Meet Dr. Mary Walker: The only female Medal of Honor recipient

Out of the nearly 3,500 Medal of Honor recipients, only one was a woman -- just one -- and her medal was actually rescinded just before she died.

In honor of Women's History Month, we're looking back on the life of that exceptional woman: Dr. Mary Walker, who helped change the face of medicine during the Civil War.

Walker was born in Oswego, New York, to abolitionist parents who encouraged her to pursue an education. She really embraced that idea and in 1855 graduated as a medical doctor from Syracuse Medical College.

Walker went into private practice for a few years, but then the Civil War broke out in 1861. She wanted to join the Army as a surgeon but wasn't allowed because she was a woman. Because of her credentials, she didn't want to be a nurse, either, so she chose to volunteer for the Union Army.

Helping However She Could

Walker worked for free at the temporary hospital set up at the U.S. Patent Office in Washington, D.C. She also organized the Women's Relief Organization to help the families of the wounded who came to visit them at local hospitals.

In 1862, Walker moved on to Virginia, this time treating the wounded at field hospitals throughout the state. In 1863, her medical credentials were finally accepted, so she moved to Tennessee, where she was appointed as a War Department surgeon. Her position was paid, and it was the equivalent of a lieutenant or captain.

Walker was captured in April 1864 by the South and held as a prisoner of war for about four months. She and other Union doctors were eventually exchanged in a prisoner-of-war swap for Confederate medical officers. According to the National Library of Medicine, sources say Walker had been captured intentionally so she could spy for the North, but there is little evidence to support that claim.

Not long after being released by the Confederates, Walker returned to her craft as an assigned medical director at a hospital for women prisoners in Kentucky.

Supporting Feminism

Aside from her wartime efforts, Walker was also an outspoken advocate for women's rights.

As the war raged on, feminists also struggled to further their cause, which included being able to wear clothing that enabled better mobility. Walker chose to wear what was known as the "Bloomer costume" as a modified uniform all throughout the war. It was a dress-and-trouser combination that had gone out of favor long before the war began, but she didn't care -- she wore it anyway.

Walker eventually switched to wearing men's clothes and was even arrested for impersonating a man several times. In her defense, she argued that she was given special permission by the government to dress that way.

Medal of Honor Controversy

In November 1865, having left government service for good, Walker was awarded the Medal of Honor by President Andrew Johnson, even though she was a civilian who had never been a commissioned officer in military service.

That civilian status is why Walker's medal was rescinded in 1917, two years before she died -- along with 910 others. Walker refused to return the medal, though, and continued to wear it until she died two years later.

Sixty years after that, in 1977, President Jimmy Carter restored the honor in her name, thanks to efforts made by her family.

Mattis: Social Media Misconduct Won't be Tolerated

The purported actions of civilian and military personnel on social media websites, including some associated with the "Marines United" group and possibly others, represent egregious violations of the fundamental values that are upheld

at the Department of Defense, Defense Secretary Jim Mattis said today in a statement.

"The chain of command is taking all appropriate action to investigate potential misconduct and to maintain good order and discipline through-

out our armed forces," Mattis said.

"Lack of respect for the dignity and humanity of fellow members of the Department of Defense is unacceptable and harmful to the unit cohesion necessary to battlefield victory," the secretary continued. "We will not excuse or tolerate such behavior if we are to uphold our values and maintain our ability to defeat the enemy on the battlefield."

Defense press operations director Navy Capt Jeff Davis told reporters today

> that Mattis spoke several times during his confirmation process about military service and unit cohesion and how those are predicated on the core values of trust and mutual respect.

All Held Accountable

"Our leaders at all levels of the chain of command will be held accountable to

ensure that each member of our military can excel in an environment that maximizes their talents and [will have] no patience for those who would degrade or diminish another service member," Davis said.

The secretary will meet with uniformed and civilian leaders in the days ahead and ensure that they are taking all appropriate actions to maintain good order and discipline, the captain added.

"The Naval Criminal Investigative Service is investigating ... web sites and other services are looking into the matter, as well," Davis said.

Values

"Our values extend on- and off-duty, and we want personnel experiencing or witnessing online misconduct to promptly report matters to their chain of command," the captain said.

Davis said service members who might feel uncomfortable reporting alleged online misconduct to their chain of command have alternative avenues that include family support services, equal opportunity offices, Sexual Assault Prevention and Response program, the inspector general and law enforcement.

Communication, an essential capability for NATO Allies

Soldiers with the 588th Brigade Engineer Battalion, 3rd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 4th Infantry Division (Iron Brigade), demonstrated communication capabilities of U.S. Army radio systems for Polish Soldiers from the 11th Armored Cavalry Division, Mar. 10, 2017 in Zagan, Poland.

The Fort Carson-based brigade is part of a continuous "heel-to-toe" rotation through the European theater as part of Operation Atlantic Resolve. The U.S. and its Allies are making strides toward interoperability by training together and implementing innovative solutions to common communication capability gaps.

"They set up training for us, which was really enjoyable," said Capt. James Carey, commander of Company C, 588th BEB, 3rd ABCT, 4th ID. "We got the chance to go there, see their equipment and work directly with the Polish signal soldiers. Then we got the opportunity to showcase all of our equipment for them, to really demonstrate how a lot of our radio systems are very similar and that we have the ability to communicate in a field or tactical environment."

Carey also discussed showcasing the similarities between both nations' communication systems and highlighted benefits gained from today's event.

"A lot of the benefits are really about the knowledge.

understanding that the systems aren't that difficult, the systems are very similar and having a solution to be able to communicate between the nations," Carey said. "That is the biggest win for both nation in interoperability."

During the communication static display, leaders and Soldiers with Company C, 588th BEB, 4th ID demonstrated the communication systems and signal capabilities used to support the brigade.

"The equipment that the Polish Army has, closely matches the equipment we use," said Staff Sgt. Alexander Graybill, platoon sergeant of 2nd Pla-

toon, Company C, 588th BEB, 3rd ABCT, 4th ID. "Today we found out that a lot of our equipment can talk to Polish equipment and we can talk through it with each other, so that really broke down some boundaries with our Allies."

Maintaining combat readiness continues to be a top priority for the brigade, as well as training with NATO Allies here in the European theater. The brigade's participation in Operation Atlantic Resolve provides unique opportunities to familiarize Soldiers with their multinational counterparts while in a complex security environment.

"The surprising and energizing factor of this whole training is that the Polish Soldiers are very eager to work with us," Carey said. "They're very willing to set up and show us their equipment, they're very willing to come out to see our equipment; [and they are] just very hands on and willing to participate and increase interoperability, which is really breathtaking and encouraging for future missions and endeavors."

The Iron Brigade's deployment of more than 2,000 pieces of equipment from Fort Carson, Colorado, to aggregation sites in seven countries is evidence of NATO's ability to facilitate the quick assembly of forces to deter aggression.
