OPERATION HOLIDAY CHEER ARRIVES AT OFFUTT

- Volunteers from the Bellevue-Offutt community volunteered their morning on Dec. 6 to stuff bags at the Olde Towne Bellevue Volunteer Firefighters Hall to bring sweet joy to the Airmen of Team Offutt as there were more than 40 volunteers who showed ur filling more than $500\ bags$ with a variety of sweet treats for the residents of Offutt's dormitories.

Once filled, the bags were boxed up and sent to Offutt where they were delivered by first sergeants to the dorms on base.

"This is one of my favorite events of the year," said Doris Urwin, an administrator at the Greater Bellevue Area Chamber of Commerce. "To me, being able to let the Airmen know we care for them and appreciate their service just seems a little more important

during the holidays.' The chamber, along with the Bellevue Economic Enhancement Foundation, actively start looking for donations 45 days prior to

the event but receive interest throughout the year.

Even Bellevue Public School students assisted with the operation. Students from kindergarten through sixth grade crafted hundreds of hand-written cards, cut in the shape of trees, elves and Santas, that thanked the Airmen for their service.

For some Airmen who are spending their holidays away from home, some for the first time, this bag of goodies is a welcome gift.

Base leadership went to Olde Towne to the Bellevue Volunteer Firefighters Hall and assisted in putting the **Operation Holiday Cheer** bags together.

"I am humbled and encouraged by the amount of support the community surrounding Offutt Air Force Base displays consistently year after year," said Chief Master Sgt. Brian Kruzelnick, 55th Wing command chief. "This time of year can be difficult for some of our Offutt members, but to have the community rally around them is priceless.

Each volunteer manned a station to place goodies

in the bags as they made their way around the room. When the bags came to the end of the tables, volunteers placed 25 bags in each box and sealed them to be delivered to the base later that day. This process takes more than 90 minutes.

The bags, which were donated by a local business, are sturdy enough to serve the Airmen as backpacks well after the bag is empty of treats. It's made of a heavy fabric with a drawstring top and embossed with the Holiday Cheer

When the Operation Holiday Cheer program began, they used paper bags, but there would be ripped and torn bags by the end. The new bags are tough enough for the Operation Holiday Cheer mission and after that Airmen can use them for other things.

"We couldn't do this without the support of everyone in the Bellevue-Offutt community," Urwin said. "I thank our donors and volunteers and wish our service members the best this holiday season."

Putting lifesaving skills to the test

- For one airman, a routine workout at the Offutt Field House turned into an opportunity to put his life saving skills to the test.

Airman 1st Class David Robb, 55th Security Forces Squadron elite guardsman, was starting his warm-up lap during his daily workout Nov. 15, 2017, when something caught his attention. Robb saw enlisted and civilian gym workers sprint past him.

"I know that usually when they do that it means something is going on, and by the way they were running, it was something serious," Robb said. "I picked up my pace and ran to the other side of the gym where I noticed there was a man lying on his back with an automatic defibrillator, or AED, attached to him and someone was in the process of doing chest compressions on him.'

After Robb identified himself as an emergency medical technician, he asked the person assisting the patient to temporarily stop chest compressions, then assessed the situation and found that the man had no pulse and wasn't breathing.

"I took over chest compressions and had the other gentleman maintain an open airway so he [the patient] could have a nice open airway," Robb said. "After about 45 seconds of chest compressions the AED said to 'step back from patient, analyzing'."

The AED analyzed the patient and advised a sho

"I continued with chest compressions for 5 to 10 seconds and once the AED was charged we stood back, pressed the button and the AED shocked the man," Robb said. "I continued to do chest compressions after that for an additional two

minutes." The AED analyzed the patient again and this time no shock was advised.

"At that point we did a quick assessment of the patient because he doesn't need chest compressions anymore," Robb said. "We checked his wrist for a pulse and he had a good strong pulse. He also start-

ed breathing again." In the span of minutes, Robb helped save a life -

Away for the holidays, on duty



'It's a huge work between the us and the [Installation Personnel Readiness] section, as well as all the unit deployment managers, to make sure we are getting everybody ready to go, trained up and deployed," said Capt. Justin Graham, 55th Logistics Readiness Squadron installation deployment officer.

Once a tasking is received, Graham's team coordinates the travel and works with those offices to identify personnel eligible for deployment.

On the deployment date, the IDRC coordinates the pickup of personnel and any required mobility bag equipment. The deploying personnel then process through the IDRC deployment processing line where they receive additional briefings and any last minute services prior to

boarding the plane. The processing line include representatives from chaplain and legal offices

personnel, finance, medical, who are available to provide information or services such as vaccinations and powers of attorney.

Continued from Page 1 something he had prepared for from his extensive CPR and EMT training.

In addition to the CPR training Robb is required to have as a security forces airman, he earned his national EMT certification in January 2015. The certification included specialized training in adult and infant CPR, and use of an AED.

"I'm coming to the end of my enlistment. I'm going to be separating soon and my ultimate goal is to become a firefighter. In order to become a firefighter you have to be a certified EMT," Robb explained.

Robb's father was a paramedic firefighter in Mesa, Arizona, and like his father, he always desired to help people.

In fact, Robb's desire to help the man at the gym didn't stop when the Bellevue Fire Department showed up and took the patient to a local hospital.

That evening, Robb went to the hospital to check on the man he helped rescue.

"I really wanted to see if I could offer any assistance," Robb said. "Growing up around firefighters, paramedics and police officers, [I know] the majority of the time when they go on a rescue and they do what they need to do, they drop the patient off at the hospital, and they never see them again. They don't know the outcome."

The patient's wife and a nurse were at the hospital and thanked him for what he did. Robb also cleared up some information that was not passed on to them, such as where and when the patient was found at the Offutt Field House.

This was the first time Robb assisted someone in cardiac arrest in the more than two and a half years

he's been EMT certified. "With me separating soon, and my goal to be a firefighter, I felt like I hadn't been put up to a challenge yet to see if I could really do this under pressure, in a real life situation," Robb said. "When the situation presented itself, I did what I could. When he [the patient] started breathing again and had a pulse. I was euphoric! I couldn't believe it. I don't think I came down from that euphoria for the rest of the day. I had

trouble sleeping that night, because I cannot believe it's finally happened.'

When Capt. Keith Saylors Jr., 55th Security Forces Squadron elite guard operations officer, received the news, he explained that he was a bit shocked because although Robb is a "steadfast defender, he is not always the most vocal person in the room."

"In most cases, he will not be the first person to raise his hand, but knows all of the answers," Saylors said. "On the other hand, his actions are not surprising. We teach our defenders from day one of training that they are security forces 24/7, 365 days a year, and to always be prepared to react to the adversary or provide support to those in need.

Robb stated that when he's on duty as an elite guardsman, he anticipates that things like this event could happen, but to him, rescuing someone during his off duty time seemed "completely out of the blue.

Robb also noticed something that concerned him.

"I noticed there was a large group of people, even when I went over to start doing compressions," Robb said. "Nobody was really doing anything except for one guy. I don't know if those people knew CPR,

afraid to get involved. To me it just doesn't make a whole lot of sense; if a person is in cardiac arrest. you can't do any more harm than what's being done." Robb also explained why he thinks people should learn CPR. "The reason it's so

but I also find that people are afraid to do it; they're

important to me is because

you never know when situations like this happen," Robb said. "They say that the average person in a non-rescue type profession will at least one time in their life be put in a situation where someone will be required to perform CPR. "The last thing I would

want is to be in that situation and think, 'man, I had the opportunity to take the training, but now I can't do anything.' To me that is a scary feeling."



Offutt's Tactical Air Navigation System upgraded

- The Tactical Air Navigation System, or TACAN, located on the flightline here, was replaced and upgraded as part of an Air Force wide \$43M modernization project Nov. 29

The TACAN is a beacon for aircraft within 200 nautical miles of the system providing aircrew the proper bearing and distance to assist them for their return flight to base.

The new system will increase reliability, and overall cost savings on maintenance, supportability and repair compared to the old system installed in 1994. It has a dual transmitter intersystem that the old TACAN did not provide and can provide 100 percent uptime rate, reducing overall downtime while enhancing

safe flight operations.

"The legacy system had become outdated and met the end of its service life due to a strained supply chain and outdated electronics," said Master Sgt. Nancy Murillo-Alvarez, 55th Operations Support Squadron NCO in-charge of air traffic control and landing systems. "The upgrade will definitely help with day-to-day operations due to increased reliability.'

Previously, Murillo-Alvarez's section had been responsible for providing support and maintenance to the legacy system, but the new TACAN changes that.

"The new TACAN will be remotely monitored and about 90 percent maintained by the regional maintenance center out of Oklahoma City," she said.

In addition to reducing

the maintenance requirements for the 55th OSS, the new system will enable the regional maintenance center to perform flight checks remotely as well.

"Monetary savings is behind the regional maintenance center concept and provides the Air Force a return on investment with the modernization," Murillo-Alvarez said. "An estimated 400 manpower positions will be superseded by the modernized system

Air Force wide." The bulk of the upgrade effort was led by Tech. Sgt. Anita Hooper and Staff Sgt. Brian Magee of the 55th OSS' air traffic control and landing systems team.

"Without prior project management experience, they worked very hard to comply with established deadlines for a successful project completion," Murillo-Alvarez said. "However, without the outstanding and timely support from agencies across Team Offutt to include the 55th Communications Squadron, 55th Logistics Readiness Squadron and especially the 55th Civil Engineer Squadron, the project's completion would not have been possible."

The upgrade initiative falls under the Navigational Aids Family of System modernization project managed by the Air Force Life Cycle Management Center, out of Tinker Air Force Base, Oklahoma. The project began in 2015 and is expected to conclude by 2020.

595th Group marks one year, looks to maximize capabilities

Commander of the group says they have met or exceeded nearly all goals

The 595th Command and Control Group celebrated its one year anniversary as a group in October 2017, and they've spent that year working to excel in their mission.

The group stood up in October 2016 in order to align under Air Force Global Strike Command and 8th Air Force.

The group's mission is to ensure U.S. strategic

deterrence and enable strategic assessment and global strike capabilities.

Col. Robert Billings, commander of the 595th CACG, said the group has met or exceeded almost all of its goals for their first year.

"It's been pretty impressive on how the group as a whole got together and said, 'OK, this is new how do we make it ours?"" Billings said. "They owned it, leadership set the goals and the plan, but the group owned it.

The group's goals are focused on four categories mission, families, weapon system advocacy, and Airmen leadership.

One of Billings' most important goals was to provide 100 percent aircrew manning for the group's mission, all day, every day.

"That's the main goal you don't want to mess that up," he said. "We provided our aircrew operators and maintainers for the secretary of defense, the National Air Operations Center, the Strategic Automated Command Control System. inter-continental ballistic missile air launch control systems and other Global Strike missions."

As Billings looks toward the group's second year, he is focused on maintaining the excellence at which the group has operated

"I would like to see increased support and sustainment," he said. "Because now you have the founding leadership members of the group starting to depart. We need to make sure the organization continues to move forward as new leadership arrives."

Maj. Andrew Kasperek, commander of the 595th

Strategic Communications Squadron, said that the realignment under GSC has allowed his squadron to connect with other units within the major command with similar goals and problems.

'We are realizing the partnerships and the synergies that were always available but unknown to us," he said. "There's really a call and a desire to lash together. We realized there are a lot of other people outside of our group doing similar work. We're figuring out who the other players are that are also struggling with similar problems, for years, and we come together and match up our solutions.'

Kasperek has also organized new training for his Airmen.

"We've been able to realize, over the last year, that we can leverage industries to be able to augment the training that is provided at technical school," he said. "We've sought out other training that Global Strike provides to round out our Airmen's training. We had never been to any of these trainings before.

and new routes for training has paid off for the group. The 595th SCS alone has won three MAJCOM level awards over the last year.

This focus on synergy

Billings said he is incredibly impressed with how the 595th CACG has performed since it stood up.

"It's just amazing what they do every day," Billings said. "Change is hard, and they've taken it in stride and executed the mission without failure. The nuclear mission isn't going away, and the professional nuclear warriors of the group keep it relevant."



offered to Offutt parents

through the Offutt Family

Advocacy Program. Dale Sundermann, FAP outreach manager and course instructor, said the courses will provide valuable learning opportunities often overlooked by

parents. "We spend time learning and studying things that we'll never use," Sundermann said. "Yet parenting and raising kids and our family is what we identify as most important in our

lives.' Sundermann said many parents approach parenting as something that comes naturally. However, courses like these offer proven techniques to help your child reach their full potential.

'If you're not learning to become a better parent, your kids are at a disadvantage in the classroom."

According to Sundermann, some of the biggest parenting challenges among military members can be beneficial to child development.

"If parents are deliberate about how they're parenting their kids, you can actually use a deployment to develop your kids to be better, not as something to simply get through," he said. "And we know how to do that."

The series of courses are conveniently offered from 4:40 – 5:30 p.m. at the Offutt Youth Center.

The first course, "Parenting Rewired," is scheduled for January 11 and uses the latest scientific research to provide valuable insight into why some parenting practices work and why some fail miserably.

"Parent-Child Communication" is scheduled for February 8 and focuses on developmental issues for various age groups. It addresses how you can help children process their feelings and how to effectively communicate with them.

"Raising Smart Children: It's not Magic" will be offered in two sessions, March 14 and 15. This fast paced and engaging course is designed to bring out the best in children by effectively using praise to foster growth.

Protect yourself from holiday theft

How can you work to keep the Grinch away this holiday season?

According to Papillion Police Chief Scott Lyons, a little common sense goes a long way.

"I think the worst thing people can do is get complacent," Lyons said. "They live in a great community and they get a false sense of security. We live in a different day and time. Unfortunately, there are criminals out there waiting to prey on you if you give them the opportunity."

Lyons said there are basic precautions people can take to avoid having a blue Christmas.

"Check and make sure all your doors on your house and car are locked before you go to bed each night," he said. "I think if people could get into a routine of doing that, they would avoid a lot of frustration."

Other tips for the holiday season:

 If you are shopping at multiple stores in the same location, change parking spots so thieves can't keep track of where your car and packages might be.

• Place packages in the trunk, not in the view of criminals.

Shop with others.Keep your purse/wallet

close.
• Carry only the credit

cards you intend to use.
• Break down the boxes from the gifts you receive

from the gifts you receive and throw them away. Don't leave them out and visible for criminals to see what new items you might have. • Stake down decorations

so it takes longer and is harder to steal.

Lyons added people also need to be aware of packag-

es being stolen from their porches.

"A lot of people are getting security cameras on their porch and the quality and speed of those has really improved," he said. "But if you don't have one of those, try and be at home when you're package is being delivered or have a neighbor pick it up for you."

Personal packages can be trickier, Bellevue Police Department Capt. Tom Dargy said, since they can't be tracked online. If you're sending someone a package, drop it off to be mailed by a company you trust, he said. Let the receiver know it's coming so they can look for it.

Credit card theft is also a concern during the holidays.

Dargy said the biggest mistake people make is saving their credit card and billing information online. If you don't input it every time, it's much easier for hackers to find. Even if you don't save it, though, they can still track it in other

Also, you should initial calls to your credit card company, to ensure you're really talking to them. If you receive a cold call, don't provide any information. Instead, Dargy said to hang up and call your credit card company to verify it was them.

Beware, some fraudulent websites may almost identically mock the real bank sites, Dargy said.

Getting robbed anytime of year is not a pleasant experience, but Lyons said that is magnified when it happens during the holiday season.

"It's tough to see things get stolen from under the Christmas tree this time of year," he said.

Good mental health critical to readiness

Mental health is a critical part of every Airman's medical readiness. Although many service members worry that seeking mental health care will negatively effect their career, the opposite is usually true. With early identification and the right treatment by a medical professional, most mental health issues get better quickly without any negative career impact.

Unfortunately the reverse is also true, says Maj.

Joel Foster, a psychologist and chief of deployment mental health for the Air Force Medical Service. Left untreated, even relatively minor mental health issues can become more serious, evolving into depression or suicidal thoughts and actions. These present serious risks for an Airman and an Air Force career.

"It's absolutely true that having an impaired mental state can negatively affect an Airmen's ability to complete their mission," said Foster. "People suffering from depression can experience symptoms like difficulty sleeping, fatigue, indecisiveness or poor decision making, and inability to focus. It's easy to see how these symptoms can put an Air Force career at risk."

Numbers bear this out. Complications from mental health issues are one of the most common reasons for medical evacuation of Airmen from theater.

"Most, if not all jobs in a

combat zone require high cognitive function," said Capt. Jordan Fields, an Air Force clinical psychologist at Wilford Hall Ambulatory Surgical Center at Joint Base San Antonio-Lackland. "Someone in a deployed environment can't afford to be distracted by depressive thoughts. This can decrease their reaction time, affect their ability to make decisions, and diminish their ability to prioritize things."

Deployed environments are often stressful and Airmen are isolated from their usual support network. Beginning deployment with even a low or moderate level of depression is a recipe for possible problems, says Fields.

"We always try to tackle mental health issues before deployment. A real challenge for us as mental health providers is getting patients to reach out to us before problems get so severe as to affect an Airman's readiness." The good news is that treatment for mental health issues is far more effective than most people realize. Once a patient is in treatment, they are very likely to see real improvement within four visits to a men-

tal health professional.

"People respond quite quickly to evidence-based treatments for depression. Weekly treatments usually lead to major improvement within a month," said Fields. "It's critical to get people in, start to change behaviors and give them some hope. Even patients with severe depression can experience significant relief quickly, and get back to

being mission-fit."

Depression pulls people away from family and friends, valued activities, and other engagements.

Treatment for depression focuses on rebuilding those connections. Simple things like renewing social activities, basic self-care activities, eating well, exercise, and sleep are critical parts of therapy. These deceptively simple actions can reverse the downward

spiral of depression.

"For many Airmen, the most challenging part of treatment is just coming through the door to begin," said Fields. "Not everyone who feels sad is depressed, and sadness is a common and even natural symptom of other traumatic events. For anyone struggling with depression, or other mental health issues, that first step to get treatment is the most important one they take."

Recent Air Force research shows that Airmen who seek earlier help for depression see better outcomes from therapy and fewer negative outcomes to their careers. Self-referral for mental health care can be very challenging, but more education will help break down some of those barriers.

"Every patient is different, but one constant we see is that depression usually doesn't get better on its own," said Foster. "Many depressive symptoms are self-perpetuating. If you feel alone, you are likely to isolate yourself. Social isolation keeps building. Patients shouldn't worry that something bad might happen if they seek help. They should worry about what might happen if they don't."
