Marine plummets down air shaft

An attempt to explore an open air shaft at Koko Head Crater, Feb. 14, resulted in a serious injury to a Marine Fighter Attack Squadron-235 Marine.

The injury occurred when Lance Corporal Mathew Moran and his three friends, Sergeant Larry Enfield, Corporal Michael Ansbauh, and LCpl Larry Harris, also members of VMFA-235, were starting back from a weekend camping trip. That's when Moran saw an abandoned air shaft in an old bunker and began to climb down it.

"THE LADDER WAS rusty and shaky," said Cpl Ansbauh, "and Sgt Enfield started to climb down right behind LCpl Moran.

The ladder broke and LCpl Moran fell approximately 12 feet. His foot stuck between two boards at the bottom of the air shaft, throwing his body sideways and shattering his left ankle.

Sgt Enfield was still safe on the top part of the ladder and yelled up at Cpl Ansbauh and LCpl Harris to get help.

"I wanted to make a stretcher and get LCpl Moran out," said Cpl Ansbauh, "but Sgt Enfield said that LCpl Moran's back was also

injured and to get Crash Fire Rescue instead."

Cpl Ansbauh and LCpl Harris climbed 1400 feet down the mountain to the Hawaii Job Corps Center and called CFR while Sgt Enfield scaled down the air shaft wall and administered first aid to his injured friend. "Sgt Enfield was with LCpl Moran the entire time and kept a cool head through the whole thing," said Cpl Ansbauh.

After calling CFR, Cpl Ansbauh and LCpl Harris started to climb back up the mountain. Halfway up, LCpl Harris suffered from heat stroke. After dumping water on his friend's neck and loosening his clothing, Cpl Ansbauh continued alone to meet the CFR helicopter. Cpl Ansbauh directed the chopper to a cave opening which led horizontally into the air shaft.

"IT ONLY TOOK about a half an hour for help to reach me," LCpl Moran recalled from his hospital bed, "I would never have made it if it wasn't for my friends. They did an outstanding job. None of them lost their heads.

They did everything they possibly could have done."

"We thought all the stuff we learned during the IG about first aid wasn't necessary, but we found out that it really helped out in an emergency," said Cpl Ansbauh. "Without the training we learned in the Marine Corps and the endurance we've gained, we probably never could have gotten help to LCpl Moran as fast as we did, or helped each other in the process."

After clearing the cave opening, CFR took LCpl Moran to the waiting helicopter for the trip to Tripler Army Medical Center. LCpl Harris was driven back to the Air Station by a Hawaii Job Corps Center employee, and CFR later went back and picked up Cpl Ansbauh and Sgt Enfield.

LCpl Moran was admitted to Tripler with a shattered left ankle, two crushed vertebrae, and lacerations on his back, hands and arms. He is listed in satisfactory condition.

Cpl Ansbauh said, "We're putting together a team to clear out the air shaft and make it safe so that hopefully no more accidents will happen."

Contraband discovered during inspections

Security Department enforces weapon guidelines

EDITOR'S NOTE: The article printed in the Feb. 17 issue contained several mistakes. It has been rewritten and rerun for your convenience.

Illegal weapons aboard the Air Station are being found and confiscated from barracks rooms and from individuals during command authorized inspections.

Captain H.E. Tobey, deputy provost marshal at the Security Department, explained that the only weapons which need to be registered on station are firearms, spear guns, air rifles and compressed gas pistols and rifles. Knives with blades over three

inches must also be stored at the armory, but they do not need to be registered.

Capt Tobey explained that knives fall into three categories — permitted, restricted and prohibited. Permitted knives are knives with blades under three inches. These may be kept in the possession of the owner and do not need to be stored in the armory.

Restricted knives are knives used for specific purposes, such as camping, scuba diving, fishing and hunting. These knives must be stored in the armory. When using them, individuals may only have them in their possession when going to and from the

activity at which they are being used. If carried in an auto, these knives must not be accessible to anyone in the car. They must be carried in places such as the trunk.

Prohibited knives are any knives meant specifically for personal combat use, such as switchblades, gravity knives, and dirk and dagger knives. Straight razors are unauthorized and may not be brought aboard the Air Station.

Bows and arrows are in a separate category, and must also be stored in the armory.

"Martial arts weapons are illegal unless the individual's commanding officer has given

him written permission to have these instruments because the individual is either enrolled in or teaches an approved martial arts class," said Capt Tobey. "Based on the commanding officer's written permission, the individual is then given a letter from the Security Department authorizing him to have martial arts weapons."

However, martial arts weapons can only be carried to and from class, and must also be stored in the armory.

Firearms must be registered with the Honolulu Police Department as well as with the Security Department. The

only exceptions are the black powder weapons, which only need to be registered on station.

Capt Tobey feels that a lot of illegal weapons are being confiscated because individuals are simply not aware of the regulations.

Most offenders are troops living in the barracks. People living in station housing may possess registered handguns and other registered weapons in their quarters.

Illegal weapons have also been found in automobiles during administrative inspections held at the Station's gates. "We conduct

these inspections at the gate to prevent contraband from being introduced to the Air Station, and to prevent government property from being removed," said Capt Tobey.

When a weapon is confiscated, the owner's commanding officer may submit a letter to the Security Department requesting the weapon be returned and ensuring that it will be properly stored in accordance with regulations.

Before introducing weapons to the Air Station, owners should contact the Security Department at 257-2103 or 257-2104 concerning registration and storage questions.

Anniversary

Marine Aircraft Group-24 marks 40 years of service

Marine Aircraft Group-24 and three of its squadrons: Marine Fighter Attack Squadron-212; Marine Air Base Squadron-24; and Headquarters and Maintenance Squadron-24 will celebrate 40 years of Marine Corps Service March 1.

MAG-24, VMFA-212, MABS-24 and H&MS-24 were activated March 1, 1942, in the wake of the Japanese attack on Oahu.

MAG-24 WAS commissioned at Ewa Field in the Territory of Hawaii to serve the needs of dive bombers in combat areas in the Pacific. In spite of its described mission, the first squadrons assigned to the Group were not dive bombers, but fighters. VMFA-212, was one of two squadrons originally assigned to the Group. Today, VMFA-212 is one of three fixed-wing squadrons assigned to MAG-24.

Immediately upon commissioning, the forward echelon of MAG-24 was sent to Efate, New Hebrides. After establishing an airstrip there, the Group moved to the mainland in June 1942 and was the first unit to occupy the new air station at Santa Ana, Calif. MAG-24 stayed there less than a year before returning to the Pacific.

Group's forward echelon went ashore in the Philippines, under enemy fire, to construct Mangalden Field. Within two weeks, the field was operable and the first aircraft had arrived.

ONE OF THE Group's last missions in World War II was to drop copies of the Japanese surrender to enemy units in the area.

With the end of the war in August 1945, MAG-24 was used as part of the occupation force in China. In 1947, the Group moved to Guam and two years later to Marine Corps Air Station, Cherry Point, N.C., where it remained for the next 20 years.

In April 1968, MAG-24 moved to the Air Station at Kaneohe to become the air element of the 1st Marine Brigade.

MAG-24, under the command of Colonel John Solan, is comprised of a Headquarters and Maintenance Squadron, a Marine Air Base Squadron, a Marine Air Control Squadron, three F-4 Phantom squadrons and four helicopter squadrons.

Of those 10 squadrons comprising MAG-24, VMFA-212, H&MS-24, and MABS-24 are also celebrating their 40th anniversary March 1.

In January 1945 the VMFA-212 was

originally formed as a fighter squadron at Ewa, Territory of Hawaii. The squadron, first known as the "Devil Cats," was soon ordered to the South Pacific to conduct patrol missions. The Devil Cats destroyed more than 130 enemy aircraft before the end of World War II.

DURING THE Korean conflict, the squadron was designated an attack squadron. From September 1950 until the end of the war, the squadron flew 18,257 combat missions in nearly 40,000 combat hours. In 1955, VMFA-212 left Korea for the Air Station at Kaneohe to become one of the units of the 1st Marine Brigade.

VMFA-212 deployed to the Far East in 1958 and participated in the first Trans-Pacific flight of Marine combat aircraft.

By 1963 the Devil Cats had changed their name to the "Lancers" and were once again designated as a fighter squadron. The Lancers served in Vietnam until the end of 1965 when they returned to Kaneohe. In August 1968, equipped with the F-4J Phantoms, the squadron received its present designation of fighter attack squadron.

VMFA-212 was selected as the best Marine Fighter Squadron of the Year in 1970 and received the

Robert H. Hanson Award.

AFTER another tour in Vietnam in 1972 the Lancers again returned to Kaneohe. Since being stationed here, the squadron has participated in a number of TransPac flights and six-month Western Pacific deployments.

Lieutenant Colonel Thomas Conley is the commanding officer of VMFA-212.

Another MAG-24 squadron celebrating its 40th anniversary is Headquarters and Maintenance Squadron-24.

H&MS-24 was one of the MAG-24 squadrons responsible for the construction of the air field at Efate, New Hebrides in 1942. The squadron served throughout the Pacific until the end of World War II.

In 1949 H&MS-24 was transferred to Cherry Point to be part of the 2d Marine Aircraft Wing. The squadron remained in North Carolina until 1968 when H&MS-24 was reformed at Kaneohe.

H&MS-24 is responsible for supplying administrative and logistic support to MAG-24 along with supply support and maintenance for the Group's assigned squadrons. H&MS-24 is commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Gary Robinson.

MARINE AIR Base Squadron-24 was also formed at Ewa, Territory of Hawaii March 1, 1942. The squadron participated in many combat operations in the Pacific during World War II, including Bougainville, Northern Solomons and the Philippine Campaigns. At the end of the war, MABS-24 was sent to Peiping, China to support Marine flight operations in the area. In 1949 the squadron moved to Cherry Point to be part of MAG-24.

In the fall of 1964, the squadron participated in Operation Steelpike in southern Spain. The operation was one of the largest air-sea landing exercises since World War II.

During the height of the Vietnam War, in 1968, the squadron was ordered to Kaneohe from Cherry Point along with the rest of MAG-24. MABS-24 remains at Kaneohe as a support element of MAG-24, providing support services to the Group's tactical squadrons. MABS-24 provides communications, motor transportation, engineering and heavy equipment to MAG-24 in addition to normal launch, recovery and refueling services.

Lieutenant Colonel Myles Still is the commanding officer of MABS-24.

Blacks defend America's freedom

EDITOR'S NOTE: This article is reprinted from the Feb. 12 issue of the *Quantico Sentry*.

Though sometimes denied the rights and freedoms that they defended abroad, black Americans built a legacy of faithful service in the defense of freedom long before President Franklin Roosevelt signed a 1942 edict to end segregation in the armed services.

During the American Revolution, blacks served on both the Continental and state navies and armies.

BLACKS SERVED IN THE FRENCH and Indian War, the War of 1812, and other skirmishes and conflicts during the 18th and 19th centuries.

In the decisive victory in the War of 1812, Andrew Jackson, after soliciting men from the free black citizenry of New Orleans upon hearing of the approach of a large British force, said this about the men of color after viewing their performance on the battlefield.

"... from the shores of Mobile I collected you to arms; I invited you to share in the perils of your white countrymen. I expected much from you, for I was not uninformed of those qualities which render you so formidable to an invading foe. I knew that you loved the land of your nativity, and that like ourselves, you had to defend all that is most dear to you. But you surpass my hopes; I have found in you, united to these qualities, that noble enthusiasm which impels great deeds."

Blacks continued serving alongside whites in the army and navy in the World Wars, Korea and Vietnam and continue to serve today.

Major General Oliver P. Smith, a distinguished Marine

Corps combat leader, gave his view of the black Marine during an oral history memoir of his career in June 1969. He was asked if his division was integrated.

"Oh yes, I had a thousand Negroes, and we had no racial troubles. The men did whatever they were qualified to do.

There were communicators, there were cooks, there were truck drivers, there were plain infantry — they did everything, and they did a good job because they were integrated and they were with good people... Two of these Negroes got the Navy Cross. There was no fooling; they were real citations, and there were plenty of Silver Stars and Bronze Stars and what have you."

A total of 448,000 Marines served in Vietnam between 1965 and 1973, of that number 41,000 were black. From that commitment to the final withdrawal, the black Marine was there, serving his country as never before.

AMONG THE NOW FAMILIAR names of black Marines which include Sergeants Major Edgar R. Huff, and Gilbert H. "Hashmark" Johnson and then Lieutenant Colonel Frank E. Petersen are five Marines awarded this country's highest decoration during Vietnam. Sergeant Rodney M. Davis, PFCs James Anderson Jr., Ralph H. Johnson, Oscar P. Austin, and Robert H. Jenkins were all awarded the Medal of Honor.

Reviewing the history of Americans, whether they be white, yellow, red or brown brings to light one main theme. Americans must stand ready to lay their lives down as did these black Americans and all other Americans did before them, in pursuit of the same freedom — the same dream.

Sgt Munoz, 3d Mar Regt — "I feel that it will drop because people look at a promotion as a reason for staying in. It's like an advancement in their future."



SSGT Robert Jensen, 3/3 — "No. I don't think that the Marines who plan to stay in will get out. They know that promotion will come. It may take a little longer but in the longrun it's better 'cause it gives them time to learn their job better."

Marine salutes "darlin' wives"

"Where did the time go? It's time to rotate back to the mainland already," was a comment I overheard one Marine tell another at the snack bar recently. "Time really passes fast when you're having fun. I made two Western Pacific floats which helped break the monotony."

I don't feel that enough credit has been given to the very capable rear echelon of

this unbeatable Marine team (a Marine and his family).

GySgt Moses has known for some time that he would be going out on the next float. In addition to getting his military affairs in order, he is getting things in order at home so that Angel and the kids will be able to continue to function comfortably in his absence. After getting the car, lawnmower, and bicycles in a good state of repair, among other preventive maintenance tasks, the "Gunny" is now ready to fulfill his military duties abroad. His duties for the most part will not change during the float except for the operational tempo that increases at times.

On the other hand, Angel has inherited many additional duties. She is now mother and father, chief-cook and bottle washer, housekeeper, small appliance repairperson, family accountant, nurse, auto and bicycle mechanic among other things.

AS IF THAT WASN'T enough, during the first month of the float the real problems began. She suspects that

Amos Jr is running with the wrong crowd at school and that he may be involved with drugs. She realizes the delicate nature of the situation and is careful not to mishandle it. Problems of this nature are normally handled by Amos Sr.

During the same time frame, Ralph, the 12-year-old, wants to go to the Big Island for a camping trip with the Boy Scouts and promises to hold his break or run away if she doesn't let him go.

The car started making funny noises yesterday and Pam has a bad cold and keeps Angel up all night. There are Parent Teacher Association meetings to attend, a meeting with Ralph's teacher on Thursday, the kids downstairs broke into the mailbox and Angel is not sure if the bills had already been picked up by the postman. It has been raining all month and the TV is on the blink. A military policeman stopped Angel yesterday and gave her seven days to get her car inspected or her driving privileges will be suspended. To make matters worst she noticed that she has gained 13 pounds instead of losing 10 as she had promised Amos.

Problems just seemed to multiply as the months crept by, almost to the point where they became unbearable for Angel. She knew that she had to be firm with the kids yet express all her love.

Any times she would say to herself "How would Amos handle this problem? Oh how I wish he were here."

FINALLY AFTER SIX months, as addressed the kids in preparation to rent the boat, each kid bearing a gift for daddy, she said with a happy tingle in her voice "Well kids, we made it, Daddy will be proud of you."

GySgt Moses' family may not be the typical one however this addresses some of the stressful situations that arise and how to be handled by the "non-deployable spouse."

In some cases these problems are compounded in families where the wife continues to work. With all the things that can go wrong going wrong, she still manages to write to her Marine each day without revealing any of the problems she may be having. She wants her husband to find things in an orderly fashion when he returns. Only she knows how rough it really is when he is gone. One wife who recently arrived on the island asked another at the change, "What did you do when your husband was on float, how did you make it? Her reply was, "I prayed each night before I cried myself to sleep." Wives of Marines at Marine Corps Air Station, Kaneohe Bay, I salute you!

Like DDT, marijuana lingers in fats

Experiments prove drug harmful

HQMC, WASHINGTON — In December, General Robert H. Barrow, Commandant of the Marine Corps, announced a new "get-tough" policy on illegal drug use in the Corps. That usage takes many forms, but the most widely used is marijuana.

Marijuana, a member of the cannabis family, is the third most frequently used drug in America, according to the American Medical Association, and only alcohol and cigarettes exceed marijuana in per capita statistics. Marines who continue its use face not only the possibility of separation and/or legal actions but also the lasting physical problems associated with it.

THE AMA HAS ALSO STATED "There is now no doubt at all that marijuana is a dangerous drug, with great potential for serious harm." Studies reviewed by the association point to a growing body of evidence from both animal and human experiments and from clinical observations, that marijuana is "by no means" a harmless amusement. Dr. Carlton Turner, head of the National Institute on Drug Abuse marijuana project in Mississippi, has read and summarized more than 5,000 cannabis research papers published in scientific journals from 1965 to 1979. Some of his findings were published in a September 1981 magazine article on drug abuse.

"Not one of those papers," said Dr. Turner, "gives marijuana a clean bill of health. There is no other drug used or abused by man that has the staying power and broad cellular action that cannabinoids do."

Marijuana has 421 known chemicals, the article states. The main chemical is Delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol, commonly referred to as THC. When marijuana is smoked, these chemicals are combusted into an additional 2,000-plus chemicals.

CANNABINOIDS, FOR THE most part, are soluble in fat, as opposed to alcohol which is soluble in water. Cannabinoids seep into the fatty sections of the body cells and organs, especially the brain and reproductive organs and stay there.

Only very slowly do they leak back into the bloodstream. It may take up to 30 days for all the cannabinoids in just one marijuana cigarette to clear from the body. So if a person smokes more than one joint a month, the cannabinoids start collecting. (DDT — the only other commonly used chemical as lipophilic

[fat soluble] as the cannabinoids — has been banned for this very reason.)

A variety of both animal and human studies suggest that marijuana used daily and in substantial amounts similar to those of a regular cigarette smoker can adversely impair some aspects of the reproductive function.

Dr. Akira Morishima of Columbia University gave "teenage female mice" minuscule mouse-size doses of "pot," the THC equivalent of an adult woman smoking one joint a day. In the THC-exposed group, 39 percent of the eggs were dying or looked unhealthy. In the control group, very few of the mice had abnormal eggs.

EVIDENCE SUGGESTS THAT marijuana affects a network of glands and hormones which are involved in functions such as reproduction, according to William Pollin, M.D., Director of the National Institute of Drug Abuse in a statement on health consequences of marijuana used on Jan. 16, 1980. The statement was made before the Subcommittee on Criminal Justice Committee on Judiciary, U.S. Senate.

According to the NIDA, there is good evidence that THC and other

cannabinoids pass through the placental barrier reaching the fetus during uterine development. Pre- and post-natal changes related to marijuana have been found only in animals. But, the distinct possibility exists that marijuana used during pregnancy might result in abnormal development in the fetus.

MARIJUANA ALSO AFFECTS an individual user's health. As early as 1974, a study compared the compounds of a "weak" marijuana cigarette to a high-tar standard tobacco cigarette. Aside from the fact that tobacco smoke contains nicotine and pot smoke contains cannabinoids, the two types of "smokes" have roughly the same compounds, including carcinogens, the cancer-producing agents. A number of these agents are present in pot smoke in amounts 50 to 100 percent greater than that in tobacco.

In addition, elements in both types of cigarettes irritate and inflame the lungs. Here too, marijuana comes out with an even darker picture than tobacco smoke: Whereas tobacco smokers use filters or low-tar cigarettes, pot smokers consider "good pot" to be the strongest they can get.

According to NIDA, marijuana use leads to an increased heart rate and associated circulatory changes. Chest pains associated with poor circulation to the heart muscle occur in patients with already impaired heart function more rapidly with marijuana use than with cigarette smoking.

BASED ON CLINICAL OBSER-vation and laboratory measurement, marijuana shows evidence of interfering with lung function and producing bronchial irritation in habitual users. Several clinical studies of humans have also reported such symptoms as laryngitis, cough, hoarseness, bronchitis and cellular change in chronic marijuana and hashish smokers.

One study has found that smoking five or more joints a week decreases vital capacity — an important measure of the amount of air the lungs can move flowing a deep breath — about the same as smoking 16 tobacco cigarettes per day.

Long-term abuse can destroy a healthy body and mind. It can lead to organic damage, mental illness, malnutrition, or failure to get treatment for other developing diseases or injuries.

Recognizable drug use symptoms

HQMC, Washington, (MCNEWS) — The recent implementation of the Commandant's all-out attack on illegal drugs brings an immediate question to mind — how are drug usage symptoms recognized?

Marines in leadership roles are concerned with readiness, mission accomplishment, duty performance and the welfare of their Marines at all times. The work place and the barracks offer ideal locations for direct observation.

Leaders, of all ranks, need expert knowledge about substance abuse and must intervene positively when a fellow Marine is affected. It is essential to remain alert to changes in work patterns and behavior, and to be able to document signs of unusual or failing performance.

Warning signs can be broken down into five areas, and are the same for all drugs; performance deteriorates, absenteeism increases, attitudes and physical appearance change, health and safety hazards increase, and domestic problems emerge. While all the below-listed warning signs from the "Supervisor's Handbook on Substance Abuse," by Health Communications, Inc., may not show up immediately, usually they do eventually occur.

Performance deteriorates: Inconsistent work quality and lowered productivity; and spasmodic work pace, deteriorated concentration, signs of fatigue.

Absenteeism increases: Absenteeism and lateness accelerate, particularly before and after weekends;

Often the complaint is of flu, stomach distress, sore throat, headache, other vaguely defined illnesses; Early departures and extended lunch periods become more frequent; and Unexplained disappearances from the job occur more often.

Attitudes and Physical appearance change:

Details are often neglected, assignments handled sloppily; Others are blamed for the individual's own shortcomings; Other Marines, and often the immediate leader are deliberately avoided; Personal appearance and ability to get along with others deteriorate; and Other members of the unit may show signs of poor morale and reduced productivity, often because of the time spent "covering up" for the

Marine using drugs. Health and safety hazards increase:

A higher than average accident rate shows up; The ability to handle and maintain machinery and equipment declines; Needless risks are taken in order to raise productivity following periods of low achievement; and safety is often disregarded.

Domestic Problems emerge: Complaints about problems in the home and with the family increase. There is talk of separation, divorce, delinquent behavior in children; Financial problems recur with the frequency, behavioral symptoms may be impossible to note or define precisely in sequence and severity, and it may appear singularly or in combination;

It should also be remembered that behavioral problems may not necessarily be connected with substance abuse. However, when changes are not it is the leader's responsibility to take action — ignoring or covering up situations only endanger everyone and may actually speed up deterioration of the user.

How many hours are you really at work?

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following item originally appeared in *Stars and Stripes* during the era between World II and Korea. It was attributed to an Army first sergeant. He presented it at his retirement ceremony in Wiesbaden, Germany:

So you've been crying about how much work you're doing. Never get any time off, eh? Well, let's look at it this way.

There are 365 days in a year. You are entitled to 30 days leave and have the privilege of a three-day pass about every six weeks. That's a total of 56 days, leaving 309.


There are approximately 16 national holidays and 104 Saturdays and Sundays. That narrows the balance to 189 days. You sleep approximately eight

hours a day and spend another eight off duty. That takes up another 135 days of your year and leaves Uncle Sammy with 63 days.

If you take an hour a day for coffee, cokes, and incidentals, that's 15 days a year. Only 48 left, 52 half work days a year are set aside for physical training and information and education lectures. The balance is now 22 days.

Of these 22 days, 12 are pay days, and you know how much you get done then. That leaves 10 days.

Statistics show that the average person spends 2 days a year in the dental clinic and 7 days undergoing medical treatment. That narrows it down to one day. And brother, if you can't figure how to goof off for one day a year, you're hurting.

Variable Housing Allowances determined by changing economy

distance of a military installation. An average cost for housing was then tabulated by rank — thus formulating the beginning of the VHA program.

ACCORDING TO LAW, VHA is the difference between the housing cost in a particular area, and 115 percent of the BAQ for each pay grade. For example, Sgt Smith is married and living in an area where the average housing cost for an E-5 is \$375 per month. His BAQ is currently \$267.90. Subtracting 115 percent of this BAQ, \$308, from the housing cost, \$375, leaves \$67. Therefore, Sgt Smith receives a \$67 housing allowance.

HQMC, WASHINGTON — A Variable Housing Allowance program was approved nearly two years ago by DoD, to supplement armed forces personnel drawing BAQ. Since then, many Marines have enjoyed the extra cash, yet have remained confused as to how those rates are compiled.

When DoD began the program, members of all services, including more than 34,000 randomly-selected Marines, were asked how much they paid for off-base housing and other related expenses. After the survey forms were analyzed, they were separated into specific Military Housing Areas; housing areas normally within commuting

The VHA rate can vary according to circumstances. Marines should contact their disbursing office prior to a permanent change of station move if they have any questions about VHA entitlement during PCS travel.

AN UNDERSTANDING of how the rates are established may also help explain why VHA did not go up as much as expected — it may have even gone down. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, housing costs across the nation went up by approximately 10 percent last year. However, BAQ increased 14.3 percent on Oct. 1. This resulted in many cases where a smaller difference between the housing costs and 115 percent of BAQ existed and meant a rate change for most Marines.

In future years, VHA will continue to increase and decrease as it reacts to a constantly changing economy.

NCOs strive for professionalism

New school motivates leathernecks

CAMP H.M. SMITH, Hawaii — Dependability, courage, loyalty, tact, initiative, endurance and judgment are just seven of the many professional traits that make up a good noncommissioned officer.

And because there is always a need to foster and develop the leadership, professionalism and effectiveness of the young Marine NCOs in the Corps today, Headquarters and Service Battalion here has started a new three-week NCO School.

"The course, that started this month, is an experimental class for all Marine units on the island. There are presently 10 Marines from Marine Barracks, Pearl Harbor; 10 from the 1st Marine Brigade; six from Marine Corps Air Station, Kaneohe Bay and 17 from H&SBn., Camp Smith," said Master Sergeant D.A. Engstrom, noncommissioned officer in charge of the school. "The school is non-funded. This means that all administrative costs and other operating expenditures are

absorbed in the budget for H&SBn here."

The new course of instruction isn't unique to Hawaii. The school's syllabus was provided by the Staff Noncommissioned Officer Academy at the Marine Corps Development and Education Command, Quantico, Va. "In addition to sending all course materials and student handouts to Camp Smith," MSgt Engstrom said, "other major commands throughout the world received the same package."

The course of instruction is divided into six academic subjects; techniques of military instruction, drill, inspections, training, leadership and physical training.

During the techniques of military instruction phase, the students prepare and present five- and 10-minute presentations. "Many of the students, especially the ones assigned to Camp Smith, have never had the opportunity to present a class," said Staff Sergeant J.D. Wooley, a squad

advisor and instructor at the school. "In addition to giving them some practical application, it helps the students build confidence."

Another confidence-building subject taught during the school is drill. The students familiarize themselves with close order drill, with and without arms (weapons). "The course is extremely interesting and it gives me a chance to show my individual efforts," said Corporal M.P. Barkley, 1st Marine Brigade. "It's very challenging."

"Spit and polish" is stressed during all phases of the school. "The inspections conducted at the school are geared toward giving the students a general understanding of inspection objectives, techniques of inspection and uniform regulations. There is an inspection in one form or another each day during the course," SSgt Wooley said.

The leadership phase of the course is designed to provide students with a general knowledge of leadership — how to recognize it, display it and teach it. The

students receive information on leadership styles, counseling and problem solving. "I really enjoy the school," said Corporal M.N. Henderson, a member of Marine Barracks, Pearl Harbor. "I think I needed the course and feel that it has prepared me to be a better NCO."

Classroom instruction isn't the only thing stressed during the course. Physical training, in which all students participate, is designed to give them a general understanding of basic physiology (the principals and techniques of physical training management) in addition to pro-

viding them practical experience.

The 43 students assigned to the new NCO School here graduated Feb. 19. Those motivated Marines have returned to their units to apply what they learned in school — the fundamentals of being good NCOs.

Family alert

Novelty items can kill keikis

The Naval Safety Center has recently received information from the Los Angeles and Orange County Sheriff's Departments that there has been a problem with LSD or "acid drugs" on paper that resemble stickers or decals.

The stamps are the type of novelty item a young child might lick and stick on a notebook. They are about one-half the size of a postage stamp, with a possible of five or six stamps in a one-by-two inch strip.

The pictures on the stamps are a red oriental dragon, a gold colored spade, Mickey Mouse in a wizard's hat and a picture of Goofy. The stickers look exactly like stamps.

The LSD does not have to be eaten to have an effect. Licking can cause severe brain damage or even death, depending on the size of the individual. The stickers are available 100 per sheet, and are readily broken down and sell for \$3 to \$5 per sticker. The stickers have been readily available on junior high school campuses.

Inform family members and if you see one of these stickers or stamps, take it to the nearest law enforcement agency and have it analyzed.

Tobacco

Parent's smoking endangers child

WASHINGTON — meter of cigarette smoke (about the size of a 1-inch cube) contains about 1,000 million particles that are small enough to penetrate the smallest lung sacs. It has been reported that a smoker who inhales, retains 68 to 70 percent of those particles. But whether you inhale or not, the fact is your child is inhaling your tobacco smoke and is retaining particles that are harmful to such small, developing, fragile lungs. In essence, your child is an involuntary smoker and has statistically entered the realm of those having illnesses related to tobacco smoke.

What about the unborn child? A Swedish study of more than 6,000 pregnant women revealed that the "total death risk" — still births and deaths of infants up to the age of 1 year — was 60 percent higher for offspring of smokers than nonsmokers. In view of these facts, it appears that the smoker, parent or not, has something far more important to consider than his or her wishes, desires or rights.

Swift moving current can catch swimmers off-guard

Finding yourself caught in a swift moving current can be an unnerving experience even for a strong swimmer. If you happen to be one of the many thousands of weak swimmers, it can result in a feeling of eminent peril.

The natural reaction is to attempt to get to shore as quickly as possible. Yet, the very worst action, on your part, is to excitedly swim against the current and try to make it to safety. At that moment, it is imperative that you relax — and go with the flow (even if the current takes you farther from shore).

The three most common currents in the waters of Hawaii are the rip or run-out current, the long shore current, and the under-tow. Even though your initial

reaction when caught in any of these currents should be to relax and not fight it, there are additional actions you can take to increase your chances of reaching safety.

Rip or Run-out Currents

These currents can cause a swimmer great anxiety in short order. Normally the swimmer will find himself being pulled away from the shore. The stronger the current the faster he will be forced away from the shore. Though difficult, it is vital that the swimmer relax and not fight the current. Usually these currents are not very wide, nor will they take him a great distance from the shore. The swimmer who remains calm needs only to swim to the right or left with the current until he is no longer in the pull of the current. At that point he can slowly swim to safety.

Long Shore Currents

The water of this current rarely hits the beach straight on. When the water does reach the shore, it does so at an angle. It will normally run parallel with the shore until it runs out of momentum, hence — the term long shore current. Usually these currents do not pose a great hazard because of their close proximity to the shore. Even an inexperienced swimmer can easily recognize the danger and return to shore. Yet, a child or other

unsuspecting swimmer may find himself being swept rapidly away from where he wants to be.

In the event you find yourself caught in a long shore current you should slowly swim or wade toward the shore. If the shoreline is too rugged for entry you may have to swim away from the shore until you are free from the pull of the current.

Under-Tow

The most common example of an under-tow in Hawaii is the

shore (surf) break. Anyone who has entered the surf can identify with the feeling of helplessness as the tremendous force of the waves thunders over him. The immense energy of the wave action can be dangerous at any time. The tired or inexperienced swimmer is most likely to fall victim to this action.

Again the key to survival is to relax. Hold your breath and let the water take you down. Even though it may seem like an eternity you will seldom be submerged more than a few

seconds. The same action that pulled you down will push you up again. When you reach the surface relax. Tread water between the waves. Get your breath. Then reorient yourself before swimming to shore. Remember that you must be prepared for heavier surf closer to shore.

The points covered are steps which will increase your chances of survival. The best prevention, though, is to improve your swimming and survival skills before you enter the water.

System estimates cost of benefit programs

Phase IX of eligibility reporting begins

HQMC, WASHINGTON — Phase IX of the Defense Enrollment/Eligibility Reporting System began Jan. 11. According to ALMAR002/82, Phase IX will affect active duty and retired personnel, surviving spouses and dependents from all uniformed services living in Connecticut, Kentucky, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New York (less zip codes beginning with 100 through

109), Ohio, Rhode Island, Tennessee, Vermont and Virginia (only zip codes beginning with 242, 243 and 246). Intensified enrollment for Phase IX ends April 11. In 1974, DoD was tasked by Congress to implement a program which would assist future benefit programs by estimating the cost of these benefits. Also, DoD was tasked to reduce

the amount of undetected fraud, abuse and misuse of military benefits by ineligible people. DEERS planners believe the system will determine how many people in each community qualify for military health care and benefits; enable better estimates to be made on the number of doctors, nurses and technicians needed; and quickly verify the

individual's eligibility for military health care through telephone-computer links at either Monterey, Calif., or Alexandria, Va. Scheduled to be completed in the continental United States by September, DEERS is anticipated to involve nine to 12 million beneficiaries, all military medical and dental facilities, and the Civilian Health and Medical

Program of the Uniformed Services. Active duty and retired service members are automatically enrolled in the DEERS program based on existing service records. Dependent enrollments are the responsibility of the sponsor. Active duty sponsors will enroll their dependents at the military facilities where they work.

Retired members should receive a letter from their parent service instructing them how to enroll their dependents in DEERS. Planners of the program hope to eventually include exchange and commissary privileges in the system, thus cutting down the number of people illegally using military benefits.



Nihon University dominates John A. Burns Golf Classic

Yoshinori Kaneko of Nihon University of Japan shot back-to-back 71s and concluded the Sixth Annual John A. Burns Intercollegiate Golf Classic with a par-72 to take the individual title and to boost his classmates to capture their second team championship.

Meyer returned on the third day with a one-under 71 which ranked him second overall.



On the last leg of the relay, the Marine queen slipped and fell, giving BOII a head start. The Marines gained their composure but could not gain enough ground to catch up.


That brought an end to the leathernecks' strings of wins but looking back at their accomplishments, it was a fruitful day.

Commentary: Athletic Director expresses views on high level athletic competition

As the Athletic Director of the Joint Special Services Department I feel that two problem areas

need to be brought to the attention of the varsity and higher level athletes of All-Marine ability.

First, superior athletes in all sports should check in with me

and make sure they are identified in our files. Secondly, they should get authorization letters signed by their commanders at least four months in advance of dates

involving off-island events. When a Marine knows he is a superior athlete (good enough to participate in Hawaii Marine Athletic Council, Hawaii Armed

Services Athletic Council and/or All-Marine competition), he usually feels he will be selected because he is the best at his position or in his event. Nothing could be farther from the truth.

I realize there are commanders and sergeants in leadership positions who couldn't care less about sports, but Marine Corps Order 1710.17C indicates that every effort should be made to allow these athletes a chance to participate. Perhaps the reason jocks are discriminated against is that in the past, they have repeatedly taken advantage of their commanders' leniency. Those days, not so long ago, where jocks got away with "murder" are gone forever.

Paperwork must be processed and approved by his section and unit commanders... the sooner, the better. Also in this regard, the athlete must realize he can be a Muhammad Ali, Larry Bird or a Reggie Jackson, but if he is a disciplinary problem, we cannot help him. Being a good Marine first, last and always is the only way of being able to participate in higher level athletic competition.

I strongly recommend that the athlete let his duty section leader, first sergeant, sergeant major and commanding officer know he is a "jock." Since he will be asking for a period of time off, volunteering for mess and other duties early, and changing deployment requirements so they won't conflict with his participating in sports, shows that the athlete is not attempting to get something for nothing.

My feelings are that superior athletes fall into two categories — extremely conscientious, dependable and valuable to their units or, just the opposite. I find very few athletes on the middle ground. Problems exist in both cases. Either he is too valuable and cannot be released on short notice or he is a disciplinary problem.

Athletes should learn to understand their leaders more and do everything in their power to assist them. The athlete's chance to participate will be 100 percent better.





A regular promotion is obtained by having enough time in grade, time in service, a promotion recommendation and a high enough cutting (composite) score.

"We made this decision because an increasing number of promotions, in conjunction with reenlistments, have resulted in an escalation of cutting scores for regular promotions," said a manpower official here. "This has created an unjustifiable delay in the promotion of many deserving NCOs."


