficial to him. She has given him the backup, support and guidance to get where he is today," said Donnellan.

Donnellan summed up Connelly's potential, "It's whatever he wants to make of it. He is on the right track. He can go as far as he wants to."

Connelly has good advice for anyone who has lost a limb. "Keep your head up. Don't let anything discourage you. It is a mind over body experience. If you keep your head in the right place you can do anything you want."



SUPPORT ORGANIZATIONS

Airman and Family Readiness Program

The Airman and Family Readiness Office (A&FRO) provided pre-deployment and post-deployment briefings for service members and their families throughout 2013. In addition, it has offered annual family readiness briefings, workshops on financial fitness, and pre-seperation counseling. A&FRO meets regularly with the 175th Student Flight to welcome new members. Key volunteers continue to be a force multiplier for the A&FRO. The volunteers work at unit level to better facilitate communication and assistance between families and the Maryland Air National Guard. Trained and appointed volunteers assist with providing sustainment support to families during deployments. A&FRO continues to collaborate with the Maryland Army National guard Family Programs on joint activities and events. MDNG Child and Youth Program continues to provide our ANG youth with plenty of activities such as the sumer camp "Homefront Challenge," MDNG Teen Council, "Drop and Shop," and opportunities with Operation: Military Kids, a partnership with 4-H. A&FRO continues to assist the Chaplain Corps with planning and executing Strong Bonds events. We will continue to assist in providing single, couple, and family weekends for our MDANG members

Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve

Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve is a Department of Defense organization. It was established in 1972 to promote cooperation and understanding between reserve component members (National Guard and Reserve) and their civilian employers and to assist in the resolution of conflicts arising from an employee's military commitment. ESGR assists members from all seven reserve components: Army Reserve, Army National Guard, Air Force Reserve, Air National Guard, Navy Reserve, Marine Corps Reserve, and Coast Guard Reserve. They operate through a network of volunteers throughout the country. The Maryland ESGR office is located at the Maryland Military Department headquarters in Baltimore and can be reached at 410-234-3816.

Besides its stated goals of promoting public understanding of the National Guard and Reserve and encouraging partnerhsips between civilian organizations of military units in the community, the office has promoted a number of outreach activities this year in furtherance of its goals.

The Employer Outreach subcommittee hosted luncheons across Maryland where more than 300 employers were honored for support of their employees. For Fiscal Year 2013, the committee hosted four Bosslift missions. Employers participated in an air-to-air refueling mission aboard an Air Force Reserve KC-135 aircraft in November, 2012. In June, employers of Maryland National Guard members flew

aboard an Air National Guard C-27 aircraft to Webster Field in St. Mary's County where they were briefed by Maj. Gen. James Adkins, the adjutant general of Maryland, on the missions of the Army and Air National Guard. In July, Navy Reserve employers visited the Navy Operational Support Center at Fort McHenry. Later that day, the group traveled to the National Museum of the Navy in Washington, D.C. where they were met and briefed by Rear Adm. Scott Sanders, reserve deputy director, joint staff. In September, 2013, the Maryland ESGR committee hosted more than 65 employers and service members at the Baltimore Grand Prix road race. Overall in FY 2013, the Maryland ESGR committee sponsored and staffed 90 employer outreach events briefing more than 1,100 individuals.

Maryland ESGR members were very active in their military outreach mission. The ESGR briefed 2,450 Air National Guard members, 3,916 Army National Guard members and 4,841 reserve members from the other five reserve components. Volunteers staffed 38 Department of Defense Yellow Ribbon Reintegration events, 11 mobilizations and demobilization events, 14 unit briefings and 32 other military activities.

Employement assistance activities increased in FY 2013 as more and more reserve members were demobilized and returned home. Maryland ESGR and the Hero 2 Hire program (www.H2H.job) participated in 18 hiring events supported by over 400 employers resulting in the hiring of over 600 Guard and Reserve members.

Maryland ESGR ombudsmen provided assistance to more than 100 employers and service members to understand and resolve military related duty questions. ESGR ombudsmen are DOD certified mediators. In FY 2013, Maryland ombudsmen were able to mediate all 39 complaints received from Guard and Reserve members regarding their employment and reemployment conditions. The Maryland ESGR committee consists of three full-time staff members and 54 volunteers. In FY 2013, the staff and volunteers worked 8,664 hours to assist Guard and Reserve members and their families.

Psychological Health Support

Mission

The wing director of psychological health is to provide commander consultation to help support the resiliency efforts on base, provide education and consultation on resilience programs, establish a traumatic stress response team, and encourage and facilitate other programs supporting positive and mission-focused emotional well-being. The office presents a variety of topics on base to enhance wellness such as stress management, communication, conflict resolution, and relationships. In addition, they meet with Air Guard members to provide a clinical interview and referral to local mental health providers and other resources to address any issues hindering a member's maximum well being. Within the realm of case management, they provide continuity and help the member address any challenges in receiving services. In addition, the office collaborates with and assists with training local community providers regarding military culture, providing information relating to best practices and treatment needed for on-going counseling for Air Guard members and their families.

1/17/2013 - BALTIMORE -- December 7, a date to most is linked to the attack on Pearl Harbor. For six members of the Maryland Air National Guard, December 7, 2012, is a date to remember when they were commissioned and pinned on the rank of second lieutenant. All six members graduated together from the Academy of Military Science, Maxwell Air Force base, Ala.

Normally one or two members of the same unit are in a class together.

"Having other members of the Maryland Air National Guard there with me made the transition from the enlisted side to the officer side much easier,"said 2nd Lt. Jake Weiser, a C-27 pilot candidate.

"It was great because I knew that I had a support structure outside my team. I was able to help other Maryland members. It was good we all had the opportunity to go as a group and we would make it out as a group," said 2nd Lt. Charles J. Wille, now

a maintenance officer with the 175th Maintenance Squadron. Wille was voted class speaker. He spoke to the families during the open house part of graduation.

"Anytime you did a group activity you had the support of your fellow Maryland Air National Guardsmen," he said.

"It was like an additional layer of trust and assurance," said 2nd Lt. William O. Ferguson, cyberspace operations officer, 175th Network Warfare Squadron.

"It was difficult. It was very similar to basic training for the first couple of weeks. A lot of leadership skills and

we were put in leadership positions right away," said 2nd Lt. James R. Sells, an A-10 pilot candidate with the 104th Fighter Squadron.

2nd Lt. Jake Weiser, 135th Airlift Squadron, said, "Lessons from basic training were instrumental in officer's school. I felt like instructors expected prior enlisted to teach non-

> prior enlisted about enlisted life."

"AMS was a lot harder than basic training," said 2nd Lt. Rachel G. Bowen, of ficer in charge, Man power and Personnel flight, 175th Force Support Squadron. Bowen, who said her parents were both of ficers and inspired her, wanted to become an officer since she was 11 years old.

Wille recalled 2nd Lt. Brandon M. Krantz, a C-27 pilot candidate, showing initiative from day one. There were only three cop ies of the dorm setup manual for 100 stu dents. Krantz went Photo Illustration to a copy store so everyone would have

a copy. "Maryland made an impact for the entire school. We learned that information is not something to be hoarded," Wille said.

"These individuals who I went to school with will definitely be friends for life," Wille said. "Even outside this base, they will be there for support,"

EXPENDITURES/ECONOMIC IMPACT

Economic Impact

Maryland Air Guard salaries and expenditures totaling more than \$81.5 million created an estimated 559 off-base jobs within the Baltimore/Washington Metropolitan Statistical Area. The total economic impact of the Maryland Air Guard for Fiscal Year 2013 was more than \$117.2 million.

Because of these expenditures and the jobs they create, the Maryland Air National Guard has a significant economic impact on the City of Baltimore and the surrounding counties, as well as on the state of Maryland as a whole.

Military and civilian payrolls, construction contracts and other operational expenditures by the Maryland Air National Guard are a significant economic benefit to both the state and the communities in which Guardsmen live and work.

The federal dollars expended generate multiplier effects on the local economy. Air Force Manual 65-506, *Economic Analysis Procedures Handbook*, provides a model for re-estimation of the total economic impact and secondary jobs created by these expenditures.

The Total Economic Impact is derived from a computation that accounts for the "respending" effect of each federal dollar expended within the economic impact region.

The secondary jobs created computation estimates the number of off-base jobs created by the spending of federal dollars within the economic impact region, which is defined as the Baltimore Metropolitan Statistical Area.

The dollar amounts representing expenditures made during the 2013 fiscal year are set forth in the table below. The complete derivation of the total economic impact and the secondary jobs created is documented and maintained in the 175th Wing Financial Management Office at Warfield Air National Guard Base.

Cooperative Agreements

Operations, maintenance and environmental programs are funded cooperatively by the state and federal governments, with the federal share being 75 percent. In addition, a number of additional programs are state-administered, but are 100 percent federally funded.




