# Coach reflects on CYSS SHAPE Warriors' winning season

From the beginning of the CYSS basketball season, Coach Rodney Lloyd and I always preached to our players, the SHAPE Warriors, "One Team, One Fight." Basketball is about building a cohesive unit and getting better day by day — not just as a team, but as young men.

On many occasions, we would tell the players of how fortunate they were to know where their next meal was coming from and have clothes on their back and the latest shoes on their feet. We also would tell the players to thank their parents for everything they do and let them know that they appreciate it.

After every practice and game, the players, their parents and coaches would huddle up and talk about what we accomplished and close by breaking out with our famous saying, "One Team, One Fight." Doing this after every practice and game generated that family feeling.

We had preached to our players that everyone on the team had a specific role and that no player was bigger than the team. We put in the time and the effort with the players to make sure that, after every practice, they would leave with a better understanding of the game of basketball and, more than anything, confidence.

We went undefeated during the regular season. We beat teams SHAPE had never beaten since the CYS Basketball program began. We had coaches coming to us and telling us how great of a job we were doing in coaching the kids.

Once the season was over and we were getting ready for the Installation Management Command-Europe Junior Boys Basketball Tournament at USAG Wiesbaden, Germany, March 7 to 8, we decided to have a banquet at Pizza Hut. We could have just handed the participation medals out at the last practice of the season, but we wanted to make this season one that the players and parents would remember.

At the banquet, the parents surprised the two-man coaching staff with some gifts to show their appreciation for coaching their children and affecting their lives in a positive way.

Even though we had the best record at the tournament, the SHAPE Warriors made it to the IMCOM-E tournament in Wiesbaden ranked No. 5.

As the boys emerged from the locker room and hit the court, they heard over the loud speaker, "And now, the marvel of this tournament, rising from bottom to top, let's welcome the SHAPE Warriors!"

Despite triple overtime, we lost our first game by one point to the Wiesbaden 2 Celtics and faced elimination if we were to lose again. Our players took it hard, but we told them that the game of basketball would have ups and downs just like life. It's all about how you decide to bounce back.

We came out for the rest of the tournament with something to prove. The SHAPE Warriors showed resiliency. We would go on to face the No. 1 team, the Kaiserslautern Warriors in the semifinals.

Some of the boys' parents even came up to us and said, "Ya'll had a good run, but you're going to lose to K-Town."

The K-Town Warriors had about 14 players to rotate into the game, and the SHAPE Warriors only had seven. K-Town had, by far, more athleticism than our boys did, but we were the better team and won the game. We had the motivation and determination to get through any and all obstacles standing

in the way of bringing back the first CYS Championship to SHAPE.

You can't just wake up and show motivation and determination; they take time to develop. From Day One, we pushed the SHAPE Warriors to the limit. We pushed them to become better athletes and better young men.

Although we had beaten Wiesbaden earlier in the tournament, we made sure our guys got the idea that the next game against them would be easy out of their heads. This was the biggest game of both of our seasons, and it was going to be a dogfight. We beat Wiesbaden and won first place in the CYSS basketball League tournament. It's a great feeling to see that all of the players and coaches' hard work paid off, and we brought back SHAPE'S first championship.

Although bringing home the trophy was exhilarating, the best feeling was seeing the children you mentor listen to what you tell them and seeing the positive changes they're making.

# Museum brings to life history of Chièvres Air Base









The International Museum of Chièvres Air Base reopened its doors for visitors after completion of renovations. The museum features the history of the base since it was first used by the Germans as a single grass runway during WWI. After WWI, the runway returned to pasture and sugar beet fields until 1939 when the Belgian governement decided to build a diversionary airfield. These plans were stopped as the country was invaded and the German Luftwaffe took control of the airfield and the caserne. After WWII, from 1947 until 1967, the base was home to the Belgian Air Force's 7th Wing and the Red Devils, Belgium's aerobatic team. When the 7th Wing inactivated in 1967, the base became a U.S. base. (Picture top left) A U.S. Battle Dress Uniform as used by the U.S. Forces through the 80s and 90s. (Picture top right) Two American Forces and one British Forces uniforms as worn during WWII. (Picture bottom right) Personal items from Monsignor Chaplain (Col.) Sidney J. Marceaux who served two tours as the Command Chaplain for the garrison in Chièvres, first time from 1997 until 2000 and a second time from 2005 until 2007, when he retired. Not too long after retirement, Marceaux was recalled to service in 2007 due to a shortage of Catholic Chaplains and deployed to Kuwait where he was the oldest serviceman. He passed away in 2008 and is buried at Arlington National Cemetery, Washington D.C. The museum is open on Sundays from 2 to 5 p.m. or by appointment and is located Rue de Saint-Ghislain 16 at Chièvres. Entrance fee is €3 per adult or €2 for children 12 to 18 years old. # **Next week in World War history (May 3 to 9)**

### **World War I**

1915

**May 3** - A combined Austro-German force succeeds in defeating the Russian army near the Dunajec River (a tributary of the Vistula River that runs through modern-day northern Slovakia and southern Poland). During 10 days of fighting in the Carpathian Mountains on the Galician front in Austria-Hungary.

The Austro-German counterattack ends nine months of victorious Russian advances in the region since August 1914.

May 7 - A German submarine sinks the Lusitania.

**May 9** - Anglo-French forces fighting launch their first combined attempt to break through the heavily fortified German trench lines on the Western Front in France.

At Vimy Ridge in northwestern France, French troops launch an attack on German positions after firing shrapnel shells for five hours. On the heels of the barrage, the French Soldiers leave their trenches to advance, only to find that the bombardment has failed to break the first German wire. As they struggled to cut the wire, German machine gunners open fire. Eventually, the French are able to reach their objective, as the Germans withdraw, but they suffer heavy casualties: one regiment of the French Foreign Legion loses nearly 2,000 of its 3,000 Soldiers, including its commanding officer, who is shot in the chest by a sniper, and all three battalion commanders.

### 1916

**May 3** - The Germans begin another attack on the west bank of the Meuse. This time they gain the advantage and within three days capture the two French hills they had been striving for since early March, thus achieving a solid position northwest of Verdun.

**May 4** - Germany responds to a demand by U.S. President Woodrow Wilson by agreeing to limit its submarine warfare in order to avert a diplomatic break with the United States.

### 1917

May 5 - German Ace Ernst Udet gets his sixth aerial victory. Udet is the second-highest scoring German flying ace of World War I. He is one of the youngest aces and is the highest scoring German ace to survive the war (at the age of 22). His 62 confirmed victories are second only to Manfred von Richthofen, his commander in the Flying Circus.

### 1918

**May 6 -** Turko-German delegates arrive at Batum (Georgia) to negotiate peace with the Georgians and Armenians.

### 1919

**May 5** - The delegation from Italy—led by Prime Minister Vittorio Orlando and Foreign Minister Sidney Sonnino—returns to the Versailles Peace Conference in Paris, France, after leaving abruptly 11 days earlier during contentious negotiations over the territory Italy would receive after the First World War.

**May 8** - Edward George Honey writes a letter to the London Evening News proposing that the first anniversary of the armistice ending World War I—concluded on November 11, 1918—be commemorated by several moments of silence.

### **World War II**

1939

**May 3 -** Fighters of the Chinese 4th Air Group intercept 54 Japanese bombers en route to attack Chongqing, China, shooting down seven Japanese bombers.

**May 4** - Chinese troops attack Japanese positions at Nanchang, Jiangxi Province, China.

### 1940

**May 3**- Dutch intelligence detect further hints of German troop gathering near its border; this information is forwarded on to Belgium. Meanwhile, in Germany, forecast of bad weather cause a postponement of the invasion.

### 1941

**May 5** - Emperor Haile Selassie re-enters Addis Ababa, the Ethiopian capital, exactly five years to the day of when it was occupied by Italy.

### 1942

**May 3-** A Japanese invasion force succeeds in occupying Tulagi of the Solomon Islands in an expansion of Japan's defensive perimeter.

The United States, having broken Japan's secret war code and forewarned of an impending invasion of Tulagi and Port Moresby, attempts to intercept the Japanese armada. Four days of battles between Japanese and American aircraft carriers results in 70 Japanese and 66 Americans warplanes destroyed. This confrontation, called the Battle of the Coral Sea, marks the first air-naval battle in history.

**May 6** - U.S. Lt. Gen. General Jonathan Wainwright surrenders all U.S. troops in the Philippines to the Japanese.

### 1943

May 4 - German submarine U-625 spots Allied convoy ONS 5 in the North Atlantic. Several German submarines gather and begin attacking at dusk and continue through the night sinking seven ships (British freighters L'Orient, North Britain, Harbury, Harpurley, Bristol City, and Wentworth; US freighter West Maximus). U-630 is lost during the attacks.

### 1944

**May 6** - British army junior officer John Randle takes out a Japanese machine gun position in Burma, then purposefully sacrifices himself to take out a bunker with a grenade. He is posthumously awarded a Victoria Cross.

### 1945

**May 7-** The German Gen. Alfred Jodl, signs the unconditional surrender of all German forces, at Reims, France.

**May 8** - Great Britain and the United States celebrate Victory in Europe Day. Cities in both nations, as well as formerly occupied cities in Western Europe, rejoice in the defeat of the Nazi war machine.

**May 9** - Herman Goering, commander in chief of the Luftwaffe, president of the Reichstag, head of the Gestapo, prime minister of Prussia, and Hitler's designated successor is taken prisoner by the U.S. Seventh Army in Bavaria.



Anyone calling in will be able to speak confidentially with a trained Masters Level crisis counselor.
