

Thanksgiving Message

LET US BE THANKFUL

Nathaniel Morton, secretary and keeper of the records for the Plymouth Colony, wrote these words concerning those memorable circumstances of the year 1620: "Being now passed the vast ocean, and a sea of troubles before them in expectations, they had now no friends to welcome them, no inns to entertain or refresh them, no houses, or much less towns, to repair unto to seek for succour; and for the season it was winter, and they that know the winters of the country know them to be sharp and violent, subject to cruel and fierce storms, dangerous to travel to known places, much more to search unknown coasts. . . If they looked behind them, there was a mighty ocean which they had passed, and was now as a main bar, or gulph to separate them from all the civil parts of the world."

As one observes the "gulph" between 1620 and 1966, he is immediately impressed by the great nation which has developed from the seeds planted in Plymouth Colony. He is further struck by the vision of the people that, one day, it will be even greater. This vision is firmly based upon the bountiful natural resources of the land, and the sure confidence of a people who gave blood in two great wars and afterward gave of their material resources to repair, uphold, and protect all the civil parts of

the world across the gulph. At times we are described by others as being a boastful people. That we emphasize the material at the expense of the spiritual. The concept of the "Great Society" is presented as a goal towards which we move. Much can be said that reflects adversely, however, much more can be said that reveals the American people to be a source of inspiration for the free world. In this there is cause for pride that we have great concern for the people of the world as evidenced in the response to the Peace Corps. We hope this kind of pride never vanishes from our National scene. It is cause for thanksgiving that we can walk proudly among the nations of the world. That we can do this we owe a debt of gratitude not only to the God-given bounty of the land but to man-made institutions which let it flourish, the economic freedoms in which we labor and the political freedoms in which we govern ourselves, and the freedom for a man to worship Almighty God to the dictates of his heart.

Nathaniel Morton recorded the acts of a brave people entering the unknown with courage and a dauntless faith in tomorrow. We in the Space Age, are entering the unknown. But we can all remind ourselves that the richness of this country was not born in the resources of the earth, though they be plentiful, but in the men that took its measure. If those men, setting out from Delfs-Haven, had been dismayed by the troubles they saw around them, then we could not this Autumn be thankful for a fair land, and in the abundant hope that we have for tomorrow.

Then let us be thankful for our heritages and with pride seek an understanding of God's will for the future. . . and with courage and faith walk forward into the unknown of each tomorrow.





K-Bay Holds Secretary Navy Demonstration

Fifteen guests of the Secretary of Navy and their escorts will view a Brigade Air Ground demonstration here Saturday.

day.

The party will arrive at Brigade Headquarters at 10:30 a.m. and proceed to Kansas Tower for a welcome, maximumperformance take-off demonstration, refreshments, and briefings by Col. A. M. Moran, Station CO, and Col. D.J. Stapp, Brigade CO.

Following aerial refueling and Morest landing exhibitions they move to the guerrilla training area for mine and explosives instruction before walking the mined trail.

After lunch in the field the group is scheduled at the Ulupau Crater for the air-ground fire power demonstration.

At 2 p.m. they leave via helicopter for Marine Barracks, Pearl Harbor. monstration flights.

Dubbed by one K-Bay Marine as "The Little Rascal," the craft introduces such qualities as a high degree of inherent stability, control power and a greater center-of-gravity range than an equivalent hinged - rotor helicopter.

After taking a demonstration flight, Kaneohe-based pilots summed up the helicopter with statements of "...definitely flies more like an airplane

Lockheed's tour director, Jack Conner, stated that "External disturbances such as wind gusts, have little appreciable effect on the rigid rotor system."

He stated that due to this stability, an aircraft carrier would not have to alter course for the craft to take off or land.

Mr. Conner also said that the "Low vibration levels and the ability of speeds higher than articulated-rotor helicopters are other features."

Among the other K-Bay pilots flying the craft were Col. A.M. Moran, Station CO, and LtCol. R. W. Cline, XO.

New Law Outlaws Oahu Hitchiking

Hitch-hiking has been outlawed on Oahu, and offenders will be ticketed.

Ordnance 2553, subsection 15-17.7 of the Traffic Code of the City and County reads:

"No person shall stand on, walk along or otherwise occupy any portion of a public street or highway including the shoulder or sidewalk area for the purpose of soliciting a free ride from any vehicle."





When a Peacemaker bullet hits your leg you fall to the ground unconscious and if it hits the thigh bone and you are lucky enough to survive the torn arteries and shock, then vou will never walk again without crutches because a totally disintegrated femur leaves the surgeon with no option but to cut your leg off.

And so I stood absolutely motionless, not breathing for the Peacemaker Colt that had prompted this unpleasant train of thought was pointed directly at my right thigh."

Thus the breathless opening scene, with Calvert facing the business end of a gun, to the suspenseful moments, when eight bells toll, bears the stamp of the master storyteller.

Alistair MacLean has given us a new British Secret Service team: courageous, merciless Philip Calvert and his London-based, title-wor-shiping chief, "Uncle Ar-thur" (Rear Admiral Sir

Arthur Arnford-Jones) whose cold forbidding manner masked a very warm heart.

For months, Uncle Arthur and his agents had been stalking a ruthless, well - organized gang of ship hijackers operation in the Irish Sea.

The "Holmwood", the "Antara", the "Headley Pioneer" and the "Hurricane Spray", each had disappeared.

They had several things in common: their crews had been removed and put ashore; each vessel had vanished without a trace; and all carried extremely valuable cargoes.

The latest victim, the "Nantesville", unlike the other ships, she carried, carefully aboard, two Secret Service Agents and a radio signal transmitter, which kept Uncle Arthur and his men informed of ship's course. Suddenly the transmission stopped. .And the "Nantesville" was lost!
