## Pass in Review

### Off-loading precautions set

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii — Dependents, friends, and relatives planning on meeting Marines and sailors returning from their WESPAC deployment during December should be aware of security restrictions at the Naval Supply Center, Pearl Harbor during the off-load of equipment.

In the interest of safety, all pier areas (to include the "H" Piers, Piers K-5 and K-7, and the entire fenced area around Piers K-10 and K-11) will be off limits to everyone except authorized military, press, and NSC personnel until such time as the ships are tied up at pierside and all brows/ramps are in place.

When the ships are secured, dependents, friends, and relatives will be allowed on the piers until the commencement of cargo/vehicle off-load operations (for approximately one hour). Once these operations begin, all but authorized personnel will be asked to leave the piers. NSC Police will be present to provide security and to maintain restricted areas.

The complete cooperation of all concerned is requested to promote safety and expedite the off-loading returning Marines and sailors.

### Life insurance increase

HQMC, WASHINGTON — President Ronald Reagan recently signed legislation increasing Servicemen's Group Life Insurance coverage from \$20,000 to \$35,000. The increase will automatically become effective Dec. 1.

Under the bill, Marines will pay a \$5.25 monthly premium, vice \$3. The new legislation also increases Veteran's Group Life Insurance coverage to \$35,000. VGLI is available only to former service members who were previously covered by SGLI. Those who choose to receive this coverage have up to 120 days after leaving active duty to apply. The monthly premium for VGLI, a five-year term insurance plan, will increase to \$5.95.

According to the casualty section here, Marines not wishing to receive the additional coverage must state so in writing and forward it to their administrative office.

### Test pilots selected

HQMC, WASHINGTON — Five Marine Naval aviators have been selected to attend the U.S. Navy Test Pilot School at Naval Air Test Center, Patuxent River, Md.

Those selected, and their current assignments, are: Major K.D. Cameron, currently serving with the Marine Aviation Detachment, Missile Test Center, Point Mugu, Calif.; Maj L.C. Heikes, H&MS-41, MAG-41, NAS Dallas; Captain R.L. Barry, MCAS Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii; Capt R.C. Figlock, 3d MAW, MCAS El Toro, Calif.; and Capt P.W. Martin, 2d MAW, MCAS (H) New River, N.C.

Selected as alternates were Capt H.C. Spies, currently with the 3d MAW, MCAS El Toro and Capt J.A. Thompson, now serving at MATSG, NAS Pensacola, Fla.

The year-long school will convene in January. The next test pilot school selection board will convene here during April 1982.

### Lateral move information

HQMC, WASHINGTON — Officers considering lateral moves into different military occupational specialties should check ALMAR 180/81.

The ALMAR has the current strengths of different officer MOSs, and lists, by rank and year group, whether an officer's MOS is balanced, overmanned or undermanned.

In addition, the ALMAR has the current strengths and shortages for women officers, and lists whether the field is over the ceiling permitted for women officers of that grade and year group.

Women officers can only request a move to an MOS which is listed as being under its established woman population ceiling for her grade, according to manpower officials here.

Officials added that officers in overmanned MOSs should consider moving to an undermanned MOS. However, this is an option, and each individual officer must arrive at his or her own decision.

### Alien registration required

HQMC, WASHINGTON — Marines and their family members who are not U.S. citizens are reminded that all aliens in the U.S. are required to report their address to the Immigration and Naturalization Service during January.

Forms to report addresses are available from any U.S. Post Office. Upon request, the U.S. Department of Justice, Immigration and Naturalization Service, Washington, D.C. 20536, will mail the forms.

Besides addresses, the forms require nationality, place and date of entry into the United States, place and date of birth, and alien registration number.

Aliens temporarily out of the country have 10 days after their return to submit a registration form. The Immigration and Naturalization Act imposes serious penalties for failure to register.

## Agents recover stolen weapons

All the weapons taken during the Oct. 13 break-in at the Weapons Company, 1st Battalion, 3d Marines, 1st Marine Brigade Armory were recovered Friday by the Naval Investigative Service here, according to Jeff Baker, Special Agent-in-Charge of the Kaneohe Branch Office.

Baker said that a fourth Marine suspected as being an accessory after the fact in receipt of stolen government weapons turned himself in and led investigators to three locations near the Pali Highway where the weapons were hidden.

The weapons, two M-60 machine guns, three M203 grenade launchers, one M-16 rifle, seven .45 caliber pistols and one starlight scope had been disassembled, stored in heavy plastic tubes and buried.

Details concerning the recovery of the weapons have not been released and the name of the Marine is being withheld pending formal charges.

Lance Corporal Charles C. Ng, one of the three Marines originally taken into custody Nov. 12, escaped two days later and is still at large. Baker announced Friday at a press conference that NIS is offering a \$500 reward for information leading to the apprehension of Ng. "Ng is known to be armed, and has had martial arts training," said Baker. "NIS considers him extremely dangerous."

"The investigation is nearly complete," said Baker. "Thus far, we've been able to determine that no organized groups, terrorist or otherwise, are involved."

## Leathernecks test drive Super M-60s

QUANTICO, Va. — Leaving powerful track marks, a protective smoke screen and a strong impression on Quantico Marines, the high performance version of the U.S. M-60 A1 Battle Tank was demonstrated at The Basic School, earlier this month.

Developed by Teledyne Continental Motors of Michigan, the new "Super M-60" is a modified version of the standard M-60. It's additions include a 1200 horsepower engine, a coat of protective applique armor and an automatic Nuclear Biological/Chemical Protection System.

And yet, Quantico Marines who actually drove the vehicle were more impressed by another feature of the Super M-60.

"IT'S A GREAT IMPROVEMENT over what we have now," said Staff Sergeant Steven Robertson, Staff Noncommissioned Officer-in-Charge, TBS Tracked Vehicle Platoon.

"The new hydropneumatic suspension system enables the vehicle to maintain stability at full speed. This stability would provide for better accuracy while firing on the move," he added.

In comparing the adapted Super M-60 to the standard U.S. M-60, there are some subtle differences in capability. Maximum speed is 45 mph opposed to 30 mph and a 1200 horsepower engine opposed to the M-60's 750 horses.

"With the added horsepower, the Super M-60 can reach a speed of 20 mph in 8.8 seconds while the

standard M-60 takes 15 seconds according to Teledyne," explained SSGT James Beers, Tank Project Officer, Fire Power Division, Dev. Ctr.

**ALTHOUGH THE SUPER M-60 Tank is impressive, SSGT Beers emphasized the fact that the Marine Corps is only looking at Teledyne's proposal.**

"The Corps is looking at this upgrade package for possible application to the M-60 tank fleet. The upgrade applied to the tanks we already have at a cost considerably less than acquiring a new tank fleet, Beers added.

Accordingly, the comprehensive package can be applied to other tanks currently employed by NATO forces. Teledyne upgraded

a standard M-60 tank unsolicited and is showing it to the U.S. Army.

Meanwhile, the Marines were also asked to take a look.

SSGT Robertson headed the TBS demonstration as he literally roared around range eight on rain laden almost impossible muddy course which didn't seem to hinder the Super M-60 at all.

# Helicopters haul cargoes

Problem: How to get fire support to an area that needs it, now!

Solution: Helo-lift 155mm howitzers and set them in where they can give the support.

To prepare for such an eventuality, leathernecks from Kilo Battery, 1st Battalion, 12th Marines, joined by aircrews from Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron-463 and a helicopter support team from Brigade Service Support Group, 1st Marine Brigade, practiced heavy-lift operations at West Field, Nov. 17.

First Lieutenant Stephen Suhlett, Kilo Battery Executive Officer, said that his unit gets to practice the heavy-lift operations only about twice a year.

BSSG's helo support team displayed their skill by safely securing each of four 155mm howitzers to the underbelly of '463's Sea Stallions.

The big guns were then flown to another part of West Field where they were set up at positions established by Kilo Battery gun crews.

"The operation was very successful," 1st Lt. Suhlett said after the heavy-lift training was completed.



## VIP visit

### Senior enlisted sailor discusses future plans

The Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy concluded a one-week tour of all Hawaii area Navy commands with a stop at the Kaneohe Branch Clinic Thursday. MCPON Thomas Crow visited the Branch Clinic and spoke with two groups of Navy personnel.

During his talk with sailors, E-5 and below, MCPON Crow said that the recent pay raise was very good but that military pay still cannot be compared to civilian pay. "There isn't a civilian job that can compare to the jobs that anyone in the military does," stated MCPON Crow, "and it's the same for the pay."

MCPON CROW said the pay raise was a substantial amount but added that "the Chief of Naval Operations is driving for even more improvements in pay and allowances, to make things even better than they are now."

According to MCPON Crow, other items being discussed in Washington that may affect Navy personnel include proposals for a new GI Bill, a CHAMPUS dental plan for dependents and an extension of the 1989 cut-off date on the old GI Bill held by those who entered the service before 1977.

He also announced a turn-around in the attitude toward the Navy partly due to the pay raise, that has resulted in better recruiting, retention and re-entry into the Navy. "In a normal month we have between 150 and 200 people come back into the Navy after they've been discharged," reported MCPON Crow. "But in the last four months, we've had more than 1,000 a month come back in the Navy." He also said that for the last two years the Navy has been at or above recruiting goals.

"WHEN THE economy gets bad, the military starts looking very good," he said. The Navy is taking advantage of the surge in enlistments to upgrade their military image.

As of October 1980 there has been a rise in the basic requirements for enlistment. As a result, MCPON Crow claims that "we're now seeing a better quality individual joining the Navy."

It's back to basics at boot camp also, according to MCPON Crow. "Recruits are getting more military discipline, more military behavior and more military training in boot camp now," he said. "And, they're coming out more adaptable and more motivated."

THE NAVY is also cracking down extensively on their drug problem. According to MCPON Crow, "The Navy is clamping down on the abuse and use of drugs and we're doing more than just talking about it."

The Navy has just received a new portable drug urinalysis test kit. The new test provides a more valid and immediate response than previous urinalysis tests and is capable of detecting all types of drugs injected into the system up to 10 days before the test is administered.

The narcotic dog program within the Navy is also being expanded, according to MCPON Crow. The use of drug dogs will be more frequent and more thorough and there are plans to build kennels for the drug dogs aboard ships.

HE WRAPPED UP his talk by addressing the problem of overweight sailors. MCPON Crow said that "Obesity in the Army, Air Force and Navy is almost as serious as the drug problem." He claims

that approximately 40 percent of the Navy is overweight and said that there are plans to "put the Navy on a weight control and physical fitness program similar to the Marine Corps."

MCPON Crow, from McArthur, Ohio, enlisted in the Navy in January 1953. He was assigned to Navy Fighter Squadron-161 in Da Nang and Chu Lai, Vietnam from September 1966 to August 1969. There he worked as the Transfer F4B Aircraft Inspector supporting the transfer of Marine F4B aircraft to the USS Coral Sea.

HE HAS served in several billets since then including Race Relations Education Specialist and Equal Opportunity/Race Relations, Drug and Alcohol Program Manager. In December

1977 he was selected to serve as the Force Master Chief for Commander, Naval Air Forces, U.S. Pacific Fleet, for which he received the Meritorious Service Medal.

On Sept. 28, 1979 he became the fourth Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy. In addition to the Meritorious Service Medal, MCPON Crow wears the Navy Achievement Medal, six awards of the Good Conduct Medal, two awards of the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal and the United Nations Service Medal.

# Save energy dollars

Light bulbs are the symbols of conservation, but there are other things you can also turn off to save money.

One example is the anti-sweat heater in refrigerators. These heaters keep moisture from appearing on the sides of the appliance. On large refrigerators, they add nearly \$10 to the annual electric bill.

They can be regulated with a switch inside the refrigerator compartment. The switch may have settings that say "dry/humid" or it may be called "power miser switch" or "energy-saver switch." If your switch says "dry/humid," make sure it is set on "dry." If it says "power miser" or "energy-saver," turn the switch on to turn the heaters off.

The heaters are unnecessary, except in humid climates where a house is not air-conditioned. If moisture ever does appear on the refrigerator, you can turn on the heaters for short intervals and turn them off again.

Another good turn-off is pilot lights on a gas furnace during warm weather for savings of \$10 a year.

**IF YOU HAVE A SECOND** refrigerator and use it only to store marginal items, unplug it for savings of \$20 to \$40 a year.

Central air conditioners can be turned off when the house will be unoccupied for four hours or more. Room air-

conditioners can be turned off during an absence of one hour or more.

Water heaters can be turned off when you leave the house for a weekend or longer.

**A SWITCH TO A LOWER** temperature on the washing machine can have a major impact on utility bills. It takes about 35 gallons of water to do a full wash and rinse, or about 17 gallons for each cycle. How much of that water is hot depends on which button you push.

A hot wash and warm rinse combination, the highest setting on most machines, require 25 gallons of hot water. A load a day on such a setting, for electric water heaters, could easily cost \$100 a year.

Changing the rinse water to cold, which experts say does not affect the results of the wash, will save 8 of those gallons per day, or \$25 a year. By changing the wash setting from hot to warm, you could save another \$25. If you have a gas water heater, the savings would be \$10 a year for each strategy.

To increase the savings even further, use a cold water detergent, and wash and rinse with cold water.

You may be well satisfied with the cleaning results and you'll definitely be satisfied with the energy dollars saved.

# Money game is the only one in town

**MARINE CORPS LOGISTICS BASE, ALBANY, Ga.** — We live in a country with the highest per capita income ever known to mankind; yet of every 100 of our citizens who reach age 65, 95 are flat broke! Of every 100 who reach their "golden years", only two are financially independent; 23 must continue to work, and 75 are dependent on relatives or charity, therefore, young citizen, upon you falls the responsibility to be a good steward of every dollar that comes your way.

If you are granted a reasonable amount of time, have the willingness to earn an average wage, and have the discipline to save a small portion of your earnings, you can become financially independent. You, however, must make your dollars work for you as hard as you had to work to get them. I write this article to make you knowledgeable about money matters—to inspire you, to give you hope, to motivate you to act.

**IN PLANNING YOUR** financial independence, remember this: you are different from any other person, you were created as a unique individual, you have different financial objectives, different assets, and a different temperament. Your financial program, therefore, must be designed for you alone because you are special. Financial planning is like navigation. If you know where you are and where you want to go, navigation is not so difficult.

Enter now your chart room to plot your financial future. Here you must determine your present position, where you want to be on a certain date, and alternate courses available for arriving at your destination.

You are an investor. You are investing the wealth that comes your way either in present goods and services or in future goods and services. It is not a choice of whether you will invest, but how you will invest. Do you want to consume all your earn today and hope for the best tomorrow?

Why in a nation with a high per capita income and unparalleled prosperity prosperity do 98 percent of our citizens reach age 65 without having made adequate preparation to retire in financial dignity? There are five basic reasons so many fail: procrastination, failure to set a financial goal, ignorance of what money can do, failure to understand and apply tax laws, and being "sold" the wrong kind of life insurance. Preparing to retire in financial dignity is an obligation, a debt that you owe yourself and others (family, community, taxpayers).

**A NORMAL LIFETIME CAN BE** divided into three financial periods. The first period is the "Learning Period" (1-25 years), the second is the "Earning Period" (say 40 years until age 65), the third period will be your "Earning Years" or your "Golden Years" dependent on the decisions you make during the second period of your life. If you are a male, you will probably spend 15 to 20 years in this third period. If you are a female and make it to age 65, plan your finances well, you'll probably be around for a long time.

Do you realize how much wealth will pass through your hands during the 40 years between 25 and 65? If you earn as much as \$525 a month, over a quarter of a million dollars will pass your way. If you earn as much as \$1050 a month, over a half million dollars will pass your way. So what's the problem?

Let me share with you a very simple secret (10 words) for the accumulation of wealth: "A part of all I earn is mine to keep." Some of it belongs to the butcher, the baker, etc., but you must learn to pay yourself first. If you were to save one-tenth of all you earned and did this for ten years you'd have a year's salary at one time, and you'd put this money to work and before long you would have much more working for you.

And do not be lulled into a false sense of security by the cozy sound of the words "Social Security." Social Security was never designed to give you financial independence, but rather, it was created to prevent mass destitution. When you reach the age to qualify for Social Security benefits, if your income from it and other sources is insufficient for you to live in financial dignity, making it necessary for you to continue to work, you will forfeit all or most of your benefits each month until you reach age 72.

**TODAY MORE THAN 24** million citizens over 65 lose their Social Security benefits. You may live a long time, yet how many of those years will be meaningful? You may decide how long you will work, as it may be decided for you, but the decision of how long you will live is not in your hands.

There are three chief sources of income. The first is you at work, however, there will come a time that regardless of how badly you want to work, the world will not let you: it will retire you. The second source is your money at work. If you have turned some of your past income into capital, there will come a time when you will no longer have to work for your money, your money will work for you. The third source of income is charity. How much will you need at retirement time?

Several factors will enter into this calculation: the number of years you have before you reach retirement, what inflation will have done to that cost of living by then, what standard of living you desire, and what rate of return you will be receiving on your funds.

We can try to calculate how much income you will need at retirement, plus what additional income you will need to adjust for the yearly rate of inflation. For example, assume that you would need \$1000 per month if you were retiring today, that you are age 45, that you plan to retire in 20 years at age 65, and you feel the government can slow inflation to 5 percent (ha-ha). The adjustment factor is 2.65.

Now let's adjust: \$1000 x 2.65<sup>30</sup> = \$2650. This would be the amount you would need per month in 20 years to obtain the same housing, food, and clothing as you do with \$1000 today. And, inflation will probably not accommodate you by stopping just because you retired. Inflation will continue.

**WHAT GOAL SHOULD YOU SET** for yourself to have a monthly income of approximately \$2650 per month at age 65? How much capital will it take to produce this amount? Let's use a 6 percent yield. If so, we need \$530,000 of capital. Don't become discouraged, remember, that you have 20 years before you need it, and if you invest, this amount can be reached. If you save at 6 percent compounded to reach \$200,000, and you begin saving at age 25, you can reach it by saving \$102 per month. At age 40 the amount to save increases to \$286 and at age 45 to \$426 per month.

The formula for financial independence is: "time, plus" money "plus" American free enterprise equal opportunity to become financially independent." If you are young and have only a small amount of money to invest, don't despair, for you possess the most important ingredient — TIME.

It doesn't take much money to compound a tidy sum of you have TIME. A savings of \$10 per month started at age 25 is equivalent of \$30 started at 35, \$100 at age 45 and \$425 at age 55. Start as early as you can to reach your predetermined goal.

**MONEY IS THE SECOND** ingredient—something you get every payday or that you have acquired through previous paydays. To become financially independent you must save and let your money grow. The rate of return that you receive on your funds will be determined by how skillfully you put your money to work under our free enterprise system.

A goal to shoot for would be to accumulate enough money through saving to reach the \$10,000 lump sum certificate that, if invested at 10 percent for 40 years will grow to \$422,193. If you can invest \$100 per month at 5 percent for 10 years to reach this \$10,000 level you can accumulate \$15,848. Usually it is necessary to reach your first \$10,000 before you can enjoy an interest return of 10 percent to 16 percent. If you can invest \$10,000 at 14 percent you can reach \$137,000 in the 20th year and \$1,888,835 by the 40th year. If you can save \$100 per month at 6 percent you can attain \$196,857 by your 40th year of investment.

If you have waited the past 18 years for \$1 to become \$2 at 4 percent, you have lost the fight, because inflation has more than doubled your cost of living — to say nothing of your loss through the tax bite.

**YOU MUST SAVE FOR THE** future in order to fulfill your obligation to yourself, your family, and society. You must conscientiously avoid the twins of financial failure — procrastination and ignorance of what money must do to accomplish your predetermined goal. You must use the talents you have to implement your own formula for financial independence.

A dollar has fantastic earning power if you will employ it properly. The money game is the only game in town — you must choose to play... I kid you not!

# Uncle Sam offers a gift Marines can't afford to refuse

"Education makes a people easy to lead, but difficult to drive; easy to govern, but impossible to enslave." Henry Peter Brougham.

The Marine Corps has consistently tried to offer Marines the opportunity to further their education. The Marine Corps Tuition Assistance Program is just one of those opportunities.

Veterans Administration Educational Assistance under the GI Bill was terminated Jan. 1, 1977 and funds for this program will no longer be available after 1989. This made it necessary for another type of education program to be established.

The Veterans Education Assistance Program was established and now offers Marines the opportunity to receive \$2 from Uncle Sam for every \$1 they save for a higher education. But that money cannot be used until after the Marine has completed one enlistment or has been separated from active duty.

Therefore the Marine Corps Tuition

Assistance Program was designed to encourage Marines to finish their high school education and to take off-duty college courses while still on active duty.

Active duty Marines and personnel from other services who are attached to a Marine Corps installation are entitled to take part in the Tuition Assistance Program. During the last quarter of Fiscal Year 1981, more than 600 Marines were enrolled in the Tuition Assistance Program at the Air Station.

As authorized by the Department of Defense Appropriations Acts, 75 percent to 100 percent of tuition costs may be subsidized under the program. One hundred percent of tuition costs for Marines receiving high school diplomas are paid through the program. Air Station Marines can receive diplomas through the St. Louis High School program.

Seventy-five percent of the tuition will be covered for E-1s through E-4s attending off-duty undergraduate and graduate college courses. Enlisted Marines E-5 and

above with less than 15 years of active duty, will receive 90 percent. All others will receive 75 percent including commissioned officers who must also agree to obligate two years of active duty following completion of college.

There are few restrictions to this program that saved Air Station Marines nearly \$500,000 last year. Only courses that apply to the Marines' program of study and lead to a specific degree are authorized under the program. Courses must be offered by accredited colleges and universities. Chamaine, Roosevelt, Chamaine, Wayland Baptist, Embry Riddle Aeronautical and Central Michigan Universities, with offices located at the Air Station, are accredited for tuition assistance purposes. Independent study and correspondence courses are not authorized under the Tuition Assistance Program.

Also, Marines who are already receiving educational assistance from other government sources may not be eligible for the program.

Before enrolling in any college or university, check with the unit education officer or contact the Joint Education Center at 257-2061 to apply for the Tuition Assistance Program.

program are not retroactive.

The Tuition Assistance Program is just one of the many educational programs offered to Marines by the Joint Education Center.

According to Captain Joe Bockhold, Joint Education Officer, the Education Center has the St.

Louis High School program offering a high school diploma program and a basic skills education program. Developmental reading and English as a second language are part of the basic skills program.

The Joint Education Center is also a testing center for Marine Corps classi-

fication tests including the GCT, language aptitude and typing. The Defense Activity for Non-Traditional Education Support provides different types of scholastic testing including the College Level Examination Program tests. Normally, five CLEP exams are given at a cost of \$20 each.

however, there is no cost to active duty Marines. Under DANTES, the education center also offers the Scholastic Aptitude Test and the American College Test.

With the educational opportunities available in the military today, all Marines have a chance to become scholars.

# Services pay act achieves final step in per diem equity

HQMC, WASHINGTON — Policies on basic allowance for subsistence for enlisted Marines on temporary additional duty have been revised, resulting in extra money for many Marines.

Announced in ALMAR 218/81, as of Nov. 1, enlisted Marines are entitled to the meals portion of per diem while TAD away from their permanent duty stations. This allowance is authorized even if enlisted dining facilities are available.

## THE CHANGE BECAME

effective with the passage of the Uniformed Services Pay Act of 1981. A section of the Pay Act provides the per diem along with BAS to enlisted Marines during TAD periods.

This represents the final step in achieving full BAS/per diem equity between officers and enlisted members while on temporary duty and fulfills the Congressional intent of the BAS amendment to the Defense Officer Personnel Management Act, according to the ALMAR. The Secretary of the Navy can

authorize exceptions to the payment of the subsistence portion of the per diem allowance when unit messing has been determined to be essential to a unit's training readiness.

**THE SECRETARY OF THE NAVY** approved the exception to subsistence of per diem for enlisted Marines participating in the Unit Deployment Program. According to the ALMAR, in UDP, unit messing is considered essential to the training and readiness of units. Although Marines serving with

units on the UDP do not rate the subsistence portion of per diem, they will continue to receive regular BAS while still being allowed to eat at enlisted dining facilities without paying.

Other enlisted Marines on TAD will draw regular BAS plus the subsistence portion of per diem. However, should they desire to eat at an enlisted dining facility, they will pay the meal rate plus an additional surcharge, these rates are established by DoD.

## Thanksgiving magnifies a celebration of gratitude

The first Thanksgiving days were harvest festivals, or days for thanking God for plentiful crops. That is why the holiday comes in the late fall after the crops have been gathered.

But few military families are farmers, so we join the majority of American families in a celebration complete with big turkey, candied sweet potato and pumpkin pie dinners and joyous reunions — if not with family, at least with friends. And we may sprinkle in a little football for spice.

But Thanksgiving is also a time for serious religious thinking, church services, true thanksgiving and prayer. It is a time of reflection and counting God's blessings to us. It is really to be a celebration in gratitude!

Theodore Terr's described the grateful person: "The grateful person is not necessarily the satisfied person who gets what he wants. He is the sensitive person, sensitive to everything and every person to which and to whom he owes his existence."

Living the thankful life is living a sensitive life, quick to perceive when you are receiving something that is for your own good. At times we receive things that are for our

good but for which we had not wished. It was in Paul's letter to The Christians in Thessalonians where he wrote: "Give thanks whatever happens for this is what God in Christ wills for you." (1 Thessalonians 5:18 N.E.B.) So we are to be thankful whatever the circumstances may be. This can be difficult.

I never really grasped the concept or attitude of grateful living until I met Bill some years after we had been in college together. When I graduated from college, Bill had married and had begun his family... a proud father of a baby boy! He had been called to pastor a small California congregation. Everything was looking up when illness struck, forcing Bill to take a leave of absence.

Through the years I had only heard sketches of Bill's hardships. Multiple Sclerosis had attacked his nervous system and soon confined him to a wheelchair. His wife and children left him as he wasted away in a rest home. Most of us would have perhaps cursed God, given up on life and just rotted away in depression in such circumstances. But not Bill. Every day he pushed his wheelchair to every room and cheered the lives of others.



# Bald eagle vs. turkey

As a patriotic symbol, the epitome of nobility, strength and valor, the eagle has represented more nations than any other creature. But one of their number, the venerable Benjamin Franklin, registered a strong demurrer. In a letter to his daughter, reprinted below, Franklin set forth his reasons for feeling that the eagle was unworthy of being the national bird.

sharping and robbing, he is generally poor, and often very lousy. Besides, he is a rank coward; the little king-bird, not bigger than a sparrow, attacks him holdly and drives him out of the district. He is therefore by no means a proper emblem for the brave and honest Cincinnati of America, who have driven all the king-birds from our country.

I am, on this account, not displeased that the figure (appearing on the Order of Cincinnati medal) is not known as a bald eagle, but looks more like a turkey. For in truth, the turkey is in comparison a much more respectable bird, and withal a true original native of America. Eagles have been found in all countries, but the turkey was peculiar to ours; the first of the species seen in Europe being brought to France by the Jesuits from Canada, and served up at the wedding table of Charles the Ninth. He is, besides, though a little vain and silly, it is true, but not he worse emblem for that, a bird of courage, and would not hesitate to attack a grenadier of the British Guards, who should presume to invade his farmyard with a red coat on.

"For my part, I wish the bald eagle has not been chosen as the representative of our country; he is a bird of bad moral character; he does not get his living honestly; you may have seen him perched on some dead tree, where, too lazy to fish for himself, he watches the labor of the fishing-hawk; and, when that diligent bird has at length taken a fish, and is bearing it to his nest for the support of his mate and young ones, the bald eagle pursues him and takes it from him.

Sgt Medina gave Kaneohe trouble from the start of the game, returning the opening kickoff 58 yards and on the first play from scrimmage, exploding up the middle for a touchdown which was nullified by a penalty.

Kaneohe couldn't get it together the first half, being caught off guard by the rain. When they finally got their hands on the ball, after Camp Smith missed a field goal, they couldn't do anything right.

Quarterback Private Oltha Wallace fumbled the ball on first down and came back on the next play to have his pass picked off by Sgt Medina on the six-yard line.

Camp Smith, having its own problems, was unable to move the ball and had to punt it away.

As Kaneohe's offense returned to the field, First Lieutenant Danny Ball entered the lineup as the quarterback. His first two plays netted a minus 20 yards as the snaps flew through his fingers like greased watermelons. With third down and 40 yards for a first, 1stLt Ball's pass was picked off by Sgt Medina.

Two interceptions later, Camp Smith had the ball again. Sgt Angel Gomez connected with Lance Corporal Charles Williams for a 57-yard touchdown pass. With one minute and 37 seconds left in the first half, Corporal Joe Mulvenna's conversion kick was good and Camp Smith took the lead 7-0.

Pvt Wallace returned as K-Bay's quarterback in the second half and moved his team down to the 18-yard line. First Lieutenant Ball took over and ran an option

play to the right side for a touchdown, but the two-point conversion was broken up.

Camp Smith received Cpl T.J. Rahmburg's kick on the five and returned it to their 30-yard line. They marched straight through Kaneohe's defense and Sgt Robert Knutti, nine plays later, took it in for the score.

The conversion attempt was good and Camp Smith increased their lead 14-6.

The pressure was now on Kaneohe with one minute left and the ball on their own 40-yard line. On a fourth down attempt and under a heavy Camp Smith rush, 1stLt Ball unloaded, finding Staff Sergeant Joe Blackburn on a post pattern. Amazingly SSgt Blackburn caught the ball and ran it in for a touchdown with no time left on the clock.

K-Bay needed a two-point conversion to tie, but LCpl Williams intercepted the ball in the endzone ending the first game of the best of three series, 14-6.

The second game of the series was an endurance contest.

Who was going to last the longest, Kaneohe, Camp Smith or the rain?

Camp Smith started the game with a new play, the double reverse. It netted big yards until Kaneohe was able to read the play.

Cpl Rahmburg was one-for-three kicking field goals and the Kaneohe touchdown was the only score of the game. In the foul weather Kaneohe shut out Camp Smith 9-0.

It took three attempts at the bomb before 1stLt Ball found someone who could hold on to the ball in the only dry game of the series.

After Cpl Aaron Brown and SSgt Blackburn let the ball slip through their fingertips on the first two K-Bay plays, LCpl Jim Balthis managed to hang on and get to the Camp Smith 10-yard line. Three plays later 1stLt Ball adverted two tacklers, ran the ball into the endzone for a 6-0 lead.

Cpl Rahmburg missed the point after yard line. On the second play from scrimmage LCpl Jeff Rainey was on the receiving end of a 1stLt Ball-pass and K-Bay jumped out to an early 13-0 lead.

Not to be out done Camp Smith quickly recovered. Sgt Gomez handed off to LCpl Jeff Becknell running up the middle for a first

A good attempt at a come back for Camp Smith but no time was left on the clock and Kaneohe, after losing the first game came from behind to take the title for the second year.

If history continues to repeat itself, the Hawaii Marines will take the interservice title. The returning champions will meet the best of the Army, Navy and Air Force in the series which concludes Friday at Pearl Harbor.

The Department of Land and Natural Resources announced the opening of the annual game bird season. Hunting will be permitted throughout the state on Saturdays, Sundays, and state holidays only, through Jan. 17, 1962. The following exceptions are of special interest.

1. The special permit area on the Puuwaawaa Cooperative Game Management

Area will be open only during the month of November on weekends. Twenty hunters will be permitted each hunting day. Each hunter must apply for and be assigned a hunting day no earlier than the Wednesday preceding his hunting day(s) from 8 to 9:30 a.m. by calling the Division of Forestry and Wildlife office in Hilo, 961-7307. The hunting of ring-necked pheasants will be prohibited in this area.

2. Wild turkey hunting on the public hunting areas will be permitted from the first Saturday of January through the third Sunday in January, except for the Puuwaawaa Cooperative Game Management Area where wild turkeys may be hunted in November.

3. All archery hunting will be suspended on weekends and state holidays in Kaohoe during the game bird season.

4. Portions of the Pohakuloa Training Area will become available for hunting later in the season. Hunters are urged to contact Range Control at Pohakuloa Training Area, 935-8027, prior to each weekend's hunt for information on open areas in PTA.

All hunters will be required to have a 1981-82 State of Hawaii hunting license and to check in and out at checking stations located at Puuwaawaa, Kilohana, or Puu Huluhulu. All hunters are reminded that field forms must be carried while hunting and turned in to the checking station at the end of the day.

Details on species, bag limits, hunting times, bookings, and areas are available at all Division of Forestry and Wildlife offices on Hawaii.

**Helicopters squadron flies mission**

**Training task tests techniques**

The scenario was as follows. Kahoolawe, an ally, was being overthrown by the government of the Big Island, Maui, a communist block nation, was backing the coup. The Marines were called in to land on Kahoolawe, secure the radar communication station located on the island and remove the high security equipment.

Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-165 was tasked to land the ground troops on the island and remove the troops and equipment after the communication station was secured.

**A DIVISION OF** CH-46 helicopters flew 1,500 feet over the water, passing three predetermined checkpoints. As they neared Kahoolawe, 84 miles away, they dropped down 1,000 feet to avoid detection.

A simulated section of AH-1J Cobras scouted the island and cleared the avenue for the anxious, ready Marines. With radios silenced, four helicopters, loaded with the first of a battalion of combat ready Marines, landed undetected on the island. The rotors continued

to slice through the hot, dusty air as the Marines charged off the aircraft to accomplish their mission. Within a matter of days the air support provided by HMM-165 was again needed. The ground troops and their precious cargo were removed from the island.

**ALTHOUGH THIS** situation was entirely fictional, the Marines of HMM-165 played the game as if their lives depended on it. It was one of a number of training exercises they will participate in as the squadron prepares for deployment to the Western Pacific next April.

"It went very well," said First Lieutenant James Nelson, Unit Information Officer, about the training exercise. "Getting in under cover is the real problem, but the key is to keep quiet and follow the division leader," he explained. "This is basically what you have to do in a wartime situation."

Following the debrief of the training exercise 1stLt Nelson explained that "everybody knew what they were doing and where they were supposed to be, when they were

supposed to be there."

**HMM-154 IS** accomplishing their training exercises with the new CH-46E Sea Knight helicopters they received last August. According to

1stLt Nelson, the new helicopters have larger engines and more power than the older CH-46D.

The training continues for the Marines of HMM-165 as they prepare for deployment.

On future training schedules they hope to have low level navigation training flights and air-to-air training with an aggressor jet against one of their new CH-46E Sea Knights.

# First aid training pays off for parents

In the past four weeks, after attending a one-day class in basic life support techniques, more than 300 Air Station Marines have received their American Red Cross certificate for cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

The class was coordinated by Gunnery Sergeant David Willhide, Ground Safety Manager for Marine Aircraft Group-24, and was taught by Hospitalman First Class Robert Harris.

THIS STORY could have ended here, but it doesn't. There is a heartwarming postscript about Marines learning how to save a person's life.

Sergeant Hector Lerma, Marine Air Control Squadron-2, spent all day, Oct. 23, in the MAG-24 classroom learning the basic life support techniques. He left the class armed with his CPR card, and con-

fidant in his knowledge.

He picked up Jamie, his 26-month-old daughter, at the Air Station's Child Care Center and headed for his home in Pearl City. He recounts the events as he drove down the road.

"All of a sudden I heard Jamie in the back seat gagging. Her eyes and mouth were wide open and she had her hand in her mouth like she was trying to get something out. I immediately pulled off the road and started hitting her on the back. A few minutes later the object came out."

JAMIE, a beautiful little girl with big, soft dark eyes, was choking on a penny.

"After the penny came out I monitored her to make sure she was breathing right and checked for more pennies," said Sgt Lerma.

When the incident occurred, Sgt Lerma

claims "CPR immediately popped into my head. If she had needed CPR I could have done it. I knew I could do it," he continued. "I honestly feel good about taking this class. There is a lot to learn and knowing it helped me save Jamie's life."

HIS KNOWLEDGE of basic life support techniques and the calm, confident manner in which he handled this emergency situation was taught in the class.

It was that same knowledge and confidence, however, that was missing a few years earlier when his older daughter, Jessica, now three-and-a-half, was also a choking victim. Jessica was choking on food. Sgt Lerma was scared and panicked.

It was his wife, Petty Officer Third Class Connie Lerma, a corpsman at the Naval Regional Branch Clinic, Pearl Harbor, who expertly handled

the situation that time. "Ever since then," said the 25-year-old Marine from Raymondville, Texas, "I've wanted to learn CPR, but I've never had the opportunity before this class."

THE CLASS was coordinated by GySgt Willhide primarily for the Marines of MAG-24. HM1 Harris now teaches the class to volunteers, from all commands.

During the one-day classes, students are taught an advanced Heimlich Maneuver that involves more than grabbing the choking victim from behind and jerking up.

The students also learn CPR, artificial respiration and how to help both conscious and unconscious, adult and infant choking victims. The class stresses confidence and judgement and students successfully completing the class receive the American

Red Cross certificate qualifying them to administer CPR.

"WHEN THESE

people leave this class with their certification cards, they are confident about what they know," said HM1

Harris. Persons interested in learning basic life support techniques,

including CPR, should contact E.C. Phillips, Station Director of the American Red Cross at 257-2606.

Don't wait, someone's life, like Jamie's, may someday depend on you.



**Airlines to reduce services**

**Plan ahead for December holiday trips**

**HQMC, WASHINGTON** — The Christmas holiday season always brings a lot of congestion to air, bus and rail terminals. This year it will be worse than ever.

Because of the air controllers' strike, air carriers will, beginning Dec. 1, reduce scheduled service to 77 percent of normal. This situation, coupled with the expected rise in furlough fare travel, makes it even more urgent that military members carefully plan their trips and make reservations as early as possible for leave travel over the Christmas holiday. The main reason for doing this is, of course, to take advantage of the discount fares that are available to military personnel.

**NINETEEN** airlines now offer 50 percent discount furlough fares, with reserved seats, to active duty military personnel, Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps and Coast Guard.

In addition, service academy cadets and

personnel traveling within seven days after date of discharge are eligible. All personnel must be traveling at their own expense on authorized furlough, leave, pass, or liberty or be dischargees. Members are not required to travel in uniform but must be prepared to show ID cards or separation papers to buy tickets.

The 19 participating carriers are: American, Air Florida, Braniff, US Air, Empire, Aspen, Piedmont, TWA, Texas International, Air Midwest, continental, Ozark, Eastern, Republic, United, Altair, Northwest, Western and Delta.

**ALL THE LISTED** airlines, with the exception of Texas

International, offer the special fare over all their domestic routes.

Pan American Airlines discontinued its military furlough fare on Nov. 16 due to a major revision to its CONUS air fare structure. Many of Pan American's new restricted fares will be

competitive with their previous furlough fares.

TWA has lifted blackout dates previously imposed on holiday travel. Military members may now take advantage of the furlough fare on TWA any day during the Christmas season.

**THE 25 percent** furlough fare discount is still available from most other carriers that do not offer the 50 percent furlough fare discount. Travelers are urged to check with the airlines early to insure the lowest fares are obtained. This is very important since airline tariffs are constantly changing to meet the competition — so shop around, also be patient with ticketing agents as they are doing their best at this hectic time.

For bus travel, furlough fare discounts are limited to selected points in the Eastern states and between Eastern and Midwestern states. Fares apply to both one-way and round-trip travel with no restriction as to the dates or time travel

can be performed.

**FOR RAIL** travel 25 percent discounts are available on both one-way and round-trip coach tickets and apply year-round. However, military furlough fares do not apply on the metro-liner.

Many services are available to military members transiting airports around the country. The United Service Organizations, Inc. has major lounges located in Atlanta, Chicago, Cleveland and Columbus, Ohio, Philadelphia, San Francisco, Seattle, St. Louis and Washington, D.C. airports.

The USO also has two overseas lounges at Honolulu, and Frankfurt, Germany. These lounges provide information services, refreshments and recreation facilities. Some have babysitting services, nurseries, and interpreters. The Honolulu lounge provides sleeping facilities for stranded travelers.

**THE USO** also operates information

desks at airports in Colorado Springs, Colo., Los Angeles, Oakland, Calif., Orlando, Fla., and Andrews Air Force Base and Kimpo International Airport, Seoul, Korea. Hours vary from center to center, but most are open during heavy traffic hours.

Most airlines also have lounges at major airports around the country. Service members should contact airline agents at the terminals for specific information.

Any military members traversing Minneapolis-St. Paul can take advantage of the Servicemen's Center, Inc. of Minnesota located on the ticketing concourse at the Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport. This facility is open 24 hours a day, year-round, and provides all free services including refreshments, game room, a lounge and sleeping area.

**PERSONNEL** with problems on scheduling, local transportation, shortage of funds, or expiration of leave

time can get help at the military information desks located in major U.S. air terminals.

Distressed members can obtain assistance from the nearest military installation, regardless of branch of service. Additionally, the American Red Cross, Traveler's Aid, and the various USO centers, listed in local telephone directories, are available to assist military travelers.

Military personnel are urged to report excellent service or any travel deficiencies to the Military Traffic Management Command, Washington, D.C. 20315 on DD Form 1341, Report of Commercial Passenger Service.

MTMC uses these reports to insure that military members continue to receive nothing less than high quality service. Personnel can obtain this form at local military installation transportation offices and are encouraged to use them. This is the best way for MTMC to get quick feedback from you — the military traveler.

**Consumer's Choice**

"Surplus jeeps — \$19.30...Cars — \$13.50...Government surplus, most comprehensive directory available. Tells how, where to buy — your area...send \$2."

Ads such as the above appear in magazines and newspapers throughout the country. Unfortunately for those people who answer the ads and send in their \$2 or \$10 or \$15, the answer received is not what they expect.

"Buyer beware," says Bill Collins, Public Affairs Officer for the Defense Property Disposal Service, headquartered in Battle Creek, Mich. "People who answer the ads are buying information that is actually available free of charge."

"Aside from the fact that most of the ads are misleading," says Collins, "the majority of the material sent is available from our Bidders Control Office for nothing."

The Defense Property Disposal Service, a field activity of the Defense Logistics Agency, manages the sale of military surplus property through more than 240 field activities in the United States and 18 foreign countries.

Collins says beside the problem of people paying for what they can get free, there is the constant problem of rumors that people can get almost new, crated World War II — type government jeeps for next to nothing.

"The truth is there are no such vehicles available," states Collins. When jeeps are sold, they are rarely in driveable condition — and jeeps never were crated.

There are basically three types of four-wheel vehicles, including jeeps, which are

called "utility trucks" when sold as surplus vehicles.

The type most commonly referred to as the World War II jeep is the M38 series. Most recent models used by the military services are the M151 series. Also included in the utility truck category are commercial type four wheel vehicles that can be bought by the general public on used car lots.

One of the reasons that a vast majority of the four-wheel vehicles sold are in such poor shape is the reutilization program managed by DPDS.

Vehicles that are in good condition, yet are excess to the needs of one military service, are transferred to another military agency in need of such vehicles.

In addition to the reutilization program, items no longer needed by the services can be transferred to other government agencies, both federal or state, or donated to eligible agencies.

If the vehicle passes through the reutilization, transfer and donation screening, it is then made available for sale to the general public.

And, the possibility of purchasing such a vehicle for \$19.30 and getting anything other than scrap metal is very remote.

As an example of average prices paid, even for vehicles requiring extensive repairs, several 1952 to 1955 Willys Overland, Model M38, four wheel vehicles were recently sold for from \$800 to \$1,000. Commercial vehicles, such as AMC's CJ5 and IHC's Scout, brought up to \$2,000 through sealed bid sales and at auctions.

All vehicles are offered in "as is"

condition and should be inspected before submitting bids.

The other type utility vehicle available to the public is the M151 series. Unfortunately, this vehicle can only be sold for scrap and recovering of certain parts.

Collins explains, "The M151 series was designed for cross-country mobility, high flotation, air-drop capability and ease of maintenance."

According to Collins, the M151 is safe if operated within the design limitations, but exhibits a tendency to turn over without warning if those limitations are exceeded.

In 1971, the Army started to phase out worn out models of the M151 series due to age and high cost of repair. Because of the roll-over problem, even among trained military personnel, it was recommended by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration that the M151 series be disposed of in such a manner as to prevent its future use as a vehicle.

And according to Collins, even with destruction of the body as a requirement, the residue of some of the M151s has been sold for up to \$500, depending on the condition of the vehicles components.

Anyone interested in purchasing government surplus vehicles or any commodity should request an application to be put on the bidders list from the DPDS Bidders list from the DPDS Bidders Control Office, Post Office Box 1370, Federal Center, Battle Creek, MI, 49016, or Sales Office Hawaii, Post Office Box 300, Pearl Harbor, HI, 96860.
