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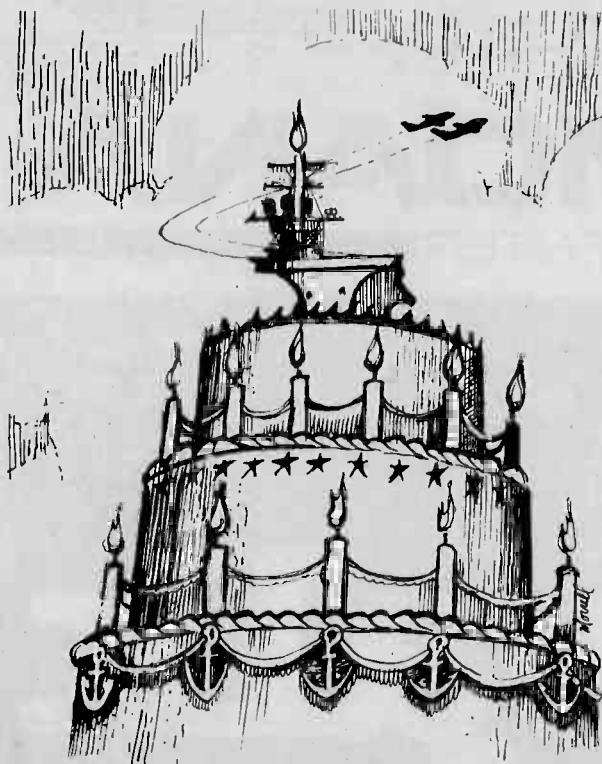

Marines and sailors lauded for peacekeeping efforts in Beirut

USS Guam, Mediterranean Sea — The Navy Unit Commendation was awarded to Sailors and Marines for their flawless handling of the United States peacekeeping effort in Beirut, Lebanon, Sept. 26.

General Robert H. Barrow, Commandant of the Marine Corps, along with Vice Admiral William H. Rowden, Commander Sixth fleet, flew in and presented the awards in a ceremony aboard the USS Guam approximately 60 miles off the coast of war-scarred Beirut.

During the awards presentation, in the middle of the eastern Mediterranean sea, the Legion of Merit was awarded to the commander of the amphibious task force, Captain Richard F. White, and to the commander of the U.S. element of the multinational peacekeeping force ashore, Colonel James Mead, for their leadership and extraordinary planning abilities ensuring the overall success of the unique evacuation operation.

While on the 17 day operation, Marines of the 32d Marine

Amphibious Unit oversaw the departure of more than 6,000 PLO.

The well-planned operation marked the first time U.S. Marines have been sent to foreign soil since 1975, when they were called to Tang Island after the U.S. merchant ship Mayaguez was seized by Cambodian forces in the Gulf of Siam.

ON THE GUAM, GEN. Barrow told the Marines he was proud of their professionalism and discipline and said they were tested in Lebanon and they met the test. He went on to say the next

assignment into Lebanon would be more difficult and added, "My confidence is in you, as is that of the President, the Secretary of Defense and the American people."

The commandant told the Sailors of the Guam that without them the Marines could never have accomplished their mission. Gen. Barrow praised the sailors by saying "Your support was teamwork of the highest order."

President Reagan called the deployment of the Mediterranean embarked Marine Amphibious

Unit essential to the success of bringing peace to Lebanon as part of the trilateral peacekeeping force involving the French and Italians.

In an earlier press conference, Gen. Barrow told reporters that his Marines did just what he knew they would do — they accomplished their mission.

During the evacuation of PLO and Syrian soldiers from west Beirut, the Marines were commended for their professionalism and calmness while the guerrillas fired thousands of small

arms rounds, automatic weapons and rocket launchers into the air.

More than 15,000 Syrians and Palestine Liberation Organization soldiers were evacuated during the operation by land and sea.

Infantry battalions to undergo changes

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The Marine Corps' basic maneuver element, the infantry battalion, will undergo more major changes beginning next year than it has since World War II.

As the result of several studies conducted in recent years, the Corps has adopted a comprehensive, long-range program that will change the structure of many units, both aviation and ground, and bring into service many new weapons systems.

Nowhere, however, will the changes be more quickly and dramatically felt than in the Corps' 27 infantry battalions. They will become 10 percent smaller in personnel, but will gain 25 percent more firepower.

The reason for the changes, say Operations Division officials here, is to accommodate new or improved weapons systems that counter a changing enemy threat. The officials stress that the coming changes in battalion structure

and the added firepower are not revolutionary but evolutionary, and have been under consideration for some time.

Major General Harold G. Glasgow is the Director of Operations at Headquarters, Marine Corps, and is responsible for overseeing many of the innovations. "What we're looking at," said the general, "is an infantry battalion that is more streamlined, has a considerable increase in firepower, and can move quickly."

Today's infantry battalion is made up of 913 Marines; the new battalion will have 822. New battalion weapons will range from heavy machine guns to additional anti-tank missiles and improved mortars.

The restructured battalion will have three rifle companies, plus the weapons and headquarters and service (H&S) companies. The rifle squad will change from 13 to 11 Marines and the three four-man fire teams, which have been the Marine Corps standard since World War

II, will be replaced with two five-man fire teams.

Starting with II MAF units, current plans call for 11 infantry battalions to undergo structural changes in FY83. Thirteen more battalions will transition in FY84 and the final three in FY85.

The changes start from the ground up. "To begin with," MajGen Glasgow said, "we have gone to work on the basic rifle." Marine units will begin receiving an improved M16 in FY84, continuing through FY88. The new rifle has a heavier barrel, an improved sight, a burst control limiting the fire to three rounds per burst, a muzzle brake, and an improved stock and handguard.

"For the first time since the M16 came into being," said the general, "we now have Marines talking about the M16 as being the best rifle in the world today."

Within the five-man fire team, two men

Intelligence Brief

The Soviet T-72 main battle tank integrates firepower, reliable armor, and high maneuverability in one vehicle. It is equipped with a 125mm main gun, a 7.62mm coaxially mounted machine gun and a 12.7mm antiaircraft machine gun.

The maximum effect range of the main gun is 4,000 meters utilizing the day sight, and 800 meters using the night sight. The direct fire range of the armor piercing (heat) round is 2,100 meters. Maximum rate of fire is 8 rounds per minute utilizing a fully automatic loader. Because of this unique feature, the crew consists of 3 personnel: a commander, gunner and driver.

The tank uses shell proof armor that is resistant to artillery rounds because of the armor's ability to

deflect or absorb tremendous amounts of energy created by ballistic impact. The armor also protects the crew from the effects of radioactive contamination and shock waves created by a nuclear blast, as well as from toxic agents.

The tank is powered by a 780hp engine and has excellent mobility and maneuverability in spite of its 41 tons. It is capable of moving at an average speed of 45kph on an unsurfaced road and 50kph on a paved road. Maximum speed is 60kph operating range is 480km.

Despite the considerable weight the ground pressure is roughly equivalent to that of a human being. The reason is the wide tracks that distribute the weight over a larger area.

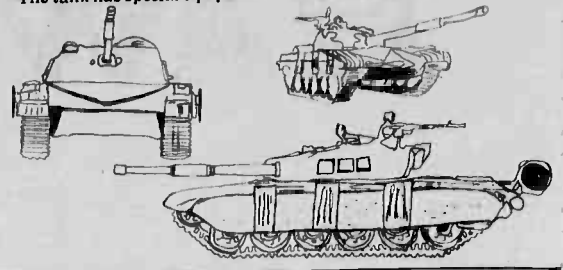
The T-72 is able to operate under water by utilizing its underwater

driving equipment which provides reliable hermetic sealing and an air supply to the crew and engine. This equipment assists in maintaining a given underwater course. Underwater fording can be accomplished in depths up to 5 meters.

The tank has special equipment

for digging emplacements and revetments and is equipped with a mine clearing attachment for clearing passages through mine fields.

An impressive fighting machine, the T-72 is one of the premier armored fighting vehicles in the world today.

Heart Disease Testing

HEARTBEAT — A program to determine coronary risk — will be held Sunday and Monday, Oct. 17 and 18, 8 to 11 a.m. at the Kaneohe Health Education Center, 46-005 Kawa Street, Kaneohe, Hawaii.

The program, conducted by personnel from Castle Memorial Hospital, consists of five blood tests from a single sample — HDL

cholesterol, total cholesterol, triglycerides, glucose and uric acid. Participants also complete an extensive lifestyle questionnaire and a blood pressure check. The testing phase takes about 40 minutes.

A few days later, individuals return for the evaluation of the profile. Each participant will be given a copy of test results and will be urged to share it with his personal physician.

These tests would normally cost about \$66, according to a hospital spokesman. The tests are being offered through Castle Hospital for \$25. The hospital wants to cut health costs to the community, said the spokesman.

Tuition Assistance

In May 1982 Navy Tuition Assistance funding was reduced to 50 percent due to significant increases in participation rates and increased tuition charges.

The Navy resumed the authorized tuition assistance program level of 90 percent for enlisted members E-5 or above with four to 14 years of service; 75 percent for other enlisted and all officers for post-secondary studies; and 100 percent for personnel enrolled in high school completion courses.

This increase effects classes starting Oct. 1 or after.

Dependent Scholarship

If you have a child or children attending college or who will enter an institution of higher learning in the Fall of 1983, they may wish to compete in the Dependents' Scholarship Program.

The sponsors of the awards are Navy-oriented groups and organizations who select their scholarship recipients on the basis of scholastic merit, character, and financial need.

Hawaii Planned Parenthood is offering low cost male and female sterilization procedures in a convenient out-of-hospital setting.

Sterilization, the most effective method of birth control, is virtually foolproof and has no side effects. It is also permanent. The procedure should primarily be considered by men and women who already have had all the children they planned to have but realize that the likelihood of future pregnancy is a possibility during their remaining fertile years.

Patients will receive full professional service from pre-screening to post-op care by a qualified medical team. In addition, HMSA and Medicaid will cover the entire costs. For more information call Hawaii Planned Parenthood at 537-5557.

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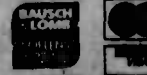
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Blue Angels Officers biography

Alcoholics become involved in a destructive cycle

"No one wants to be an alcoholic," said Gunnery Sergeant Donald Doherty, counselor at the Counseling and Assistance Center.

"It happens because they become involved in a destructive cycle and don't know how to get out of it."

Concerned personnel at CAAC are hard at work to help individuals turn that destructive cycle into a productive one.

Dr. Thomas Ditzler, neuropsychologist and Director of CAAC, said, "Our mission involves the education, prevention, identification, and rehabilitation of issues associated with alcohol and substance abuse. The clinical quality of our staff is as good as any place I've worked. All have college degrees and advanced training from the Marine Corps and outside sources."

There are five counselors at CAAC — three gunnery sergeants and two civilians.

In addition, a registered nurse screens each individual who comes to CAAC for help.

After an informal interview, the

nurse makes a recommendation. Depending on the extent of alcohol or substance abuse, the individual may be returned to his unit and put on the outpatient program (which involves attending classes or alcoholics anonymous fellowship), or be admitted to the inpatient program.

The inpatient program is residential treatment, where the individual moves into CAAC facilities and is put on a well-constructed program.

"We have 26 beds available," said Ditzler. "We usually have 100 percent occupancy, so occasionally there is a waiting list."

The inpatient program lasts six weeks. The client is evaluated on several points, including attitude, cooperation, conduct, willingness to communicate and participation.

"The key word is responsibility," said Ditzler. "We do not throw theories at people, and we don't do magic. We want to give the clients tools to help them put their lives in order. We do first-rate therapy."

Individuals needing help from CAAC may either be referred by their commands, or voluntarily walk in themselves.

"The local commands have been very responsive to AIMARS concerning alcohol and substance abuse," said Ditzler. "We have received very well-placed and timely referrals."

"We treat dependents as well as active duty military," said Doherty. "But our primary mission is to rehabilitate active duty members so that they can be returned to military duties and successfully complete their enlistments."

As part of rehabilitation, Doherty said that individuals are taken on various trips and introduced to different behaviors. There is also group and individual psychotherapy.

"We want to show them other ways of filling their time," said Doherty. "We're trying to do in six weeks what may have started when the individual was 10 or 12 years old. We're helping people to learn to live and solve problems without alcohol."

Ditzler said that CAAC's theme is "Pride in Self and Pride in the Corps."

"If you take away something, you have to give something back," he said. "When we take away their substance abuse, we like to give them their pride."

Triathlon: *The ultimate test of body . . . the ultimate triumph of spirit*

KAILUA-KONA, Hawaii — They walked, limped, ran and even jumped across the finish line Saturday, but once they made it across, the 779 of the world's most superbly conditioned athletes had completed the toughest and most grueling triathlon in the world.

Dave Scott, a 28-year-old fitness consultant from California, shattered two records in the sixth running of the Ironman Triathlon World Championship, and became the first person to win all three events.

Emerging first from the 2.4-mile ocean swim in 50:52 shaved a mere eight seconds off of his record set in 1980, and completing the 140.6-mile course in 9:08:22 broke the record Scott Tinley (second place) set in February. Scott, won the event in 1980 and finished second in February, ran away with the event on the bike race and steadily gained ground on the marathon.

Scott Tinley was about four miles behind Scott when his record was broken, but was still ahead of his younger brother, Jeff who finished both February's and October's triathlons in third place.

Thirteen Marines and Navy corpsman who is assigned to the 1st Marine Brigade were among the 850 starters, and everyone except 1st Lieutenant Michael Hoffner Jr. finished the 2.4-mile ocean swim followed by a 112-mile bike race and concluding with a 26.2 mile marathon.

Hoffner was forced to drop out of the bike race because of a pulled hamstring muscle.

Six months of training allowed Staff Sergeant Ted Steinhauser to step across the finish line sixth of all the Hawaii residents. The Brigade Service Support Group Marine's time was 11:47:09.

Captain John Bates of California gave a big boost to the Distinguished Disabled American Veterans by turning out a time of 12:28:40. Bates, who has only one lung, finished in the top 40 percent of the runners.

One Marine who had virtually no training before the event ran the course in just over 13 hours. Staff Sergeant Michael Camm, a reservist stationed in Honolulu, found little time for training carrying a full course load working toward his associate's degree and working a full time job.

But the top Marine and second Interservice finisher was Major Victor Kelly, a judge advocate general stationed in Alabama. Coming in 40th overall, the 36-year-old lawyer was the All-Marine steeplechase champion in 1971. He stepped across the line in 10:46:07.

After 114 miles Capt Gili Loomis still had enough to run a three-and-one-half hour marathon, a feat most people never accomplish.

All the hours of dedicated training and mental and physical anguish for . . . a finisher's t-shirt and to be able to say, "I finished the Ironman."

But, the strength and ability to survive by pushing the body beyond its limits is what enables these triathletes to pass the ultimate test of body . . . the ultimate triumph of spirit.

Courts-Martial Report

EDITOR'S NOTE: The information contained in Courts-Martial Report is compiled by the Joint Legal Services Center and is published as a source of information for all Marines.

Private First Class Tony C. Ogletree, Headquarters Company 3d Marines, was convicted at trial by general court-martial of the wrongful possession, transfer, and sale of cocaine on three occasions; and of the wrongful possession, transfer, and sale of marijuana on two occasions.

He was sentenced to six years confinement at hard labor, total forfeiture of all pay and allowances, reduction to private, and a dishonorable discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.

Lance Corporal Stephen A. Zeyak, 1st Battalion, 12th Marines, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of unlawfully striking another person on the head with a broomstick.

He was sentenced to one month

confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$200 pay per month for one month, and reduction to private first class.

LCpl Gary D. Schoonover, 1st Battalion, 3d Marines, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of unauthorized absence from March 1 to 2, 1982, and from March 7 to 19, 1982; and of missing movement, through design, of his unit, on March 17, 1982.

He was sentenced to 75 days confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$367 pay per month for two months, and reduction to private first class.

PFC William E. Sorrell, 1st Battalion, 12th Marines, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of the wrongful possession, transfer, and sale of marijuana.

He was sentenced to two months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$200 pay per month for two months, and reduction to private.

Private Daniel J. Maurice, 1st Radio Battalion, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of disobeying a lawful order of a superior noncommissioned officer; and for assault by stabbing a corporal in the belt with two forks.

He was sentenced to 100 days confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$367 pay per month for three months, and a bad-conduct discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.

PFC Bruce L. Chapman, Brigade Service Support Group, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of the wrongful possession of marijuana.

He was sentenced to three months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$365 pay per month for three months, and reduction to private.

Hospitalman Third Class Kenneth T. Grant, Brigade Service Support Group, was convicted at trial by special court-

martial of unauthorized absence from Sept. 4 to 11, 1981 and from April 22 to June 10, 1982; of making and uttering 18 worthless checks by dishonorably failing to maintain sufficient funds in or credit with a bank for payment of such checks; and of uttering 23 additional worthless checks with intent to defraud.

He was sentenced to three months confinement at hard labor, reduction to E-1, and a bad-conduct discharge from the U.S. Navy.

PFC David R. Strohecker, Brigade Service Support Group, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of unauthorized absence from June 27 to July 25, 1982.

He was sentenced to 15 days confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$250 pay per month for one month, and reduction to private.

PFC Fred Morrison, Brigade Service Support Group was con-

victed at trial by special court-martial of the wrongful possession of 16.1 grams of marijuana.

He was sentenced to three months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$300 pay per month for three months, and reduction to private.

Sergeant Rafael D. Johnson, Headquarters Company, 3d Marines, was convicted at trial by general court-martial of the wrongful sale, possession, and transfer of cocaine on three occasions.

He was sentenced to four years confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$300 pay per month for 48 months, reduction to private, and a dishonorable discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps; and further, a fine of \$5,000, and to be confined at hard labor until such fine is paid, but not more than an additional nine months confinement at hard labor.

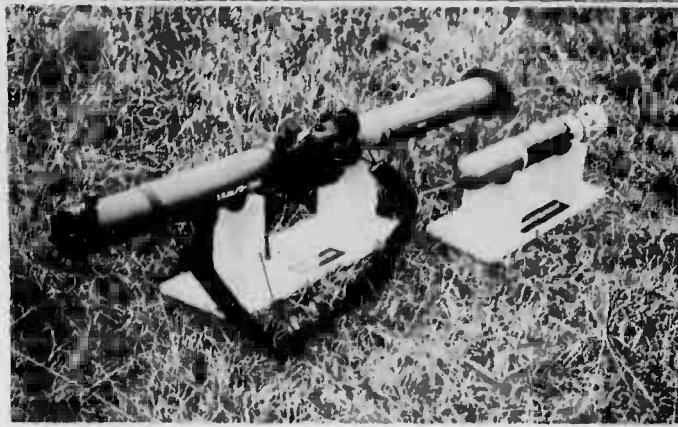
will have M203 grenade launchers mounted on their improved M16s. One man will carry the new M249 squad automatic weapon (SAW). Procurement of the SAW began this year and will continue through 1988. The SAW fires the same 5.56mm round as the M16 and fills a gap that's existed ever since the old Browning Automatic Rifle (BAR) was phased out years ago.

"The SAW is a beautiful weapon," Glasgow enthused. "In my 30 years in the Marine Corps, I have never observed one that I felt better fitted Marines or that fired in the manner that this one does. It's without a doubt the finest weapon we have added."

The assault squad in the weapons platoon of each rifle company will replace their M202 rocket launchers with six SMAWs (shoulder-launched multiple-purpose assault weapon). A contract with McDonnell Douglas Astronautics Company covering engineering development and initial production for the SMAW was signed in May and Marines could start receiving the weapon as early as 1984. The bunker-busting capability of the SMAW will enable infantry companies to fight more effectively in built up urban areas or wherever troops are well dug in.

"We can no longer think exclusively in terms of fighting in a Pacific island or Vietnam-type environment," the general pointed out. "As we look to satisfy the requirements for a global mission, we have to think in terms of perhaps fighting in cities..."

The mortar and machine gun sections of each rifle company's weapons platoon will also be getting some new gear. The

current M19 mortar is being replaced this year by the M224 which fires its 60mm projectile nearly twice as far and at a higher sustained rate than the old mortar. Also, the aging M60 (7.62mm) machine guns in the weapons platoon will be replaced with new M60s — six per company.

By FY86, the weapons company should receive an improved 81mm mortar. Seventeen pounds lighter than the current M29, the new mortar will have a range of 5,600 meters instead of 4,000.

The weapons company in each restructured battalion will also receive additional means to engage and defeat helicopters, tanks and light armored vehicles.

"We have to look to Southwest Asia —

an area that we haven't concentrated on in particular in the last two or three decades," Glasgow explained. "To do that, you then have to plan for a threat that may be heavy in armor, artillery, armored fighting vehicles and helicopters. Keep in mind that some powers in the Middle East today have more tanks in their inventory than Germany had during World War II."

To meet that potential threat, the Dragon (anti-tank missile) platoons in the weapons companies will add eight additional launchers to their current stock of 24, increasing their tank-killing capability by 25 percent.

Also, a 19-man heavy machine gun section will be added to each of the battalion's weapons companies.

Organized into four squads of two teams each, the platoon will be equipped with eight MK19 (40mm) machine guns and eight M2 (.50 caliber) machine guns. The new MK19 is a belt-fed, high-velocity grenade launcher that fires an armor-piercing round. "It will kick out that 40mm round up to 2,000 meters," the general added.

The M2 machine gun has been around for many years, but its addition to the infantry battalion will provide a limited anti-helicopter defense that did not previously exist. The Corps plans to buy 273 of them in FY83.

Of course, those heavy machine guns weigh a lot and can't be carried by individuals. Current plans call for the MK19 and M2 to be mounted on jeeps although ground mounts will also be provided. In the future, however, the guns will be mounted on the battalion's new High Mobility Multipurpose Wheeled Vehicles, known as HMMWV ("HumVee").

The Corps' FY83 budget already provides funding for the 5/4-ton HMMWVs and a production contract is expected to be signed in December with either Teledyne Continental Motors, General Dynamics, or AM General. Each infantry battalion will receive 45 HMMWVs to replace its current stock of 149 pieces of motor transport equipment. Combined, the HMMWVs in each battalion will have a lift capability of 56.25 tons as compared to the 46.75 tons for the vehicles they replace.

Other new infantry battalion weapons will include a new personal defense weapon and a light anti-tank weapon. The Corps continues to monitor the Army's program to procure a replacement for the LAW and is conducting studies of its own

as well.

Although Marine infantry battalions are decreasing in size, the Corps will grow slightly in the next few years. The new budget provides for a modest increase in force strength, from the current 192,000 to a projected 202,000 by 1986. The manpower changes will improve the Corps' artillery structure, facilitate establishment of Light Armored Assault Battalions (LAAB), and fill out combat support units.

"I would just like to assure all of our Marines everywhere that the changes being made are not to reduce the infantry battalion just to save people for other unnecessary billets," the general said. "The infantry battalion of the '80s and '90s will be better able to fit the carrying capability that we'll have then. The smaller size allows us to move the battalion by LVT (landing vehicle tracked), by LAV (light armored vehicle), by helicopter, or, eventually, by LCAC (landing craft, air cushion). With these developments, we will have increased the maneuverability of the infantry battalion by threefold."

"There are a lot of things coming down the road that the new infantry battalion will fit perfectly — for example, the Maritime Pre-positioning Ships program that's really just now getting started," Glasgow added.

"Certainly, I believe in that theory of superiority in numbers. But when you consider the advances in technology that we're seeing, the increase in firepower and mobility — then the smaller number is offset. The new infantry battalion will be much, much stronger because it will move quicker and have more firepower," the general concluded.

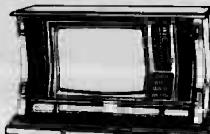
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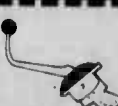
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How to eliminate and control cockroaches

Has something seen or unseen invaded the privacy of your home recently? Bugs in and around the home do not indicate bad housekeeping. Every home no matter how clean, provides ideal living conditions for pests.

Cockroaches are pests found throughout the United States. The year round warm climate in Hawaii causes them to be very common here. They carry filth on their legs and bodies and may spread disease by polluting food. They also damage fabrics and bookbindings.

There are about 55 different kinds of cockroaches in the entire United States, but only seven kinds are troublesome indoors. Most of the others live outdoors and once inside either leave or die.

The German (also called croton bug and water bug) and the brown-banded (also called

tropical) cockroaches mature in 2 to 5 months. Other kinds mature in about a year.

Female cockroaches lay eggs in a leathery capsule which is formed at the end of her body. The German cockroach carries the egg capsule about a month and drops it just before the eggs hatch. About 36 cockroaches hatch from the capsule. The other cockroaches carry egg capsules only a day or two, then glue them to some protected place in your home. About 12 cockroaches hatch from each capsule after a 1 to 3 month incubation period!

Cockroaches grow slowly when conditions are not good for rapid growth. Sanitation is vital to the

elimination and control of cockroaches. Although most of us don't really consider what good sanitation is until we are faced with a problem.

To practice good sanitation in the home, you must keep floors, windows, window sills, screens, cupboards, baseboards, and closets both washed and vacuumed. Also use vacuum attachments to clean under baseboards, in cracks, under stairways and in all dark warm places where pests might hide. You should air stored books, dishes and clothing, and move stored boxes regularly.

Cockroaches enter the house from outdoors, in infested containers from other places, or

from adjoining homes. To keep them out, fill all cracks passing through floors or walls and cracks leading to spaces behind baseboards and door frames with putty or plastic wood. Pay special attention to water pipes entering rooms.

Infestations can be controlled by using insecticides in sprays or dusts. Treat only along baseboards, under cupboards, and in similar places where cockroaches hide. DO NOT treat surfaces used for food preparation. DO NOT treat surfaces used for food storage.

The following list names the most commonly used insecticides and give the proper strength to

use.

— **CHLORPYRIFOS** (Dursban): 0.5% oil solution or water emulsion

— **DIAZINON**: 0.5% oil solution or water emulsion

— **MALATHION**: 2% oil solution or water emulsion; or 4 to 5% dust

— **PROPOXUR** (Baygon): 1% oil solution or water emulsion

— **RONNEL**: 2% oil solution or water emulsion

These insecticides available in the exchange and commissaries kill the cockroaches present and leave a residue on the treated surface. The residue doesn't keep cockroaches out but those that come in contact die. A single

treatment is good for several week's protection. A liquid is probably best for use in a home.

A contact spray only kills the cockroach you see so is not an effective method of control. Baits are effective in eliminating cockroaches, but be certain they are placed where children and pets cannot get to them. Boric acid and borax (sodium tetraborate pentahydrate) are slow acting but safe insecticides against cockroaches. These are available by the ounce in drug stores and there is an inexpensive boric acid tablet available in the commissary and drug stores.

Remember that for control of cockroaches sanitation and vigilance are most important. Use insecticides only as directed. Store the insecticides under lock and key away from children, animals, food and feed.

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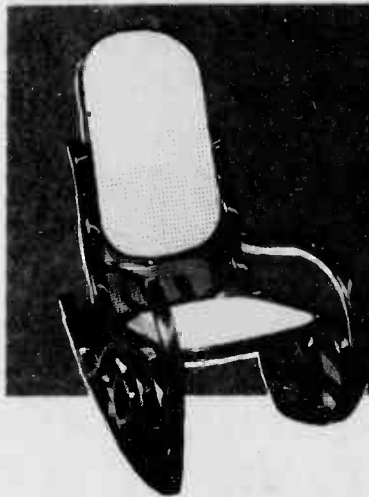
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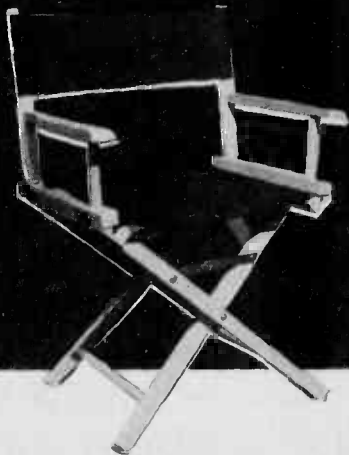
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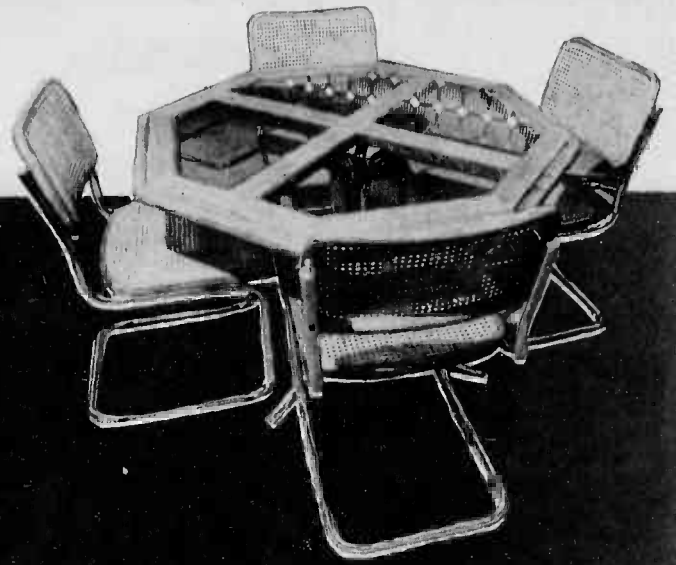

CAMP H.M. SMITH, HAWAII — When the last ball had dropped into the cup on the 18th green during the tourney, Steve Wimmer had edged the field by one stroke to become the Interservice Open Golf Champion for 1982.

Wimmer, a Marine Corps gunnery sergeant stationed at Camp H.M. Smith, Hawaii, shot a 74-77-80-75-306 during the four-day tournament which was held this month at the Professional Golfers' Association National Course in West Palm Beach, Fla.

"The Navy player shot a 39, the Army a 40, the Air Force a 41 and I shot a 38." According to Wimmer, who is from Cincinnati, Ohio, the Air Force and Navy players who had shared the lead going into the last day of competition, began "fading" quickly after the front nine. When the 10th hole had been completed the Marines and Army were deadlocked for the lead because the Army player dropped a 35-foot birdie putt in and Wimmer bogeyed.

Bed racing is an unusual and exciting sport in Hawaii. On race day, thousands of people flank Kalakaua Avenue to watch the colorful and festive parade of beds as they are pushed to the race's starting point at Kapiolani Park in Waikiki.

In February the Marine Corps' team in the Annual Carole Kai Bed Race footed their way to a division championship, but was later eliminated in the semi-finals. They lost the military division title by a mere three-tenths of a second.

As far as anyone can recall, that was the team's best performance in the recent years. Although the next race is in March, the Corps' entry is in limbo. The \$500 entry fee has already been paid by the Mutual of New York Insurance agency; however, there is no bed, or team — just two returnees with a truck load of enthusiasm and heart, who are staunchly rebuilding from scratch.

BAKER AND WATSON ARE optimistic about the Corps' chances in the '83 race. They say that if they can put together a team, build a bed and start practicing soon, they have a good shot at the military trophy, and possibly the race championship.

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Jogging is No. 1 pastime

They're doing it everywhere. On roads, in the woods, across fields, up and down hills, on beaches and in parks. They're often strangers to each other, yet they're all familiar with the increasingly popular sport.

JOGGING IS FAST BE- coming the number one sport in America. It's an inexpensive activity that requires no athletic prowess, and can be enjoyed by people of practically all ages. According to "Joggers Bible," a quarterly publication on running, more than eight million people participate in some form of a jogging program.

What makes all these people exert and strain their bodies in such a manner? Could it be that jogging is just a fad? The "in" thing to do? Or, could it really have some beneficial effects on the body? Many doctors have answered this last question with a resounding "yes."

RUNNING IS MORE THAN a passing fad. In fact, it can prevent many problems from depression to heart trouble. To become a healthy jogger, it is wise to take some necessary precautions. Too much too soon could put

your program on the back burner for awhile.

First, you should honestly evaluate your level of physical fitness before starting. For every year you don't stay in shape, you lose three years of conditioning.

If you don't have a history of illness or heart disease, you should be able to run, without being winded, on level terrain for 30 minutes. By increasing your running five minutes each week for three weeks, you can progress safely.

GOING TOO FAR, TOO fast, too soon is tabu for the beginning runner. Not letting the body adapt slowly to stress and conditioning leads to injuries. Most beginners are impatient and expect to see changes immediately. Some want to lose all their excess weight overnight. Instead, they should let their bodies develop naturally.

Using proper equipment is very helpful. Poorly constructed shoes often cause foot injuries and, of course, healthy feet are probably the most important asset in jogging. Shoes made specifically to take the punishment of running should be used.

COMFORTABLE, LOOSE- fitting shorts or sweats are

essential. Tight, cut-off jeans tend to make running more difficult and irritating. Nylon mesh uppers are suitable for warm weather, while sweat suits, hats and gloves are required for cold weather.

Now, let's see. You've had a check-up, bought the best shoes, and plan to start off nice and easy, so you're all set, right?

Not quite.

It's advisable to choose a running style suitable for your body. A lack of knowledge about running forms is common among beginners. A majority of injuries to feet, legs, ankles, knees and hips occur because of poor running form.

A NOVICE SHOULD BEGIN with short, shuffling strides. Overstriding or running on the balls of your feet leads to injuries and premature fatigue during running.

Your posture and hip position are equally important in preventing injuries and developing a better stride. While running, lift your ribcage. This also lifts your pelvis, stomach and back muscles and lessens strain.

No matter how healthy you are, beginner or marathoner, heat can cause you more trouble than you bargained for. Depending on your level of training, sensitivity to

heat and the percentage of body fat you carry, it may take two weeks or more to get used to the high heat of summer.

As a precaution to over eating, you should learn to recognize the early warning signs of heat illnesses.

HEAT CRAMPS ARE MUS- cle spasms caused by the loss of salt during perspiration. They don't normally last long, but may return. An increase of salt on your foods should help prevent cramping recurrence.

Heat exhaustion is a more severe form of overheating. It occurs when there's extreme dehydration and the circulatory system is exhausted. Signs of this illness include cold skin, weak and rapid pulse, a faint feeling, nervousness and an extreme thirst.

If you experience these symptoms while running, stop. Lie down in a cool place and drink plenty of water unless you are nauseous.

Though heat ailments are runner's enemies, the most dangerous heat illness is heatstroke. It occurs when excess heat cannot be eliminated from the body. The pulse rate rises, the skin grows hot and sometimes

dry. The body temperatures can rise to 106 degrees Fahrenheit or higher.

THE VICTIM BECOMES very irritable, aggressive and incoherent. Medical attention must be obtained immediately. The body temperature must be lowered, if possible, by rubbing the person in ice. Although intense summer heat can melt asphalt, the properly prepared jogger can run all summer long without overheating.

A proper diet is also important in becoming a proficient runner. Fruits and vegetables are preferred over processed meats. It's usually not a good idea to eat before running because food taken within three hours of running tends to lower the blood sugar rather than raise it, making the runner less efficient and more prone to fatigue. Liberal amounts of fluids should also be taken before, and if practicable, during the run.

REPEATED MISTAKES often lead to injuries and layoffs, which tend to discourage the beginning jogger. Learning to assist your body in adjusting to the pains and strains of running, will make the transition smoother and more rewarding.



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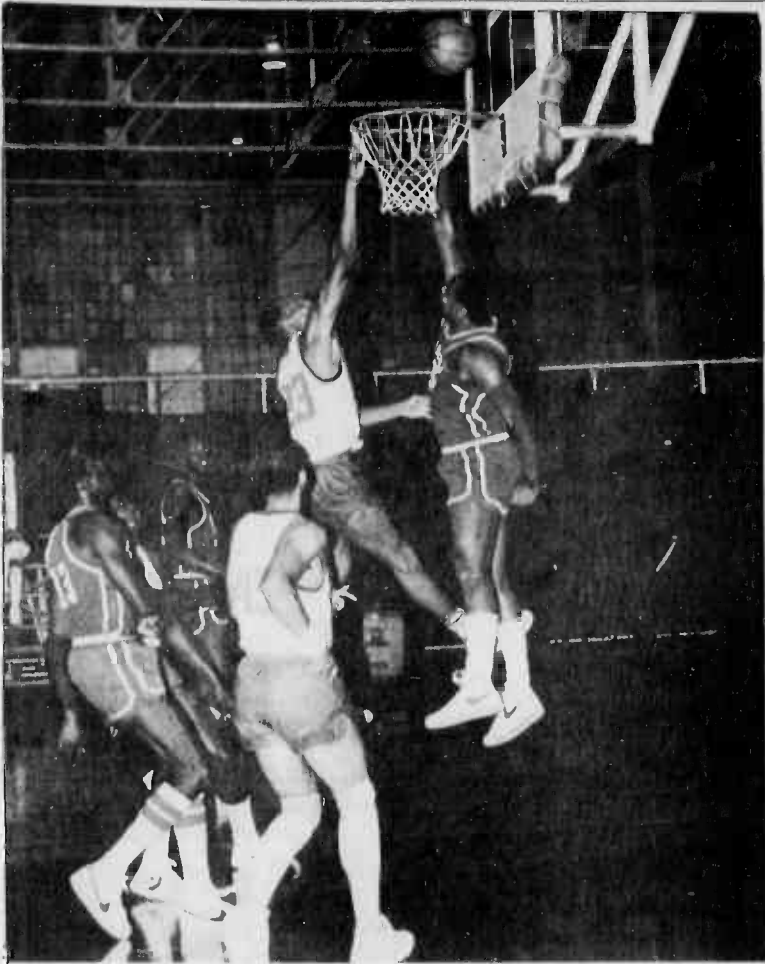

making a par and Wimmer tapped in a six footer for birdie giving him a one stroke lead.

As the apparent battle between the Army and the Marines went to 13, a 410-yard par four, Wimmer was able to jump out in front with a comfortable two stroke lead. "The Army guy hit a bad drive off the tee and an even worse second shot leaving him in some very heavy rough," Wimmer said. "His third shot was 100 yards short of the green; he chipped up and two putted. I was able to get on the green in two and two putt."

When Wimmer stepped up to the 14th tee box, he thought to himself, "If I don't choke up I've got a pretty good chance at being able to take the open title home for the Marines," he reminisced. Both the Army player and Steve got on the green in two and two putted for par on the 452-yard 14th hole.

The 15th hole was uneventful. Both the Army player and Wimmer two putted for par on the 167-yard par three.

The 435-yard par four, 16th hole was another story. There was water paralleling the entire right side of the fairway and at about 310 yards, the water cut directly

had a bad drive and his second shot was just short of the water. across it. Unfortunately, Wimmer "My third shot was a 6-iron to the right side of the green. I chipped up and one putt for a bogey," he said. "Meanwhile, the Army player got on the green in two and two putted giving me only a one stroke lead."

Steve worried a little about the 17th hole and just wanted to get through it without any problems. The 17th, a 191-yard par three, was surrounded on three sides by water. Steve hit a 4-iron about 40 feet from the pin and one putt for birdie. The Army player missed the green to the left, chipped up and one putt for par.

On the last hole of the tournament Steve led by two strokes and only wanted to play conservative in order to maintain his lead. "Off the tee, all I wanted

to do was to keep the ball in play and not in the rough," he said. "My second shot, a 3-iron, laid up just short of the water that paralleled the 578-yard par five." The Army player who was in contention for the lead, knew he would have to birdie the last hole if he hoped to even tie Steve throwing the tourney into a sudden-death play-off. Trying to "gorilla" the ball and drive it across water to outdistance Wimmer, the Army player's chances "sunk" when he dropped his second shot in the water.

When Steve stepped up to his ball for the third shot, he was 116 yards from the green. As he pulled his wedge out of his bag, he thought to himself, "All I want to do is keep the ball at the pin or to the left of it," he said. He knew that if he hit left of the green, there wasn't much trouble there, only some short grass. "I barely missed the green to the left, chipped up and missed an eight footer for bogey giving me a one stroke victory over Al Johnson, another Army player."



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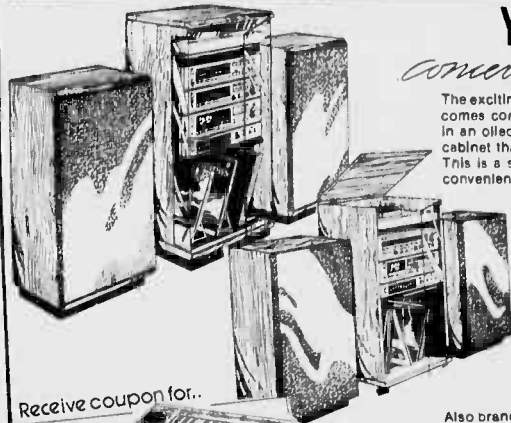

LE, a chronic collagen vascular disease, may damage or destroy virtually any part of the body.

The program is sponsored by the Hawaii Lupus Foundation, a local, nonprofit organization promoting lupus education and research.

Educational displays will be exhibited during the week's kick-off event — the foundation's annual Plant, Book and Craft Sale — at the McKinley High School cafeteria on Saturday, Oct. 16, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The week's activities will conclude with a panel discussion titled "Living with Lupus." It will take place on Saturday, Oct. 23, from 2 to 4 p.m. in Kuakini Hospital's Hale Pulama Mau auditorium. An informal reception will precede the discussion at 1 p.m.

The panel will consist of three lupus patients, a lupus parent and Dr. James Musgrave, a nephrologist in private practice. Musgrave heads the foundation's board of directors. The discussion will be moderated by Dr. Tony Holtzgang, chief psychiatric resident at St. Francis Hospital.

Programs on lupus will be featured on radio and television. An interview will be aired at 2:30 p.m., Sunday, Oct. 17, on KGBB's "Voices of Concern" program. KAIM-FM (95.5) will broadcast another interview at 12:30 p.m., Monday, Oct. 18. On Tuesday, Oct. 19, at 10:30 p.m., KAIM-AM (870) will replay the program. The local awareness week coincides with the national observance of Lupus Awareness Week, Oct. 17 to 24.

Lupus affects more than 500,000 persons nationally. It is more common than the more widely known muscular dystrophy, leukemia, multiple sclerosis or cystic fibrosis.

Although LE is not contagious, infectious or malignant, doctors diagnose an estimated 30,000 to 50,000 new cases each year. More than 5,000 persons die from lupus annually.

The cost for annual membership in the foundation is \$10. Donations are tax-deductible.

The first of the Fall 1982 Environmental Studies program forum series announces the completion and availability of a multimedia information packet on Kawai Nui Marsh for use by the classroom, general and visiting community.

The forum — Ho'ona'auao No Kawai Nui (Educating about Kawai Nui) — will be held in Kuykendall Auditorium on the University of Hawaii Manoa campus Oct. 15 at 7:30 p.m. The program features a slide/tape demonstration by Dr. Diane Drigot, coordinator of the project, and a Merrie Monarch award-winning hula performance by Halau Mohala 'Ilima. The hula honors Hau-wahine, the mo'o guardian goddess of Kawai Nui Marsh.

The new information packet brings together formerly scattered information about Kawai Nui, the largest freshwater wetland area in the state. Besides fulfilling general environmental education objectives to encourage awareness, understanding and respect for the natural and cultural environment, the guide describes the educational potential of the marsh and outlines its functions as a marine nursery, a flood control basin, a groundwater recharge

aquifer, a habitat for endangered waterbirds and an erosion buffer for the surrounding suburban community of Kailua.

The educational potential of Kawai Nui has long been known by U.H. and Kamehameha schools educators, the Bishop Museum and the Sierra Club and other environmental organizations. The marsh is a valuable resource for insight into ancient Hawaiian culture, archaeology, agriculture and aquaculture; as well as a site for study of endangered waterbirds and unique insect and aquatic life.

The marsh, which contains some of Hawaii's oldest agricultural and archaeological sites, has faces an uncertain fate for 25 years. The current "official" use of the marsh is a dump and the area has faced recent pressures for commercial, recreational and residential development. Through public and private initiative and cooperation, a resource management plan is being developed. The guidebook reflects the joint effort of Dr. Drigot, Environmental Studies program practicum students, U.H. faculty members, government officials and community resource persons. Informational displays in Kuykendall Courtyard will supplement the program.

The Environmental Studies program, administered by the U.H. Liberal Studies Program, offers undergraduate students an opportunity for an interdisciplinary approach to environmental education. The speaker series is the longest ongoing forum program at the university.

The group will examine all allowances and benefits offered to service members in this category, identify problems in the compensation system, and recommend remedies to the Secretary of Defense.

The study group is coordinated by Rear Admiral A.J. Herberger, director, Military Personnel Policy Division and his counterparts in the other services, with day-to-day work assigned by the services' directors of compensation.

The group, which first met Sept. 8, will meet for approximately six months.

Congress has shown considerable interest in this area of compensation, especially with respect to paying quarters allowances to members on sea duty.
