During an interview on the flightline, Huddleston echoed Lieutenant Colonel Rendell Clark's earlier comments praising the F-16's multiple-role capability and strengths over the F-4. Clark added that the F-16 will significantly


an enemy in combat operations. The F-16 is a newer, sleeker, more highly sophisticated aircraft than the F-4. Many of the unit's pilots are presently attending schools to learn just how sophisticated the "Fighting Falcon" really is.

According to Tyus, the unit's remaining F-16's are expected to arrive prior to January 1, 1989. The 187th will house 20 Falcons when delivery is complete. He says the F-4's will be moved out on a one-to-one basis as the new aircraft arrive.

Tyus says the long-anticipated arrival of the F-16's sadly marks the end of an era for the unit, however. Because the F-16 is a single-seat fighter, the 187th will say goodbye not only to the F-4, but to many weapons systems

officers, or back-seaters, as well. Ceremonies marking the unit's official conversion to the F-16 are planned for Saturday, October 22. Tyus encourages family members to take part in this important event.





New Era Begins as Dannelly **Welcomes First Falcon**

Members of the 187th Tactical Fighter Group witnessed a bit of Air National Guard history as the unit's first F-16A "Fighting Falcon" touched ground at Dannelly Field on Sunday, May 1.

The F-16 and its escort of F-4's arrived shortly after 3:00 p.m. Colonel Ted Tyus led guardsmen in a ceremonial salute as Captain Robert Huddleston taxied the aircraft to its designated spot on the flightline.

Huddleston, who piloted the fighter from Nellis Air Force Base to its new home at Dannelly, emerged from the cockpit looking tired but pleased as fellow aircrew members applauded nearby.

After "presenting" the newlyacquired aircraft to the group commander, Huddleston greeted the crowd of guardsmen, photographers and reporters eager to see the unit's first F-16 at close

THINKING OF JOINING THE **AIR NATIONAL GUARD?**

You may have heard that Governor Kay Ivey signed into law a provision that will provide greater college tuition payment benefits to Alabama Air National Guard members. Eligible members can receive tuition assistance up to the average cost of tuition at an accredited in-state supported college or university. Here are some of the requirements:

> Guardsmen MUST complete Basic Training to be eligible.



Guardsmen MUST complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and have on file with the school before applying (https://fafsa.ed.gov/).

Guardsmen MUST use ALL State and Federal Education Benefits before ANGEAP can be applied



The benefit CAN be used for a Technical Certificate, Undergraduate, or Graduate Degree.

Guardsmen MUST remain in good standing with BOTH the Alabama National Guard and the post-secondary school they are attending (2.0 GPA).

The new law goes into effect September 1, 2017.
