Pass in Review

"Kangaroo '81" begins

HQMC, WASHINGTON — Some 1,800 Marines from the 31st Marine Amphibious Unit are participating with other U.S. forces from the Pacific command and Conus in the Australian sponsored combined forces exercise "Kangaroo 81," which began Oct. 12 and ends Nov. 5.

The 31st Amphibious Unit is comprised of Battalion Landing Team, 2d Battalion, 3d Marines, Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-262 and Marine Amphibious Unit Service Support Group-31.

Kangaroo 81 is being staged off the east coast of Australia and ashore in Queensland, and is designed to exercise participants in combined and joint operations in a conventional low-scale, mid-intensity conflict.

The exercise includes 25 ships, more than 100 aircraft, and approximately 20,000 personnel, representing U.S. Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps; plus the Australian and New Zealand armies, air forces and navies and minor participation by the British Royal Air Force.

U.S. participation in Kangaroo 81 is a demonstration of our support of U.S. allies and of our general commitment to work with Anzac partners in areas of common interest.

Tuition funding announced

HQMC, WASHINGTON — Education officials here have announced the Tuition Assistance Funding Policy for Fiscal Year 1982.

Enlisted Marines, sergeant and above, with less than 15 years of active duty service, may now use TA to pay 90 percent of the costs of college-level courses, according to ALMAR 187/81.

The program covers 75 percent of the total cost of college-level courses for all other Marines. Marines can use TA for any off-duty classroom course offered at most colleges or universities which are accredited by a regional association. No more than two courses can be taken during any academic term with TA, and no waivers to the maximum course load will be granted, according to officials here.

Normally, only courses leading to an associate, baccalaureate or graduate degree can be taken when using TA. However, courses at vocational or technical schools which are regionally accredited may be taken, provided the Marine has no more than 30 semester or 45 quarter hours of college-level work.

Officers desiring to use TA are required to sign a statement agreeing to serve an additional two years, and they cannot elect to repay the funds instead of serving the two-year requirement, according to officials here.

TA will also pay 100 percent of the cost of off-duty high school courses offered at regionally accredited educational institutions. Normally, no more than two high school courses may be taken during any one school term. Only courses which lead to earning a high school diploma may be taken.

Use of TA does not affect the money Marines may be entitled to under the old G.I. education bill or the new Veteran's Education Assistance Program.

Birthday celebrations set

It's going to be one big birthday party Nov. 10, as Marines from the 1st Marine Brigade and the Marine Corps Air Station join with all other Marines in wishing each other a "Happy Birthday."

Although the "official" kick-off for the birthday celebrations will be a pageant and cake-cutting ceremony, the first event of the day will be a 10-kilometer Marine Corps Birthday run sponsored by Special Services.

THE RUN BEGINS AT 7 a.m. with check-in 45 minutes prior to that. Beginning at Dewey Square, runners will follow a course around the Air Station, back to Dewey Square.

Men and women will compete in seven different age divisions. Awards will be presented to the top three finishers in each division and all runners will receive certificates. For more information and to sign up for the race, contact the Athletic Office at 257-3258.

At 8:30 a.m. Marines and their dependents are invited to the Pop Warner Football Field for a birthday pageant and cake-cutting ceremony. The ceremony will include the reading of the birthday messages and comments from the Guest of Honor, Brigadier General Bain McClintock, Commanding General of the 1st Marine Brigade, and the

Honored Guest, Colonel Charles Robinson, Commanding Officer, Marine Corps Air Station.

ALSO, THERE WILL BE a pageant of Marine Corps uniforms dating from the birth of the Corps in 1775 to the Marine of 1981. In all, 16 uniforms will be presented. Following the pageant of period uniforms will be the formal cake-cutting ceremony during which Col Robinson will cut the first piece of cake and present it to the Commanding General. The second and third pieces of birthday cake are traditionally given to the oldest and youngest Marine present. The Fleet Marine Force, Pacific Band will perform throughout the ceremony.

Celebration of the Marine Corps Birthday does not end at the conclusion of the pageant and cake-cutting ceremony. Birthday meals are scheduled at Pless Hall and Anderson Hall on the 10th. The meal will include shrimp cocktail, grilled steak, baked potatoes with sour cream, sauteed mushrooms and onions, vegetables, salad bar and mincemeat pie. The meal will be rounded off with birthday cake and ice cream.

THOSE PLANNING TO attend one of the scheduled birthday balls should get plenty of rest before setting out on an

evening that begins early and ends late.

The Enlisted Ball will be held at the Enlisted Club, with the cocktail hour beginning at 5:30 p.m. Drinks will be at a reduced price. Cake-cutting ceremonies will begin at 6:30 p.m. and dinner will follow shortly after 7 p.m.

Dinner will include a hotel round of beef, glazed ham, and baked chicken, accompanied by rice, potatoes, vegetables, rolls and butter and a complete salad bar. Enlisted Marines will also enjoy a creme de menthe parfait and a complimentary glass of wine with their dinner.

Dinner will include prime rib with au jus, salad bar, potatoes, rice, vegetables, rolls and butter.

Dinner will be completed with a dessert of creme de menthe parfait and a complimentary glass of wine.

Following the dinner two bands will play. "Dave West and the Chain Gang" will play country and western music upstairs while the variety band "Star" will play downstairs on the lanai.

FROM MIDNIGHT TO 2 p.m. a breakfast of scrambled eggs with Spanish sauce, ham, sausage, hash browns, SOS with biscuits, sliced pineapple, orange juice and coffee will be served. Breakfast will be complimented with a glass of champagne.

Termite control contract awarded

Treatment rids buildings of insects

A termite control contract estimated at \$82,000 was awarded to Jose Lopez and Sons Inc. Wholesale Fumigators, Sept. 30, Navy Lieutenant George Eichert, Resident Officer-in-Charge of Construction announced Friday.

The treatment of 31 buildings is scheduled to begin Monday and will be completed by April 28.

LT Eichert said that letters of notice will be sent this week to the tenants of the 31 buildings, informing them of the projected dates of treatment for their buildings, and outlining pre-treatment procedures. Housing Areas and Barracks are not included in this contract.

TWO TYPES OF treatment will be employed by the termite control contractors. Some buildings will receive ground treatment, some will be fumigated and some will be treated with both processes.

The first building to be treated will receive ground treatment. This will involve digging a small trench around the building, placing a chemical pesticide in the trench, and covering the trench with the excavated earth.

It also requires the contractor to drill holes through the floor of the building along the inside of the exterior walls. He will then pour a pesticide into the soil below the holes and seal them.

IF A BUILDING is to be fumigated, a tent will be erected

around it and a gaseous pesticide will be injected into the building.

The tenants of tent fumigated buildings must take certain precautions to comply with state and contractual safety codes. All persons, pets, desirable plants and mattresses completely enveloped in water-proof covers must be removed. This includes fish in aquariums.

All medicine and food not in sealed glass or metal containers must also be removed from the building. This includes items in refrigerators, freezers, plastic containers and/or bottles. (Don't forget the aspirin, sugar and

creamer packets and gum hidden in the bottom of desk drawers.)

SODA CANS IN dispensers may remain, but candy bars, potato chips, etc. in vending machines must be removed before fumigation or discarded after.

The removal of these items cannot be emphasized strongly enough. Failure to comply could result in serious illness to anyone consuming the contaminated materials.

Fumigated buildings will be returned to the tenant's control only after the buildings have been ventilated to dispose of the fumigant, inspected with a

"Fumscope" and certified free of trapped pockets of fumigants, certified free of live termites and cleared of the contractor's equipment.

TO FACILITATE these inspections, all interior closets and lockers must be made accessible.

Tent fumigation is planned for weekends to minimize inconvenience to tenants.

The Kaneohe Branch Clinic, the Fire Department and the Security Department will be kept informed in case of any emergency involving the civilian workers or Station personnel.

Amendment

New law corrects veterans memorial benefit inequity

Oct. 17, President Reagan signed the Veterans Disability Compensation, Housing and Memorialization Benefits Amendments of 1981. Public Law 97-66 now makes it possible for veterans leaving no bodily remains to be memorialized in national cemeteries.

The measure corrects an inequity in the law that disallowed memorial benefits to those veterans who donated their bodies to science, whose cremated remains were scattered or those who elected to be buried at sea.

The bill is retroactive to all veterans living and deceased.

Congressman Cec Hefel of Hawaii first introduced H.R. 1714 on Feb. 5, 1981 in response to a request for assistance from Beverly Brew Miranda of Maui whose husband, William A. Brew, died of cancer in 1972.

"Her late husband elected before his death to donate his body to medical science," said Hefel. "Only later did Mrs. Miranda learn that he could not be memorialized in the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific, because of the old law."

Since Brew's death, Mrs. Miranda has worked for

memorialization of her husband, a Marine Corps veteran who, according to her, "gave of himself in death as he had in life." She was determined to accomplish this tribute to her deceased husband on behalf of their marriage and son, a Marine veteran of Vietnam.

Moved by this plea and supported in his efforts by numerous local and national veterans organizations, Hefel initiated a chain of events that culminated in P.L. 97-66, signed only days before what would have been the couple's 31st wedding anniversary.

Energy

WASHINGTON — More than 16 percent of the electricity used in homes goes into lighting it. The following are some suggestions that may help cut overuse of Marines wattage and wallet:

- Light-zone a home. Concentrate lighting in reading and working areas and where it's needed for safety (stairwells, for example).

- Reduce overall lighting in non-working spaces. Remove one bulb out of three in multiple light fixtures and replace it with a burned-out bulb for safety reasons. Reduce lighting in other areas by replacing other bulbs throughout the house with bulbs of the next lower wattage and avoid very sharp lighting contrasts.

- Install solid state dimmers or high-low switches. They make it easy to reduce lighting in a room.
- Buying new lamps? Consider the advantages of those with three-way switches. They make it easy to keep lighting levels low when intense light is not necessary. Use the high switch only

for reading or other activities that require bright light. Additionally, always turn three-way bulbs down to the lowest lighting level when watching television. It'll reduce the glare and use less energy.

- Use low-wattage night-light bulbs. These now come in 4-watt as well as 7-watt sizes. The 4-watt bulb,

with a clear finish, is almost as bright as the 7-watt bulb, but uses about half as much energy.

- Try 50-watt reflector floodlights in directional lamps. Pole or spot lamps give about the same amount of light as the standard 100-watt bulbs, but at half the wattage.
- Use fluorescent

lights whenever possible, they give out more lumens per watt. For example, a 40-watt fluorescent lamp gives off 80 lumens per watt and a 60-watt incandescent gives off only 14.7 lumens per watt. The 40-watt fluorescent lamp would save about 140 watts of electricity over a seven-hour period. Over a period of time, these savings could pay for the fixtures necessary for fluorescent lighting.

- Save on lighting energy through decorating. Remember, light colors for walls, rugs, draperies and upholstery help to reflect light, thereby reducing the amount of artificial light required.

Workshop

The Hawaii Association for Children and Adults With Learning Disabilities will sponsor a workshop on "The Total Management of the Hyperactive Child," Thursday at 7:30 p.m. at Maryknoll High School, 1402 Punahou Street.

Two noted experts in the field, Dr. Richard Presbrey, psychiatrist,

and Dr. David Wood, pediatrician will conduct the workshop. They will discuss identification of the hyperactive, causes of hyperkinesia; diet therapy; how allergies relate to hyperactivity; use and misuse of medication in the treatment of hyperactivity and other alternatives to medication; how hyperactivity impacts on the family, others, and on the child's self-image; how self-image influences future learning and future success, and programming for success at school and at home.

Foreign object damage: the silent killer

As we increase our inventory of highly sophisticated aircraft and constantly seek higher levels of aviation technology, we rest with a proud feeling of accomplishment. When we compare the multi-million dollar aircraft that we have in our inventory today with those our military counterparts had to maintain in the years past, we readily realize how much more advanced our technology is in contrast to theirs.

Billions of dollars are spent yearly in an effort to keep this nation's aircraft in top flying condition. To accomplish this, we employ the services of factory-trained technical field advisors, highly trained mechanics, hydraulicmen, electricians and many other support personnel, including a highly proficient engine repair team. These teams of professionals work continually to upgrade the quality of maintenance in addition to performing scheduled, unscheduled and preventive maintenance tasks.

We have many checks and balances in our maintenance system to ensure that only safe aircraft are permitted to fly. This is done by effective utilization of planned/scheduled maintenance programs. Are we devoting the same amount of attention toward rectifying one of our "basic" maintenance problems? This basic problem is foreign object damage, sometimes referred to as "The Silent Killer."

Foreign objects can be defined as any object adrift or aloft that can be injected by aircraft or support equipment or placed in such a manner about the aircraft or support equipment where it may cause equipment malfunction, destruction, injury to personnel or death. This inconspicuous debris (FOD) became more of a menace as our engines, flight controls and other precision systems became more complex.

The fact that FOD does exist, and has been the subject of many aircraft accident/incident investigations is no secret to any of us. What is startling is that no positive conclusive action has been taken to solve this problem. Many squadrons rely strictly on their daily FOD Walks to combat this problem. Foreign objects such as safety wire, nuts, bolts, etc. can be found on the flight line and hangar deck during each FOD walk even in squadrons where as many as three FOD Walks are accomplished daily. This condition indicates that no FOD prevention program exists, or the present program is ineffective. To be in compliance with directives from high commands, commanders have established FOD investigation teams to investigate FOD related accidents/incidents and file the appropriate reports. This is to be accomplished after the damage has been done.

It is the opinion of this writer that we are attacking the problem from the wrong end. Our emphasis has been placed on picking up foreign objects as opposed to eliminating the source of it. Foreign objects originate with the mechanics completing a maintenance task and leaving metal fasteners, safety wire, caps, plugs, nuts, etc. adrift, or with refuse containers being overfilled or tipped over allowing contents to become airborne. It all boils down to poor housekeeping techniques and sloppy maintenance practices. Until we deal with this problem, we will forever be haunted by "The Silent Killer."

I recommend the following action as a preventive measure in an effort to curtail the rising injury/accident rate and repair cost caused by FOD:

(A) Establish an effective FOD Prevention Program. Assign team members to the FOD prevention teams from all pay grades and work centers.

(B) Hold monthly meetings to share ideas and discuss ways to improve the existing program.

(C) Utilize "FOD Walks/Pick ups" to supplement the prevention program, not as the only existing program. A

prevention program is effective when the only foreign matters that are found during scheduled walks are those which Mother Nature provided i.e. rocks, sticks, etc.

(D) Introduce films/lectures concerning FOD into weekly technical training programs.

(E) Establish an effective program supplemented by technical training to eliminate sloppy maintenance practices and poor housekeeping techniques. Employ quality assurance and FOD prevention team members' services to closely monitor housekeeping procedures and maintenance post repair police calls and motivate violators as necessary.

(F) Include a small locally manufactured pouch in all tool containers issued from the tool control center. These pouches are to be utilized anytime a mechanic is working on or near aircraft for deposit of foreign matter found on or near aircraft, and to also place any scraps and consumables that may have accumulated from work being done.

We should remind ourselves that FOD Prevention is an "All Hands" effort requiring full support by everyone to be totally effective. Foreign object surveillance is as important to the maintenance concept as any repair action and should be treated as such. Failure to perform either properly and in a professional manner could be fatal.

Commissary comparison reviewed

A few additional questions have been raised concerning an article in the Oct. 7 issue of the Hawaii Marine, defining pricing policies at commissaries.

Two dependent wives from the Air Station spent five days in September coordinating with Commissary Officers at the Marine Corps Air Station, Schofield Barracks (Army); Hickam Air Force Base; and Naval Station, Pearl Harbor, and conducting the price survey. They also compared the prices of the same items at a local supermarket. The comparison was made because many military personnel and their families have expressed confusion about the differences in prices at each commissary.

MANY FACTORS DETERMINE the shelf price and the total price of groceries purchased at commissaries. The most significant factor is the addition of surcharges to the items.

Commissaries at Hickam and Schofield add a 4 percent surcharge at the register, to the total price of the items bought. The commissary at Pearl Harbor applies a 7 to 10 percent surcharge to each item before it goes on the shelf and the commissary at the Marine Corps Air Station adds a surcharge of 6 percent to the cost of each item before it goes on the shelf. Therefore, the actual cost of an item can be determined by the following example:

8 hamburger buns at the Air Station commissary = 74¢
8 hamburger buns at Schofield = 69¢ + 3¢ (surcharge) = 72¢

Questions have also risen about the additional money saved by Air Station Marines who shop at their commissary instead of driving 23 miles, round trip, to the commissary at Pearl Harbor, for example.

ACCORDING TO THE American Automobile Association it costs 8.17 cents per mile to operate a 1981 six-cylinder, four-door Chevrolet with standard accessories, power steering and power brakes. This figure is based on the price of gasoline at \$1.30 per gallon and includes the cost of gasoline, oil, automobile maintenance and tire wear. Therefore, to drive 23 miles to Pearl Harbor would cost \$1.88.

That amount, added to the survey cost of the groceries purchased at the Pearl Harbor Commissary, brings the total price paid to \$76.20 or 10 cents more than groceries bought at the Air Station commissary.

In the comparison chart that follows, the 4 percent surcharge levied by Hickam Air Force Base and Schofield Barracks is added next to the individual prices. All percentages have been rounded to the nearest penny.

Haggard ghouls haunt military history

Tradition has it that sailors of the Old Navy were a very superstitious lot. But a few years ago, midshipmen of the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis decided to update the Navy's ghost lore by pulling off a prank that received world-wide headlines. Through the use of motion picture projectors and some daring young Middies who scaled the West Point buildings, they convinced some West Pointers, for a while, that a certain dormitory was haunted — at least this was the Navy version of the story.

Fake haunts aside, there have always been tales of the supernatural throughout the years. It would seem that some ghosts who have haunted U.S. Navy ships are long-lived. It is reputed by some people associated with the ship that an old War of 1812 Navy ship, the U.S. Constellation, now berthed in Baltimore harbor, is haunted. The noted psychic Sybil Leek spent a few hours aboard the ship one dark night and said she felt the ghosts. This was substantiated by a number of late-night tipplers after imbibing spirits of a different nature. Not long after bedding down on the ship, they came screaming off, chased, they claimed, by sailors in 18th Century uniforms.


Washington, it is reputed, has a liberal store of ghosts. For example, the spirit of the first U.S. Marine Corps Commandant supposedly haunts the Commandant's house Fort McNair, one of the oldest military installations in Washington, is said to have several spirit tenants; one is the ghost of Mary Surratt who was imprisoned and hanged at the fort for her alleged involvement in the assassination of President Abraham Lincoln. Many years ago, a sentry on his lonely night patrol of the fort encountered her apparition and was promptly tried by courts-martial after telling his story. It was fortunate for him that his commanding

officer saw the same ghost a few days later, and the unfortunate sentry was able to resume his military career.

Some U.S. airmen stationed at the Chicksands Royal Air Force Station, England, once the location of a Gilbertine Priory, claim that the station is haunted by a nun of that order. In life, she was sealed into a wall for an indiscretion. Those who have seen her describe her as a tall, fascinating woman dressed in white.

In keeping with the legend of the Flying Dutchman is the tale of the ill-fated German submarine of World War I, the UB-65. The ship was jinxed from the very beginning. On the morning of July 10, 1918, a U.S. submarine sighted the German U-boat surfacing. Before the U.S. craft could man its torpedoes, the UB-65 blew up, but not before the apparition of a man with folded arms appeared on the bridge of the submarine. The submarine, now itself an apparition, has been seen as late as 1967.

As might be expected, several of the old forts of the early American West have ghosts. One old fort was supposed to have the spirit of an ill-starred Indian princess haunting the area. Another post had a troublesome haunt that was finally exorcised by a local priest.



Fleet Home Town News releases spread the word

At one time or another we have all filled out Fleet Home Town News releases. These forms are one way to let the folks back home know what's going on.

FHTN CONSISTS of news stories and photographs concerning Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard personnel. The

releases are prepared specifically for publication in the service member's home town newspaper, and for dissemination throughout that community's broadcast media.

When you sit down to complete a news release, you become the first step in that distribution process. After the forms are

turned over to the unit information officers, they go directly to a Fleet Home Town News clerk at the Joint Public Affairs Office. Once in the Marine's hands, the forms are screened for accuracy and verified. When it is determined that the form is ready for release, it is sent to the Fleet Home Town News Center in Norfolk, Va. FHTNC then eval-

uates and edits the release before distributing it to your home town media. It must be emphasized that the actual publication or broadcast of your release is at the discretion of the local media. For example, if the story is "ancient history" by the time it reaches your home town, it might be considered useless and may not be printed or

broadcast. To prevent this from happening FHTN forms should be completed and forwarded as soon as possible. **THE SALUTES** column which appears in the *Hawaii Marine* is based solely upon information gathered from Fleet Home Town News releases. Events which warrant FHTN releases are:

- Reporting for duty
- Promotions
- Medals
- Awards
- Graduation from schools
- Reenlistments

FHTN can't work without your cooperation. Forms must be completed and error-free. With your help, this program will continue to be a success for years to come.

Retired general speaks

A NIGHT TO REMEMBER — Retired Lieutenant General Victor Krulak, former Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force Pacific, addresses 3d Marines officers at their mess night.

Preparedness was the theme of the general's speech at the formal dinner Oct. 19 at the Marine Corps Air Station Kaneohe Bay Commissioned Officers' Club.

LtGen Krulak told the officers that he would not congratulate them on the pay raise because the economy would soon eat it up.

"You are destined to a life of poverty," he said. "Your reward has got to come from something less tangible." He said that things have traditionally been rocky in the Corps, but the Corps has always overcome and been prepared.

"When World War II came along we found ourselves humiliated by practicing with wooden weapons and cardboard tanks," LtGen Krulak said. "But, in the face of all kinds of impediments, we have remained war oriented, combat oriented."

He recalled that before the Korean conflict he received complaints from wives who thought their husbands were spending too much time training. But, when the Korean War was fought, those women were glad their husbands had been prepared.

"I was called by women who said, 'I thought you were a son of a b--- when you kept my husband in training, but he came home alive.'"

The general emphasized that it is not enough to be ready to go to war, but Marines must be prepared to go, win and come back alive.

LtGen Krulak retired from active duty in 1968, and is currently writing a book on the history of the United States Marine Corps.



Pumpkins prospered during colonial times

Military exchanges are stocked right now with shelves of plastic orange Jack-o-lanterns for the trick-or-treat crowd. Few people take the time these days to pick a pump pumpkin and create their own frightening pumpkin face with a sharp knife. If it fails, mom can always use the scrap for pie.

Americans aren't really forsaking the pumpkin, they're just skipping the unpleasant part of the fun. The pumpkin has a meat a great deal to this country since the earliest time.

into a Muske Million, but lesse and worse." The intrepid leader apparently made the mistake of sampling a raw pumpkin.

American colonists soon found that cooked pumpkin was a tasty, nourishing food. As early as 1630 a versifier wrote: "If fresh meat be wanting to fill up your dish, / We have carrots and pumpkins and turnips and fish. / We have pumpkins at morning and pumpkins at noon, / If it were not for pumpkins we should be undone."

As a treat.

A colonial drinking son proclaimed: "Oh, we can make liquor to sweeten our lips, / Of pumpkins, of parsnips, of walnut-tree chips."

Even the shell was used. Early New England blue laws required every man to have his excess hair trimmed around a cap. Sometimes a dried half shell was substituted, and New Englanders were called pumpkin heads. The epithet later came to mean a dolt or stupid fellow.

the phrase to startled Englishmen when he declared that London was "some pumpkins, I tell you."

The London Times soberly explained that this was a "profound Americanism, which is supposed to convey a wholly unutterable approbation and surprise."

THESE DAYS pumpkin can be purchased in cans, already cooked, processed, spiced and ready to pour into pie shells. It also comes frozen, and ready to eat, in pies. While a few hearty pioneer spirits insist on preparing their pumpkins "from scratch" there are thousands who applaud the progressive shortcut. Without the frozen, and canned pumpkin, many would have to do without the traditional dishes of holiday fare.

PUMPKINS originated in Mexico and Central America. Centuries before Columbus reached the New World, Indian tribes were cultivating pumpkins and squash almost everywhere in North America.

Captain John Smith wrote that Virginia Indians grew a "fruit like

THE EARLY settlers made pumpkin soup, stew, pudding, bread, and griddle cakes, as well as pie. The pulp was dried for use in winter and spring or boiled down into a thick sauce.

"Pumpkin sass and roast possum" was a delicacy. Pumpkin seeds were dried, fried, and salted

THE TERM "somepumpkins," for a person or thing of consequence, apparently was coined by New Yorkers in the 1850s when their fancy was taken by enormous pumpkins displayed at the Crystal Palace.

Henry Ward Beecher, the preacher and lecturer, introduced

Safety

Simple precautions keep Mr. Jack-O-Lantern smiling

Halloween is commonly symbolized by the lighted pumpkin, Mr. Jack-O-Lantern, who with his fiery grin presides over scenes of costumed children asking for treats or playing pranks.

But some words of caution about costumed children and lighted pumpkins come from the Consumer Products Safety

Commission.

CANDLELIT jack-o-lanterns should not be carried by children and should be kept away from doorsteps where trick-or-treaters' costumes might brush against the flame. If used indoors, be certain there are not curtains, decorations or other furnishings that could be ignited.

Better still, substitute a small flashlight.

When selecting costumes, beards, masks or wigs, CPSC suggests looking for flame-resistant labels. Avoid outfits with billowing skirts and keep hemlines short to prevent tripping.

CHOOSE COSTUMES which are light or bright enough to be

seen clearly by motorists. Even witches can wear reflective tapes over their gowns.

Don't permit a youngster to parade in the Halloween world of mischief and possible hazards which he or she cannot see. Masks shouldn't be so big or loose that they obstruct a young "witch's" vision. Moreover, facial dis-

guises should not be restricted breathing. A natural mask of cosmetics applied directly to the skin may be a safer disguise.

CPSC also advises parents:

- Young children out trick-or-treating should always be accompanied by a responsible older person and should be

kept in constant sight.

- Tell youngsters to avoid running across lawns or backyards because they can trip over lawn ornaments or run into clotheslines that are invisible in the dark.
- Finally, if you are driving on Halloween, take special care. Watch out for trick-or-treaters who will be too busy to watch for you.





completed the tournament dead-locked at a net 214 until Aruda parred the first hole of sudden death to win. Toben defeated Gray on the second hole by a stroke.





TAX UPDATE FOR HOMEOWNERS

Homeowners, age 55 or over, may exclude from their taxable income all capital gain up to \$125,000 from the sale of their principal residence. They must have lived in the home at least three of the five years before they sell it and the exemption may be claimed only once in a lifetime. The tax break is retroactive to July 20, 1981. Deductions for moving expenses have been increased to \$3,000 (real estate commissions, mortgage costs, etc.) if you are forced to purchase a home due to a job change over 35 miles away. Up to one half this total (\$1,500) may be deducted for pre-move househunting expenses and temporary living expenses (up to 30 days) at your new location.

There has also been a breakthrough in the area of capital gains when you sell real estate. If you sell after holding the property for over one year, you only have to pay tax on 40% of the profit. Real estate continues to be the best tax hedge for investors and homeowners.
