Fire protection service bids opened

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii

Two bids, ranging from
\$6.02 million to \$8.3 million,
were opened at Pearl Harbor
recently offering to furnish fire
protection services for
military bases on Oahu.

Pan Am World Services Inc.
entered a bid of \$6,024,130.
That figure was adjusted to

That figure was adjusted to \$7,242,309 to include administrative and other costs incurred by the government for converting to a contract service.

The U.S. Government in-house estimate came to \$8,337,290. It was the only

The bids were submitted at ne Navy's invitation to

determine whether fire protection provided by the Federal Fire Department could be more economically operated by private enter-

operated by private enterprise.

The bids will be forwarded to the Chief of Naval Operations in Washington, D.C. for review. A final decision is expected to take from 30 to 90 days.

Approximately 270 Civil Service firefighters, inspectors and other staff personnel are involved in the job review study of the Federal Fire Department, which provides fire protection for all military bases on Oahu except Hickam Air Force Base.

Air Force Base.
The cost study was directed

by the Chief of Naval Operations as part of a Navy-wide program called the Commercial Activities Program, Under the program, detailed studies are conducted to determine the feasibility and economy of converting various support function to civilian contract.

The Chief of Naval Operations said such support functions will be contracted out "only if the detailed studies indicate that significant savings of tax dollars can be achieved."

In addition, it is federal policy that the function will not be contracted out unless the bid offer is less than the

performance by a factor equal to 10 percent of the government's personnel

costs.

Civilian employees affected will receive assistance from federal placement programs, including relocations, to obtain transfer or reassignment to other positions in the Department of Defense or to other federal agencies, at government expense if necessary.

The Commercial Activities Program is federally initiated under a public law requiring all federal departments and agencies to rely on the private enterprise system to the maximum extent possible.

Annual campaign starts

PEARI. HARBOR — Navy and Marine Corps personnel will be called upon to open their hearts and pocketbooks for the annual Combined Federal Campaign today through Oct. 20. The donated dollars will help support more than 100 community, service and health agencies.

Last year Navy, Marine Corps and federal employees in Hawaii donated a record breaking \$1,014,000 to help the young and old of all races.

To kick-off the campaign, a luncheon will be held at Fort DeRussy Hall in Waikiki from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. for Federal Executive Board members and selected guests. The cost is \$5.75

The goal of this year's campaign, as in previous years, is to contact every federal employee — military and civilian — and encourage a maximum contribution. Keypersons will be selected within each command to ensure everyone is made aware of the great and intense need for maximum contributions.

USS Dixie lowers Navy Jack

USS Dixie (AD 14), once the only destroyer tender to fly the Navy Jack — the Revolutionary War-era "Don't Tread on Me" flag —, hauled down its ensign during decommissioning ceremonies in San Diego June 15. "Dependable Dixie" was commissioned in 1940 Dixie" was commissioned in 1940 and, by virtue of being the oldest Navy ship in continuous active service, was the only U.S. Navy ship authorized to fly the jack. The honor has been passed to another destroyer tender, the U.S.S. Prairie (AD 15), homeported in San Diego.

The Navy Jack has a colorful background. The flag, with a rattlesnake on a field of red and rattlesnake on a held of red and white stripes and the words — including a misspelling — "Don't Tread on Me" emblazoned across it, was once the personal banner of Commodore Esek Hopkins, the first and only commander in chief of the Continental Navy. The jack first flew from the mast of Hopkins' flagship Alfred and was hoisted by young John Paul Jones, a member of Alfred's crew. Jones raised a flag Dec. 5, 1775, but there is some question as to exactly which Navy Jack was

exactly which Navy Jack was flown.
Technically, there may have been two American Navy Jacks. The first of these was the Gasden flag. created by Colonel Christopher Gadsden of South Carolina, and offered to Congress as the flag for the commander of the Navy. The Gadsden flag also carried a rattle-snake but against an orange field, and it also included the words "Don't Tread On Me." In presenting the flag to Congress, Benjamin Franklin explained, "The rattlesnake is found only in North America; among the ancients, serpents were considered to possess wisdom and vigilance (because snakes have no eyelids to close). The rattlesnake does not attack without first giving warning, and the number of rattles increases with age." The

snake on the Gadsden flag had 13 rattles, perhaps symbolic of the 13 colonies.

The words "Don't Tread On Me" were in response to British Lord North's threat made to America. Lord North swore he would never relax his coercive measures until England and the hing again controlled the

would never relax his coercive measures until England and the king again controlled the colonies. The flag was a warning that it would be as dangerous to tread on America as it would be to tread on her symbol — the American rattler. Although Congress discussed the idea, it did not formally adopt the Gadsden flag for the Navy.

The flag now known as the first American Navy Jack or the Continental Jack has a rattlesnake stretched diagonally across a red and white striped bunner. This is the flag that John Paul Jones presumably ran up, even though he didn't like the symbol that it bore. "I had no choice but to break the pennant as it was given to me," he later wrote.

"But I had always abhored the device and was glad when it was discarded." The jack faded into obscurity for almost 200 years following the Revolutionary War. In 1975, a Chicago attorney suggested the Continental Navy Jack be flown on U.S. Navy ships in celebration of the Navy's 200th birthday. He voiced his idea to his two active duty Navy sons and, with their encouragement, with their encouragement, contacted the Navy Chief of Information. The idea was adopted, and on Oct. 13, 1975, Navy ships around the world hoisted the now famous "Don't Tread On Me" ensign and were allowed to fly the ice! through allowed to fly the jack through December 1976.

The honor of flying the American Navy Jack has since been designated to the oldest Navy ship in continuous active service. Dixie proudly flew the historic jack from April 1981 until decommissioning in June of 1982. That honor and prestige now passes to the Prairie.

In accordance with a presidential proclamation, Congress has authorized one week in September to be set aside each year to honor all Americans of Hispanic origin.

Hispanic Americans served with distinction during both world wars. In WWII I Spanish-speaking addiers served men and women of Hispanic ancestry — first as explorers, then as settlers, and today as active participants and leaders in all segments of society.

Such contributions, both military and civilian, stem from the earliest days of our nation's history. In fact, today's Puerto Rican National Guard, the oldest unit in

Rican National Guard, the oldest unit in the U.S. Armed Forces, can trace its beginnings to the fight against Sir Francis Drake in 1595, nearly 200 years before there was a United States.

Puerto Ricans first served as scouts and interpreters with the U.S. Armed Forces during the Spanish-American War of 1898, and they have served in many cancellies with course and distinction in capacities with courage and distinction in every U.S. war since then.

Remember the Alamo," the rallying throughout the Mexican-American

Nearly 30 years later, during the U.S. Civil War, many Mexican-Americans in Texas fought for the Union against the Confederacy. In 1884, John Ortega, who served in the federal navy aboard the USS Saratoga, became the first Spanish surnamed serviceman to receive the Medal of Honor. Since that time 30 Hispanic Americans have received the Medal of Honor, our nation's highest award, while serving in the U.S. Armed Forces.

Mexican-Americans again served their country as members of Colonel Theodore Roosevelt's Rough Riders in Cuba during the Spanish-American War and their skill in handling horses and rifles while on horseback proved invaluable. After that war, many Mexican-American veterans returned to their home state and joined the

WW II, Spanish speaking soldiers served valiantly in Cloily as a part of the 45th Division; others in the Philippines, where many of them were killed or wounded in the Bataan campaign.

The courageous service of Hispanic Americans during the Korean War is exemplified by Private First Class Joseph Rodriguez who with his unit attacked and neutralized four enemy positions while

under heavy fire.

Hispanic Americans also saw extensive combat service during the Vietnam War and were highly decorated for their

performance.
Today, more than 66,000 Hispanic-American servicemen and women contribute to the nation's defense.

Basic scuba class starts

Anyone who has seen "The Undersea World of Jacques Cousteau" has probably marveled at the wonders of the ocean.

Those wonders can he viewed

Special Services' Scuba Locker is sponsoring basic scuba classes through Aarons Dive Shop. The courses, taught here, start periodically when enough people register for a

The basic course costs \$70 with students providing basic snorkeling gear (mask, fins and snorkel). The advance course costs \$95, or \$75 if the

student provides scuba equipment.

The Scuba Locker also rents scuba

and snorkeling equipment and fills air tanks. They're open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Wednesday through Sunday and closed Monday and Tuesday. The shop has improved tremendous

ly during the past few months, with new stocks of fins, masks, snorkels and buoyancy compensators,

and buoyancy compensators, bringing their inventory to more than \$38,000. value.

Rentals are inexpensive, with a full set costing \$10.25 per day. Tanks, both steel and aluminum, rent for \$2 per day; masks, fins and snorkels go for 75 cents each; backpacks are 50 cents; regulators are \$2.50; buoyancy compensators are \$2 and weight belts are \$1. All rentals are for 24 hour increments.

Neopreme equipment (hoods; boots, wet suits, etc.), spearguns, flashlights,

watches, and underwater photography equipment are not available.
Underwater activities vary with each diver. Some like to sightsee, while others like to fill their table with lobster and fresh fish. Lobster season opened Wednesday, but there are restrictions on size. The top of the shell must be at least the inches long for the must be at least 1½ inches long for the lobster to be legal.

And spearguns can't be used to take them either. There's a hefty fine for those who do.

Recon patrol experiences realism

Realism . . . it's the one ingredient that's missing in combat training, according to some Marines.

It's also the hardest one to provide. Company A, 3d Reconnaissance Battalion took a giant step forward in providing realistic training for their leathernecks Aug. 20-24 with Operation Viking, a four day long distance patrol in the Kahuku Training Area.

Three Recon patrols were inserted into separate locations by helicopter. They received different missions and, were to consider all forces (including the other two patrols) as "The enemy." The four-man patrols traveled light.

Each man carried six quarts of water, four meals (one for each day), and very little else. Their equipment wasn't exactly light though, considering each team was radio-equipped to communicate with higher beadquerters. headquarters.
The radio is their most important

piece of equipment. "If the team can't talk with the COC (combat operations center), then they might as well not be out there," said Captain Robert Crabb,

THE PATROLS WERE tasked

with various objectives during their long-distance patrol. Each team was required to sketch military installations, note troop activity, survey terrain and routes to be used for friendly troop movement, locate drinkable water, and collect other data needed to mount a successful campaign.

The information is relayed to the Marine amphibious unit head-quarters, aboard the "USS MCAS."

The captain explained that the two most important lessons learned during the exercise were the necessity

of communication and patrol security.
"I learned to set up security whenever we stopped," said Corporal Evan Chang, point man for lst Team. "We were getting water from a stream when the first sergeant and Sergeant

(Doug) West caught us."
First Sergeant James Lewis led aggressor teams against the Recon patrols, making sure the leathernecks stayed under pressure throughout the exercise. At least five two-man aggressor teams searched the area at

THE TRAINING WAS CONstant, 24 hours a day. "It didn't let up just because it got dark," Crahb said.

The aggressor teams were composed of Recon Marines and seven leathernecks from 1st Battalion, 3d Marines' Surveillance Target Acquisition Platoon. Two Army OV-2s also flew over the area in an attempt to spot the patrols. The planes were

"All the teams made mistakes. This was a training exercise," Lewis said, "but Cpl Todd Hunt's team was never

Their mistake? The patrol lost its element of stealth by engaging the enemy. "We killed people, but nobody killed us," said Sergeant T.A. Smith.

The patrols rendevoused at separate landing zones and were airlifted by helo. The teams arrived at their LZs on

neio. The teams arrived at their 128 on time. If they didn't they would have had to "walk out" of KTA on their own. "Not only was the mission tough, but it tested each Marine's endurance and skill," said Crabb.

THE TEAMS GATHERED near Range Control after the exercise for "Vikings Night," a going away party for 2d platoon. Vikings traditionally hopped into their ships on a full stomach, and 2d platoon got their fill while preparing for a Western Pacific deployment.

present rank, a meritorious mast, and a 96-hour liberty pass.







Corpsman aims for 15-hour Ironman Triathlon

Triathletes go to great extremes developing ways to shave seconds off their times in the various events. Expensive bicycles modified to weigh as much as a pair of running shoes and quick-bangs uniforms are only a couple change uniforms are only a couple

of tactics used by the profes-sionals to enhance their finishing

One sailor, assigned as a corpsman to the Small Unit Leaders Course who can't be bothered with all those frills and fancy tricks, has registered for the event just to finish. Hospitalman Third Class

James Bronken explains, "I have to prove to myself that I can do it. You don't pay all that money to go over there (Kailus-Kona) and not finish."

Bronken was first interested in competing in the Ironman when it was described to him by a sergeant while they were deployed to the Western Pacific. Upon his return in May, Bronken started training.
"I don't train like all the other

When presented the opportunity, Bronken practices all the events. "I'm pretty consistant about my swimming and running but I don't always get a chance to ride my bicycle. When I do cycle, I go for long rides on the weekends,

usually for about four or five hours."

Unlike most triathletes. Bronken doesn't measure his training sessions in miles but in time. "I run twice a day totaling about an hour and a half. I swim for an hour fin the Station Pool during lunch.

His tour of duty will end in February and he says this will be the last opportunity to run in an event of this caliber. "Being stationed on Oahu I'm really close to the Triathlon and after I'm out it gets expensive to travel hack to Hawaii to run in the Ironman."

"I don't mind carrying a little bit of extra weight," comments the stocky corpsman, "I know I can burn it off during the race."

Bronken doesn't plan to use any special frills or fancy tricks to enhance his time, but he said, "I'm going to he out there to enjoy myself."

With the thought of the finisher's T-shirt and bumpersticker planted in the back of his mind, Bronker concluded, "I'm going to finish. It might take me 15 hours, but I'm going to finish."
