Rent Plus replaces housing allowance

Rent Plus, a new housing allowance system, will be implemented in Hawaii Monday. The system will replace the present off-station housing allowance system.

Under the Rent Plus system, members will be reimbursed for the actual cost of

utility and initial occupancy allowances.

According to Major Priscilla Stewart, disbursing officer, the ceiling figure is a set amount established through a Department of Diefense survey which computed, per pay grade the amount of expenses. per pay grade, the amount of expenses incurred in all overseas commands.

IN DETERMINING A Rent Plus figure, certain guidelines established by the DoD are followed. The rent figure

computed cannot exceed the ceiling figure. If it does, the ceiling figure is used. Beginning with this rent or ceiling figure, \$115 utility allowance is added, which is the same for everyone, regardless of rank or dependents. An additional \$5 is also added as an initial occupancy

These figures added together give the total allowance from which the amount of BAQ a person is receiving is substracted. The remaining figure is the Rent Plus, which will be used in place of OSHA.

For example, a sergeant over four years who is married to a civilian has a ceiling rate of \$545. If his rent is \$600, the ceiling figure will be used to compute his Rent Plus. The utility allowance of \$115 and initial occupancy expense of \$5 is then added to the ceiling figure, giving a total of \$666. The sergeant's BAQ rate of \$267.90 is subtracted from the total. The remaining figure of \$397.10 will be his Rent Plus figure. Since his OSHA figure is \$282, this gives him \$115.10 more on the Rent Plus system Rent Plus system.
A person does not forfeit his BAQ under

the Rent Plus system. The BAQ figure is

merely used in computing the amount.

Homeowners are also included under the Rent Plus system. A homeowner's monthly mortgage will be established by dividing the cost of the member's home by 120. This will give a figure used as the monthly rent. Either this figure or the ceiling, whichever is less, will be used to compute the Rent Plus housing

FOR EXAMPLE, A MASTER sergeant, married and with dependents, may be buying a home worth \$72,000. This price, divided by 120, gives a figure of \$600 as west Sizes this calibration \$82.5. This price, divided by 120, gives a figure of \$600 as rent. Since his ceiling is \$645, the master sergeant's rent figure will be used to compute his Rent Plus. Utility allowance of \$115 and initial occupancy expense of \$5 is added to \$600, giving a total of \$720. Substract his BAQ of \$340.50, and his Rent Plus figure is \$379.50. Since his OSHA is \$357, he also benefits by using Rent Plus.

Rent for members who share quarters

Rent for members who share quarters with other members will be the actual portion of the rent paid.

For families where both spouses are

military members, each member's rent will be one half of the total rent. This amount will be compared to each member's ceiling with the lesser amount used. The utility allowance will also be divided when members share quarters.

Single members will receive only 75 percent of the utility allowance, since they normally use less electricity and water than members with dependents.

than members with dependents.

Members under Rent Plus will receive the full initial occupancy allowance, regardless of their marital status or if they sharing quarters with another

Members already living off station when Rent Plus becomes effective will have the option of retaining their OSHA or going on Rent Plus. However, by June 1986, all members of overseas commands living off station will use Rent Plus

Personnel moving off station after June 1 will automatically be on the new system.

EACH MEMBER WHO ELECTS to go to Rent Plus must see his unit representative with a written lease or purchase agreement and fill out a worksheet, which will be submitted to the disbursing office. Stewart explained that depending on

factors such as marital status or rank Rent Plus could cause either an increase or decrease in pay.

In some examples, single members

living alone, or military spouses, usually benefited by retaining OSHA. However, in other examples, a military member married to a civilian and supporting dependents benefited from Rent Plus.

A single captain living alone has a ceiling of \$750. If he has a rent of \$400, that is the lesser figure that will be used. As a single member, he receives half the utility allowance, which is \$86.25. This amount added to \$400, plus the \$5 initial amount attect to \$400, plus the \$5 limital allowance of \$491.25. Subtracting his BAQ amount of \$316.80 gives him a Rent Plus amount of \$174.45. Since his OSHA figure is \$253.50, going on the Rent Plus system results in a decrease in pay. Stewart explained that each member's

case is taken individually under the Rent Plus system. What may be true for one case, may not apply to another. Therefore, it is beneficial for each member to find out how it will affect his or her pay.

"Rent Plus is a little closer to meeting the actual expenses incurred than the old system," concluded Stewart.

Restrictions placed on bonuses

Reenlistment funds run short

HQMC — Funds for this fiscal year's Selective Reenlistment Bonus Program are running out at an increasingly rapid rate, so further cutbucks have been

As of May 17, Marines eligible for SRBP bonuses are not authorized to reenlist for that payment more than 30 days prior to their EAS.

That word from the Plans and Policy Divison of the Manpower Department at HQMC, carried even further the recently announced restrictions on SRBP payments to only Marines with an EAS in FY82.

According to ALMAR 121/82, the initial restriction was

necessary to "decrease the rapid expenditure rate of SRBP funds which had occurred during the first half of FY82."

At the present time, the Corps' request for additional funds is pending before Congress. Meanwhile, the need has arisen to cut back further until those supplemental funds are approved.
This new policy will provide those Marines nearest their EAS

the opportunity to reenlist for a bonus; however, it does not affect the reenlistment of Marines who are ineligible for the program.

The Enlisted Assignments Branch of the Personnel Management Division will consider

aivers on a case-by-case basis for waivers on a case-by-case users when are not within 30 days of their EAS but who are issued permanent change of station and must have obligated

station and must have obligated service prior to transfer.
Further, Marines who are not within 30 days of their EAS but whose reenlistment has been approved by a message with a date-time-group prior to May 17, 1982, may reenlist for the bonus.

Additionally, Marines in the Agreement To Train Option Program who are not within 30 days of their EAS but who complete their training and are re-classified into their new Military Occupational Specialty, may also reenlist for a bonus.

Expansion

Corps increases forward area air defense firepower

HQMC — Forward Area Air Defense (FAAD) firepower in the Marine Corps will quadruple by the end of this year.

According to aviation officials ere, by the end of 1982 each Marine aircraft wing will have four FAAD platoons, as well as a headquarters element. This expansion is part of a phased plan expansion is part of a phased plan to increase ground air defense capabilities. Presently, each wing has only one FAAD firing platoon. In Fiscal Year 1984, the FAAD expansion will be completed when a fifth platoon is added to each wing. After expansion, each FAAD battery will have 277 Marines.

FAAD units will provide low altitude (zero to 10,000 feet) air defense to forward combat maneuver elements as well as provide point air defense for designated vital areas such as ammunition depots and command and control elements. and control elements.

"The FAAI) Marines hit the beach along with the first assault elements," said aviation officials. "This gives ground combat troops air defense protection from the earliest stages of the assault."

The basic unit of the firing platoon is a two-man team composed of a team chief and a gunner. Each team member carries two missile rounds. In addition to being a back-up gunner, the team chief assists the gunner by providing aircraft identification and target position information. He also functions as the team's communicator. There are five two-man teams per section and three sections per platoon.

The weapons employed by the FAAD gunners are the "Redeye" and "Stinger" missile systems. Stinger is currently replacing Redeye as the Marine Corps Short Range Air Defense System (SHORAD). Each system is a man-portable, shoulder-fired,

surface to air missile system which homes in on the infrared energy (heat) emitted by the engines of the hostile aircraft. The Stinger system has an increased range, altitude and engagement capability over Redeye and is also equipped with an "identification Eviand or Foo" system. Friend or Foe" system.

Althouth the FAAI) units directly support ground combat units, they are under the command and control of Marine aircraft wings. The 3d FAAD is aircraft wings. The 3d FAAD is currently stationed at MCB Camp Pendleton, Calif.; the 2d FAAD is at MCAS Cherry Point, N.C.; and the 1st FAAD is at MCAS Futenma, Okinawa, Japan.

Asbestosis is a lung condition caused by breathing asbestos dust, and anyone who has ever worked around the fireproof material is a candidate for lung disease.

In the tradition of "taking care of its own," the Station Safety Office here conducted an asbestos screening survey to locate those

who have been exposed. Master Sergeant Thomas Bishop, a safety specialist, explained that the surveys were distributed to all the Marines and civilian workers with Headquarters and Headquarters Squadron and Station Operations and Maintenance Squadron.

identified Persons having been exposed to as bestos, are referred to the medical department for further screening. The Asbestos Control Officer

here, Navy Lieutenant Hal Bryant, said that individuals referred to him are given lung tests and special X-rays to determine the extent of exposure. Those exposed do not always suffer ill effects, but those who do, or have the potential to develop medical problems, are placed on the Asbestos Medical Surveillance Program. Depending on the individual case, checks are conducted anywhere from







Power plants keep squadrons flying

"Without us, the squadrons couldn't fly." Gunnery Sergeant Henry Palomo, division chief of Headquarters and Maintenance Squadron-24's power plants, could not be more concise than that.

And he means it. No brag, just fact

Subtract the 76 Marines of the Subtract the 76 Marines of the power plants and every aircraft on this station would be grounded. Face it. Planes and helicopters cannot fly without engines, and engines are the "claim to fame" of the power plant's repairmen. They are accountable for fixing or rebuilding every aircraft engine within Marine Aircraft Group-24. The power plants can be

The power plants can be described best as a conglomerate broken down into four sections. Each is liable for some type of aircraft engine ranging from the huge and powerful fighter planes to the comparatively smaller. the comparatively smaller helicopter engine. Add them all up, and the total will be an inventory of and the total will be an inventory of approximately \$10 million. The tool supply, which is in excess of \$1 million, further attests to the seriousness of the engine repair business: to do good work, you need good equipment.

The exceptions to the engine repair routine are the Component Shop, and the Tank Farin. Marines of the component shop concentrate

of the component shop concentrate on all the rotor dynamics and drive systems of helicopters. Tank Farm leathernecks are tasked with

repairing external fuel tanks for fighter planes, and the internal tanks for the rotary crafts.

The technicians there perform first degree maintenance. This means they are capable of stripping those habies naked, and re-clothing them with a wardrobe of complex wires, gears, gaskets and

them with a wardrobe of complex wires, gears, gaskets and components.

The power plants provide two types of engine maintenances scheduled and unscheduled. Palomo said that under the scheduled category, engines are brought in periodically for checkups. "Sometimes we get an engine in here and all it needs is a quick bearing change, and then it's out again.

engine in here and all it needs is a quick bearing change, and then it's out again.

"But," he said, "if an engine is brought here unscheduled, it's more than likely FODed (Foreign Object Damaged)."

FOD is an archenemy of aircraft mechanics. It disrupts work routines and often extends repairs for months. Palomo said when it happens, it sends his workers through some changes.

The gunny explained that before engines are returned to squadrons, they must first pass the unwavering scrutiny of the Test Cells. A Test Cell is an intricate diagnostic machine that monitors the cardiovascular system of an engine. Helicopter engines are tested on mobile machines, and fighter plane engines are checked in a stationary structure containing a cell.

"It really puts an engine through."

"It really puts an engine through the paces to see if it meets its

specifications," Palomo explained. He declared that the Cell's results is the final word because, "its accuracy is on the money." New engines are also tested by the Cell

before issuing them.


Once the testing is complete, an engine is again examined. "We go over it with a fine tooth comb. Then we invite the squadron to come and look at it," he said. Engine mechanics are trained at

Engine mechanics are trained at the aviation school at the Naval Air Station in Millington, Tenn. Once they obtain their specialty in either the helicopteror jet field, they spend the next year bounding from one school to another, with on-the-job training in between. Then they settle into a gregular routine—


It may sound like a hassle, but Palomo said to keep abreast with the trends in engine repairs, additional schooling is an absolute must. "These mechanics will never stop going to schools. The systems change constantly and they have to be aware of what," gaint on."

be aware of what's going on."
Although the power plant's mechanics have steady hands and mechanics have steady rands and numble fingers like highly-skilled surgeons, in pressure situations one slip of the scalpel could be tragic. However, Palomo said he has enormous faith in his workers, characterizing them as being very talented and extremely conscien-

Our technicians are outstanding and I'll match them against any power plant division in the Marine Corps," he said.





Leathernecks evaluate 'new and improved' rifle

QUANTICO, Va. - A lot of items on QUANTICO, va.—Alto interms on the market today bear labels saying 'new and Improved.' If the Marine Corps ultimately adopts the Colt Industries' modified M-16A1E1 service rifle, it will also be able to carry that label and many a Marine markeman will attest that the weapon is an improvement. is an improvement.

with the majority of the testing already completed, the Firepower Division of the Marine Corps Development Center here, is in the process of formulating a recommendation to be given to the Commandant of the Marine Corps is the Commandant of the Marine Corps via the Commanding General, MCDEC, with the proposed weapon changes.

"WE'RE STILL WAITING on results of developmental tests from Aberdeen Proving Grounds, Md., and Fort Dix, N.J., before submitting a final report to Headquarters Marine
Corps," said Major Bruce
Wincentsen, M-16 project officer.
So far," the test results have been
favorable with only a few minor
problems encountered.

During the testing phase, shooters indicated the sights on the new rifle were easier to adjust and learn how to use, Additionally, data showed that the modified M-16 is slightly more advantageous to unqualified shooters on the Known Distance (KI)) course.

"Concerning safety, it was determined that elevation adjust-ments could be made with a loaded rifle because the sight is at the rear, related Wincentsen. "The same could not be said for the current service course, there was no significant difference in the amount of destructive or suppressive fire delivered by the either rifle. But, on the modified infantry trophy course, it was noted that the modified rifle delivered 11 percent more suppressive fire at 600. percent more suppressive fire at 600 yards than the standard rifle.

In long-range firing (600, 700 and

800 yards), using data from both the operational test and supplementary testing, it was determined that shooters who were biased toward the current rille and fired expert with it did slightly better with the current rifle, while others, to include distinguished shooters, did better with the M-IGALE.

"On our fire distribution test, which was essentially a test for burst control, the shooters had to fire at four silhouettes with 15 rounds in 15 seconds using either the automatic or burst control mode, depending on which rifle the shooter had," said Wincentsen. "From a distance of 100 meters the modified rifle proyed more meters, the modified rifle proved more effective. Results showed it had 42 percent hits while the present model had 35 percent hits.

"WE BELIEVE THE modified rifle would have been superior had it not been for some of the educated, two round burst, trigger fingers of most Marines shooting the standard M-16." The modified rifle was also tested on

other courses against the current rifle with the results weighing favorably for the new version.

As for the problems encountered during the testing, Wincentsen considered most to be minor with only a couple of major significants.

standard rifles, shooters were getting
significantly higher scores than what
they normally had when qualifying."

BESIDES THE operational

testing conducted, supplementary tests were also performed to evaluate barrel strength, accuracy, sight size,

and the human factor, man/machine interface. This was to determine if some of the questions and comments

which rose during the operational

testing were valid or not.
"Primarily, we tested the rifle for effectiveness, strength, durability and reliability," said Wincentsen.
The final report being sent to the Commandant of the Marine Corps for approval will contain recommendations for nine changes to the current service, with plus adoption of the

service rifle plus adoption of the NATO type round.

A muzzle break compensator replacing the flash suppressor will be added to reduce the amount of jump in the barrel after firing. The harrel of the rifle will be heavier

with a one-in-seven twist to handle the XM855 round. The front sight post is square to improve clarity and reduce glare. The settings for windage and elevation will be finger manipulated and located on the rear sight. It will have a combat aperture for use in ranges of 0-200 yards and a long-range accurate aperture for ranges of 300-800

THE HAND GUARDS will be of a stronger material, redesigned and be-easier to remove. The stock will be of stronger material and the length will increase five-eighths of an inch to conform with current human factors, studies and doctrine.

The pistol grip will be contoured to better fit the hand. The butt cap will be checkered to reduce slippage on the

shoulder.
Perhaps the most significant change in the weapon is in the firing mode. The new weapon no longer has a fully automatic mode. The modified model will utilize a short burst control mechanism which allows the shooter to shoot three rounds burst with each trigger pull. This would conserve ammunition and increase hit

probability.

With all of the proposed changes for the M-16, the words 'new and improved' will have a special significance.



Admin system starts recovery

HQMC — The health of the Marine Corps' personnel administration system continues to be monitored here and Manpower officials say, "a review of the 'patient's' chart reveals that recovery is not complete, but the prognosis is

THE PERSONNEL ADMINISTRATIVE Management Section of the Manpower Department is responsible for monitoring and coordinating all administrative functions throughout the Corps. "One by one, we believe we are curing the long list of illnesses," an MPI spokesman remarked. Section officials point to a series of recent and proposed changes which will aid in the recovery process:

—A "Guide for Consolidated Administration" was published during September 1981 to assist commanders in the establishment, and operation of a consolidated administrative center. Material in the guide represents the advice and collaboration of units Marine Corps-wide that have been successful in consolidating administrative functions.

functions.

-A complete revision of the Individual Records Administration Manual was published in February 1982. Among some of the many changes was the elimination of 41 required entries on page 11 of the Service Record Book.

—The Assignment, Classification and Travel Systems

Manual is under revision, with a planned completion date of

—Actions are onderway to improve the professional training of Marine administration specialists. The programs of instruction for the formal "01" school are being completely revised, and the personnel administration school will be relocated from Parris Island, S.C., to Marine Corps

Service Support Schools, Camp Lejeune, N.C., during September 1982. A pilot program is currently being conducted at MCSSS to test the updated course material and will continue through September 1982. Also, the instructor/student ratio is being increased.

ALREADY, SIGNS OF RECOVERY are becoming apparent. During November 1979, the Corps added additional criteria and established an overall performance goal of 96 percent for the monthly Command Statistical Transaction Analysis Report. The STAR accumulates reporting unit data and provides timeliness, acceptance, correction response and overall performance rates for reporting units within major commands dealing with the Joint Uniformed Military Pay System/Military Manpower System. Although individual units and commands had periodically attained the 96 percent performance goal, it was considered unachievable for the Marine Corps as a whole. In January 1982, however, the Marine Corps collectively achieved an overall performance rate of 96.5 percent. The

In January 1982, however, the Marine Corps collectively achieved an overall performance rate of 96.5 percent. The Commandant of the Marine Corps General Robert H. Barrow, attributed this to the recent emphasis and attention directed toward improving the system. "Reaching this goal for the first time is a major achievement," the Commandant said. "Administrative personnel throughout the Corps can take great pride in what they have accomplished..."

Environmental specialist sets high standards

One of the newest additions to the air station's civilian workforce is a lady named Dr. Diane Drigot — but

the jobs and problems she will be handling are not new.

Drigot was hired in April as the air station's Environmental Protection Specialist — the focal point for all environmental laws - national and

Drigot has been in Hawaii for five years, and was employed as the assistant director of the Environmental Center, University of Hawaii, before coming to the air station. She

has a doctorate in natural resources from the University of Michigan. Drigot came to Hawaii in 1977 because she was offered a job as research associate with the East-West center on the UH Manoa Campus. She worked there for approximately three

As the new environmentalist, Drigot has some enthusiastic projects scheduled "There are several things we are doing right away," she said. "One of them is updating a 1974 Natural Resource Management Plan for the station. "In addition to the update, I also

have to develop an Envrionmental Awareness program for the station so that people will become aware of what a important in our environment.

"We need to develop a more specific boundary around Nuupia Pond so that resources around the pond can be protected from vehicles and people. protected from vehicles and people. One recent effort was to construct a new amphibious assault vehicle concrete crossing at the pond to provide an alternate route. The old route is used by the endangered stilt birds as a nesting habitat.

"We have to control predators also. Some people don't keep their dogs on leashes and the dogs eat the eggs of the still bird," she said.

Drigot said she wants to concentrate

Drigot said she wants to concentrate on getting more service projects on station, such as encouraging college students to come on base to study

Since there is so much personnel turnover aboard the air station, Drigot

explained that very few military people are aware of how the Hawaiian people treasure the unique wildlife and cultural resources on station. "For example," Drigot continued,

"native llawaiians have strong feelings about the Mokapu Peninsula, the area on which the air station stands. According to Hawaiian legend, man was created here when three Hawaiian gods formed his image, in the sends of Halslog

image in the sands of Heleloa, bringing lim to life."

Married five years, Drigot is the wife of Dr. Robert Reed who works for the City and County of Honolulu as a Policy Planner.

Drigot is excited about her new job.

Drigot is excited about her new job. "It's a lot of responsibility for one person, but it's an important job and challenging to me," she commented. "There is more work here than one person can do. A second or third position may be developed within the next couple of years. Everyone on station has their own responsibility to-contribute to entire mean temporary. contribute to environment awareness.
If anything occurs such as birds being shot or oil spills, it should be reported. Drigot concluded.

Spanish linguists needed

HQMC - The Marine Corps wants 20 of its 2,000 Spanishspeaking Marines to laterel move into military occupational specialty 2674 (Cryptologic Spanish Linguist) to fill a shortage in the field. Native speakers are especially desired.

shortage in the field. Native speakers are especially desired. The program is open to sergeants and below. Candidates must be capable of successfully completing a Special Background Investigation, have a GT score of 100 or above, and have no NJP or court martial markings in their Service Record Book.

Qualified Marines will be accepted into the field under the Agreement to Train Option Program (ATOP) and will undergo about 15 weeks of technical instruction at Goodfellow Air Force Base in Texas. Cryptologic Spanish Linguists can be assigned to a wide variety of duties, according to Intelligence officials here, but the most commonly assigned duty stations are in North Carolina, Florida, Maryland and Cuba.

More information can be obtained from local career planners or ALMAR 88/82.

Military air fare

WASHINGTON — Service members are not taking full advantage of special half-price airline tickets, according to the Military Traffic Management Command (MTMC).

The message from the command, dated April 19, said, "We

continue to receive evidence that many personnel on active duty are unaware of the special fares and their significance." The message described the tickets as "one of

the most generous benefits ever offered to the armed forces by American industry."

Active duty military personnel are offered a 50 percent discount on coach class fares for most major U.S. airlines. The discount is available on domestic (non-overseas) flights only. Service members may be required to show their green, active-duty I.D. cards at the time of purchase, though travel in uniform is not required.

Tickets may be advertised as "furlough fare," "leave fare,"

or "YM" fare. They provide the traveler with a reserved seat, and may be bought at any travel agency, airline ticket office or scheduled airlines traffic office (SATO).

Light armored vehicle

HQMC - The Armed Services Committees of the House and the Senate reached different conclusions on the Joint Marine Corps/Army Light Armored Vehicle procurement program last month; the Senate supporting planned procurement figures and the House deleting funds entirely. Because of the differences of opinion, it will be up to Senate

and House conferees to work out a solution. This is not expected to take place before late May.

Meanwhile, testing continues on the 16 LAV test vehicles at the Marine Corps Air Ground Comhat Center, Twentynine Palms, Calif. Initial testing of these vehicles is scheduled to be completed by the end of May.

Currently undergoing testing are the V1504-wheel vehicle and V300 5, wheel vehicle but produced by Cadillac Gauss.

and V300 6-wheel vehicle both produced by Cadillac Gage; the 8-wheel MOWAG-Piranha from General Motors, Canada; and the tracked Stormer by Alvis, Ltd., of

Canada; and the tracked Stormer by Alvis, 1.td., of Coventry, England.

The test LAVs are being looked at to fill a void in the military inventory — a lightweight comhat vehicle which can be procured and fielded quickly and accomplish a wide range of missions. The basic LAV will carry the 25mm M242 automatic cannon. Other mission roles being considered include: command and control; morter; anti-tank; air defense; assault gun; maintenance and recovery; and logistics.

The Marine Corps has earmarked \$89.7 million in Fiscal Year 1983 for procurement of the vehicle while the Army plans to spend \$111.3 million.







Precise description essential when telling physician about pain

WASHINGTON (NES) ... Pain is the body's alert system that tells you something is wrong. During a routine medical examination, the doctor will ask you to describe the pain as accurately as you can. So it's important that you know how

to answer your doctor's questions.
In describing your pain, begin with the first time you noticed that something was wrong. Inform the doctor of all the things you have done or medicines you have taken to relieve the pain. This is important because if you have

taken aspirin or a similar drug, your pain may have lessened and your doctor may not be able to make a proper diagnosis.

make a proper diagnosis.

As you continue your description, tell the doctor where the pain hegan and whether it has moved or spread from its original place.

To help describe the intensity of the pain, try rating it on a scale of one to 10, with one being the least amount of pain and 10 being the

Describing the actual pain is probably the hardest part of the examination, but words like sore, achy, sharp, dull, throbbing and cramping are quite helpful. Include in your description, too, whether the pain is constant and what, if anything, makes it better or worse. If the pain is recurring, indicate what seems to turn it on

A side note . Medically speaking, pain is a symptom, while tenderness is a sign. This means that pain is what you usually complain of because it is there even when you rest; tenderness is the pain you or the doctor may produce by touching or pressing parts of your body. Sometimes there is a very subtle difference between pain and tenderness. But when you undergo a physical examination, you should be able to distinguish

if the doctor presses on a place that never hurt before — but does now — he or she has found a tender spot. If such a spot is found, the doctor may press that same place on the other side of your body for comparison.

 If you already have a tender spot, pressing on it will make it feel worse. But it's important if a little pressure produces a lot of tenderness. You can use the one to 10 scale to tell this to your doctor,

Weathermen constantly hone skills

What are the chances of Kaneohe Bay having a white Christmas?
"When the next ice age comes, maybe — but until then, no, we won't have a white Christmas," predicted Staff Sergeant Thomas Clary, a forecaster with Station Weather Service. In fact, the station has never experienced a recorded snowfall.

KEEPING TABS ON weather conditions and maintaining records is all part of the daily routine for the 26 weather observers and forecasters here. Readings on temperature, pressure, wind direction and rainfall are taken every half-hour, hour, or sixhour period, depending on weather changes and recording procedures.

To do this, the Weather Service has a mercurial barometer, microbarometer,

mercurial barometer, microbaro-graph, aneroid barometer and two wind chart recorders inside; and a rain gauge, globe and natural wet bulb thermometers (to measure heat stress), maximum and minimum temperature thermometers and a theodolite

outside.
The theodolite measures the azimuth and elevation of ascending weather ballons which are released daily.

And, all of this equipment is in

addition to an automatic weather station which constantly measures air temperature, wind direction and speed, dew point and rainfall, and the maximum and minimum tempera-tures per six-hour period. If this sophisticated gear breaks down, most the same functions can be

performed by hand-held and portable devices.

THE WEATHER SERVICE provides these readings, plus maps and climatology (average weather conditions of a region), to the squadrons and battalions here. The information gives pilots up-to-the-minute and forecasted flying conditions. The same information is essential to the infantry — especially the climatology reports.

the climatology reports.

When units deploy to another area, they have to know what type of weather to expect, and Station Weather can provide information for any place in the world — at the touch of a button.

Weather services throughout the world are-linked together via Western Union, and the weather service here is no exception. Current weather

no exception. Current weather conditions, as well as forecasts and climatology reports are all available.

Local weather conditions are transmitted via the same Western Union lines (called the Pacific Meteorological Data System) every hour, or when weather conditions change. When aircraft are flying the same information is sent straight to the air control tower.

IN ADDITION TO the wire network and local equipment readings, the weather observers have two facsimile machines which print satellite pictures and maps to help forecasters determine upcoming weather conditions.

'We don't release weather reports to civilians, but our records are sent to the Navai Oceanographic Command in Ashville, N.C. where they (the records) are made available to the

public," explained Master Sergeant Jeanne Hamadyk. However, the observers here do work with the National Weather Service in Honolulu.

"Our relationship with them (NWS) is mutually supportive," said First Lieutenant Lee Halverson, the officer in charge of the weather service here. He explained that while there isn't any routine communication with the National Weather Service, the observers here keep the NWS notified of all weather changes via the wire

Not all the observers are forecasters though. Station Weather, which is manned 24 hours a day, is divided into four sections, with a forecaster assigned to each section.

OBSERVERS ATTEND a special six-month course at Chanute Air Force Base, Ill. before becoming weather forecasters. And this training is in addition to the three-month basic school (also at Chanute) and years of experience in the field.

experience in the field.

"You can't make mistakes with millions of dollars worth of aircraft flying around," said Corporal Mike Beaudette, a section watch leader. Beaudette commented on the learning process for observers, which neverends. "We are constantly refreshing our knowledge of height estimation (for clouds), cloud identification and map analysis," he added.

The sections also conduct approximately five hours of formal

training per month to improve their




"WE HAVE A LITTLE PROBLEM with consistency both offensively and defensively, but when we're playing solid ball we're the best team around."



NRMC regulations guide branch clinic prescription filling

The Kaneohe Branch Clinic of the Navy Regional Medical Clinic offers assistance to CHAMPUS-eligible patients in filling prescriptions from civilian

prescriptions from civilian providers when possible. When possible when providing such services, however, the pharmacy must conform to state laws and overall NRMC Hawaii policies.

Since laws in the State of Hawaii prohibit filling a civilian prescription without a registered pharmacist on duty, civilian prescriptions can be filled between the hours of 7:45 a.m. to noon and 1 p.m. to 4:15 p.m. only, Monday through Friday (except holidays). Doctors at the clinic are not authorized to rewrite or substitute prescriptions written by civilian

physicians. Therefore, CHAMP-US patients should have their doctors check with the pharmacy to see if the medicine requested or a generic equivalent (same medication from another company) is stocked in the pharmacy.

The pharmacist at Kaneohe must follow NRMC Hawaii regulations for the amount given and the number of refills allowed.

If above is 'not convenient, CHAMPUS-eligible patients may file claims for legend drugs (those requiring a prescription to obtain).

requiring a prescription to obtain). For CHAMPUS claim forms and information, see the CHAMPUS advisor (Master Chief Hospitalman Joseph DeLuca) at clinic's administrative office.

Marine hurdles first goal

When Rear Admiral David Farragut said "Damn the torpedoes! Go ahead full speed!" he wasn't speaking to Marines. However, Sergeant Michael Porter has taken that command to heart

Porter, weather maintenance chief for Ground Electronics, Station Operations and Maintenance Squadron, has kept his nose to the grindstone to fulfill a goal sought after by many Marines—completion of his bachelor's degree

When makes him stand out from the crowd is that he did it in a mere 15 months from start to finish — and graduated 'cum laude' to boot.

"I ALWAYS HAD this thing in my mind that it takes four years to complete a degree," confided the 5-foot 10-inch Marine. "Going part instead of full, I convinced it would take six years. If someone would have told me I'd

I was interested in a technical field and originally wanted to follow a course in electrical engineering, but I couldn't find a nighttime curriculum. So, I talked with Embry-Riddle and they set me up with professional aeronautics."

The majority of Porter's college The majority of Porter's college work was completed out of the classroom. Between the College Level Examination Program (CLEP) exams, military schools and practical experience, he acquired 81 credits. The 24-year-old Marine said, "They even gave me two credits for PT. He said, "When I started taking He said, "When I started taking the classes, about three or four people in my section were also taking them. Now, there are 18 or 19 of us. I like to think my enthusiasm had a little to do with it. I guess they saw me doing it and decided, 'he, if Mike can, so can I.'"

Porter, one of two weather radar technicians on the island, takes a technicians on the island, takes a lot of pride in his work and accomplishments. "I had a lot of support from my section. When there was nothing to do, I would study," he explained. "I think my section would rather see me improve myself than sit around doing nothing but waiting for the doing nothing but waiting for the gear to break down."

And, sitting around doing nothing isn't Porter's style. He is an avid outdoors person. Although he hasn't had much time for it lately, next to school, hiking and camping are his two

favorite pastimes.

To top it off, he is a member of an To top it off, he is a member of an up-and-coming club, Mensa (Latin for round table). Mensa's goal is to develop and implement a center for gifted children.
