Week-long celebrations mark Navy anniversary

PEARL HARBOR — Through-out Hawaii, Navy and Marine Corps commands will celebrate the United States Navy's 206th birthday with an array of events and activities during the second week in October.

Some highlights of the week's events are:

- A Team Olympics, hosted by Pearl Harbor Naval Station, will be held Saturday at Naval Station's Ward Field;

- Commander Naval Base, Pearl Harbor will host the time-honored Navy Birthday Sunset Parade Friday, at Marine Barracks, Hawaii;

- Navy ships and commands in Hawaii will sponsor a Family Day for all hands and their dependents as part of the Navy Birthday observance;

- A 50-piece orchestra composed of members of the Pacific Fleet and Fleet Marine Force, Pacific Bands will present a one-hour concert open to all military and guests at the Naval Station gazebo on Hale Alii Road, Tuesday beginning at 7:30 p.m.;

- Saturday, will be observed as Navy Uniform Day when all Naval personnel, including active duty, reserve, Navy ROTC, Navy Junior ROTC, Sea Cadets and retired members, are encouraged to wear the uniform of the day;

- The Pacific Fleet Band will play the national anthem at morning colors at major Pearl Harbor commands during Navy Birthday week;

- The Navy Exchange at Johnson Circle will sponsor special sales from Friday through Oct. 15;

- The Pearl Harbor Naval Station will coordinate their annual motor whaleboat races on Saturday, in the South Channel;

- Tuesday, the 206th anniversary of the Navy's creation by Congress, all ships at Pearl Harbor will full dress ship with flags and pennants flying from bow to stern;

- The Pearl Harbor Naval Station Chief Petty Officer Club will hold the Chiefs' Annual Navy Ball Saturday at 6 p.m.

- Saturday and Sunday will be observed as Navy Sabbath weekend with Navy personnel encouraged to wear their uniform to church services;

- The frigate USS Ouellet will sponsor a Navy Birthday dependents' cruise to Kahului, Maui, from Friday till Tuesday, with guided tours for visitors from 1 till 4 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

- The frigate USS Rathburne will sponsor a similar cruise to Nawiliwili, Kauai during the same dates with guided tours for visitors from 1 till 4 p.m. Monday;

- The Pacific Fleet Band will tour the Naval Base Friday and Tuesday by truck throughout the morning in a musical salute to Pearl Harbor-based Navy personnel;

- Commands throughout Hawaii will sponsor special ceremonies honoring individuals

during the birthday week. The ceremonies will range from group reenlistments to awards presentations; and

- The Honolulu Council of the

Navy League will sponsor a luncheon honoring the outstanding junior officers and enlisted personnel Oct. 30 at the Ala Moana Hotel.

Parade honors Navy

PEARL HARBOR — If you love a parade, you'll want to see the Navy Birthday Sunset Parade at Pearl Harbor Friday.

It's the curtain raising event of the Navy's 206th birthday celebration at Pearl Harbor — and traditionally the Naval Base's most colorful parade.

THE FLEET Marine Force, Pacific Band and 200 Marines from the Marine Barracks, Hawaii will march in review beginning at 5:30 p.m. before a star-studded gathering of admirals, generals and state, city and civic leaders at Quick Field.

More than 300 special guests, including many members of the Navy League, are expected to attend the annual parade honoring the Navy's birthday anniversary.

Rear Admiral Stanley Anderson, the Pearl Harbor Naval Base Commander, also has invited all Armed

Forces personnel — active duty and retired — and civilian government employees to attend with their families.

The parade will celebrate traditions such as the drawing of The sword to order "Sound Attention," the Marine Barracks Hawaii color guard will "March on the Colors" to the center of the field as well as the playing of "Echo Taps" as a tribute to fallen Navy and Marine Corps comrades.

Admiral James Watkins, Commander-in-Chief of the Pacific Fleet, will be the reviewing officer for the parade of troops.

ADM WATKINS will ceremoniously inspect the troops with the Marine Barracks Commanding Officer, Colonel Frank Koethe and the Commander of Troops, Major Christopher Mohr. All units will pass in review for Adm Watkins followed by "Retire the Colors."

The parade will be followed by a reception for invited guests.

Participants in the parade will include units from Lualualei, commanded by Marine Captain W.E. Heinzman; Wahiawa, commanded by Marine Capt Joseph Prizy; and Marine Barracks, commanded by Maj Mohr.

Fleet Marine Force Pacific Band, led by Marine Warrant Officer David Robins, will provide the ceremonial music for the parade.

The Fleet Marine Force Saluting Battery, commanded by Marine Capt Duane Hegna, will honor Adm Watkins with the traditional 17-gun salute during the parade.

ALL ACTIVE military, reserve, retired, civilian employees and Navy League members are invited to attend this celebration honoring the anniversary of the United States Navy's history and proud tradition.



College

Program attracts quality recruits

HQMC, WASHINGTON. — Recruiting quality people, particularly in hard skill military occupational specialties, is a difficult task to accomplish.

The new Community College Enlistment Program gives recruiters added strength to accomplish the task of keeping the Corps full of top-notch Marines.

THE PROGRAM, announced in ALMAR 143/81, is designed to attract high quality recruits, primarily in hard MOSs. The program begins Oct. 1, with a big effect beginning on local college campuses this month.

The program is open to all second-year community college students, associated degree graduates and college students who have completed a special course of instruction provided by a community college.

According to the ALMAR, many community colleges offer one-year or less curriculums in areas such as welding, drafting, building and electrical construction and maintenance. Certificate holders in these areas are eligible for enlistment under CCEP.

INDIVIDUALS enlisting under CCEP will be entitled to the following four-year incentives: guaranteed military occupational specialty (except occupational field 03, 08, 18 and MOS 1371).

excellent promotion opportunity and an enlistment bonus if qualified.

Advancement opportunities for CCEP enlistees are excellent. Upon enlistment into the delayed entry program, the individual will be promoted to private first class. Lance corporal promotions will take place when Marines are at their first duty station or school subsequent to successful completion of recruit training.

The Marine will be entitled to corporal after 13 months active service and sergeant upon 26 months active service.

IF THE FIELD the individual is enlisting into offers a bonus, the individual is also eligible for the bonus, except in those specialties listed above.

Eligible applicants with prior service will receive individual consideration for reappointment to grades higher than those currently authorized in career planning directives.

The ALMAR also states that commanding officers of CCEP enlistees are required to send those Marines to the first available noncommissioned officer school and will ensure those Marines also enroll and complete the Marine Corps Institute Course, "The Marine NCO" as early as possible.

Marines welcome airmen

F-16 unit participates in joint exercise

Ten F-16 aircraft from the Tactical Air Command, 474th Tactical Fighter Wing at Nellis Air Force Base, Nev., arrived at the Air Station Friday to begin a 30-day exercise.

The exercise, "Cope Elite," involves combat training for Army and Air Force units based in Hawaii. The Pacific Air Force's 326 Air Division, the 22nd Tactical Air Support Squadron the 154th Composite Group and the Hawaii Air National Guard will work with the 474th. United States Air Force units regularly deploy to Hawaii in support of these semi-annual maneuvers.

This is the first time the F-16 has participated in Cope Elite. The aircraft were refueled by Strategic Air Command KC-135 strato tankers en route to Hawaii. Airlift of Maintenance Support personnel was provided by Military Airlift Command 141 "Starlifters."

The Special Services Department, located under the station library, provides for the morale, welfare and recreation of the personnel aboard the Air Station.

THROUGH involvement in their programs patrons can take advantage of discounts, increase their mental and physical health and enjoy themselves in the Hawaiian weather.

An authorized HITS ticket outlet within the reception area provides tickets for concerts, special features and athletic

events at Neal Blaisdell Center, Aloha Stadium and Waikiki Shell. Tickets can be purchased with a 10 percent discount during the hours of 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The Family Theater adjacent to the information office shows daily movies. The doors open at 6:45 p.m. and showtime is 7:15 p.m.

Special Services also provides a variety of recreational areas as well as the equipment. Life guards are provided at the Station Pool, 13th Tee and Pyramid Rock beaches so water lovers can safely enjoy

themselves in many different water sports.

OR, FOR those who prefer less salt in their water, the Olympic size swimming pool may satisfy their needs. Patrons can relax poolside in lounge chairs and at umbrella tables. Two diving boards and slide make entering the water more enjoyable.

For those off-duty personnel and their dependents who have a flair, or just the desire to do it themselves, an auto hobby shop and woodworking shop supplies all the necessary tools.

Men and women who takes pride in work done by their own hands will find these services invaluable.

The Kaneohe Klipper, an 18-hole golf course, is the place where golf enthusiasts unwind and settle down. Practice greens and the driving range allow pros and novices alike the opportunity to stay in the best of shape.

The Special Services managed Marina offers water skiing, sailboats, mooring facilities, haul out facilities and dry storage.

Next door to the Marina is the scuba locker. One may find approximately 80 sets of diving gear available for rent as well as regularly scheduled diving classes.

The skating rink is an outdoor facility located in the regimental area. Rental skates are available for those who do not have their own.

For those who are seriously into exercise, the mini-gym is a fully equipped weight room. After a hard workout relax in the sauna

before taking a shower.

Shooters can take out their frustrations on the clay birds at the skeet range. Recently the skeet range received a trap machine and will be able to offer both skeet and trap shooting.

Special Services also manages the K-Bay Lanes with 24 alleys open for your bowling entertainment.

Signs warn of dud munitions

Trespassing poses dangers

Bang, bang you're dead, and it's no game to disregard the warning signs posted around the impact area at the Station Rifle Range in Ulupau Crater. The area is littered with "great souvenirs" capable of maiming or killing the foolish hunter who picks it up.

The souvenirs in the area are dud munitions.

"We find everything that is fired on a battalion level," Warrant Officer-1 David Lindsey, Explosive Ordnance Disposal Officer, Brigade Service Support Group, 1st Marine Brigade, said. "The majority are 40mm H.E. rounds, M72 LAAW rounds, 60mm mortar H.E. rounds and M73 subcaliber LAAW rounds."

WO-1 Lindsey and his EOD experts make routine sweeps of the impact area to locate and destroy ordnance there.

"WHenever we have the people or when someone from the range calls us, we sweep the area," he said Wednesday.

"Yesterday we recovered 47 duds from only half the impact area."

The EOD team located and destroyed 16 more dud munitions Wednesday. And, the area was swept only a month before!

The warrant officer said that the Marine

Corps once allowed a 10 percent dud rate, but now only permits five percent. Even at only five duds per hundred, enough highly explosive devices are fired on the range to leave the impact area a death zone for the curious.

To locate the dangerous devices, disposal Marines establish an area to be swept. They section the area and carefully sweep it on line.

When they find ordnance, they mark the location and continue to search. When all the devices have been located the team sets charges of C-4 explosive on the duds and blow them up.

"MOST OF THE rounds we find are too sensitive to move," the warrant officer said.

He added that the EOD personnel get extensive training in identification of munitions, to include the different types of detonation devices. These detonators can be activated by temperature change, shock or centrifugal force.

The EOD Marines are also trained to know which rounds are dummy and which are high explosive or other destructive rounds.

"The rounds come in different colors so Marines firing them can tell what they are," said WO-1 Lindsey.

"But, you can't tell practice rounds from H.E. rounds by color when they are laying in the impact area. They're all rust colored."

Even with the care EOD puts into policing the impact area, they never "get it all." Some pieces simply get overlooked and others are buried.

"IF A ROUND is buried and we cansee part of it, we uncover enough to identify it and, if we need to, destroy it," WO-1 Lindsey said.

He added that buried duds frequently surface when wind or rain uncovers them.

Master Sergeant Robert King, Operations Noncommissioned Officer-in-Charge at the Range Complex, said, "We know it is a pretty area up there and the Penn Battery is historical. We're willing to arrange tours when the range isn't in use."

He explained that a temperature change of only one degree can sometimes set off the duds.

"I was sitting here the other day, and no one was on the range at all, when there were two big explosions," he said. "At first I thought someone had wandered into the area, so I called EOD."

It turned out that the explosions had been spontaneous.


THE MASTER

sergeant said he had warning signs put up around the range complex all the way to the ocean. The signs are spaced about 50 feet apart and the area is surrounded by a fence to preclude people wandering in by mistake.

And still people enter. "I come to the range

on Saturdays and Sundays," he said, "and, I frequently find people out here."

"When people are walking up here without range personnel who know where to go, they are walking on death. One of these days someone is going to walk in here and not walk back out."

Many factors affect food prices

The Commissary Store is a benefit Marines have enjoyed since 1909. Commissaries are not in the business to make a profit, but to provide active duty and retired service members and their families a place to purchase groceries.

On Oahu, all four branches of the armed forces are in such close proximity that members of one branch of service have the opportunity to shop in commissaries of other branches.

SOME OF THOSE WHO shop at different commissaries have noted and complained about the difference in prices at each commissary.

A number of factors influence the price of items at commissaries throughout the armed forces. None of the services have identical pricing policies and this can cause differences in the totals at the cash registers.

Commissaries were originally designed to sell items to service members at cost, however, in 1952 Congress authorized commissaries to add a surcharge to the price of items.

Currently the Army and the Air Force add a four percent surcharge at the register, to the total price of the items bought. The Navy applies a seven to 10 percent surcharge to each item depending on its category. Marine Corps commissaries add a surcharge of six percent to the cost of each item before it goes on the shelf.

According to Captain James Morris, Commissary Store Officer at the Air Station, "Surcharges are designed to cover the operating costs. You're talking about \$60,000 a year just for paper bags," he explained, "and more than \$11,000 a month for electricity."

THE SURCHARGES ARE ALSO used for renovations and new construction and to purchase meat trays and cellphone produce bags, among other things.

The commissary is not allowed to sell items at cost or below cost in order to attract customers into the store like civilian supermarkets often do.

According to Capt Morris, at civilian supermarkets, "once the customer is in the door he buys the sale item but he also purchases other items that have as much as 100 percent markup." At the Air Station Commissary, the markup on any item is only the six percent surcharge.

The Defense Logistics Agency publishes a Supply Bulletin which provides guidelines for all items purchased for sale at the commissary. "We purchase items at prices equal to or lower than what the civilian market buys it for," said Capt Morris. "We try to make it a competitive market by carrying more than one line."

Meat and produce are purchased from the lowest bidder, but Capt Morris pointed out that, "we try to get the best service and quality."

EVEN MORE FACTORS ARE involved in the price differences among commissaries.

When new stock comes in at a different price than previous stock, the Army and the Navy re-price all items, including those already on the shelves. The Air Force and the Marine Corps, however, do not re-price items already on the shelves, only the new stock. Therefore, it is possible to find different prices on two packages of the same item at the Air Station Commissary.

Different brand names and the quality of products, such as meat and produce, affect the selling price.

Some commissaries receive items more often than other commissaries and prices may fluctuate depending on the date the items are received. Transportation costs, especially in Hawaii, have a lot to do with the price of individual items.

ALL OF THESE FACTORS cause price differences from one commissary to another and a number of commissary patrons have complained about the fact that prices at one commissary may be higher or lower than the prices at another commissary.

According to Capt Morris, the difference is not that drastic and, in addition to the savings already realized by shopping at a commissary as opposed to a civilian supermarket, there are several other ways to combat the high cost of eating.

"Our commissary has 20,000 paying customers a month," said Capt Morris. According to a survey taken last month, those customers save nearly 25 percent over local prices.

In addition to this, vendor's coupons and food stamps are accepted by the commissary to allow the buyer to achieve even greater savings.

Just two years ago the Air Station Commissary redeemed \$12,500 in

coupons. That figure has more than doubled already this year with \$27,000 worth of coupons redeemed.

FOOD STAMPS MAY ALSO be used to purchase edible food items at the commissary. It is ironic, however, that according to Capt Morris, "sodas can be bought with food stamps but vitamins cannot." So far this year nearly \$265,000 in food stamps have been redeemed by the commissary.

Annual sales at the Air Station Commissary reached \$8.6 million last year and are expected to pass the \$9.7 million mark this year. But, with as many as 5,500 line items at the commissary, many patrons complain about the lack of selection.

"We are dealing with masses of people and there is no way we can carry every single item that people want us to carry," explained Capt Morris. "We just don't have the space."

Several renovation projects are planned for the Air Station Commissary including new display cases, floors, lights and a new exit door. Also, there are plans to completely renovate the meat department.

Many people also complain that the cost of shopping in commissaries in Hawaii is extremely high compared to the mainland. According to a recent survey conducted by this Air Station and Marine Corps Air Station, El Toro, Calif., 100 of the same items were compared. The results showed the total price of the items at the commissary here to be \$1.27 higher than El Toro.

ALTHOUGH CAPT MORRIS feels commissary shoppers do not have a lot of complaints, he has established a Commissary Hot Line which can be reached at 257-2643.

After a recorded message stating the hours of operation for the commissary, callers have the opportunity to leave their name and phone number and state their complaints, criticism or suggestions. Capt Morris claims that all calls are answered within seven days.

In September, the prices of like items were compared at a nearby supermarket and the commissaries at Marine Corps Air Station, Kaneohe Bay; Schofield Barracks (Army); Hickam Air Force Base; and Naval Station, Pearl Harbor. Despite the slight difference in prices, it's still cheaper to shop at commissaries.

History

Commissaries emerge from Sutler Stores

Armed with a grocery list and a few dollars, the Civil War soldier wandered a short distance from camp to a Sutler Store to buy the things he needed. Sutler Stores were known to follow regiments as they moved from one place to another, to provide the soldier, far from home, with both wanted and needed items.

IN 1982 CONGRESS ENACTED A charter which described in detail the items which Sutler could sell to the soldiers. However, the Sutler System was not set up to provide the soldier with a benefit as much as it was to make a huge profit off him.

To supplement the soldier's daily ration of about a pound of bread; a pound and a quarter of fresh or cured meat or three quarters of a pound of bacon; potatoes, rice, hominy or beans; coffee; sugar; vinegar; and salt, soldiers could purchase items from the Sutler Store.

Items included fruits, dairy products, syrup, crackers, beef, yeast, pickles, eggs, fish and poultry, in addition to candles, buttons, newspapers, tobacco, matches, brushes, oil, razors, razor straps, soap and of course, whiskey.

SUTLER STORES WERE notorious for charging high prizes for their items, sometimes making as much as 300 percent profit. In addition, Sutlers would extend credit to the soldiers and then were allowed by the government to collect up to one half of the soldier's monthly pay to cover the debt.

Like it or not, the Sutler System marked the birth of the commissary store as we know it today.

It was probably the habit of Sutler Stores to take advantage of the soldier that caused Congress in 1866 to authorize the Army to establish commissaries to sell items at cost to the soldiers.

The Marine Corps opened its first commissary store in 1909. Then,

commissaries were often located in converted barns, horse stables, warehouses and, as in the case of the commissary store here at the Air Station, engine repair shops.

COMMISSARIES ARE THE supermarkets of the military community, however, they are not in the business to make a profit like the Sutler Stores. Also, commissaries are not allowed to sell items below cost like some civilian supermarkets do to entice customers into their stores.

Today, the average commissary shopper is the wife of a corporal, sergeant or staff sergeant who lives off base and drives more than nine miles to shop there. This is according to a 1976 survey conducted by the Control Analysis Corporation which also states that 68 percent of the commissary patrons are active duty personnel while the other 32 percent are retired military. Enlisted personnel make up 73 percent of the shoppers while captains and their wives make up the majority of officer patronage.

IT IS IRONIC THAT TODAY wives make up the largest percentage of commissary patrons considering that until 1943, when the men were going off to war, women were not allowed in commissaries.

Major renovations and new construction are continuous things with commissaries but patrons still complain about inadequate facilities, long lines at the check out stands, crowded stores and limited selection.

Recent surveys have determined that the average savings to commissary store patrons is 25 percent compared to the prices at civilian supermarkets. Commissaries are designed to provide service personnel and their families with a benefit that will save them money. The commissary store has come a long way from Sutler Stores which, like civilian supermarkets, make a profit off the customer.

Navy submits proposal to cut commissary costs

WASHINGTON — The Navy has submitted a proposed plan to the Department of Defense that would result in the more efficient operation of commissary stores and save about 21 percent of the money Congress appropriates each year for their support.

The proposal would have no effect on the prices charged to customers, would leave current industry relationships unchanged, and would ensure the continued support of a vital benefit to service members and their families.

The Navy plan calls for the gradual conversion of commissary store employees from the present civil service employees to contract government employees. The savings in commissary store operations would come about because of the wage scale used to compute salaries for civil service employees.

If approved, the Navy proposal would be phased in over a period of at least two years in order that most of the conversion would be accomplished by normal attrition, thus minimizing the impact on current commissary store employees. Those employees not desiring to convert to contract government employment would be given all possible assistance in attaining other civil service positions.

In response to a request from the Office of Management and Budget to improve commissary store operations, the Army is testing a plan at two of its stores during fiscal year 1982 which involves the contracting out of various commissary store functions to outside commercial agencies. The Navy proposed its plan of converting to contract government workers as an alternative.



Army Vet Corps assumes command of Station's clinic

After serving the veterinary needs of the Air Station since 1968, the Air Force relinquished command of the Veterinary Clinic to the Army Thursday. The change resulted from the recent congressional redesignation of responsibilities of all veterinary services within the armed forces.

"THE ARMY Vet Corps has been in existence longer and is bigger than the Air Force," explained Army Staff Sergeant

George Dawson, Non-commissioned Officer-in-Charge of food inspection. "That's why they picked us over the Air Force." The responsibility of the Air Force Veterinary Corps has been shifted to cover only preventive medicine and environmental health. The Army veterinarians will now provide the small animal care and food inspection services formerly provided by the Air Force. Three soldiers and one Marine will be

the veterinarian running the show at located next to the Housing Office. Army Captain Lynn Anderson is the veterinarian, assisted by SSgt Dawson, Specialist Four Martin Simmons and Marine Staff Sergeant Obadiah Smith. Capt Anderson's primary duties will be at the Air Station's Veterinary Clinic, but he will also work at Hickam Air Force Base and Schofield Barracks. Before his recent arrival on Oahu, Capt Anderson

was the veterinarian at Naval Base, San Diego.

WORKING under the direction of Capt Anderson will be SSgt Smith, the only Marine at the Clinic. SSgt Smith will be conducting laboratory work, studying parasitic control and giving vaccinations to small animals. Small animal examinations and vaccinations are given at the Veterinary Clinic, by appointment only, from 8 till 9 a.m. on Tuesdays and

Thursdays. For more information or to make an appointment call 257-3643.

The veterinarians at the clinic are also responsible for inspecting all food items delivered to the commissary, clubs and warehouses at the Air Station. SSgt Dawson is in charge of all food inspections and is assisted by Sp4 Simmons.

Air Force Technical Sergeant Richard Julian worked at the Air Station's Veterinary Clinic for nearly six years. He will report to Eglin Air Force Base, Fla. this month, with some regrets about leaving here. "I love this place," said TSgt Julian. "I love the climate and the people and all the things there are to do here. And I liked working with the Marines."

THE AIR Force may be pulling out of the Air Station's Veterinary Clinic, but the Air Station's veterinary needs will continue to be provided for, by the Army now instead.



TAX TIP IF YOU SELL FOR A PROFIT
Normally, taxpayers who sell their home for a substantial profit face a heavy tax load, but this burden can be avoided. If you buy another home that costs as much or more than the sales price of the old one within a specified time, the profit from the sale is not included in your taxable income.

The second home must be bought and occupied within a period ending 2 years after the sale. A 2-year period is also permitted when building a new home. This tax deferral applies only to the sale of a home which is the family's main residence.

When figuring the amount of gain for which tax may be postponed, you may deduct for "fix-up" expenses if they were accomplished within 90 days prior to the sale, and paid for no later than 30 days after the sale. Check with your accountant or the IRS on details if this matter affects you. It could be well worth your while.

At age 55, you qualify for the big bonanza - a one-time \$125,000 exclusion of capital gain from the sale of your principal residence.

ALL ABOUT HAIR

Living in Hawaii, with our active lifestyles, we are constantly exposed to the elements. As a result, often times our hair needs more than just a good shampoo. How do you decide what to use? One way is to use the simple strand test we talked about last week. Otherwise, a good rule of thumb is if you are not chemically treating your hair, usually an instant conditioner will be enough of a treatment to keep the hair in good shape.

An instant conditioner treats the outer layer of the hair and a good one actually closes the cuticle layer making it compact and resulting in sheen and easy manageability. Many of the instant conditioners available coat the hair with a resin or waxy substance to give the appearance of closing the cuticle when it is actually building up a layer of resin or wax on the outer layer of the hair. When a rinse like this is first used it will give the appearance of an acid balanced rinse, but after repeated applications it will start to build up on the hair and scalp causing loss of body, the hair will get dirty much faster, and often times a white powdery substance will come off of the scalp. Many times people think this is dandruff when it is really a build-up of conditioner on the scalp. We have several excellent instant conditioners available in our salon: 1) Phinal Phase - this product is by Redken and is an oil free, very lightweight acid balanced finishing rinse. It is very good for fine, limp hair. 2) Ensure - by Nexus is very similar but a little heavier rinse and it is good for all hair types.

Both of these rinses tame tangles, add body to the hair, eliminate static electricity, promote hair strength, add sheen and luster, relieve split ends, and improve elasticity. They both are sold in a concentrated form and may be used in very small amounts that way, or they may be diluted with water and put in a spray applicator bottle. This is a more economical way to use your rinse and it may either be rinsed from the hair or, for a wet look, it may be left in to dry that way.

In most cases, as long as the hair isn't chemically treated, even with our weather, a good shampoo and finishing rinse should be sufficient.

Next week we will discuss using a conditioner on severely damaged hair.

Kidney Fund eases medical bills



In August 1978, 7-month old Davey Kirby was flown to Walter Reed Army Medical Center for emergency care after three weeks of hospitalization in Georgia. His diagnosis was hemolytic-uremic syndrome with nephrosis and severe hypertension.

Davey's mother accompanied him and stayed at the Walter Reed Guest House to be close by his side. The other two Kirby children stayed with relatives while Sergeant Kirby, an Army E-5 stationed at Ft. Benning, Ga. waited for reassignment to Ft. Meade, Md. where he could be near his wife and infant son.

AMERICAN Kidney Fund was con-

tracted for financial assistance for the Kirby family on several occasions. American Kidney Fund was asked to pay for Mrs. Kirby's lodging at WRAMC and to help with expenses associated with her lengthy stay.

The following year, American Kidney Fund paid for ambulance service to carry little Davey from a Maryland hospital to Children's Hospital National Medical Center in Washington. Other agencies had denied this help and Civilian Health and Medical Plan for Uniformed Services would not cover the cost through a civilian service.

Little Davey's kid-

neys were ravaged by his disease and they could not function sufficiently without threatening his life. At the very young age of two years, Davey received a cadaveric kidney transplant. Although he requires monthly check-ups and immuno-suppressant medications to prevent the rejection of his new kidney, Davey is doing very well.

"HE'S A REGULAR little 3-year-old now," exclaims Mrs. Kirby.

The story of Davey's success might never have been told but for a recent request to help Thomas Kirby, Davey's older brother. He too, suffers from severe hypertension that must be regulated once

a week by artificial kidney treatment called hemodialysis.

There are medical needs that insurances, including CHAMPUS and Federal Blue Cross, do not always cover and it is important to know that the American Kidney

Fund provides direct financial assistance as well as educational and community service programs for Americans with kidney disease.

American Kidney Fund is a member of the National Health Agencies and partici-

pates in the Combined Federal Campaign.

"IN A TIME of need, it's nice to know there is someone there to help," says Mrs. Kirby.

"Thank you for helping little Davey and Tommy with your contributions."

Tommy and Davey Kirby of Ft. Meade, Maryland have been helped by American Kidney Fund, a member of the National Health Agencies, who participate in the Combined Federal Campaign. Problems with severe hypertension caused little Davey's kidneys to cease functioning but his life has been saved by a cadaveric kidney transplant. Tommy too, suffers with severe hypertension that must be regulated by artificial kidney treatment.

Simple precautions deter Halloween hazards

Halloween brings ghosts, goblins and, sometimes, real danger. The American Lung Association of Hawaii warns about one danger for children — the risk of choking on holiday treats such as candy corn, hard candy, and peanuts. At Halloween, children go door-to-door "begging." Parents should insist youngsters bring the goodies home for inspection. For the youngest —

two, three or even four years old — some of the candy can be divided or mashed before eating. The chewing and swallowing muscles of young children may not be sufficiently developed to cope with certain treats. Choking can result. Halloween goodies also may "go down the wrong way," and lodge in the lung instead of the stomach. This is called aspiration. A "foreign object"

of any kind in the lung can cause life-long problems. The best warning is: Be sure children are old enough to chew and swallow correctly before trusting them with small, hard bits of food. Parents should always be on guard against "small objects" getting into the hands of children. Particularly those young enough to want to put things they pick up involving such

items as eyes and buttons, that might come loose from dolls, or wheels from toy cars

into their mouths. Set a good example. Don't put anything but food into your own

mouth. Keep the coffee table clear of small objects a child might reach for.



The field meet, held at Platt Field, consisted of 11 combat related and non-combat events including a six-mile run, grenade throw, and fireman's carry.



As one Marine said, "The best part of the field meet is getting the battalion together and relaxing in the best way possible, competition."


