Abandoned or illegally parked vehicles on base

Abandoned or illegally parked vehicles on base are causing safety hazards.

Therefore, these vehicles will be towed to a storage area or will be disposed of in case the vehicle is abandoned.

Towing will be done at the request of the Military Police.

The registered owner of the vehicle shall pay all towing and storage fees and associated costs to the towing company.

If you are about to deploy, go on temporary duty or on leave, contact the Military Police to identify areas where you can park your vehicle safely.

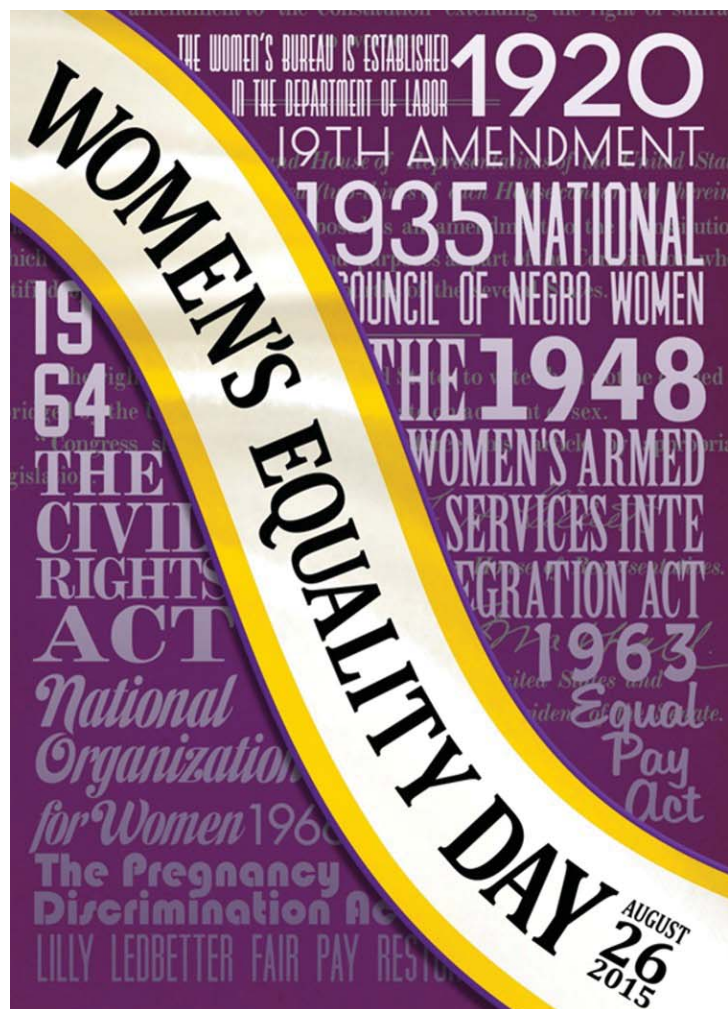
Take precautions before foreign travel

Foreign-travel briefings and debriefings are required for all U.S. employees who are planning visits outside of Belgium (excluding the United States) to include official and unofficial travel and for host-nation personnel on official travel. If you have access to sensitive DOD information (either unclassified

or classified), you may be a potential target for foreign-intelligence agents. The Security Office can provide the latest State Department advisories on hazardous conditions, identify any known security concerns regarding the areas where you will be traveling or organizations with which you will be dealing, and

provide general information on security risks during foreign travel. Currently, there are enhanced travel restrictions for southeastern Turkey that require additional approval for travel to those locations.

They typically involve a competition with both community members and firefighters taking part.

Purple Belt teaches self-defense moves

'I'm trying to teach you awareness, not fear.'

What starts out as "good times" downtown can take a sinister turn in an instant. No matter where you are, the world can be a dangerous place.

Two Soldiers can teach you the basics of how to stay safe in a threatening situation.

Capt. Raymond Ryan and Investigator Charles "Chuck" Yates now teach the Purple Belt self-defense class offered through Army Community Service's Family Advocacy Program. ACS director Yvette Castro, a certified self-defense instructor who launched this program seven years ago when she arrived in the community, recently turned it over to them.

"There are criminals out there," said Ryan, who works with the 650th Military Intelligence Group on SHAPE, adding, " '99 percent of people think, 'I want to live my life, have fun and go to bed.' But there's that 1 percent. ... Criminals work in shadows."

The two Soldiers said that human trafficking for the sex-slave trade can be another reason for situational awareness for Benelux community members.

"Prostitution is prominent throughout Europe, which makes human trafficking a very real threat," said Yates, who works for USAG Benelux's Headquarters and Headquarters Company in the Directorate of Emergency Services.

Targets of this slavery include men and boys as well as women and girls, Ryan said.

Weapons

Even in a defense situation, Belgian law forbids the use of knives, firearms and even commercial self-defense sprays like Mace in an altercation, Yates said.

Keys, cell phone (think "brick"), fingernails or a folded magazine can help you defend yourself, he said.

"I'm pretty sure I could do some serious damage with a pen," Yates said.

He said to think about safety strategies before you go out on the town or elsewhere.

"Before you go out, think about what you can do, what you can use," Yates said.

'You're in my personal bubble'

Ryan cautioned students at the July 25 Purple Belt class at SHAPE Main Gym to be aware of cultural differences when determining what is uncomfortably close.

Americans enjoy their elbow room, but the citizens of other countries get up close and personal.

"I'm not going to teach you anything Jackie Chan would do — just basic techniques," said Ryan, who works with the 650th Military Intelligence Group on SHAPE. Contact Army Community Service's Family Advocacy Program at DSN 366-6874 or civilian 065-326874 to register for the new Purple Belt class (which ISN'T a follow-up class) coming up Aug. 22 from 10:30 a.m. to noon.

"Just because they're close doesn't mean they're a threat," he said. "I'm trying to teach you awareness, not fear."

The main thing, Ryan said, is to avoid conflict.

The two instructors offered this advice:

1. Don't go anywhere alone.
 2. Have friends you trust.
 3. Know who you're with.
 4. Don't use earbuds or, if you insist, use only one, they cautioned.
- "Earbuds make you a target because they think you're not aware," Ryan said.
5. Use caution when it comes to drinking.
- "I don't want to lose my ability to defend myself," Ryan said, adding, "If someone's been drinking, what you do will have less effect on them."

Techniques

Reading words on the printed page can't replace learning by doing. Get practice doing kicks, strikes and take-down moves, and learn even more at the next (one-session) Purple Belt class at SHAPE Main Gym Aug. 22.

Basic moves taught in Purple Belt are done quickly at about the same time:

Purple Belt I continued

1. If seated, quickly stand up with your knees slightly bent and your feet shoulder-width apart so that you will be stable and maneuverable. Your dominant foot should be in the back, and 60 percent of your weight should be on your forward, nondominant foot.

"If I 'blade' myself (sideways), I make a smaller target," Yates said.

2. Raise your open-palmed hands near (but not touching) the sides of your head to protect your head and face. Don't make fists. Witnesses may only see part of the incident, but they will identify an open-palmed individual as being the victim, not the aggressor.

3. When the aggressor comes uncomfortably close enough to pose a threat, yell at the top of your lungs, "No!" "Stop!" "Hey!" or "Fire!"

"You've got to get aggressive," Ryan said. "Make yourself heard."

Yates said you should bring the sound up from your diaphragm, using air to push out the sound (much like singers do).

"If nothing else, it creates witnesses," Yates said. "That person may be less likely to do something."

4. If the aggressor doesn't back off and you're in imminent danger, push the aggressor away using your elbows and knees instead of your hands whenever possible to reduce injury to yourself. Pushing puts distance between you and the aggressor, allowing you to fight or to flee. Return your hands to the sides of your head to protect your "moneymaker," as Yates calls the face. Don't strike an aggressor's head or you may injure yourself.

5. Keep yelling, protecting your head and face, pushing and striking until you can get away.

"Success is survival," Ryan said.

Teens sample medical field via Red Cross

SHAPE Healthcare Facility and the American Red Cross honored 10 teenagers for their exemplary volunteer service in a ceremony at the clinic Aug. 6. They were singled out as the tops among SHF's 14 summer teen volunteers.

"As a volunteer, I was able to get an inside look at how a clinic operates," said Sarah Dellorso, a senior at SHAPE American High School. "The people who work there are really amazing people who have dedicated their lives to help others. It was really inspiring, and I cannot wait to further my education in the medical field. I would recommend this program to everyone!"

Yasemin Kabak, an SAHS junior, said the volunteers took on different roles in different areas and learned lots of things.

"I think this program helped us to prepare for college," the SHAPE Spartan said. "It was a great opportunity to meet new people, and this program will help those people who are going to have careers in medicine."

The Red Cross Youth Volunteer Program is a two-way street.

"You're here to help, but you're also here to learn," said Melanie Laurie, coordinator of the Red Cross program at SHAPE Healthcare Facility.

Nora Henry, a recent graduate of SHAPE American High School, said she got a lot out of it before the program ended for the summer.

"It was more learning than doing, but it was real-life learning," she said. "I just learned cool stuff."

This past summer, among her other duties, she tested

for hematocrit, which is the volume of the red blood cells in proportion to the fluid, or plasma, and was walked through the process of evaluating a complete blood count, or CBC, test, which is an indicator of overall health.

"The timing was perfect for her to participate in the program before she aged out," said Nora's mother, Kelly Henry. "She got to rotate through various clinics and got CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) certification."

Although some of the participants may be destined to be doctors, that isn't always the case.

"I don't think I'm going to have a career in medicine, but I found it extremely interesting," Nora said. "It gave me something to do this summer."

Sgt. Jesse Venable, a non-commissioned officer in SHF Primary Care, credits the Red Cross teen volunteers with working toward their goals.

"In contrast to their peers, I believe the Red Cross volunteers have the foresight to make decisions that better position them to advance their career choices," said Venable, who works with the volunteers by mentoring and teaching them. "Although they aren't paid for their services, they understand that their selfless service has a higher payoff over the long term than a paycheck at the end of the month."

Lisa Enyeart, regional program manager of the American Red Cross's Service to the Armed Forces, helped SHAPE Healthcare Facility to administer the ARC youth-volunteer program at SHAPE. Enyeart praised the teens and

expressed how successful the program has been.

"It's been fantastic this past two years, and hopefully we can continue that upward trajectory," she said, calling the teens "amazing, dynamic youth volunteers."

SAHS junior Oliver Powdar was honored for his volunteer work by being named SHAPE Youth Volunteer of the Summer.

"They couldn't stop saying amazing things about you," Enyeart said.

During the ceremony, three adult staff members of SHAPE Healthcare Facility were also honored:

- Nurse midwife Fiona Webster received recognition for ensuring that every volunteer was certified in Basic Life Support skills and CPR.

- Spc. Antonio L. Jones Jr. was honored for helping with the planning and execution of the day-to-day tasks assigned to each volunteer.

- Pharmacy technician Spc. Vanessa A. Peterson

made sure that all the youth volunteers had their training in the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act, commonly referred to as HIPAA.

Laurie, coordinator of the Red Cross program at SHAPE Healthcare Facility, was recognized "from all our ranks" as the Red Cross Volunteer of the First Quarter, Enyeart said. The Red Cross's first quarter started July 1.

The commander of SHAPE Healthcare Facility said that this volunteer program was just one example of the positive things about the SHAPE community.

Tourism, recreation define Durbuy

Durbuy bills itself as the smallest city in the world, thanks to a charter granted in 1331.

A charming town in the Ardennes, Durbuy offers fine restaurants, boutique shopping and adventure sports. A major commercial center in the Middle Ages, Durbuy has become a popular tourist destination in the Ourthe valley.

The most popular attraction in Durbuy, "the world's largest topiary park" contains 250 specimens of sculpted boxwood covering more than 30,000 square feet. The sculptures include an impressive elephant, a mermaid and even Manneken-Pis. Some of the boxwoods in the park are more than 100 years old.

The town has kept its aged atmosphere with its narrow,

winding cobblestone streets and 18th-century château. A large area of Durbuy is restricted to pedestrians and is filled with small shops selling everything from clothes to tourist trinkets.

The Ourthe river passes through Durbuy, and many fine restaurants line the river. You can enjoy good food as you watch boats, rafts and kayaks float past.

Home to one of the largest adventure parks in Belgium, Rome, a hamlet of Durbuy, boasts 60 different types of outdoor activities. At Durbuy Adventure, you can hop on a mountain bike, go rock-climbing and ride four-wheelers, or maybe you'd rather experience paint ball, archery and laser tag or one of the many other activities there.



Wèris: Rockin' it big time

Near Wèris, 4 miles south of Durbuy, you can see two dolmens (megalithic tombs with a large flat stone laid on upright ones) and many megaliths dating back to the Neolithic era. The Museum of Megaliths can be found in the center of Wèris.

Belgium leads world in begonia exports

Belgium has been in the begonia business since around 1860. About 60 million plants are grown each year, and more than 80 percent of them are exported, making Belgium the world's

top exporter of tuberous begonias. The production of begonias is concentrated in East Flanders around the city of Lochristi near Gent.

Begonias come in a rich palette from white to deli-

cate pastel shades to bright vivid colors. Begonias, which also include bicolored varieties, are robust plants that do well in soil that is neither constantly wet nor allowed to dry out.

Originally a tropical plant, the begonia takes its name from Michel Bègon, a French amateur botanist who collected begonias in the Dominican Republic where he was an administrator for King Louis XIV, also known as the Sun King.

Every two years, Le Tapis de Fleurs de Bruxelles decorates the city's Grand-Place with an intricate design fashioned entirely of begonias. The floral carpet will celebrate its 20th anniversary in Brussels Aug. 12 to 15, 2016.
