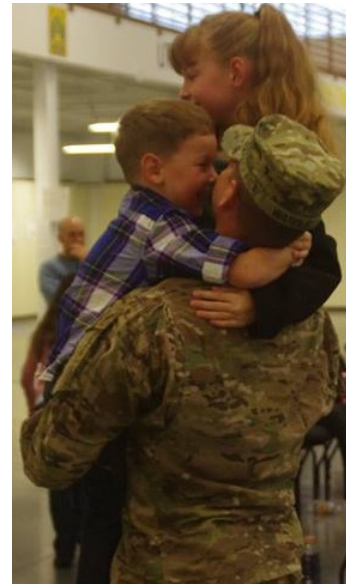

Forward Support Company—Providers “First in Support!”

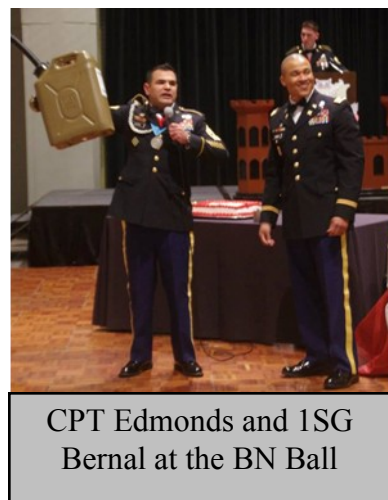
From the Commander's Desk:

1ST Platoon “Gladiators”

The Gladiators have continued their streak of excellence this past quarter. 1st PLT began and completed construction of the Gray Army Airfield (GAAF) Rapid Refuel Point Pad, hauling over 1000 cubic yards of materials with dump trucks, clearing with bulldozers, leveling the pad with graders and loaders, and compacting with drum rollers. The two week long project improved the 72' x 84' x 2' gravel pad, to prevent future flooding. 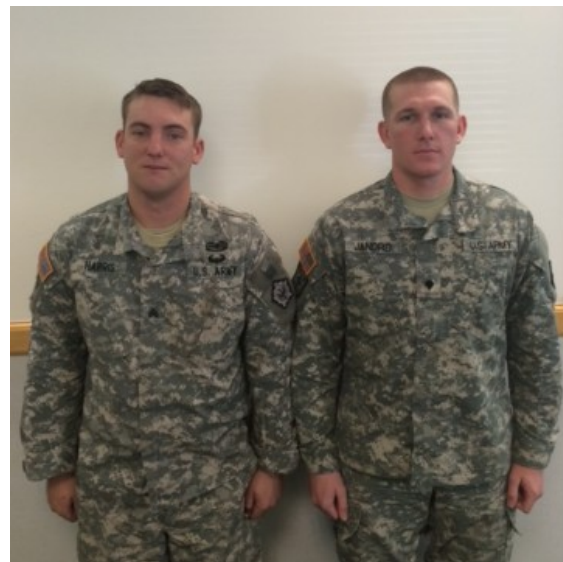

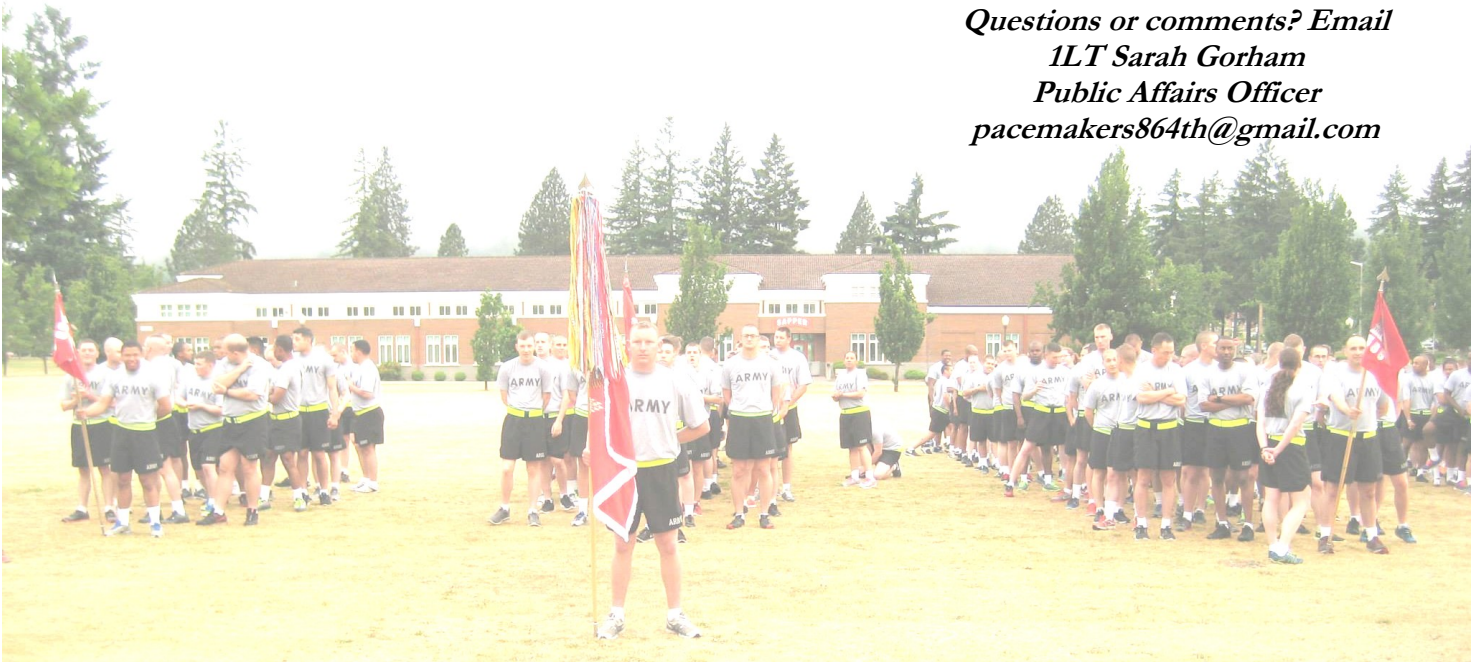
