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

# Thrift Store reopens in Enterprise Hall after renovations

The Navy Marine Corps Relief Society Thrift Store reopened in Enterprise Hall Oct. 12 after a complete overhaul of its products and a redesign of the layout.

The new hours for the Thrift Store will be Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10 a.m. -1 p.m. and the first Saturday of each month from 10 a.m. -2 p.m. The store is manned entirely by volunteers, and it was a group of them that decided to give the store a face-lift this year.

Melodie Weddle, director of the NMCRS at Washington Navy Yard, credited the team of volunteers who cleaned up the store for their hard work and the incredible results they turned out.

"Our volunteers came in and revitalized the space, getting rid of merchandise that wasn't selling and redesigning the layout to better use this terrific space," she said. "Kim Adams, one of our volunteers, is fabulous at interior design and staging. The entire team spent a lot of time and effort to turn this store around and breathe new life into it."

The Thrift Store offers those on base a chance to buy affordable items and give back to service members in need at the same time.

"When you purchase items from the thrift shop, 100 percent of the funds go back into the bank to help our service members when they need it," Weddle explained. "The first function of the Thrift Store though is to give our service members a little more

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# Fire Department visits CDC I for fire safety week

Naval District Washington Fire and Emergency Services spent some time with the children at CDC I Oct. 11 in order to teach them the basics of fire safety.

The firefighters spent time at each of the CDCs on base as part of their yearly training to familiarize the children with what to do in the case of an emergency.

Victor Proctor, fire inspector for NDW fire and emergency services, said one of the hardest things for the firefighters is to keep children calm and unafraid during an emergency.

"Today we're doing some training and getting the kids used to seeing firefighters in their suit, and getting them used to the fire truck as well," he said. "One of the biggest problems we have is the children being scared when we show up, and when we try to rescue them they will run from us. That makes it really difficult to rescue them from a life threatening issue if they ever need us."

October is fire prevention month, and offers the fire department a good reason to spend some time with the children on base to reaffirm the fact that they are here to help.

"We do this training during October because it's fire prevention month, and it allows us to give them some fire safety tips and some handouts at the same time," Proctor explained. "We teach the children the basics too, like stop drop and roll, and how to call 9-1-1 in an emergency. One of the other big topics is to teach them to pull over to the right when you see a fire truck behind you with its sirens on. It helps to get the kids to remind their parents while they're driving."

For firefighters like Proctor, the best part of the job is being able to help people, and to see the children's reaction when they get to meet a firefighter, he said.

"The best part is just the face-to-face time, and the chance to get out here and show them that we're friends, and we're here to help," he said. "We really just want them to know we're here for them, and don't be afraid to call us in an emergency."

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## JBAB honors Breast Cancer Awareness Month

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, an annual campaign to raise public consciousness of the disease as well as prevention through early detection and treatment.

The 579th Medical Group clinic is an education and referral source on Joint Base Anacostia–Bolling, providing general information about breast cancer and specialty referral.

"We are the first line in prevention through referral services, patient education and encouraging self-advocacy here at JBAB," said Air Force Maj. Catarina Schlosser, director of medical management.

There are about 200 enrolled women on the base eligible to receive preventative care

through a 'well woman' exam – an elective annual exam that includes a preventative breast screening.

Schlosser added communication and trust are cornerstones to prevention. Patients are encouraged to disclose all of their health concerns during an exam as well as ask questions so that the provider can devise the best prevention plan.

"Start the discussion at age 40 [with the provider] to determine when breast cancer screening is right for you," she explained. "Some women are at a higher risk for developing breast cancer and consequently require earlier screening than others."

While the U.S. Preventative Services Task Force recommends mammograms for women starting at age 50, breast exams can be done at any time in a woman's life by herself or her medical provider.

In fact, Schlosser added that most medical professionals encourage patients to perform self-breast exams to become familiar with how their breasts normally feel, which can help them better detect abnormalities.

Although the disease is rare among men, they make up a small percentage of breast cancer diagnoses.

"When everyone thinks breast cancer they automatically think women, but it's not just them. Men can get breast cancer too," Schlosser said.

According to the World Health Organization, breast cancer is the most common cancer among women in the world.

# U.S. provides initial critical aid in Haiti

Since arriving Oct. 5, U.S. service members assigned to Joint Task Force Matthew have been operating around the clock, providing aid to citizens of western Haiti.

The team has been conducting 24-hour operations at the request of Haiti's government to support the U.S. Agency for International Development's disaster relief efforts in the critical early stages of the response.

"USAID requested the unique capabilities of the military because we needed to transport critically needed relief supplies to the affected areas," said Tim Callaghan, the leader of the USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team. "Because of the airlift they provided, we were able to move food, water and other supplies — things that helped save lives — to communities that needed it most." U.S. Southern Command established JTF Matthew under the command of Navy Rear Adm. Cedric Pringle, the deputy director of Joint Interagency Task Force South, to oversee U.S. military efforts in Haiti. To date the JTF has moved more than 480 metric tons of relief supplies to Haitians whose communities were devastated by Hurricane Matthew on Oct. 4 causing more than 1,000 deaths.

"This is an opportunity to make a difference for someone else," Pringle said.

The task force is comprised of more than 400 military members and 20 aircraft, utilizing assets from all four branches of the military and the U.S. Coast Guard to ensure aid reaches those in need. Supplies such as rice, cooking oil, hygiene kits and medical supplies arrive to an aerial port established by 134 Airmen from the 621st Contingency Response Wing based out of Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst, New Jersey.

"We brought the newly formed Contingency Response

Group-Rapid Port Opening Element-Defense Logistics Agency team into an operation for the first time, and we had the right team to make it work," said Air Force Col. Leslie Maher, the JTF Port Opening commander. "We have been thrilled with the group we have here. From the logistical side of the operation we have been the glue to make things happen."

The supplies are accounted for and loaded for transport to communities in need. Due to the remote geography of Haiti's Tiburon Peninsula, the materials are loaded into Army CH-47F Chinook, UH-60 Black Hawk, and Marine Corps CH-53E Super Stallion helicopters for delivery.

"The amount of time, effort and planning that these guys put into this relief operation is astonishing," said Navy Cmdr. Reggie E. Johnson, the JTF Matthew Future Operations officer. "They are truly making a difference for the people of Haiti who were most impacted — it was a rapid response with results."

The task force will continue to support USAID as necessary.
