Campaign identifies fraud

HONOLULU — A campaign against fraud, waste and abuse within the Army and Air Force Exchange Service organization was re-emphasized at all Hawaii Area Exchange facilities June 11.

The campaign is designed to identify any evidence of gross negligence, fraud, dishonesty, or willful misconduct involving AAFES by an AAFES employee, vendor or concessionaire.

According to Leo Gota, general manager, Hawaii Area Exchange, "AAFES Hawaii facilities will supplement the current and existing Fraud, Waste and Abuse Hotline Program with pre-addressed, postage-paid mail in forms.

"While the toll-free Hotline number (1-800-527-6789) to HQ AAFES in Dallas will remain intact for employees or customers desiring to use that system, the mail in forms will be implemented as another avenue or an alternative for reporting suspected illegal actions relating to exchange operations," explained Gota.

The forms entitled, "Help AAFES STOP Fraud, Waste and Abuse," is identified by its yellow base and bright red stop sign on the cover and will be available in HAAX retail, food, services and theater facilities along with posters, indoor/outdoor stickers, telephone stickers, wallet cards and bulletin notices to publicize the campaign.

The yellow forms are self-adhesive on one side and must be taped or stapled if an additional sheet of paper is inserted. They can be mailed from any APO or U.S. mailbox and are addressed to Col Charles L. Gaty, commander, HQ AAFES-Pacific, for delivery to his office for appropriate action.

"Just as all reports to the Dallas FWA Hotline are held in strict confidence, the postage-paid forms will also be handled in confidence within the proper investigate channels," assured Gota. The forms need not be signed, but for obvious reasons, it would be extremely beneficial if the caller would leave his/her name particularly if further information is needed.

Gota emphasized, "The program is not intended to serve as a gripe line concerning AAFES service or stock assortment." The AAFES Customer

Comment Program available at all HAAX facilities is designed for that purpose. "The Fraud, Waste, and Abuse Campaign is solely intended as an internal check and balance," he stressed.

The Hawaii Area Exchange is asking all employees and customers to help AAFES stop fraud, waste and abuse at its source. As customers and employees, reporting suspected illegal actions relating to exchange operations is an obligation. Cooperation and support are needed in this program.

Fraud drains budget

HQMC, WASHINGTON — Fraud is unlawful.

In the military it's a crime that weakens national defense. It reduces the Marine Corps' mission capability. It drains already tight budgets. It lowers individual Marines' morale. It cheats you and every other taxpayer.

Who is guilty of fraud?

It's the person who files a temporary duty travel voucher claiming reimbursement for quarters' expenses — when he or she stayed with a friend.

It's the person who continues to receive basic allowance for quarters and separate rations after a divorce — because he or she knowingly did not report their status change.

It's the person who reports property lost during a household goods move and is reimbursed — when he or she sold it and faked the theft.

How many more are waiting to be

caught? The person who uses an I.D. card when no longer entitled is. The person who buys for non-entitled friends in the commissary or PX is. The person who uses blanket travel orders for personal travel is. The person who takes government material home for personal use is, too.

Will they be caught? In large measure that's up to you. Dishonest people are the problem. We all know it. We all pay for it. Now it's time to do something about it.

Turn the thieves in! The Marine Corps and the Department of Defense have a continuing commitment to eliminate these costly wrongdoings. One preventive measure was the establishment of DoD Hotline phone numbers allowing persons to report, anonymously or otherwise, violations of any nature.

Reserves ask for upgraded equipment

WASHINGTON — Naval and Marine Corps Reserve equipment and aircraft must be compatible with the regular forces, the Reserve Officers Association told Congress June 9.

The gap between the reserves' "rapidly aging aircraft... and those flown in the fleet grows wider at an alarming rate," said Army Reserve retired Major General J. Milnor Roberts in testimony prepared for presentation to the Senate Subcommittee on Defense Appropriations.

THE ROA EXECUTIVE director explained that in the event of mobilization Naval and Marine Reserve squadrons could deploy to active aircraft carriers that do not have the equipment or facilities to support them.

He blamed previous aviation policy of giving "hand-me-down"

aircraft to the reserves which "has driven the Naval Air Reserve, in particular, almost to ineffective obsolescence."

Maj. Gen. Roberts asked that Congress support the services in their plans to upgrade the reserves with new P/A-18 and A6E aircraft "as soon as possible."

Recalling that new production aircraft have been received by the Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve for several years, Maj. Gen. Roberts added the upgrading of Navy and Marine Reserve air "is long overdue and most essential."

Maj. Gen. Roberts also called for the purchase of four new C9B transports in addition to eight used ones made available by "the depressed state of the airline industry." He emphasized that ROA deplors any plans to buy

only used planes as sacrificing capability and longevity. He added that a minimal flow of new aircraft each year is necessary in order to keep the production line open and prevent higher unit costs.

CONCERN WAS EXPRESSED by Maj. Gen. Roberts over the material readiness of the Marine Reserve's 4th Division/Wing Team. He said the command was particularly hurt by a 10 percent to 12 percent reduction in equipment, repair parts, and consumables to support the Near Term Prepositioning Ships program.

"Without an immediate effort to significantly reduce these shortages, the ability of the Marine Corps Reserve to perform effectively on mobilization is seriously in doubt and sustainability is out of the question," Maj.

Gen. Roberts charged. He asked that Congress take action to eliminate the shortages within three years.

Army Reserve matters covered in the prepared testimony included criticism of the Defense Department's proposal to reduce the reserve's 1983 budget by \$140 million, a call for upgrading the quality of reserve recruiting, and the need for improving the status of training, equipment, and construction.

The Air Force Reserve faces "a crisis in future years," Maj. Gen. Roberts said, unless it starts to phase out its C-130A aircraft in several tactical airlift squadrons, the C130's average about 25 years old. He asked for funding to replace them with the new C-130H model.

Headquarters and Headquarters Squadron Supply sold refreshments during a softball game against the Commissary.

The Comptroller's Office and the Consolidated Fiscal Accounting Office pooled their resources for a country store and bake sale.

Other events included a carnival, sponsored by Marine Air Control Squadron-2, and a "pie in the eye" event and baseball games courtesy of Communication Support Company, 7th Communication Battalion.

Pension increases

VA gets COLA raise

WASHINGTON — Veterans Administration pension checks will increase for more than 600,000 veterans and survivors July 1, as the result of a 7.4 percent rise in the Government's Cost of Living Index.

VA pensions are paid to totally and permanently disabled veterans as a result of circumstances unrelated to their military service. They are also paid to survivors of veterans who are in need. Unlike compensation paid to those disabled because of military service, most pensions are affected by income from other sources, including Social Security payments.

People receiving benefits under the "improved" VA pension rates, started by Congress in 1979, are eligible to receive the increase the plan links pension entitlements to increases in the cost of living index.

Pensions are figured by establishing a basic "needs" figure and subtracting from that amount any income a veteran

receives from other sources. The difference becomes the veteran's yearly entitlement. Pensioners under the "improved" plan, with one dependent and no other income, will receive yearly pensions of \$6,980. The added yearly amount for each additional dependent is \$901.

Pensioners under the "old" plan remain fixed at the rates in effect in 1978. But, those rates are protected against reductions that would otherwise result from cost of living increases in their income from other sources.

Those receiving "old" plan benefits may transfer to the "improved" plan at any time, according to the VA. Officials state that the agency will carefully review each application and advise applicants which plan works to their best personal advantage.

Bad checks take money from joint morale fund

HONOLULU — Last year the Army and Air Force Exchange Service cashed 62,873,161 checks for its customers — and 365,790 of them bounced. Although AAFES officials managed to trace the "paperhangers" and collect most of the money, nearly \$1,400,000 had to be written off — money that could have been applied toward the millions of dollars AAFES turns over to the Morale and Recreation funds of the Army and Air Force.

In Hawaii, 8,634 checks of \$327,696 were returned during January 1981 through January 1982," said Carlos Castro, Chief Finance and Accounting Branch, Hawaii Area Exchange. "Of that amount, 515 checks were written off for a total of \$29,533."

Many of the bad checks were deliberate, some were a gamble that didn't pay off. The gamble was "kiting" or "floating" the checks. These are terms used by banks to describe the act of writing checks without having enough money in the bank to cover them, rushing to the bank to

make a deposit before the bad checks clear.

Brig. Gen. Richard Murray, U.S. Air Force, AAFES commander and former deputy director of the Budget in the Office of the USAF Comptroller, said that floating checks is a thing of the past because of the advanced automation techniques used by banks to speed up the process of clearing checks. "Clearing houses used to need several days to process a check," Brig. Gen. Murray said. "With the leeway, many people used to write bad checks to get the jump on payday crowds at the exchange, settle debts or enjoy a pre-payday fling. It can't be done anymore. If it bounces, the exchange will charge them a \$10 processing fee each time."

Writing bad checks could result in prosecution in a civil court or a military court martial, Brig. Gen. Murray said. It could also damage a military career, cause the permanent withdrawal of exchange privileges or stamp a stigmatism on an otherwise promising career.

Teamwork

Air/ground coordination key to exercise's success

The "quiet" of the jungle surrounds the trapped leathernecks. The enemy is there, waiting for the right moment to strike, but that moment never comes. The reverberating sound of a helicopter precedes its arrival: by mere seconds and within a minute — less than 60 seconds — the helo is airborne again with the rescued Marines . . .

THE ABILITY to enter and exit a helicopter rapidly is crucial to Marine ground forces. It also requires coordination and teamwork between the air and ground elements of the Corps.

And training is essential to developing that teamwork.

More than 200 Marines from 2d Battalion, 3d Marines participated in a training exercise Friday with Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-262 and Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron-463. The exercise took place at

Puukapu, Oahu, about 25 miles from the air station, but the lessons learned can be used anywhere in the world.

"The training exercise gave us practice in mission planning and execution," said Captain Willis Foster, HMH-463. Foster explained that the mission allowed the two squadrons to work together as a team and gave the infantry a chance to practice tactical entry and exiting maneuvers.


THE TRAINING was important for another reason. Many of the aircrews will form the composite helicopter squadron that will eventually deploy with the 31st Marine Amphibious Unit.

The results of the day's training added experience on all levels, from planning and coordinating the mission between 2/3 and the helicopter squadrons to the actual flying and landing zone preparations performed by the leathernecks in the field.


The mission was best summed up by Foster, who said, "It's a lot of fun to get everyone involved."

Leatherneck captures history on canvas

A picture paints a thousand words — and in this case many years of history.

Captain Edwina Davis, officer in charge of Training and Audio-Visual Support Center, Headquarters and Headquarters Squadron, has worked evenings and weekends to paint a mural for the conference room at Kansas Tower.

The painting will portray a

brief history of Mokapu Peninsula. It starts with the legend of how three Hawaiian gods first formed man from the sands of Heleloa (the 13th and 14th Hole beaches). From there the painting continues with more Hawaiian history, including the era of King Kamehameha I. It also introduces the military coming to the area — starting with the Army, then Navy, and finally the Marine Corps.

Davis is painting the mural on masonite, 1 foot high and

61 feet wide. She said that it will probably be attached to the wall at Kansas Tower.

The sketches for the mural are done on acrylics. The acrylics are then put on a projector and shown enlarged onto the masonite. Davis then follows the outlines of the enlarged figures as she paints.

The materials for the mural cost approximately \$15. Davis already had the paints.

"There has been talk about this mural for over a year," said the artistic captain, "but

with all the other jobs, I didn't get around to it until a couple of weeks ago." She expects to be finished by Saturday.

"For the longest time, photos were hung at Kansas Tower, but because of the humidity, they kept falling off the wall," she explained.

"Kansas Tower was repainted and the old pictures were never put back up. I decided that it would be a good idea to paint a mural. At first, I was going to paint it on the wall — but because of the humidity it was not a good

idea."

Davis also added that she has painted most of her life. "I've done paintings on other bases. I have a painting in the Marine Corps Art Archives. It's permanently hung at Headquarters and Service Company, Marine Corps Base, Camp Pendleton."

The captain will leave the Marine Corps June 30 and plans to open an audio-visual company in Bakersfield, Calif. She also plans to continue to paint.



A maximum of 12 semester hours may be allowed when the work experience is adequately documented.

White Knights

Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-165 technically started its Western Pacific deployment April 12, when the squadron embarked aboard the USS Peleliu and set sail to participate in RIMPAC '82.

The exercise was a multi-national event employing thousands of personnel, ships and aircraft of all types. The White Knights' part within "the big picture" culminated in a helicopter assault and amphibious landing at dawn on the Big Island.

After returning for three days of liberty, '165 leathernecks said goodbye and headed out to sea April 22.

During initial carrier qualifications April 28, the crew of aircraft YW 01 logged the 5,000th safe landing aboard the Peleliu. Major Fowler, Major Weist, Sergeant Kruger, AD2 Krieg and Hospitalman Third Class Caldwell were congratulated by the ship's captain, Captain Scott, and '165 commanding officer, Lieutenant Colonel Stone, at a cake-cutting ceremony for all hands in the enlisted dining facility.

The evening of May 3 found the ship off the island of Iwo Jima. It also marked the USS Peleliu's second anniversary since being commissioned.

Iwo Jima was the site of one of the most famous and heavily fought battles of the Pacific Campaign during World War II. Joe Rosenthal's prize winning photograph of the flag raising on Mount Suribachi in 1945 was later used as a model for the construction of The Marine



Memorial in Washington, D.C. The island, and Mount Suribachi in particular, has become almost a shrine to the Japanese people.

With the approval of the Japanese government and with numerous Japanese officials, newsmen, and photographers looking on, HMM-165 and Battalion Landing Team 3/3 aboard vessels of the amphibious task force, spearheaded a simulated Emergency Evacuation. The evacuation exercised the

squadron's and battalion's ability to rescue American citizens from a foreign country under adverse or hostile conditions.

The event was considered a success and even made national news in Tokyo. It was reported to have been the first large scale American operation on the island in the last 37 years.

May 6 brought with it a long awaited event — the first mail call. The squadron's first port of call was Subic Bay, Philippines. It

allowed everyone time to get their feet on dry land again and provided relaxation off the ship. The opportunity to send and receive mail, and to call home and loved ones was appreciated. The time in port allowed the squadron to accomplish necessary training at Naval Air Station Cubi Point, across from Subic Bay, in order to fully prepare all hands for the remainder of the deployment.

Marine Corps convenes new Staff NCO Advanced Course

QUANTICO, Va. — Master sergeants and first sergeants from throughout the Marine Corps will report to the Marine Corps Development and Education Command here to attend the first Staff NCO Advanced Course.

"It's one more step in providing continuous professional military education for enlisted Marines, primarily Staff NCOs," said Captain Creighton Douglas, academics officer, Staff NCO Academy.

The advanced course is designed to complete higher education demands in the Staff NCO ranks. It supplements and builds upon knowledge gained in the staff sergeant oriented career course and leads to the sophistication and broad spectrum of the master gunnery sergeants - sergeant majors seminar.

More than 280 BA academic hours are scheduled with topics including leadership, management, training, communication skills counseling and staff functions.

The Staff NCO Academy will host the 10-week course. Also, just as in the case of officer professional schools here, several Education Center departments will support the course.

"With various instructional departments from around the command participating in the course we want to show that the S/NCOs will be receiving the same quality instruction as the officers," Douglas said.

The Leadership Instruction Department will present an upgraded training package emphasizing maximum student feedback through guided discussion groups.

"They will cover all relevant leadership problems," said Douglas. "That includes alcohol and drug abuse."

The Personnel Administration School will provide instructors who'll brief the students on service record books, financial records and modern automated data processing equipment.

The Amphibious Warfare Instruction Department will provide the students with comprehensive lessons in amphibious warfare tactics and doctrine. The students will have an opportunity to apply what they've learned.

"They'll participate in two Tac-War games," said Douglas.

"The same ones used at Amphibious Warfare School."

Students will assume a variety of high command leadership roles as they plan and execute amphibious operations.

The tactics instruction is one of the efforts made to enlarge the students' perspective of the Marine Corps. They'll also be given classes in the organization of the Corps and the functions of each unit.

As senior Staff NCOs the students may be filling billets of section operation chiefs. Therefore the advanced course will present detailed lessons in training management.

"It will be a general course in training management. The students will be able to apply what

they've learned to any MOS or at any duty station," Douglas explained.

Among the lessons to be taught will be a course in writing training schedules to compliment hours contributed to managing training programs.

In addition, students will be required to exercise written and oral skills. Techniques of military instruction and lessons in research also will help prime the students for future take-charge roles.

"The students will write at least one expository article for possible publication in the Marine Corps Gazette," Douglas added.

Furthermore, the school promises to provide the missing link in professional military education for enlisted Marines. With the advent of this course, enlisted Marines will have the professional military educational continuum which corresponds to that of the officers.

"An officer knows that his education will start at TBS and end up in AWS, the Command and Staff College, or one of the war colleges," Douglas said.

"The enlisted Marine now has the NCO School core curriculum, Staff NCO School, Staff NCO Advanced Course and the MG/Sgt-SgtsMaj Seminar."

The advanced course will convene four times a year with 50 students per class. It's open to gunnery sergeants in the promotion zone to E-8 and all master sergeants and first sergeants. Marines eligible for the course and desire to attend should send an AA form to their commander.





17-year-old named state athlete of year

"It's time women came out of the closet in sports."

And, Didi Kavanaugh's statement became a reality recently as she was named the Athlete of the Year in the State of Hawaii.

Kavanaugh participates and excels in sports most women don't even think of trying — discus and shotput.

THE 17-YEAR-OLD Radford High School graduate's best throws to date were at the OIA Championships May 7. She threw the shotput (weighing 8 pounds) 46 feet and 11 inches. But the throw that won the title "Hertz No. 1 Athlete" was the discus. She threw the 2½ pound disc 170 feet and 4½ inches to break the Hawaii state record for women.

"I expected them to pick a male athlete," said Kavanaugh, daughter of Captain Frederick Kavanaugh, former 1st Marine Brigade Surgeon. When she said "them" she was talking about the sportswriters and editors that chose her for the title.

"There are a lot of really good athletes in Hawaii," explained Kavanaugh. "Until now, there has never been a woman to be named Hertz No. 1 Athlete in Hawaii. When they called me to let me know I had won, I was speechless."

She received the good news bright and early — 7 a.m.

"I WAS BARELY awake when the phone rang," the 5-foot, 10-inch athlete said. "When they told me I'd won, I just sat there in a daze trying to let it sink in. When I finally realized what happened, all I could do was scream."

This isn't the first award for the blue-eyed, blonde athlete. Among the many medals and ribbons, she has been voted Outstanding Sportsman of the Month for April, Most Outstanding Female at the Punahou relays and Female Prep-Athlete of the Year.

"Whenever I do go to a meet a lot of things run through my mind," said Kavanaugh. "But the one thing that's always there is my father saying, 'when you can be first, why be second.' I could let myself down but not my father. If I fail myself, I fail him."

Kavanaugh said, "I went to the Olympic Training Center last year and was invited back this year, but I won't be able to go because I have to be at college."

She was given a four-year scholarship to the University of Texas at Austin and will report there Aug. 1 for volleyball season.

"I'VE SACRIFICED a lot because of sports," said Kavanaugh, "you know, dating and such. But if I could go back, I wouldn't have it any other way."

"Believe in yourself is my motto," she said. "It took four years of believing but in the end it all paid off."







Seismic sea wave hides danger

Imagine you're out in the open sea on a ship. While monitoring the civilian band radio, you hear a tsunami alert for the area you just left. Taking a good look around you note, with relief, that wave conditions are calm with no "imagine" waves in sight. Check again.

A TSUNAMI, often erroneously referred to as a tidal wave, is defined as a seismic sea wave normally generated by a submarine earthquake.

In open waters the wave can virtually bypass a ship undetected, since it may only be one or two feet high. That's only on the surface, though. The forceful and destructive nature of the tsunami takes place underwater.

The wave may extend in length as far as 100 miles. Travel at speeds in excess of 600 mph is not uncommon for the seismic sea wave. It is feasible that a wave from the Aleutian Islands area could reach the Hawaiian Islands within a half hour after being detected at the tide station on Midway island.

AS THE WAVE reaches the shoreline, the head of the monstrous force all but comes to a standstill. Meanwhile, the tail of the tsunami is still hurling forward at 600 plus mph. The sub-surface wall catches up with the surface water and forces it to increase in height because of the tremendous volume of water in motion.


It should be noted that detected tsunamis may not be dangerous at one station but could be very dangerous at another as a result of the "piling up" action. This might be aided by the shape of the coastline.

NOW WHAT should a person do in the event of such an unwelcome occurrence? The Civil Defense Attention/Alert Signal will be, in most instances, the first warning of a natural disaster. Upon hearing this signal everyone should turn on a radio for more information and instructions. It is recommended that every household, place of business or recreational facility keep a battery-operated radio on hand. This is in case of any

electrical failures that may occur during disastrous conditions.

INFORMATION directing people to designated shelter areas will be made on the radio broadcast. Also, additional information concerning tsunamis and other natural disasters can be found in Oahu telephone directories.

AGAIN, THE best way to find out what to do in case of a tsunami is listen to the radio. All information needed to keep your feet above water will be provided.
