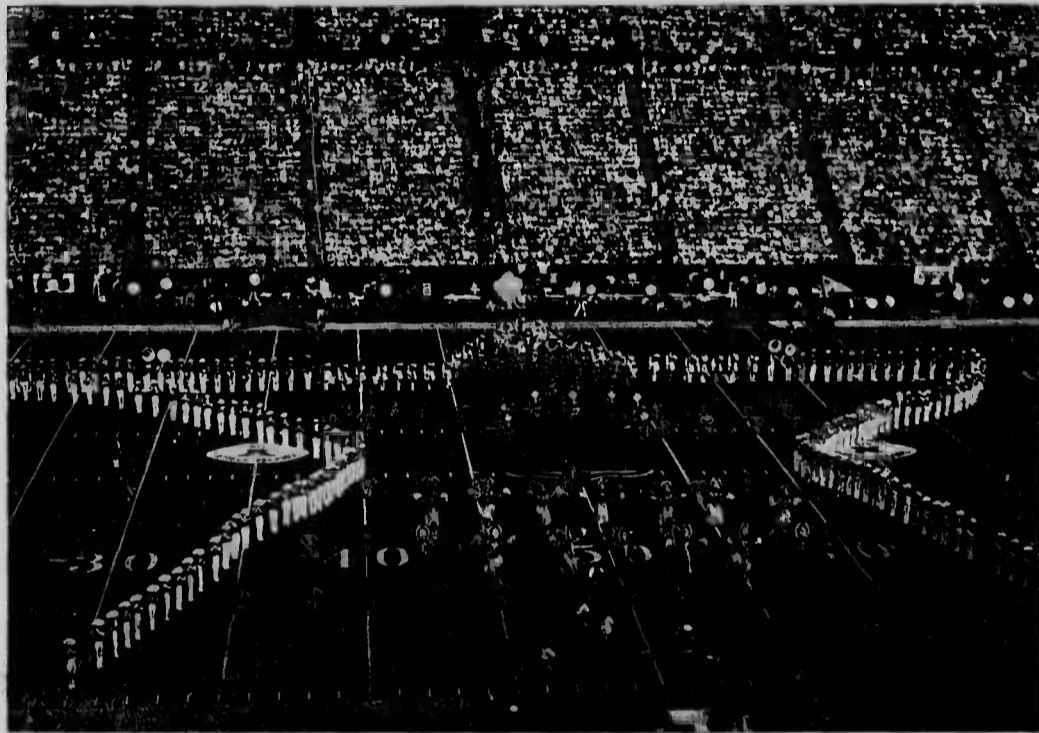

One of the biggest changes the upcoming event will have is the coming of the Budweiser Clydesdales. The horses will be available for hay rides and petting. All kinds of new and interesting children's games are

scheduled such as pony rides and three-legged races.

This Community Day picnic will host a PMO working dogs demonstration, picnic relay races and pick-up volleyball and softball. Music, comedy, magic and the Shriner's clowns will also be there to entertain people of all ages. As of now, there are no rain contingency plans.

"Although there are not many covered areas in the vicinity, we are not expecting rain anyway," said Rudisill. "It can't rain."

Rudisill said what's different from all other Community Days is that information-type booths are purposely being omitted.

"We want to make this event a fun-filled day of rides, games, entertainment and laughter for the families," said Rudisill.

"This is our (MWR's) way of saying to the families of deployed Marines and sailors, hey you're doing a great job and this day is for you."

Although MWR is encouraging families to bring a picnic lunch, there will be picnic-style food concessions available from the MWR Food and Hospitality Division, Burger King, Baskin & Robbins, The Rib Cage, and other "fun-raising" groups.

For those families with smaller children, a comfort station will be set up near the Community Center in the form of a Command Post tent for those parents that need changing and feeding facilities.

Pellet gun vandalism on rise

Random pellet weapon shootings at nine cars and one house window were reported to the Military Police Department at approximately 9 a.m. Feb. 2. This is the third pellet weapons incident on the Air Station in as many months.

According to Investigator Scot Garner of the Criminal Investigation Division here, the incidents, which resulted in more than \$2,000 in damages and took place sometime between 10 p.m. Feb. 1 to 9 a.m. Feb. 2.

He said the shootings occurred in several locations aboard the Air Station and that a pattern to the vandalism was not suspected.

Proper use of fire arms, including pellet guns, are outlined in Air Station Order P5500.6C., Chapter 10.

According to the order, all persons aboard the Air Station are responsible for securing weapons and items that are commonly used as weapons. For safety reasons, the regulation states that civilians, including dependents who are below the

age of 18, shall not carry or use weapons unless accompanied by an adult who is responsible for their actions.

All privately-owned firearms brought onto or stored aboard the Air Station are required to be registered with the Military Police and the Honolulu Police Department.

As outlined in Air Station Order P3574.5, privately-owned firearms, including pellet weapons, will not be discharged aboard the Air Station, except at the Pistol Range where there is controlled recreational shooting.

Shooters must check in with the Pistol Range Line NCO prior to firing. There is no scheduled recreational shooting for rifles, but arrangements may be made by contacting the Range Officer.

"Vandalism is becoming a problem aboard the Air Station," said Maj. John Buckingham, Air Station inspector. "One reason may stem from the absence of fathers due to deployment. But nevertheless, it (vandalism) is a significant and costly problem." See PELLET/A-12

Squadron sets record

Saudi Arabia - Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron 463 flew its 38,000th accident-free flight hour during a training mission here December 22.

The CH-53A/D squadron, is deployed here from Marine Corps Air Station Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii in support of Operation Desert Shield.

The squadron reached the milestone as it conducted a troop insertion exercise with Marines from B Company, 1st Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Expeditionary Brigade.

According to 463's Director of Safety and Standardization, Capt. L. Bruce Robson, this accomplishment is a record-breaking event.

"This is the longest period of mishap-free hours for a CH-53 series squadron in Marine Corps history," said Capt. Robson. "We have been working on this record for more than 10 years."

During that period, the squadron has won the Chief of Naval Operations Aviation Safety Award five times and the Fleet

Marine Force Pacific Aviation Safety Award twice.

The squadron's Commanding Officer, LtCol. John R. Mills, said the unit's safety record and performance has been exemplary in the past decade.

"The squadron has exceeded all my expectation," LtCol. Mills said. "They have always shown a lot of team effort and hard work, and all that has come together at this meaningful time and place."

The squadron's record during Desert Shield was impressive as well. Since their arrival here in early September, they have flown more than 880 hours, carried about 94,000 pounds of cargo externally and 615,000 pounds internally, and nearly 6,000 passengers.

The squadron's Aircraft Maintenance Officer, Maj. R.K. Read, said that although they have fewer aircraft, the squadron has remained on top of aircraft availability.

"We have maintained about 90 percent aircraft availability, and on numerous occasions," See SQUADRON/A-5

Write 'Desert Storm' on tax forms

Although military personnel serving in Operation Desert Storm have been given an extension for filing tax returns, the IRS has released guidance for those due a refund who would like to file early. All taxpayers serving in Operation Desert Storm, or those filing for them, should write "Desert Storm" at the top of their 1990 federal income tax forms and envelopes. Also, notices about tax collection or examinations sent to these taxpayers requires no action other than writing "Desert Storm" on the top of the notice and returning it to the IRS. Because legislation is pending which would extend tax relief to those who served in and left Operation Desert Storm, they should also write "Desert Storm" at the top of their tax returns, correspondence

and envelopes sent to the IRS. For more information, call the Legal Services Center at 257-2160 or the IRS at 541-3300.

K-Bay Marines combat weather, get needed training in Japan

Editor's note: The exercise described in the following story took place Dec. 11, 1990.

Camp Fuji, Japan — Mother Nature delivered her own barrage of artillery in the form of rain, hail and lightning, halting more than 250 leathernecks during a Fire Support Coordination Exercise here recently.

The weather prevented the MCAS Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii-based leathernecks from 2d Bn, 3d Marines, attached with 9th Marines, and 2d Bn, 12th Marines, under the unit deployment program with 3d MarDiv, and F/A-18 fighters from MCAS Iwakuni's Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 312 from further participation in the scheduled FIREX.

"The purpose of the exercise was to integrate air and artillery fire and deliver rounds on the same impact area," explained 1stLt. Bill Treuting, forward observer for Co. G, 2/3.

"Using two F/A-18 Hornets, we accomplished four flight missions, which accumulates to 14 passes by the jets," explained Capt. Dave Fitzgerald, Golf 2/3's air officer. "We're lucky the exercise wasn't a total wash-

out. The Marines here got a lot of needed practice before the storm rolled in and prevented the fighters from flying out of Iwakuni."

"Our mission as the ground element is to suppress enemy air defenses using 81mm mortar and 105mm howitzer fire so that the F/A-18s can deliver their goods on the target without the concern of enemy fire," Treuting said.

Coordination with the command post, fire direction centers and the pilots has to be extremely precise.

"As soon as we get the grid coordinates from the forward observers, we check the position twice - once manually on a map and once on the Battery Computer System," explained 1stLt. Mark Halbert, fire direction officer for Delta Battery, 2/12.

"The computer takes wind temperature, speed and direction into account as it tabulates the objective, but when we do it manually it takes longer because we use graphs and grid rulers," Halbert added.

After the FDC does calculations, the information is radioed to the air officer, who relays to the pilot where the arty rounds will be going and what air space it's safe to fly in.

After that, the FDC radios the same information to artillery and mortar crew chiefs so they can pack the right amount of powder in the cannon, or put the desired amount of deflection and elevation on the mortar tube, enabling the troops to deliver accurate fire down range.

During a tour of the training area, Col. James M. Strickland, 9th Marines commander, chatted with several Marines about their weapons and future activities.

"Don't ever underestimate the importance of what you do," Strickland emphasized as she inspected M-101A1 105mm towed howitzers. "They don't call arty the king of battle for nothing."

"I think it's great that the regimental CO took the time to come out and talk with us," said Cpl. Orlando Sendejo, Delta Battery, 2/12, section chief. "My section is taking extreme interest in these weapons and trying to gain as much knowledge as humanly possible. We're taking our jobs very seriously, because we know we can be in the thick of it at any time now."

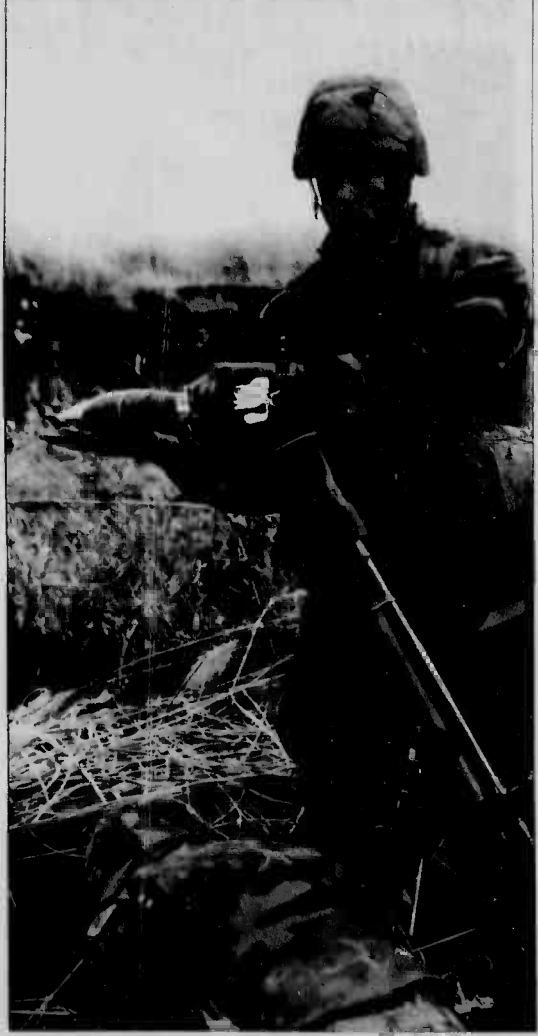
"Mistakes are made and lessons need to be learned in the training area, not on the battle field," Treuting added. "It could be too late then."

Tenants get jobs done with Self-Help support

With the support of the Self-Help Unit here, families are taking it upon themselves to do minor home repairs that help save time and money.

Paul Kim, Air Station's supervisor inspector for housing units, recognizes the extra effort of the tenants.

"Most of the funding for housing repairs is for emergency maintenance," said Kim. "Tenants presently waiting for non-critical repairs are taking it upon themselves to do some of the smaller jobs that help offset the workload."

According to Kim, the maintenance and home repairs being performed in the quarters is "very well." He said this is especially noted because most of the work being done is by the wives of husbands deployed to the Middle East.

Tenants are repairing doors

and cabinets, doing minor painting, replacing broken shower heads, fixing minor toilet problems and replacing door locks. All materials needed to repair the broken items are available at the Self-Help Unit.

Self-Help is temporarily located in building 1062, across from Burger King. The hours of operation are 8 a.m. to 3:45 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday.

"Most of the items to be repaired or replaced are available here," said Sato Craig, store worker for the Self-Help Unit. "However, we have a one-for-one basis for some of the items. This is where you must bring in the defected item to get another one."

The Self-Help Unit staff will also instruct tenants how to install a particular item. For some of the more complicated jobs, copies of the various home repair handbooks are available at the Self-Help Unit.

For service requests that

require immediate correction because they are a threat to health, safety, property or to restore essential utilities, emergency maintenance is available.

Some of these repairs are: broken water mains, serious water leaks, inoperable refrigerator, unlockable and un-openable exterior doors or critical circuit breaker in quarters will not stay on.

All requests for emergency work must be made through the Trouble Desk during the hours of 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. In an emergency situation that occurs after duty hours, tenants are to call the OOD.

All authorized improvements to housing units are listed in Appendix D of the Family Housing Manual. All self-help work is subject to inspection by the Family Housing Office.

Anyone needing more information on home repairs can call the Family Housing Office at 267-2705.

'Taking it easy' is learning process

 You need stress in your life! Does that surprise you? Perhaps so, but it is true. Without stress, life would be dull and unexciting. Stress adds flavor, challenge, and opportunity to life.

Too much stress, however, can seriously affect your physical and mental well-being. A major challenge in this stress-filled world of today is to make the stress in your life work for you instead of against you.

Stress is with us all the time. It comes from mental or emotional activity and physical activity. It is unique and personal to each of us.

So personal, in fact, that what may be relaxing to one person may be stressful to another. For example, if you're a busy executive who likes to keep busy all the time, "taking it easy" at the beach on a beautiful day may feel extremely frustrating, non-productive, and upsetting.

You may be emotionally distressed from "doing nothing." Too much emotional stress can cause physical illness such as high blood pressure, ulcers, or even heart disease; physical stress from work or exercise is not likely to cause such ailments. The truth is that physical exercise can help you to relax and handle your mental or emotional stress.

Hans Selye, M.D., a recognized expert in the field, has defined stress as a "nonspecific response of the body to a demand." The important issue is learning how our bodies respond to these demands. When stress becomes prolonged or particularly frustrating, it can become harmful causing distress or "bad stress."

Recognizing the early signs of distress and then doing something about them can make an important difference in the quality of your life, and may actually influence your survival. **Reacting to stress**

To use in a positive way and prevent it from becoming distress, you should become aware of your own reactions to stressful events. The body responds to stress by going through three stages: alarm; resistance; and exhaustion.

Let's take the example of a typical commuter in rush hour traffic. If a car suddenly pulls

out in front of him, his initial alarm reaction may include fear of an accident, anger at the driver who committed the action, and general frustration. His body may respond in the alarm stage by releasing hormones into the bloodstream which cause his face to flush, perspiration to form, his stomach to have a sinking feeling, and his arms and legs to tighten.

The next stage is resistance, in which the body repairs damage caused by the stress. If the stress of driving continues with repeated close calls or traffic jams, however, his body will not have time to make repairs.

He may become so conditioned to expect potential problems when he drives that he tightens up at the beginning of each commuting day. Eventually, he may even develop one of the diseases of stress, such as migraine headaches, high blood pressure, backaches, or insomnia. While it is impossible to live completely free of stress and distress, it is possible to prevent some distress as well as to minimize its impact when it can't be avoided.

Helping yourself
 When stress does occur, it is important to recognize and deal with it. Here are some suggestions for ways to handle stress. As you begin to understand more about how stress affects you as an individual, you will come up with your own ideas of helping to ease the tensions.

• **Try physical activity.** When you are nervous, angry, or upset, release the pressure through exercise or physical activity. Running, walking, playing tennis, or working in your garden are just some of the activities you might try. Physical exercise will relieve that "up tight" feeling, relax you, and turn the frowns into smiles. Remember, your body and your mind work together.

• **Share your stress.** It helps to talk to someone about your concerns and worries. Perhaps a friend, family member, teacher, or counselor can help you see your problem in a different light. If you feel your problem is serious, you might seek professional help from a psychologist, psychiatrist, or social worker. Knowing when to ask for help may avoid more serious problems later.

• **Know your limits.** If a problem is beyond your control and cannot be changed at the moment, don't fight the situation. Learn to accept what is for now until such time when you can change it.

• **Take care of yourself.** You are special. Get enough rest and eat well. If you are irritable and tense from lack of sleep or if you are not eating correctly, you will have less ability to deal with stressful situations. If stress repeatedly keeps you from sleeping, you should ask your doctor for help.

• **Make time for fun.** Schedule time for both work and recreation. Play can be just as important to your wellbeing as work; you need a break from your daily routine to just relax and have fun.

• **Be a participant.** One way to keep from getting bored, sad, and lonely is to go where it's all happening. Sitting alone can make you feel frustrated. Instead of feeling sorry for yourself, get involved and become a participant. Offer your services in neighborhood or volunteer organizations. Help yourself by helping other people. Get involved in the world and the people around you, and you'll find they will be attracted to you. You're on your way to making new friends and enjoying new activities.

• **Check off your task.** Trying to take care of everything at once can seem overwhelming, and, as a result, you may not accomplish anything. Instead, make a list of what tasks you have to do, do one at a time, checking them off as they're completed. Give priority to the most important ones and do those first.

• **Must you always be right?**

Do other people upset you particularly when they don't do things your way? Try cooperation instead of confrontation; it's better than fighting and always being "right." A little give and take on both sides will reduce the strain and make you both feel more comfortable.

• **It's OK to cry.** A good cry can be a healthy way to bring relief to your anxiety, and it might even prevent a headache or other physical consequence. Take some deep breaths; they also release tension.

• **Create a quiet scene.** You can't always run away, but you can "dream the impossible dream." A quiet country scene painted mentally, or on canvas, can take you out of the turmoil of a stressful situation. Change the scene by reading a good book or playing beautiful music to create a sense of peace and tranquility.

• **Avoid self-medication.** Although you can use drugs to relieve stress temporarily, drugs do not remove the conditions that caused the stress in the first place. Drugs, in fact, may be habit-forming and create more stress than they take away. They should be taken only on the advice of your doctor.

Art of relaxation
 The best strategy for avoiding stress is to learn how to relax. Unfortunately, many people try to relax at the same pace that they lead the rest of their lives. For a while, tune out your worries about time, productivity, and "doing right." You will find satisfaction in just being, without striving. Desert Storm causes added anxiety, tension

Today's news reports cause anxiety and concern for all of us. The conflict in the Middle East has created tension and stress for many families in America, especially those with relatives and other loved ones involved in the conflict.

A great deal of the anxiety we are feeling comes from waiting and not knowing what will happen. This tends to make us feel helpless, as if something external is controlling our lives rather than the other way around.

At times like these, when we don't know what will happen to those we care about, or to ourselves, it is important to become aware of typical responses to stress so you can understand your own responses. Some typical responses are:

- Marked change in eating patterns
- Poor concentration

- Increased alcohol intake
- Irritability
- Fatigue
- Sleep disruptions
- Headache
- Restlessness
- Anger/blaming
- Fear

There are a number of things you can do to help yourself:

- Talk with relatives, co-workers, and friends, people you can trust and confide in. If possible, join a support group with others in the same situation.
- Try to develop a routine but allow for flexibility.
- Eat a nutritionally sound diet. Limit intake of sugar, chocolate and caffeine as they tend to increase tension.
- Limit use of alcohol and other drugs that numb feelings. These substances can also make us depressed.
- Get some form of exercise daily. Exercise helps reduce tension.
- Get adequate rest.

Night vision goggle changes save lives

Editor's note: The following story was prompted by a visit from Joe Johnson of the Naval Science Acquisition Program to Japan. However, the NSAP is located at Fleet Marine Force, Pacific Headquarters, Camp Smith.

Okinawa, Japan — A recent change to the night-vision goggles worn by Marines serving in Operation Desert Storm may mean the difference between life and death, according to Joe Johnson, Fleet Marine

Forces, Pacific science advisor. Officials with the Naval Science Acquisition Program, which Johnson belongs to, received complaints about the goggles from Marines assigned to the Middle East region and they took action.

"The Marines discovered the goggles reflect light and expose Marines to possible enemy fire," Johnson said. "NSAP representatives put a coating on the goggles that should take care of the problem. If it does, we'll start trying to procure them because it has the potential to save lives."

Saving lives and increasing effectiveness by using scientific advances and technology represents the basis for Johnson and his co-laborers' work and efforts.

Johnson and his peers have worked on several projects including the M-60 tank leaf springs, squad automatic weapons, 9mm handgun safety, uniforms, sensors, intelligence systems connectivity and nuclear, biological and chemical gear.

"I work on a variety of project everything from shoe laces to sophisticated command and control systems," Johnson said.

"Although Lt.Gen.(Robert F.) Milligan (Fleet Marine Force Pacific Commanding General) sets my priorities, most of my projects come from observing Marines in training as well as problem they provide for me."

Problems are often presented to Johnson during visits he makes to various training locations.

Some of the projects Johnson works on simply provide more comfort to Marines. He's currently searching for better cushions for Marines riding rigid raider crafts a form of

transportation reconnaissance Marines sometimes use.

"The Marines were riding on seats that caused their backs to be uncomfortable," Johnson said. "By the time they arrived ashore they were fatigued."

Another comfort-aiding project he's working on is even less glamorous, but of vital importance to infantrymen. "It's a small project," he said, "but I saw a type of non-blistering sock, and I thought who could use such a sock more than a Marine?"

"It sometimes takes a while to locate a source that can

provide what is needed, but it's worth it to find a way to help Marines."

Johnson spends a lot of time away from his Hawaii headquarters, but he keeps in contact with his Camp Smith office.

"I have an answering machine and can access it from wherever I am in the world," Johnson said. "If a person calls me with an idea or a suggestion, I'll get back to them to find out exactly what they are talking about."

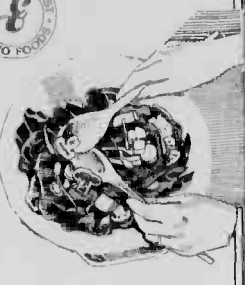

Gear production, distribution increases for Desert Storm

Albany, Ga. — As the number of Marines deploying for Operation Desert Storm (formerly Desert Shield) increases, the number of uniforms and Nuclear, Biological and Chemical gear produced and distributed increases.

"Desert Storm has caused a large increase in our work along the line of NBC protective gear and desert camouflage ensembles," said Jean Davis, supervisory logistics management specialist for the Clothing and General Property Section, Automotive Clothing and General Property Branch of the Mobile Equipment Ordnance Division here. "The requirements for these items have more than tripled since the beginning of the operation."

During the last four months, in excess of 200,000 desert camouflage ensembles, 66,000 M17A2 gas masks and 295,000 chemical suits (OG-84) have been released in support of Operation Desert Storm," said Davis. The desert ensemble was introduced to the Marine Corps in 1980.

It includes the desert camouflage coat, trousers, and hat; the helmet cover, field pack cover, body armor cover, neckerchief, and the nighttime parka, parka liner and trousers.

In order to meet the extra needs and requirements of the Marines currently and soon to be deployed, DPSC contractors are concentrating primarily on desert ensembles and NBC protective gear. A government factory at DPSC is turning out more than 22 sets of desert cammies a day.

Although present requirements focus mainly on desert utilities and NBC protective gear, the Clothing and General Property Section here continues to get demands for many other items. "We are awaiting the arrival of the Ballistic Laser Protective Sun, Wind and Dust Goggles," said Davis.

Other new items in the works are desert boots, currently being

processed for initial issue to troops in Saudi Arabia and the M40 gas mask which will be introduced later this year.

McGruff tells all 'Crime dog' discusses safety, meteoric rise

Editor's note: When the Hawaii Marine newspaper staff decided to do a story on crime awareness as part of national Crime Prevention Month during February, the obvious source of information came quickly into the conversation. All agreed — it was time to talk to the dog.

This is no ordinary dog, mind you. In fact, this dog walks on two legs, wears clothes and heads up the country's most aggressive

crime prevention program. He is McGruff the crime dog, and cornering him for an interview wasn't easy considering his busy schedule. But corner him we finally did.

Hawaii Marine staff writer, Cpl. Jason Erickson, caught up with him last week between speaking engagements and was able to conduct a quick interview. He filed this report:



I was a bit nervous at first, considering what a big star McGruff is. I don't mean just his fame, I mean he's BIG. About six-foot, 5-inches. But as we began talking, McGruff's helpful and relaxed manner smoothed things out.

I was hoping we'd have a long interview so I could get a feel for his personality, while also drawing on his knowledge of crime prevention. Unfortunately, duty called, and McGruff was off on another mission soon after the interview began. But, even in the short time that we had, McGruff passed on some interesting wisdom. The entirety of the interview follows.

Hawaii Marine: Mr. McGruff, how long have you been in the crime business, and how did you get involved with safety awareness?

McGruff: Well sir, this is my tenth year in the crime prevention business. I started as a police dog, and one day, my handler took sick. So I grabbed a trench coat and went out on my own.

Hawaii Marine: Is there an ongoing need for safety awareness?

McGruff: Definitely! As kids say today, safety awareness is needed 24/7. That means 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Hawaii Marine: What tips do you have for children in terms of safety?

McGruff: There are many kinds of safety needs for kids today and many different safety tips. The one I believe is a good general tip is "think before you act." If it is dangerous, don't do it. For example, some kids are not wearing safety equipment when they go skating.

Then to boot, they skate down unauthorized, dangerous hills, such as Kansas Tower. They can't be seen by oncoming traffic that's dangerous. Many more tips are available by contacting my partner, Officer Friendly, at the Military Police Department, Crime Prevention Section, 257-3425.

Hawaii Marine: Is there a greater need for safety awareness now because of recent world tensions?

McGruff: Safety needs should always be at the highest level of awareness. We recommend good safety practices at all times regardless of world events. During the present situation, I would like to see kids paying more attention to strange activity in their neighborhood and reporting everything to their parents. That way, their parents can notify Military Police.

Hawaii Marine: How well do you think kids and parents understand the need for safety awareness?

McGruff: Kids tend to be more conscious about safety after they have been taught, but parents on the other hand, sometimes become over confident and ignore important safety tips. Remember, parents are the best teachers for safety.

Hawaii Marine: How do you go about increasing awareness, Mr. McGruff?

McGruff: What I do is work with the Military Police Department, Crime Prevention Section, on all possible programs. We give briefings on just about every concern. Our goal is to increase safety awareness wherever possible. If we can reach at least one person, then it's all worthwhile. By doing that, I now have thousands of kids helping me "Take a Bite Out Of Crime!" I call them my "Crime Bitters."

Alcohol-related incidents

Two civilians attempting to enter the Air Station were stopped by the Military Police, who charged both with possession of narcotics. The driver was also arrested for Driving Under the Influence of alcohol, and for having an open container of an alcoholic beverage in his car. He took an intoxilyzer test, which showed a .13 percent blood alcohol content. He appeared in court, and received 14 hours in the Alcohol Assessment and Rehabilitation Program, four traffic points, 30 days absolute and 60 days conditional suspen-

sion of his driver's license, and a \$155 fine.

• A Marine was arrested for Driving Under the Influence after being stopped for lane-weaving by Honolulu Police. The police officer smelled alcohol on his breath, and the Marine failed a field sobriety test. He was released on \$150 bail after refusing all BAC tests. He later appeared in Kaneohe District Court, and received a one-year suspension on his

driver's license and a requirement to attend AARP.

Other incidents

• A Marine was arrested by MPs for Reckless Driving, Failure to Obey a Lawful Order and Eluding Military Police. MPs had seen him driving recklessly down Mokapu Road. He refused to obey their orders, and fled the area at a high speed. His vehicle was later found in a barracks parking lot.

association voted, and selected her as this year's Hawaii Horse Show Association Eva Summer Sportsmanship Trophy awardee. "Just to know that they thought enough of me as both a rider and a sportsman to elect me is a great honor," Amber said.

While she loves riding, Amber says the amount of time she spends at the A-Tri K Stables is more than recreational.

"It's a commitment, but sometimes it gets tough to keep up the regime," she said.

Her mother, Jeanie Bowser pointed out that in spite of Amber's commitment to riding, she's still an outstanding student.

"She's got a 4.0 average, you know," her mother said.

"Not any more," corrected Amber, blushing.

"Well, she got one 'B' this semester," conceded the proud mother. "But she'll be going to Texas A&M when she graduates."

Amber explained that she has plans to become an equine veterinarian. "That's a horse doctor in English," she said.

According to Amber, A&M shares top rating in the nation with University of California at Davis for its equine veterinarian program.

Her mother envisions an Olympic champion in her daughter, but the younger Bowser said she'll be happy just to get her degree from A&M. Why an equine vet? Amber explained it bluntly.

"I love horses and want to be around them whether I'm competing or not."

Modern techniques improve oral health

Editor's note: February is "National Children's Dental Health Month, and this year's theme is "Smile America." The following article was provided by the 21st Dental Company, 1 Marine Expeditionary Brigade.

Over forty years of progress in dentistry has resulted in dramatic improvements in the oral health of Americans and enormous savings on dental health care costs. Scientific breakthroughs, improved dental equipment and techniques, and increased consumer information efforts are responsible for these benefits.

The following are some of the major innovations which have marked the past four decades and some directions for the future:

- Fluoride is considered to be the single most effective weapon against tooth decay. In 1948, the mineral was proven to prevent cavities by strengthening tooth enamel. Now it is available in toothpastes, mouth rinses, tablets, topical applications, and fluoridated water and half of school age children have never had cavity. Currently, scientists are researching a time-release pellet which would bond to a tooth and allow continuous absorption of fluoride over six months.

- Plaque removal became paramount in the 1960s, when researchers isolated the bacteria in plaque as the cause of tooth decay and periodontal (gum)

diseases. Preventive techniques include physical removal of plaque by brushing and flossing and the use of chemical antiplaque toothpastes and mouth rinses to control infections. Today, dentists are also using antibiotics to treat some forms of periodontal disease and dental scientists are seeking a vaccine to prevent tooth decay similar to vaccines against measles, mumps, and polio.

- Sealants are additional preventive measures that were created in the early 1970s and are strongly recommended by the ADA. Sealants are plastic coating applied to the tooth's chewing surfaces to fill microscopic pits and fissures in children's developing permanent molars. Recently, sealants have been combined with time-release fluoride to strengthen tooth enamel and remineralize areas which show early signs of decay.

- Patient information and education have made important contributions to the decrease in tooth decay and are now being employed to fight gum diseases. Programs like the ADA's National Children's Dental Health Month, now celebrating its 42nd year, have made the public aware of the importance of good daily hygiene and regular professional care. Today, the majority of Americans understand that teeth are intended to last a lifetime and, with good habits, developed early in life, they will.

PELLET/From A-1 that will not be tolerated."

According to Garner, if a Marine is found guilty of committing these crimes, he could be charged for wrongful destruction of personal property.

"The maximum penalty is five years confinement, dishonorable discharge and total forfeiture of all pay," said Garner.

He adds that if a juvenile military dependent is found to have caused the damage, he or she could be prosecuted through the state's judicial system. Garner said other courses of action that may be taken are barring the juvenile from the Air Station, or evicting the family from housing.

The incidents involving the pellet gun shootings are still under investigation.

'Old Glory' flies high as troops go to combat

While U.S. servicemen in the Persian Gulf are "doing the hard work of freedom," as President Bush puts it, the public has rallied behind them to do their part in winning the war.

Since the beginning of the crisis last August, and especially since the outbreak of war, patriotism nationwide has swelled as a sign of support for the men and women fighting abroad.

"Communities all across America... (have) joined hands to support the military troops and their families," Bush said during an emotionally charged Feb. 1 speech at Marine Corps Air Station, Cherry Point, N.C.

A Feb. 9 *Time*/CNN opinion poll confirms the president's remarks. It suggests that 80 percent of all Americans strongly support the president's handling of the crisis thus far. This is up from a Jan. 20 ABC-*Washington Post* opinion poll that placed support at 75 percent.

From coast to coast, houses and cars, store windows and school yards, even people themselves, are adorned by flags and yellow ribbons. The stadiums at sports events like the Super Bowl in Tampa Bay, Fla., and the Pro Bowl here in Hawaii, looked more like Desert Storm pep-rallies than football games.

Children of all ages at schools throughout the nation have taken up aggressive letter writing campaigns with troops in the Persian Gulf. Thousands of businesses, private groups and individuals, have taken it upon themselves to send care packages and letters of support and encouragement to the troops.

For the troops in the Persian Gulf, the positive effect of support at home is obvious. As former President and General Dwight D. Eisenhower once said, "Morale is the greatest single factor in a successful war."

Sgt. Brad Mitzelfelt, a Hawaii-based Marine correspondent now in the Persian Gulf, said Marines there are very affected by support at home.

"We often hear news about support at home. It definitely helps lift people's spirits," Mitzelfelt said during a telephone interview last week. He added that knowing the American people support their actions means they'll be able to get the job done right. "That's the most important thing."

Retired Marine SgtMaj. James McGuirk can remember the effect negative public opinion had during the Vietnam Conflict. As a veteran of three combat tours there, McGuirk said there were several political considerations that held the troops back from doing "their jobs."

"Towards the end, we weren't allowed to engage the enemy unless they fired first," said McGuirk. "There were certain villages we weren't allowed to attack, even if we knew there were high concentrations of enemy troops and equipment."

McGuirk said the effect of poor public support also had a tremendous effect on the morale of American troops.

"The public was confused about the war, and why we were there. In a lot of ways, they took it out on us," he said. "When I returned home, I was treated like a second-class citizen because I was a Vietnam veteran."

McGuirk sees a vast difference between the Vietnam Conflict and Desert Storm. He said the reasons are much clearer, and the vast majority of Americans understand and support the action.

"Troops in the Gulf today know they are fighting a just cause, and they can feel proud to be serving their country," McGuirk said. "Morale is incredibly important to fighting men. After a long, hard day, every fighting man is starving for a little encouragement from home, whether from the girl he loves, his family or even a perfect stranger."

Morale is needed on the homefront as well. Coping with the absence of a husband, a wife, a mom or a dad, is hard enough. Coping with the fact that they are in danger, and not knowing from day to day how they are doing, puts tremendous pressure on military families.

A random sampling of the Air Station community suggests that national support, while not a solution, is certainly a tremendous help.

Jody Schlund is the wife of a deployed Hawaii Marine. While she misses her husband very much, and worries about his safe return, she said national support for his mission in the Gulf makes life a little easier.

"It makes me happy to see people supporting our troops," said Schlund. "I've always been a patriot, but to know that most Americans stand behind Desert

Storm makes me very proud to be a military wife."

Lisa Huffman's husband is also deployed. She said there's no question, American support helps the troops perform their mission.

"Our troops are finally getting the recognition they deserve," said Huffman. "I've always known how great Marines are, and now the rest of the country seems to be realizing it as well."

Sandy Wakefield, a co-worker of Huffman's at a Kailua business, added that she (Wakefield) gets very emotional feelings of pride and patriotism when she sees other American's supporting her deployed husband.

"I've always been very patriotic, but a situation like this makes you re-evaluate your feelings," Wakefield said. It was no coincidence that she was wearing a USMC T-shirt and a yellow ribbon. "I'm very proud to be an American and a Marine's wife."

While the Air Station community seems overjoyed by American support, many worry about how long it will last.

From Saudi Arabia, Mitzelfelt said that the durability of American support is heavily on the minds of Marines there.

"The reports we get are that it's still very high, but a lot of people wonder how long it will last. It makes a difference," he added.

McGuirk is quite sure Moses and others who doubt American resolve have nothing to worry about.

"Patriotism is on the rise. They know and fully understand this is a just war. They're gonna stay behind their troops," he said.

While military troops and their families benefit from national support, President Bush told the Cherry Point crowd that it works both ways.

"To all of you spouses, children, parents, loved ones, Marines you're doing more than just keeping the home fires burning," he stressed. "Your dedication and bravery is lifting the hearts of every American."

Bush told the crowd of servicemembers and military families, that during his trip to their Air Station, he heard a radio announcer say, "the President is going to North Carolina to lift the morale of the people there." But Bush said, "Let me assure you, it's the other way around."
