

### You and the Self Inspection Program

As most of you are aware, in April 2012 the 133rd AW will go through an Air Mobility Command directed



Compliance Inspection that will evaluate and measure ongoing compliance with a wide range of laws, Air Force Instructions, and policies.

I thought this would be a good time to discuss the importance of the Wing's Self Inspection Program in preparing for the CI, and more importantly, the role the SIP plays to ensure the utmost safety and efficiency in all of our day to day activities.

Highlighting the vital role of the SIP in the compliance picture, AFI 90-201, IG Activities states: "Selfinspection provides commanders with a tool for internal assessment of unit health and complements external assessments...Basic responsibility for problem solving and the corrective action process resides at the lowest appropriate command level."

Although some may view the SIP as a management imposed burden, it does serve as a problem-solving tool that analyzes, corrects, and prevents noncompliance, error, defect, and deviation from reoccurring. It ensures our output or products, Tactical Airlift and Expeditionary Combat Support, are of the highest quality, and that we are taking good care of our members and their families. Built around a new data base called Management Internal Control Toolset, commonly referred to as MICT, the program is a structured process that turns management review into leadership action.

The Wing's SIP is responsible for ensuring compliance, quality, safety, readiness, and reliability. When discussing how the 133rd should prepare for

the inspection with the AMC IG and other ANG Wings, the common theme is "Outstanding" units all had effective SIPs, and more importantly, leadership that understood the important link between regulatory compliance and mission performance.

To ensure compliance in our respective areas, time and effort will need to be expended learning how to use these new tools and completing checklists. CIs are open book tests and our MICT checklists, if executed properly, will have the answers to those questions.

The 133rd AW will be hosting a Yellow Ribbon Reintegration 60-day Post Deployment event on Sept. 19, 2011 in Duluth. Eighteen 133rd AW members along with several 148th Fighter Wing Airmen, accompanied by some spouses, participated in an event in August. Many were deployed in support of operations throughout the AFCENT AOR and returned within the last six months.

Speakers from TRICARE, Veterans Administration, County Veteran Services Office, and ESGR offered enrollment and details on benefits. A Military Family and Life Specialist discussed reintegration advice regarding communication and emotions post deployment. Additionally, a financial advisor provided guidance on smart spending habits and long-term investing. **Col. Greg Haase**, Wing commander and other leaders also contributed to the event in August.

To celebrate 90 years since being established, the 133rd Airlift Wing held an air expo here July

16, 2011. The base welcomed over 40 aircraft, several of which guests were encouraged to get a hands on tour. There were also several family-friendly activities and demonstrations by the 133rd AW along with other organizations and other branches of the U.S. military.

On Jan 17, 1921 the 109th Air Observation Squadron, which would later become the 133rd AW, became the first federally recognized National Guard aviation unit. The last 90 years have seen many changes for the Wing. Many people and events were honored and fondly remembered during the event by members both past and present.

The expo officially began with a rumbling entrance by members of the Minnesota Patriot Guard. The riders dismounted and held a giant flag for the arrival of the official party and the singing of the National Anthem. Once the expo officially started the weather began to cooperate and several thousand people joined in the festivities.

The Air Force Honor Guard Drill Team really got things going with the first of two performances. The preciseness and talent the airmen showed stunned the crowd as they tossed their weapons in the air and kept perfect time with their maneuvers. The precision was definitely noticed as their captain walked through a gauntlet with the members twirling their weapons with bayonets inches from his body. They performed two



shows during the day and the crowds enjoyed their performances. **Col. Greg, Haase**, commander of the 133rd AW, said the drill team performance was truly a statement of our core values as Airmen.



ir Force One brought

Wing on August 30, 2011, only
two weeks since his last visit to the
Minneapolis – St. Paul area and the
Minnesota Air National Guard base
at the airport.

The presidential visits were for a three-state bus tour on Aug. 15 and a speech to the 93rd Annual Conference of the American Legion in Minneapolis on Aug. 30, according to the White House.

The president flies in a VC-25A, which is a highly customized Boeing 747-200B, and it is the job of the 133rd Airlift Wing to support the commander-in-chief, his aircraft, and all of the agencies associated with the visit.

This support includes Airmen from almost every group on base. Maintenance and Operations provide for the big jet and other aircraft associated with the visit.

Arrangements for communications, base security, public affairs and ramp logistics are just some of the tasks to be coordinated with Secret Service and White House staff.

After placing the chocks under the front wheels on Aug. 15, **Senior Airman Quinn Brophy**, a maintenance crew chief with the 133rd Aircraft Maintenance

Squadron said, "touching Air Force One was one of the top experiences of my military career."

The White House and the Secret Service thanked the 133rd AW for their professionalism and cooperation, which was essential to the mission's success.

During both visits to the 133rd AW, Mr. Obama spent a lot of time with the Airmen, family members and other well-wishers in a greeting area where he shook hands, signed autographs and exchanged words of thanks for the support.


