A Note from CSM Lawrence May

Command Sgt. Maj. Lawrence G. May, 91st Training Division spoke about his perception of the 91st TD, his experiences, and how they will guide him in shaping the future of the division.

"91st has a great history. I'm still amazed to read about the history from WWI to WWII and through to the present. It's a very prestigious unit to be a part of."

"It's an exciting new adventure for me," he added. "Because I've always been in troop units. I've never really worked in a training unit before. I'm used to being a customer on the training end and bringing my units through training. So, for me to be able to help shape the training for other units is exciting. It's something I haven't done."

May's background gives him a specific ability to add perspective to the 91st's mission.

"I think I bring a different perspective than someone who would have come up through the training arena their whole career. For a while, it will be a sit back and see how things work, try and understand why they work the way they do, and then try to make some improvements."

"Every Soldier does it," he said. "We always sit there and say, 'boy, they should have done this, or they should have done that.' Well, this is my chance to put up or shut up and help the *should haves* make those things happen."

He discussed his intentions further, regarding his role in working with visiting units.

"When units come in," May stated. "I think they believe it's a turn-key operation. They don't understand that there is some train-up and some preparation that needs to be done on their end. I fell into that, too, early on in my career. I think I would like and make them understand why the training environment is built the way it is, and help them understand what they can do better to help us provide a good experience for them." and make them understand what they can do better to help us provide a good experience for them."

Virtual Staff Ride Battle of La Fortuna



A staff ride is a historical study of a campaign or battle that involves a classroom phase and a field study phase at the site of the battle or segments of the campaign. The Army's Center for Military History (CMH) conducts many of these. The booklets or further information can be accessed using the following link http://usacac.armv.mil/cac2/historical-support-sr.asp A virtual staff ride uses the same mythology however due to access restriction the terrain is replicated in a virtual environment for use in the classroom. The 91st Division Historian has created one of these virtual staff rides for the battle of La Fortuna which occurred 8-10 October 1944. This battle was an important gateway to the breaking of the Gothic line in the Apennine Mountains in Italy during World War Two. This battle was fought by I Company, 361st Infantry Regiment, 91st Infantry Division. During the battle the company was almost destroyed as a German force approximately the size of a Battalion descended upon them. The previous month's "Faces of the Fallen" article spotlighted one of the casualties which occurred during this battle. Members of the 91st Division Headquarters, Headquarters Company AGR staff have been busy giving back to the communities surrounding Fort Hunter Liggett. As was previously reported they had participated in an effort to feed the homeless in the downtown Monterey area but they have continued their efforts to other venues. In an effort to spread their volunteering around Major Jesus Cruz, 1st Lieutenant Larel Bonner and MSG Thaddaeus Duke worked as coaches and assistant coaches for Lockwood Middle School. MAJ Cruz was acting as the 5th and 6th grade head coach, 1LT Bonner for the 7th and 8th grade head coach and MSG Duke served as assistant coach for both. The High School did not previously have a football program so their efforts provided an opportunity to play a sport which was not being previously offered. They coached from September to November 2015. MAJ Cruz commented that "it was a chance to give the kids in our area an opportunity to play a sport that would otherwise not have been available. It was a great experience." 1LT Bonner said that they additionally "held the kids to a high standard where they had to maintain a GPA higher than the average high school student... We taught the kids sportsmanship, team building, and how to balance school, football and life." MSG Duke also stated that they are looking forward to expanding the coaching program to include basketball starting in a few weeks then football again next year.
