aws govern public drinking

Twenty-five dollars is a lot to pay for a can of beer but a lot of people have been paying it since the Honolulu Police Department began arresting those people violating the public drinking laws.

laws. Revised Ordinance, Section 13-42, prohibits the drinking or displaying of any alcoholic beverage in public, including beaches, parks, parking lots, sidewalks and streets in Hawaii. Last month HPD started cracking down on those violating the ordinance. the ordinance.

"So long as the city has a law which prohibits drinking in public parks, we are going to enforce that law," said Honolulu Mayor Eileen Anderson.

In two recent weekends police arrested nearly 200 people for liquor and drug violations on Waikiki Beach. According to

Army Sergeant First Class James Berryman, Noncommissioned Officer in Charge of the Military Police Department at Fort DeRussy, 66 Armed Forces personnel were arrested by HPD in July for drinking in public on

ONE AIRMAN, EIGHT Marines, 21 soldiers and 36 sailors were arrested, handcuffed, booked and eventually released on \$25 bail each. "The majority of them were arrested on the beach behind Fort DeRussy," said SFC Berryman. - Drinking alcoholic beverages is

allowed on the grassy area at Fort DeRussy and the Hale Koa Hotel at Waikiki. However, only a sidewalk separates this federal property from the beach which is owned by the state.

"All you have to do is step one foot onto the sand and you're on state property," said SFC

Berryman, "and subject to being picked up by the HPD. I've seen people no more than a foot off the sidewalk who were arrested. But that's all it takes."

EFFORTS HAVE BEEN made to inform service members of the laws prohihiting the of the laws prohibiting the drinking of alcoholic beverages on public beaches in Hawaii. Signs are posted on the lifeguard towers on the beach at Fort DeRussy which can be read from the sidewalk before reaching the sand, which is state property. In addition, according to John Kay, Director of Public Relations at the Hale Koa Hotel that botel

at the Hale Koa Hotel, that hotel has posted signs stating that alcoholic beverages are not

allowed on the beach. "I don't know if people are not paying attention and they aren't seeing the signs, or if they just don't care," said Kay. "So now when you buy a drink, the

bartender tells you that the drink can't be taken onto the beach. We also have signs on the cash

registers saying the same thing." According to SFC Berryman, half of those arrested don't realize that it's against the law to drink on the beach. "We had a whole unit from Schofield Barracks picked up one day. "SFC Berryman added. Like Fort DeRussy and the Hale

Like Fort DeRussy and the Hate Koa Hotel, the Marine Corps Air Station, Kaneohe Bay is located on federal property. However, state regulations (Station Order 5500.6A) prohibit the drinking of alcoholic beverages in certain areas at the Air Station.

ALCOHOL MAY NOT be consumed in any type of motor vehicle or in working areas except during authorized parties. Lance corporals and below are prohibited from having alcoholic beverages in the Unaccompanied beverages in the Unaccompanied Enlisted Quarters. Authorized corporals and sergeants are permitted to store alcoholic beverages in the UEQ if there is a secure storage area under the direct control of the activitity commander or a delegated authority. authority. Drinking is not allowed in any

Special Services activity including the theater, pool, gym, hobby shops and marina, or in the Counseling and Assistance Center (Building 1037) and on the baseball diamond adjacent to the building.

BEER MAY BE consumed on

BEER MAY BE consumed on the Air Station at Pyramid Rock, Fort Hase and Hale Koa beaches, (not to be confused with Fort DeRussy and the Hale Koa Hotel in Waikiki). According to Lieutenant Colonel Ronald Neubauer, Provost Marshal here, beer is the only alcoholic beverage allowed on these baches and must be in cans since glass containers are not allowed on any of the Air Station's beaches.

Anytime a govern-ment vehicle is involv-ed in an accident, on or off station, the driver is required to complete a Standard Form 91, according to Station Order 5890.1c.





been added to the checkage sales of uniform clothing, a system designed to give enlisted Marines an opportunity to buy required uniforms without creating financial hardships.

ACCORDING TO ALMAR 118/81, Marines will no longer be able to use checkage sales to replace missing or unserviceable uniform items with credit whenever they want to, or when purchases are for less than \$50.

The minimum limitation was imposed to improve cost efficiency by reducing the number of lowdollar checkage sales. In the past, items as inexpensive as utility covers were purchased using checkage sales

checkage sales. A bonafide hardship must exist and the uniforms must be needed, according to officials here. Whether checkage sales should or should not be used is determined

EVEN THE checkage sales of

uniform clothing can sometimes cause financial hardships because the full amount of the sale is normally taken out of the Marine's next paycheck. To Marine's next paycheck. To alleviate this problem, a Marine's commanding officer can make arrangements with the local disbursing officer to schedule payroll deductions over a period of time to repay the total checkage sale

According to officials here, a Marine cannot just decide to use checkage sales because he/she is short on cash and needs a few uniform items to stand a personnel inspection. Preparations for personnel inspections do not qualify as emergencies since these items should be replaced when needed using the indivi-dual's monthly cash maintenance

Sometimes one club's prices are copied from those of another club. Do your own comparison shopping to be sure the buying club prices are com-petitive. Be wary of the club that won't release its price list until you

are a member. A club that actually intends to save you money has no reason to hide prices Check shipping charges; these can make or break a bargam.

HISTORICALLY, one of the major drawbacks to buying clubs has proved to be their instability as business organiza-tions. A consumer paying a membership fee in advance has little hope of regaining his or her losses should the club go out of the club go out of business. Because of business. Because of this, six states (Cali-fornia, Georgia, Iowa, Minnesota, South Dakota, and Winscon-sin) have laws requiring buying clubs to post bond. The bonds can then be used to refund membership fees to consumers if the club goes out of business and refuses to

make refunds.

Defense Secretary fights possible tuition charges Secretary Caspar STUDENTS WHOSE spon

Defense Weinberger has assured service secretaries that the Reagan administration will use all available legal steps to prevent the imposition of tuition charges on military members for public school education of their dependents.

IN A JUNE 1 memorandum to secretaries of the military departments he emphasized confidence in this position, noting that some local jurisdictions are contemplating the imposition of tuition charges for the public school education of military dependents. This action, he said, is in response to proposed reductions in federally funded impact aid provided to communities having significant populations of federal workers. "I want to make clear," Wein-berger continued, "my view that any such action by states, counties, or school districts is completely unwarranted and that the Department of Defense will take every possible measure to prevent it.

"THE MATTER HAS my close attention. Please advise your members that I am determined memoers that I am determined that no soldier, sailor, airman, or Marine will be forced to pay tuition for the public school education of his or her dependents." dependents.

The federal impact aid program reimburses public school districts for a portion of the cost incurred in for a portion of the cost incurred in educating dependents of federal employees, including members of the military services. It provides financial assistance to local-educational districts where operation of a military installation or other activity on federal property deprives states and local districts of real property. consumer, and income taxes.

THE IMPACT AID budget proposal for FY 1982 will affect

two categories of students. Those students whose sponsors live and work on federal property category A. There are are termed category A. There are about 230,500 military dependents in this group. For school districts where category A children constitute 20 percent or more of total district enrollment, impact aid would continue at 90 percent of the FY 1981 level.

The remaining category A military dependents are in schools where less than 20 percent of total district enrollments are made up of federal employee dependents. Impact aid for these districts would be eliminated.

In the expectation that Congress will approve the FY 1982 budget proposals, some states are preparing to enact legislation permitting local school districts to charge tuition fees to dependents of service members living on military installations.

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



Hawaii are parthonegenic. This means that each specimen is female and produces fertile eggs without copulating with a male. These are the Mourning Gecko (Lepi doactylus lugubris) and the Indo-Pacific Gecko (Hemidactylus garnoti).

The Mourning Gecko is believed to have arrived in Hawaii as a stowaway aboard early Polynesian voyaging canoes. It usually stays hidden beneath rocks or bark during the day but will travel short distances to lick juices from fallen papayas and mangoes. At night the sociable lizard can be found in and around houses or near lighted areas which attract insects.

IDENTIFICAtion of this specimen is quite easy due to smooth, satiny skin which has large paired dark spots and bars extended the length of their back.

The Indo-Pacific Gecko is sometimes called the "Fox Gecko" because of its long, narrow fox-like snout. Renowned for it's ability to live in association with man, the Indo-Pacific Gecko is now seldom found in urban areas. This is attributed to its inability to compete with the more aggressive House Gecko

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




