

# From the Commander's Desk:

Dear friends and family,

It has been a warm two months in Helmand, with the temperature often soaring above 110 degrees. Your Marines and Sailors have continued to work tirelessly and pick up momentum as we move well into the second half of the year. We have passed significant milestones in our advisor capacity with the Afghans as well as our retrograde and redeployment efforts, and we have taken the time to pause to remember some of our fallen heroes.





Afghanistan post-2014 under Resolute Support. However, regardless of the outcome we know our mission in Helmand will come to a close by the end of this year. Your Marines and Sailors are working tirelessly to ensure a responsible transition of the facilities at Camps Bastion and Leatherneck to the Afghans, remediate the land and buildings that will not be transferred, and set the Afghan forces up for success in their fight against the Taliban while we safely retrograde our equipment and redeploy our personnel. We will also maintain the highest level of vigilance to ensure both our external and internal security.

During June, the Taliban launched a major attack in northern Helmand, and while the situation was fluid and checkpoints changed hands multiple times, the Afghan National Security Forces (ANSF) responded on their own and repulsed the Taliban's attacks. During the June 2013 fighting season, the ANSF had the lead for security but were backed up by coalition ground forces. This year they have done the fighting all on their own, with limited support from coalition advisors, air support and intelligence support. This is a major step forward for the ANSF, and while the fighting season is not over, we are cautiously optimistic.

There were two other major milestones in ANSF development. We lifted off our Afghan National Police Advisor Team (AN-PAT) from the provincial police headquarters in Lashkar Gah, marking the end of Level 1 police advising. The advisors at the Regional Corps Battle School also stepped back, and the Afghan instructors now conduct all the training at the school, which is the model in theater.

We have seen many changes within the command, and some of your loved ones have already returned home, while others have moved to Kandahar Airfield (KAF) to support our retrograde and redeployment process. Several units have redeployed and the Brigade Headquarters Group cased its battle colors. During this period, CLB-1 replaced CLB-7, HMH-366 replaced HMH-466, Sierra Battery 5/11 replaced Tango Battery 5/11, and VMM-261 left to support other requirements. On Aug.15, 1st Marines - in command of Task Force Belleau Wood - transferred authority to 1st Battalion, 2nd Marines, and the regimental headquarters is returning home.

Our hearts were heavy with the loss of four brave Marines: Staff Sgt. David Stewart, Sgt. Thomas Spitzer, Cpl. Brandon Garabrant and Cpl. Adam Wolff. These heroes gave their lives keeping the rest of us safe, and we will honor their sacrifice and keep them and their loved ones in our prayers.

We still have much work to do, and we will focus on the task at hand until the finish. We are increasingly going to expeditionary living measures, which may result in less frequent communication with your service member. Many of you have been taking care of the home front for more than eight months now, and you have our heartfelt thanks and admiration. You are constantly in our thoughts, and we know we could not accomplish this mission without your support.

# From the Sergeant Major:

Dear family and friends,

During the past two months, your Marines and Sailors have been extremely busy and very productive. Some units and personnel have finished their mission and redeployed, while some units have recently arrived in Helmand province to support the final efforts of the deployment.

Both when units arrive at Camp Leatherneck for the start of their deployment and when units are heading back to their home stations, I have the opportunity to speak with them. Speaking with the Marines and Sailors is the highlight of my time spent here in Afghanistan. Whether they are starting their deployment or ending it, the Marines' and Sailors' motivation and esprit de corps remain high.

In addition to various units starting or ending their missions here, there have been multiple other significant events during the past two months. Since our departure from the northern Helmand province, the Afghan

National Army 215th Corps' 2nd Brigade has been working diligently to hold security in the region. Despite a major offensive by the insurgents during late June, the ANA soldiers were able to maintain security in the region and fend off the attackers. Their resiliency during the fighting and their ability to take the fight to the enemy is a testament to the training they received from your Marines and Sailors and those advisors and mentors of deployments past.

As I am sure most of you know, the official results of runoff elections are currently being audited. During the start of the audit process, service members stationed throughout Afghanistan were requested to support getting ballots to the capital of Kabul. In true Marine fashion, the MEB-A team worked around the clock devising plans to accomplish the mission in a timely manner, and we did just that. Within days, we had helped our Afghan partners get the ballots from Helmand province to Kabul without incident.

The command recently held the quarterly board to select the Marine of the Quarter and Noncommissioned Officer of the Quarter. Several outstanding Marines were submitted for the honor. Sergeant Michael Scott, with Task Force Belleau Wood, was named the NCO of the Quarter, and Lance Cpl. Tyler Angus, with Marine Aircraft Group - Afghanistan, was named the Marine of the Quarter.

In the coming months many things will change here on Camp Leatherneck. The retrograde is in full swing here in Helmand and your Marines and Sailors continue to give 100 percent of themselves to get the mission accomplished. It truly takes a team effort to retrograde years' worth of equipment and gear from the battlefield, but the Commanding General and I know we will not only complete the mission, but do it to perfection as Marines always do.

Lastly, during the past two months, four Marines paid the ultimate sacrifice while conducting combat operations in Helmand province. While we will miss these brave Marines, they, and those who have gone before them, will never be forgotten and will continue to live in our thoughts and memories.

The Sailors of Combat Logistics Battalion 7 completed their mission Aug. 1 and handed over responsibilities of the logistics combat element to CLB-1. While deployed, CLB-7's Surgical Company continued to train and refine their skills by participating in base-wide drills. They also worked with their UK counterparts helping to improve all immediate actions in the event of a mass casualty aboard Camp Leatherneck. The Forward Resuscitative Surgery System (FRSS), which is responsible for complex surgical cases, ended their mission at Camp Dwyer. Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron 466 recently redeployed and handed over their duties to HMH-366. Both CLB-7 and HMH-466 did amazing work while deployed, especially during the retrograde of the last Marines and Sailors from Nimroz province as well as those who left Sangin.


