### National security report released

A new August 1991 White House paper on national security in the 1990s points out that the world is far more independent economically and environmentally, and that the United States remains the only nation with truly global strength, reach and influence in every dimension - political, economic and military. While the report states that by the mid-1990s our military force will be 25 percent smaller than during the Cold War, it adde that "as a maritime nation, with our dependence on the sea to preserve legitimate security and commercial ties, freedom of the seas is and will remain a vital interest. We will not agree to measures that would limit the availability of our Navy and regional ground-force imbalances that are inherently de-stabilizing. Recent events in the Gulf, Liberia, Somalia and elsewhere show that American seapower without arbitrary limits on its force structure or operations makes a strong contribution to global stability and mutual security."

### Lummus docks

Before the Motar Vessel IstLL. Jack Lummus even pulled into port this past weekend, it caused quite a stir within the lat Marine Expeditionary Brigade.

This Maritime Prepositioning Ship, one of 13 used for rapid deployment within the Corps, carried within her a large portion of the Brigade's day-to-day operating genr.

Given the circumstances, it's not hard to understand the uproar. It was something like the buildup to Christians morning. Only in this case, Santa was just returning the 680 "presenta" he'd borrowed nearly a year hefore.

And on top of the anticipated return of their "Remain Behind Equipment," planning for offload operations had itself

gotten the Brigade kettle boil-

gotten the Brigade kettle hoiling.

In part, this was because it would he the first time for the Marines and sailors of Brigade Service Support Group-I to show off their MPS expertise to a new Brigade commander and a new Brigade commanding general expertise these same warriors used in their historical Desert Shield offlond shortly after the Persian Gulf crisis began.

With all that on the table, the hulking vessel floated to a stop at Victor Pier in Pearl City Saturday morning, and activity that had begun days earlier with preparations hecume a frenzy.

Like the nearly 8,000 Hawnii-based Marines and sailors that came home from the war a few months ago, the Brigade's gear received a warm welcome. The various units within the 1st MEB have long-since re-grouped

LtGen. Robert F. Milligan, the senior Marine in a geographic area that spans a region from the West Coast of the United States to the Indian Ocean, will relinquish command of Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, and Marine Corps Bases, Pacific, to LtGen. Royal N. Moore Jr. in

a ceremony scheduled for 6:30 p.m. in the parking lot and portice area of building 1.

Headquartered here, the Commanding General of FMPPac is responsible for the largest single U.S. Marine Corps field command. FMFPac includes more than 45 percent of the total manpower of the Marine Corps, with two of its three active divisions, aircraft wings and service support groups.

As an integral part of the Pacific Command's Mavull Expeditionary Forces, FMFPac's

principal mission is to provide combat-ready Marine Air-Ground Task Forces (MAGTFa) to the Commander-in-Chief, Pacific Fleet. These task forces are part of the Fleet's naval power projection forces, and they can range in size from the smallest security detachment to an entire Marine Expeditionary Force of the size committed in Operation Desert Storm.

### Friendly fire caused 35 'Storm' deaths

WASHINGTON- U.S. military investigations have identified 28 incidents during Operation Desert Storm in which U.S. forces have mistakenly engaged other American forces, resulting in the deaths of 35 servicemen and the wounding of 72 others.

and the wounding of 72 others. A combination of featureless desert terrain; large, complex and fastmoving formations; fighting in rain, darkness or low visibility; and the ability to engage targets from long distances were contributing factors in the 28 incidents.

factors in the 28 incidents.

Of note, these factors also contributed to our forces schieving their victory more rapidly, thereby keeping coalition casualties at a minimum. Military officials said all known and suspected instances of friendly fire have been investigated, but added that if additional information is developed, they will carefully review it to determine whether the conclusions should be revised.

The investigations are conducted to determine how the incidents happened so that the likelihood of similar incidents can be reduced in the future, and to provide as much information as possible to the families of the servicemen who were killed.

The information concerning the servicemen who were killed was offered to their next of kin.

Of the total 615 U.S. military battle casualties in Operation Desert Storm, 148 service personnel were killed in action, including 35 by friendly fire, and 467 were wounded, including 72 by friendly fire. Non-battle casualties are 143 deaths and 3,043 injuries, none of which resulted from friendly fire.

Fourteen Marines died and six Marines and one sailor were injured as a result of friendly fire incidents involving Marine Corps units during Operation Desert Storm.

Eleven of the fatalitie occurred during an Iraq incursion into Saudi Arabi Jan. 29 in the area of Umn Hujul, at approximately th See FIRE/A-1

and gotten back to routine operations, but they have been without a great deal of their equipment.

Capt. Tom Barna, BSSG-1 MPS officer, explained that the lack of gear has hampered training and routine operations, but with the arrival of the Lummus, the Brigade will soon he "healthy" once more. He couldn't say exactly what percent of the overall Brigade equipment table these 600 pieces of gear represent, but was quite certain it is "a significant portion."

It has been gone since Oct. I last year. After all 13 of the MPS vessels were offloaded in Saudi Arabia, then-Commandant, Gen. Al Gray, decided to have one ship re-stocked to be ready in case of a contingency somewhere else around the world.

The gear to stock the ship came from the Remain Behind Equipment left by the 1st MEB here when it deployed to Southwest Asia, as well as units in Okinawa and on the West Coast.

The decision to have one ship ready proved its worth after Hurricanes decimased Bangladesh and the Mt. Pinatubo volcano eruption buried part of the in the Philippines under molten lava and ash.

The Lummus was able to deploy much needed supplies and equipment to both sites, while all other MPS ships were still waiting to be reloaded. Barna added that hecause many of the other ships are now restocked, the Lummus can return the gear to its rightful units.

But because the gear was used in both the Philippines and Bangladesh, it has a bit of "wear and tear" to it.

"Every attempt was made to repair the equipment before it went back aboard the ship, but it's not necessarily in the same condition it was in when it left here last year," Barna said.

Additionally, the original database that was set up for the gear when it was loaded aboard the Lummus has changed, making the job of offloading a bit more difficult than usual, according to Barna.

### Offload no piece of cake

Any MPF operation is a difficult and detailed procedure, because of the enormous amount and diversity of gear involved. Add to this changes in the configuration that aren't shown in the load plan and its that much more complex. "During the first day, we tried

to use our normal automated MPF tracking system, but later switched to a more manual system to adjust for the changes,

switched to a more manual system to adjust for the changes, he said, adding that the problems this caused were minor, and the offload continued on schedule.

"When we have our usual MPF squadrons," he said, "the 10,000 pieces of gear aboard each ship are identified by package 1.D. or serial number and we have a database that maintains the location of every single piece of gear, no matter how hig or small. I can tell you where anything is on the ship, in quantity, type or anything else you want to know."

While this may seem a trivial capability to one not familiar with the system, we need look no further than August 1990 to find proof that accountability is crucial.

### Experts in their field

Port of Jubayl, Saudi Arabia: It was here that for the first time in their more than 10-year existence, two of the three MPF squadrons downloaded their entire cargo for use by I Marine Expeditionary Force only days into the crisis. The third squadron arrived and unloaded shortly after, bringing the total number of offloaded ships to 13, with more than 130,000 individual pieces of cargo both great and small.

"I can't speak for the other two MEBs (who handled MPS offloads of the other two squadrons) but the 1st MEB offload of MPS-3 went superbly," Barna aid. "It met all expectations."

He said the 1,200 to 1,500 Marines and sailors frum this Brigade who participated in the offload knew exactly what to do.

"We went to Saudi Arabia and conducted the offload as we had always done it," Barna said. "We deployed with people who felt comfortable with what they were doing, because they trained extensively to do it in several operations not long before the war." This included Freedom Banner '90 in Washington State only two months before the crisis."

The offload by the 1st MEB in Saudi was historic in many

The offload hy the 1st MEB in Saudi was historic in many ways, Barna said. "We were the first MPS squadron to ever download our entire cargo, even though 7th MEB and MPS-2 were in theater first."

He said the 1st MEB was also the only Brigade of the three to use an offload preparation party to get the gear ready for embark

during the trip from Gunn to Saudi; the only one to use a fully automated tracking system for accountability; and the only MEB that pre-designates which gear goes to which units, for more efficient transfer of the gear as it comes off the ships.

He added however, that the offload operations in Saudi were not without lessons learned.

"With something as complex as this, there will always be ways to improve. But if you aren't playing the game, that is, if you're an outsider looking in, the actual lessons probably wouldn't mean a whole lot," he said, adding, "They are minute details, not large-scale issues."

### Ongoing process

Lessons, Barna explained, are continuously learned in every offload. That is one reason training exercises are so important. The other, of course, is to make sure every one knows their responsibilities.

For the people who actually move the gear from the ship to the staging areas, an MPS offload is not much different than any other type of equipment movement, Barna said. But for those who deal with information movement, the MPS system is a complex network like no other, and refinementare constantly being made.


"Those who transmit data must know the system to be effective, and it is a complex system to know," Barna said. Starting with a database that maintains a detailed sketch of every piece of cargo while the ship is loaded, trackers must follow this same gear as it moves off the ship and into different directions.

The detailed process has a very important purpose. Barna explained.

"It's very important that unit commanders know specifics."

explained.

"It's very important that unit commanders know specifics about the whereabouts of their gear during the offload to remain flexible and plan their operations," Barna said.
"Therefore we have to have an effective means for tracking that gear, so at any time we can tell them general information like when the offload will be complete, or specifics like exactly where any particular piece of cargo is."



Marines of the 1st Marine Expeditionary Brigade will for the first time participate in a combined joint exercise between Australian and Tongan forces during exercise Tafakula '91 in the Kingdom of Tonga.

The main body of the Marine contingent will arrive August 21 and the exercise will culminate in a week-long field operation Aug. 30 through Sept. 5.

Tonga, which is situated east of Fiji in the South l'acific, consists of some 150 islands. The majority of Tonga's population is located on Tongatupu, where the exercise will be held. It will be conducted on the King's royal estate, which covers about two-thirds of the island.

Under the overall command of the Tonga Defense Services Commander, LtCol. Frita John Tupou, Tafakula '91 will consist of approximately 300 TDS sailors, Marines and soldiers, 40

Australian soldiers from the Townsville-based First Royal Australian Regiment and 75 U.S. Marines and sailors from Kaneohe Bay.

The Tongan military has a combined strength of about 400 men. It has no air force. The force has recently been corganized to emphasize maritime operations and coastal defense. The exercise will reflect this mission, concentrating on small amphibious landings/raids, and will utilize scout swimmers and

reconnaissance teams.

Capt. Leon Pappa, commanding officer, Company K, 3d Battalion, 3d Marine Regiment, will be the commander of the Marine contingent. The contingent Includes one platoon from Co. K, one platoon from Co. A, 3d Reconnaissance Bn., three U.S. Navy doctors and six Navy corpsmen.



### Computer upgrade makes arty faster, more accurate

When long-range artillery became part of the arsenal of modern warfare, aiming the guns was done manually with charts and firing tables. While this only took minutes for a skilled Fire Direction Control Center, that could be an eternity for units awaiting the neutralization of a hostile target. Human error was also always a factor.

With the advent of the Battery Computer System, this computation of data was cut from minutes to seconds. First Battalion, 12th Marines, recently received the latest updated version of the system, the BCS-9.

"The BCS is a network of

received the latest updated version of the system, the BCS-9.

"The BCS is a network of computers, both in the battery fire direction center and at the howitzers, that takes the raw data and solves the ballistic solution for each different howitzer," said Capt. George S. Whitbeck, 1/12 S-3 officer. Whitbeck, 1/12 S-3 officer. Whitbeck, 1/12 S-3 officer. Whitbeck recently completed a three-year tour as an instructor at the U.S. Army Field Artillery School at Fort Sill, Okla.

He explained that a three-step method is used when a fire mission is reported, with the BCS being a vital element.

"First, the forward observer digitally transmits a call for fire," he said. "Then a human decision is made if and how to attack, called the tactical fire direction. Next, the compute performs the technical fire direction, which is the actual firing data computation."

The computation of firing data is almost instantaneous, and while the possibility of human error is still a factor, it is greatly reduced. The BCS can instantly compute the different firing data for differently positioned howit-

zers. Weather information is also digitally entered. While it usually controls a platoon of four guns, it can handle up to

12.
Another advantage of the BCS over manual computation is the ability of the computer to instantly alter the firing data to change the impact of the rounds. "The BCS can change the individual aiming points of the howitzers so the pattern of bursts will fall in a circular, linear, rectangular or a converging sheaf," Whitbeck said. "In comparison, before the BCS, almost all battery fire missions had a parallel sheaf pattern of burst."

The BCS also has the capability to store target information. "The last used version of the BCS could store the firing data on 60 targets and 59 fire plan targets, or multiple fire missions," Whitbeck said. "The BCS-9 can 'remember' 120 targets and 78 fire plan targets."

gets."

According to Whitback, there are three major areas where version nine is improved over the older model.

"First, it expands the capabilities to engage targets by incorporating new information into the system and a more user-friendly design," he said. Examples of this new informa-

tion is accounting for the curvature of the earth and updated ammunition data.

"Second, it expands the ability to talk digitally to more 'subscribers' of digital communication." Future applications of digital comm could include target locations from reconnassiance aircraft. Other data digitally input is from the Firefinder Counter-Battery Radar, which detects incoming artillery fire, determines its trajectory and point of origin, and instantly transmits that information to the BCS-9 for retaliatory fire.

A third major improvement in the system is it clears up some

software errors that existed in earlier versions, Whitbeck said. Whitbeck explained the goal of modern artillery is a "firstround fire-for-effect," or hitting the target with the initial round. This was merely a dream in the early years of artillery where the norm was "walking" the rounds to the target. "The maximum effective range of the M198 howitzer is 30 kilometers, so this is an incredible improvement in accuracy over the years," he said. The older version of the BCS was used in the Gulf War, performing with expected precision. "Although the technology for the mission of artillery is always improving, we will still be prepared to do things the old way," Whitbeck said. "For

example, we will always listen to a voice or radio call-for-fire. And artillery students still learn the old way of using charts and firing tables to compute firing data in order to be able to work without the BCS."

The lattalion will be conducting a Command Post Exercise later this month, using all digital systems.

Beginning this week, 1st Bn., 12th Marines will be training FDC Marines on the BCS-9, Whitheck said. August 26 through 28 will be the battalion CPX, with all BCS-9s up and running, coordinated by battalion digital systems. This will also mark the first time 1st Bn., 12th Marines will have all its digital systems together and working as one unit.





### Long-distance calls are tracked

## Illegal phone use is on rise

The unauthorized use of government phones for personal long-distance calls is on the rise aboard the Air Station, according to the Telephone Division at the Air Station's Communication Electronics Office.

From Jan. 1-June 1, only \$71.11 of unauthorized calls were made on Air Station phones, according to Cpl. Philip Walton, billing NCO at CEO. From June 1-Aug. 9, the total was \$1,675.81.

Walton said that the money

is being paid to CEO by the offenders, but it may not end there.

"One Marine accumulated \$1,200 on a government phone. He and two other Marines accounted for about \$1,400 of the \$1,675," Walton said. "You can see that if you take these Marines' bills away, there isn't a huge problem. But it is illegal and we know how to catch the culprits."

In addition to providing reimbursement, phone abusers may face non-judicial punishment and even courts-martial.

Walton helieves that many of the Marines may not realize that making long-distance calls on government phones is illegal, and there are those who think they can get away with it. "I want everyone to know that we get a printout of every long-distance phone call made," Walton said. "I go through the list and highlight suspicious calls - those made after hours, on weekends and unusually long valls. Then I send each shop a printout of the calls made from their phones, and the UTCOs (Unit Telephone Con-

trol Officers) are supposed to check the lists with their log books. If any don't match or are unrecorded, the UTCOs must find out who made the calls." If the UTCOs can't track the phone call or calls down, an investigation may be required. "The key is for the UTCOs to do their job, to actually control the long-distance capable phones and maintain an accurate log book," Walton said. "Other than that, the individuals had better realize they will be caught if they abuse government phones."



### Dependent arrested for assault


A Marine and a civilian were detained for solicitation after an

According to Morgan, battery commander, his orders were to "prepare for the possibility of enemy attuck."

Unknown to him and his men, events were unfolding that would prove to be one of the few liraqi military offensives into Saudi Arabia. And before it would finish, Morgan's leadership through that buttle, along with his actions during the ground against the grou ground assault through Kuwait,

would earn him the Bronze Star with Combat Device. As Iraqi tanks were pouring over the Kuwaiti border into Saudi Arabia, Morgan and his men were setting their guns up, barrels pointed toward the town, on the horizon approximately 15 miles away. on the horizon 15 miles away.

"We were set up that same evening by midnight," Morgan said. "At around seven the next morning, we received our first fire mission."

Many times an artillery battery doesn't know where the original call for fire originates. This tine, it was fellow Hawaii Marines from Co. A, 3d Reconnassaince Bu., who called for the first fire while hiding out as Iraqi patrols tightened their control of the city around them.

"Our initial fire mission had a total of 64 rounds down-

range," said Morgan, a bachelor from Pennsylvania. "The mission called for DPICM rounds (Dual-Purpose Improved Conventional Munition)." These rounds, which contain small bomblets that scatter over a wide area, are effective against troops and armor.

Morgan explained that finally getting to fire against the enemy after being in the desert for six months was good for morth, although a little scary, and with their chemical suits on, not very

What might have been even more scary was the steady stream of Saudi and Qutari tanks and armored personnel carriers fleeing the city, traveling right by Charlie Battery's position.

But Morgan and his men weren't going anywhere.

His citation reads in part, "...(Morgan's) initial response to calls for fire and the accuracy of those fires blunted the Iraqi attack and provided confidence to the coalition forces for their ultimate move to recapture Khafii..."

When the Saudi and Qatari forces did return to retake the city, Morgan and his men were still there, continuing to pump rounds into the city. He eather than the city the categories of 170 shells in a two-day period, even more than his battery would fire during the ground assault into Kuwait.

"During the ground assault, we fired about 150-160 rounds total," the battery commander said. "We also took 69 prison-ers." Morgan and his battery's final position was about six

miles from Kuwait City. There they stayed until March 4, when they were given the order to return to Saudi Arabin. Six weeks later they were back in Hawaii.

Marine forces in the Gulf War learned many lessons, and, according to Morgan, artillery was no exception.

"The 198 is a damned good howitzer," he explained, "and this was its first major use in combat. It's super-accurate-a good long-range weapon. It proved its worth in the desert.

Morgan had nothing but raise for his men.

"They handled every situation real well, doing a great job. All the credit should really go to the staff NCOs and NCOs," he said.





The Air Medal is presented for meritorious achievement in







## Off Duty Marines set drug-free models for Kona kids

Standing with a group of leathernecks, Cpl. Horace Miller, a communications Marine from Station Operations and Maintenance Squadron, prepared for an upcoming mission and

checked his essential gear.
"I got candy, gum, old cammie blouses and trousers, chevrons and rifle badges," he said, but then realized something else after checking through his gifts. "Oh man, I forgot my lunch!"

Miller was one of over 30 Air Station Marines who flew via two CH-46 Sea Knight helicopters from Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-262 to Kailua-Kona on the Big Island to visit the local YMCA chapter. They are part of a continuing effort by Station Marines to not only show area kids what being a Marine is like, but, more importantly, to emphasize the importance of staying in school and staying away from drugs.

According to LtCol. Tho-mas Messere, commanding officer of Headquarters and Headquarters Squadron, although this was the first mission to Kailua-Kona it's the fourth to the Big Island, and many more are planned. Three missions have already been completed at Hilo schools.

"We're not there to re-cruit," he emphasized. "Our purpose is to complement the drug awareness program that already exists in schools, using an indirect approach to reach the kids."

This indirect approach includes first "getting their attention," like using the helicopters to drop in.

An ocean-side Kona soccer field served as the LZ. The Marines then set up stations to demonstrate Marine Corps life and equipment.

The two Sea Knights were at center stage in the middle of the field.

Approximately 70 YMCA kids ages 5 through 10 participated in the event, but passersby in the park added their kids to the crowd.

This is the first time the Marines have come to Kona for the YMCA like this," said Arnold Castillo, YMCA summer camp director. "All the kids have been excited for days, constantly asking if today was the day the Marines were coming.

The wide-eyed youngsters were walked around the field to each station, learning about MOPP gear, first aid, drill, radio communication,

the lensatic compass and, in what proved to be the highlight of their day, taking a tour on the helicopters.

The Marines at each station made it a hands-on learning experience for the summer camp kids.
At the NBC station, one

Marine donned chemical gear to MOPP level four as Lorraine Meyer, SOMS NBC NCO, explained to the kids the gear's purpose. As questions started to fly, Meyer showed them how to drink from the field protective mask, explained you couldn't eat with one on, and gave the kids the chance to try one on them-

"You look like a space alien!" one child said to another, eyes peering out from plastic eyepieces.

At the first-aid station, HM2 Debra Skinner, Branch Medical Clinic, showed lifesaving techniques to a group of kids, and set up litter races to teach the proper way to carry wounded on a litter. With a child on the litter, Marines and kids

alike teamed up to carry it 80 feet round-trip in a best two out of three challenge.

At the same time across the field, LCpl. Ruth Plaza, H&HS disbursing clerk, was busy teaching the fundamentals of drill to three girls, coaxing them through facing and column movements, and parade rest.

"I'm having so much fun," Plaza exclaimed, "I would volunteer for this anytime. It lets you be a kid again."

Helicopter crew chiefs Cpl. Martin Colburn and LCpl. Armando Urrutia, both of HMM-262, had their hands full with curious kids wanting to know everything about their aircraft.

"Some wanted to know where the self-destruct' button was," Urrutia said. "Others asked what we did if we were flying and had to go to the bathroom really

"They also wanted to know what all the red buttons did," Colburn added. "And

if people jump out the back."
"We try and get across
four fundamental things about being a winner and getting ahead, no matter what you do," explained Messere. "These things are getting a good education, setting goals, staying away from drugs, and developing self-discipline."

For her part in the drug awareness mission, Cpl. Lareatha Nelson, H&HS Motor Transport, made up some marching songs on the helo ride over to Kona. Later, as she marched kids around the

field, their shrill voices cried out her songs in unison:

"Did you know that staying in school Is in the Book of Golden Rules? Cutting class is not the way To make the grades and graduate."


"Always try to do your best The world will put you to the test. Doctor, lawyer or Marine You can't do drugs - you've got to be clean. Whatever you do, wherever you go, Don't take drugs, just say no!"

Many Marines brought gifts to give to the kids. LCpl. Wally Snyder, H&HS disbursing clerk, was so impressed with the spirit of 6-year-old Maikaii Kaiawi that he presented him with a Good Conduct Medal.

"I asked him what he wanted to be when he grows up," Snyder explained, "and he immediately said either an entomologist (study of insects) or an ichthyologist (study of fish)."



### Record time highlights event

An under the weather Cliff Rigsbee led a field of 281

athletes Sunday morning in winning the 9th Annual Windward Triathlon at the Air Station. His time lopped two minutes off local triath-lon legend Ruben Chappins'

old course record, as he splashed into Kaneone Bay at 6:20 a.m. and broke the tupe at 9:41. His 3:21:09 was fast enough to get him home in time for cornflakes.

The race started in a calm Kaneohe Bay, adjacent to Hangar 101. After a one-mile swim, the athletes mounted bicycles and rode to Hawaii Kai and back — a 50-mile round-trip — then finished with a ten-miler in traditional lousy Hawaiian running weather: hot and humid.

The Windward Triathlon was the last chance for many of the athletes to qualify for the Ironman World Championship Triathlon, which will be held later this year in Kailua-Kona on the Big Island and televised nationally. The top two finishers in each category—provided they met qualifying-time slandards—qualified for the Ironman.

And Rigsbee seems to be ready, though of course he'd be a long-shot at best to win the granddaddy of all triathlons. He won last month's Hawaii Timman Triathlon, barely missing that course record and beating Chappins, who then had a virus himself and was still recovering from that race Sunday.

Rigsbee crossed the line and clenched his fists in relief, later expressing some surprise that he pulled it off with a nagging cold that had been bothering him for two days and weakened him during the race.

Rigsbee hardly showed it, however, as the 38-year-old surged into the lead about four miles into the bike leg. He said after the race that he finally felt confident in See TRIATHLON/B-8

### Game is finale of year-long effort


### Tickets on sale Sunday





## Rainbow Warriors

## Bows hoping to reverse road woes



One of the nation's premiere placekickers, Jason Elam returns to the Bows after a groin injury forced him to miss most of last season.

UH head football coach Bob Wagner and the Rainbows will face the toughest schedule in school history this year.

The Rainbows begin their season with four of their first seven games on the road, including an Oct. 19 match against Brigham Young in Provo. So if the Bows hope to be competitive in 1991, they'll have to reverse their habit of playing great at home and mediocre on the road.

The Bows also will end their season with a couple of tough games at home against Air Force on Nov. 23 and Notre Dame on Nov. 30.

Although Wagner has guided the Bows to three straight winning seasons, he must find a way to replace record-setting quarterback Garrett Gabriel and 10 other starters from a team that went 7-5 last season.

Aside from finding a

capable signal-caller, another challenge for Wagner may be with the offensive line, which tost three of its starters (including Leo Goeas, now with the San Diego Chargers) from last year, and is battling a lot of bad luck.

Two back-up offensive linemen, Matt Anoal and Ala Ala, have already been declared academically ineligible for the season, while guard Peter Viliamu sustained a broken hand this summer. Also, Shawn Ching recently underwent


arthroscopic surgery to repair damaged cartilage in his right knee, but is expected back for the season opener.

ordinator Paul Johnson, the Bows' offense ranked 19th overall in the nation last year, 29th in passing. Meanwhile, the defense quietly finished 42nd.

### **OFFENSE**

Replacing last year's record-setting quarterback Garrett Gabriel may be the toughest assignment the Bows have this year.

Gabriel, who set 32 school passing records and tied four others, will be sorely missed because of his experience and grasp of Johnson's

spread offense.

Stepping In to fill the void will be sophomore Michael Carter (5-10, 220), who enjoyed a solid spring performance. Carter played some last season, completing six of 22 passes for 56 yards and one touchdown. He also accounted for 254 yards on 39 rushes and one touchdown - a 31-yard gallop against Cal-State Fullerton.

if Carter fails, look for Ivin Jasper (6-1, 190) to get a shot.

Injuries plagued the offensive linemen for most of last year, so the Bows are counting on an injury-free '91 season.

Senior Shawn Ching (6-0, 280), an All-WAC candidate, will be back at center, Mitch Kaalalii (6-4, 280) shifts from tackle to guard this season, and is also considered All-WAC material. Peter Pale (6-4, 270) will be at the other guard spot, while Doug Viaoleti (6-3, 260), Paul Manera (6-3, 250) and Travis Fonseca (6-4, 260) will fight it out for the tackle spots.

The multi-talented Jeff Sydner (5-8, 175) returns at the slot back position and figures to be the main man in the Bows' running scheme.

A junior this season, Sydner finished fifth in the nation last year in allpurpose running (163.17 ypg) and punt returns (12.1 ypr), and is considered to be Hawaii's first Heisman Trophy candidate

Tom Heffernan (5-8, 195) and Jeff Newman (5-11, 183) will battle it out for the other slot back post

The lone back in the Bows run-and-shoot will once again be Jamal







KANSAS CITY CHIEFS (11-5, 2nd in AFC West)

At quarterback, the Chiefs have one of those ageless wonders. Steve DeBerg returns for his 15th season after completing one of his best. DeBerg (6-3, 214) finished third in the AFC in passing efficiency, completing 258 of 444 of his passes for 3,444 yards.

In Kansas City, the word starts with a Barry and ends in a nightmare. At running back, the Chiefs have Barry Word who rushed for 1,015 yards and four TDs and the Nigerian Nightmare Christian Okoye who added 805 yards and seven TDs.

Defensively, the Chiefs are loaded with good, young talent.

Linebacker Derrick Thomas is flashy and gifted, and the secondary includes two Pro Bowl corners - Albert Lewis and Kevin Ross.

#### SEATTLE SEAHAWKS

(9-7, 3rd in AFC West) Leading the way will be big Derrick Fenner (6-3, 228), who ran for 859 yards and 14 TDs, and

John L. Williams, who added 714 yards rushing and 73 receptions.

The quarterback position looks to go to Dave Kreig once again. The 11year veteran threw for 3,194 yards and 15 TDs, but was intercepted 20 times.

The defense did a respectable job last season and looks to improve.

The line features Cortez Kennedy (6-3, 393) and Eric Hayes (67 297), as well as 34-yearold veteran Jacob Green, who still had enough kick left in him to dump opposing quarterbacks 12.5 times.

The linebackers were hit by injuries, but appear to be a solid crew when healthy.

### SAN DIEGO CHARG-

(6-10, 4th in AFC West) The Chargers are hoping for more improvement out of Billie Joe Tolliver (6-1, 218), even though the third-year veteran completed 216 of 410 passes for 2,574 yards. He also threw 16 TDs.

But for Tolliver to improve, his receivers will have to hang on to the ball a lot more. Anthony Miller (63 catches for 933 yards, 7 TDs) is multitalented, but even with last year's impressive numbers he sometimes suffered from a case of the dropsies

Defensively, the Chargers can cause a poweroutage for many opponents. Defensive ends Leslie O'Neal and Lee Williams combined for 21 sacks last year, and Burt Grossman has 18 sacks in his last 23 games.

#### **DENVER BRONCOS**

(5-11, 5th in AFC West) John Elway (6-3, 215) is coming off a respectable year in which he passed for 3,526 yards and 15 TDs. He also completed a career-high .586 of his passes, so things could be looking

The ground game got a boost in the form of Bobby Humphrey, who gained 1,202 yards, fifth best in the NFL.

The defense line needs help, and No. 1 draft pick Mike Croel (6-2, 231) may fit in here.

Linebacker Karl Mecklenburg (6-3, 240) returned to the inside linebacker position after a short stint on the outside. and that's good news for Bronco fans. Mecklenburg is better suited for the inside.



Darryl Green is still the fastest and best corner-back in the league, and he's joined by fellow corner Martin Mayhew, who frustrated enemy quarterbacks last season with seven thefts.

The strength seems to be in one person — line-backer Tim Harris. Harris (6-6, 258) is big, dominating and flamboyant. The question, though, is whether or not contract renegotiations will keep him away from the playing field.

#### **DETROIT LIONS**

(6-10, tied for 2nd in the NFC Central)

The Lions figure to be exciting this season, thanks to the likes of Barry Sanders. A truly gifted runner, Sanders (5-8, 220) led the league in rushing with 1,304 yards and 13 TDs.

At quarterback, former USC star Rodney Peete figures to get the nod over Andre Ware.

Defensively, the Lions are solid in the linebacking corps, and decent in their line and secondary.

Chris Spielman remains one of the best linebackers in the game.

At safety, William White had an outstanding year, but the jury is still out on Bennie Blades, the team's top pick in '88.

#### TAMPA BAY BUCCA-NEERS

(6-10, tied for 2nd in the NFC Central)

The Bucs continue to bank their future on The Franchise, Vinny Testaverde. Although Testeverde passed for 2,818 yards and 17 TDs, he still suffers from the interception bug (18). He has made progress in the last two years, but Testeverde must prove that he can win now.

There is talent at the wide-out positions in Mark Carrier and Bruce Hill, and No. 2 pick Lawrence Dawsey is a scrappy individual who may also help out here.

On defense, Broderick Thomas (6-4, 245) and Keith McCants (6-3, 255) remain the keys. McCants figures to play some on the line this year with Reuben Davis and Jim Skow joining him.

SANFRANCISCO 49ERS (14-2, 1st in the NFC West)

With veteran Joe Montana at the helm, the 49ers should never be counted out. Arguably the finest to ever play his position, Montana enjoyed another fantastic year, passing for 3,944 yards and 26 TDs.

Letting go of Roger

Craig came as a shock to most of the 49er fans. No one's quite sure whether Dexter Carter (460 yards, 4.0 average) can handle the week-to-week pounding of the NFL with such a small frame (5-9, 170).

Jerry Rice is still the finest receiver in the NFL. Last year, Rice hung on to 100 balls for 1,502 yards and 13 TDs.

The 49er defense doesn't usually get the credit it deserves, but it's a key reason the team has been so competitive throughout the years.

The defensive line is strong, with Pierce Holt (6-4, 280) and Kevin Fagan (6-3, 260) flanking Michael Carter (6-2, 285). Dennis Brown, Jim Burt and Larry Roberts are the reserves.

NEW ORLEANS SAINTS (8-8, 2nd in the NFC West)

Steve Walsh took over the signal-calling responsibilities and completed passes worth 2,010 yards and 12 TDs. Still, he doesn't look like the answer.

The defense is strong all-around.

Lineman/Renaldo Turnbull (6-4, 248) is a good pass rustier. Defensive end Wayne Martin (6-5, 275) and nose tackle Jim Wilks (6-5, 275) return to help.

The linebacking position is deep and talented. Rickey Jackson, Pat Swilling, Vaughan Johnson and Sam Mills are as good a corps as one will find.

LOS ANGELES RAMS (5-11, tied for 3rd in the NFC West)

The Rams need quarterback Jim Everett to take the team by its horns and lead the way. Statistically, Everett had a fine season, passing for 3,989 yards and 23 TDs. However, he was erratic when forced to play catch-up.

Evertt has fine receivers in Henry Ellard (76 for 1,294 yards) and Willle "Filpper" Anderson (51, 21.5 average).

Defensively, the Rams hope top pick Todd Lyght out of Notre Dame bolsters the secondary. Anthony Newman, Pat Terrell and Jerry Gray round out the unit.

The linebacking unit is solld with Kevin Greene (6-3, 247) and Fred Strickland (6-2, 250).

ATLANTA FALCONS (5-11, tied for 3rd in the NFC West)

Quarterback Chris Miller, when healthy, is a good one. He's still developing, but last season he posted good numbers: 2,735 yards passing, 17 TDs. The Falcons need continued improvement if they hope to improve on last year's mark of 5-11.

At wide receiver, Andre Rison is one of the best. Last year, he hauled in 82 passes for 1,208 yards and 10 TDs. If he continues to produce that kind of results, the Falcons will go places.

Even with the colorful Deion Sanders on defense the Faicons struggled, and must improve on their 28th ranking in pass defense.



spread, double-slot offense, and the coach expects good things from his new quarterback.


"He's a good athlete," Kane said of Tilton. "He's also got compusure and a good head."

"The game will give us a good stick to gauge our season on," said Kane.

#### KAILUA

Head coach Alex Kane returns for another year at the helm and must figure out a way of replacing a last year's quarterback, Gilbert Rezentes.

"We're gonna be very green," Kane said of this year's squad.

Key returnee Robert Yamashita will get the first shot at Rezentes' old job. Last season, Yamashita played well after Rezentes was sidelined with an injury.

John Limahai Is gone from the backfield, but running back Laramie DeSoto returns to cause defenses problems with his quickness.

Other returnees are offensive lineman Marcus Malepeal, tight end Alan Awana, defensive lineman Kimo Woelfel and defensive back John Williams.

"I just hope we can be competitive," Kane said about the upcoming season.

#### KAISER

Last season's 3-5 record was a disappointment for head coach Gary Clark and the Mules. The fact is the Mules were better than their record might indicate.




