U.S. Soldier receives NATO's highest honor

April 7 was a very special day for Spc, Joshua A. Smith who received the NATO Meritorious Service Medal, NATO's highest honor, during a ceremony held at the NCI Agency CIS Sustainment Support Centre, JFC Brunssum, the Netherlands.

On behalf of the NATO Secretary General Jens Stoltenberg, the NCI Agency General Manager retired Maj. Gen. Koen Gijsbers presented the award to OR-4 Joshua Smith while a military formation stood at attention.

This year, there were only seven awardees though NATO is authorized 150 per year. Smith stands up among them as the first OR-4 to receive this decoration because he "distinguished himself while performing preventive and corrective maintenance on deployable Satellite Based Transmission Systems while supporting NATO operations in Kosovo and NATO Communications and Information Agency supported locations," says the award citation. "His abilities as a technician supported corrective maintenance activities which involved the replacing of various Communications and Information System components to realign Radio Frequency and Satellite Communications. This enabled the operational theatre commander to transmit and receive mission critical information."

NATO MSM, highest honor to only a few

The NATO Meritorious Service Medal was approved by the North Atlantic Council, and is awarded to military and civilian personnel who have been commended for providing exceptional or remarkable service to NATO. The U.S. Secretary of Defense has approved the acceptance and wear of the NATO MSM for U.S. military and civilian personnel.

Eligible personnel are individuals serving permanently or temporarily within NATO's operational chain of command or in those forces under NATO command or control, or in a NATO Body, who are commended personally by a commander or a head of a NATO Body for:

- Performing acts of courage in difficult or dangerous circumstances; or
 - Showing exceptional leadership or personal example; or
- Making an outstanding individual contribution in any activity or program; or
- Enduring particular hardship or deprivation in the interest of NATO.

NCOs inducted into Sgt. Morales Club

Sgt. Morales was just an ordinary guy doing his best with the hand he was dealt, which included taking care of his Soldiers and their families by getting to know them and their problems.

Sgt. 1st Class Brian S. Letterle, Staff Sgt. Regan Davis and Sgt. Bryan R. Teneyck took turns talking about Sgt. Morales and the different ways he took care of his squad on a daily basis during an April 10 ceremony in Chièvres to induct the three USAG Benelux Soldiers into the Sgt. Morales Club.

"They represent the strength of this nation. Truly they're the best among the best," said Command Sgt. Maj. Romeo Montez III, Installation Management Command-Europe's top enlisted adviser. "There's something about a leader being

out front that inspires and motivates. These noncommissioned officers know what it means to lead by example."

The exclusive club is for U.S. Army Europe noncommissioned officers who model themselves on the Sgt. Morales ideal. In 1973, when the Army was making the transition to an all-volunteer force, Lt. Gen. George S. Blanchard, the commander of VII Corps in Europe, created the fictional Sgt. Morales as a role model for USAREUR Soldiers, and the Sgt. Morales Club was born.

The three NCOs went through three formal boards to become members.

"The four-stage selection process to be in the prestigious Sergeant Morales Club was strenuous on its own," said Davis, who is the Headquarters and Headquarters Company training NCO. "Competing while I was five months' pregnant added a little more difficulty."

Phase One involved obtaining the first sergeant's approval, she said. Phase Two and Phase Three were the battalion-level and brigade-level selection boards. Those two phases required a PT test, an appearance before the board and a unanimous vote from the board members.

Shotgun-style questions were mixed with hands-on activities, Davis said.

Phase Four required approval by the USAREUR command sergeant major. This final stage was by far the most difficult, Davis said.

"Being in a room with five sergeants major while they put immense pressure on you for more than an hour is intimidating," she said. "At times, I felt like they wanted me to break. I kept my composure and got through it, one task at a time."

A military policeman at USAG Benelux-Brussels, Teneyck's leadership philosophy embraces the "lead by example" concept so central to the Sgt. Morales Club.

"Never be afraid to get your hands dirty with your Soldiers, and always be willing to do what you ask of your Soldiers." he said.

Letterle, who is a provost sergeant at USAG Benelux's Directorate of Emergency Services, offered this advice:

"Teach, coach and mentor those around you so that, one day, they may take your place as a competent standard-bearer able to handle any situation."

SHAPE Army Health Clinic itemizes billing

Civilians and their family members who receive care at the SHAPE Army Health Clinic will see a difference in their bills for medical services starting June 1.

On that date, the clinic will switch from flat rate to itemized billing for U.S. and non-U.S. civilians and their dependents. Military members and their families, as well as military retirees and their families, will not be affected by this change.

The switch to itemized billing brings the SHAPE AHC in line with all other Department of Defense medical facilities around the world. The change means that civilian patients

receiving services through the SHAPE AHC will be billed for the specific services they receive, rather than being billed at the flat rate of \$65 per visit.

The transition will actually help most people who have health insurance since itemized billing is

the industry standard, said Nicole Gust, Europe Regional Medical Command Uniform Business Office Manager.

"Our customers who have other health insurance and receive care at a military treatment facility can now receive an explanation of benefits and bills that clearly identify the health care services received and their associated costs," Gust explained. "Claims submitted to the insurance companies will now be similar to those submitted by civilian providers. Our billing methodology will now mirror established industry practices, which will make it faster and easier for insurance companies to issue payments for services rendered."

In most cases, the change will be transparent to the user, Gust said, since most will still be responsible for their copays and deductibles just as before the policy change. Itemized billing may help some people reach their deductible limits faster.

Charges for individual services are determined by the Department of Defense and vary based on the service provided. Chargeable visits are any that entail interaction between the patient and the health care provider that involve evaluation management services and includes documentation in the medical record. Referrals or consultations to a provider within any military treatment facility are considered charge-

able visits. There is no charge for telephone consultations. While the Europe Regional Medical Command Uniform Business Office staff isn't able to estimate how much your next appointment will cost, according to Gust, they can tell you what your most recent

appointment would have cost under itemized billing.

Prescription fills and refills will also be included in the itemized charges. Visit the ERMC UBO web page at http://www.eubo.healthcare.hqusareur.army.mil to download the Pharmacy Pricing Estimator Tool and for more information about the switch to itemized billing. Civilians may also reach the ERMC UBO at DSN 590-7400 or civilian +49 6371-9464-7400.

"In the weeks leading up to the change we are working diligently to notify civilians who will be affected by this change, share relevant facts about what's changing, and ensure resources are available where SHAPE civilians can get answers to any questions they may have," said Gust.

U.S. Soldiers, family member take up Kennedy's challenge

Four Americans took up Kennedy's 52-year-old challenge April 4, in Sittard, the Netherlands.

Staff Sgt. James Downs, Spc. Joshua Smith, Maj. Rick Galeano, Alpha Company, Allied Forces Command North Battalion and Katrin Galeano, participated in the Kennedy Mars in Sittard.

The march is a 50-mile/80-km annual volksmarch sparked by President John F. Kennedy's 1963 speech, which postulated that, as a result of modern affluent society, "nobody can walk 50 miles within 20 hours anymore." To prove the president wrong, people all over the world walked that distance in that time. In Sitttard, it all started April 20, 1963, when students from the Bisschoppelijk College in Sittard followed the American examples they had witnessed over the media. They started at the market square and walked 80 km within 20 hours. A new tradition was born.

This year, 2,634 walkers accepted the 50-mile/80-km walking challenge.

"This was my second walk and I have been looking forward to it all year." said Smith. "There are memories of the walk that I will have forever; the children with huge smiles excitedly offering water and candy along the way, the Dutch crowds coming together for a beer and celebrating the day as you walk by and the quaint Dutch countryside that unfolds in front of you as you pass from village to village. On top of all of this, it is 50 miles! At the finish line, you have mentally and physically taxed yourself to the limit. You have accomplished something that can never be diminished or taken away."

Smith's enthusiasm has been emulated as he was joined by Downs this year. "I have done the Kennedy Mars not only for the epic experience, but to prepare for the Vier Daagse March." he explained.

"It was a great experience trekking through all of the villages and centrums; meeting friendly people along the way. I would do it again!"

The other Alpha Company participants was a husband and

wife team Rick and Katrin Galeano. They considered this both a challenge and a unique marriage retreat. "The Kennedy Mars was an exhilarating event." the major reflected. "It was amazing to see the number of people of all ages doing this event."

Unfortunately, he couldn't make it to the end as he was forced to end the walk at the half-way mark due to a knee injury.

All four walkers tackled the cold and rain in the early morning hours. They started at around 5:30 a.m. at the market square in Sittard. With a map in their hand, they followed a path that took them through the Netherlands and Belgium. The five resting areas provided them with food, water, first aid and massages if needed. "Everyone involved was kind and helpful. We met and chatted with many fellow walkers and were well taken care of at each resting point. It made a difference. The care received helped me physically and mentally to finish the race." said Katrin Galeano.

At the end, Downs, Smith and Galeano finished the 80-km walk. They had started in the dark at the market square in Sittard and finished in the dark at the same location. According to them, it was a unique experience they will never forget.

At the end, the pain of blistered feet was only temporary, but the pride of finishing this challenge is permanent.

Next week in World War history (April 19 to 25)

World War I

1915

April 22 - German forces shock Allied soldiers along the Western Front by firing more than 150 tons of lethal chlorine gas against two French colonial divisions at Ypres in Belgium.

April 23 - Rupert Brooke, a young scholar and poet serving as an officer in the British Royal Navy, dies of blood poisoning on a hospital ship anchored off the Greek island of Skyros, while awaiting deployment in the Allied invasion of the Gallipoli Peninsula.

April 25 - A week after Anglo-French naval attacks on the Dardanelles end in dismal failure, the Allies launch a large-scale land invasion of the Gallipoli Peninsula, the Turkish-controlled land mass bordering the northern side of the Dardanelles.

1916

April 24 - Around noon on Easter Monday, some 1,600 Irish nationalists—members of the Irish Volunteers—launch the so-called Easter Rising in Dublin, seizing a number of official buildings and calling on all Irish patriots to resist the bonds of British control.

1917

April 20 - An ambitious Allied offensive against German troops near the Aisne River in central France, spearheaded by the French commander in chief, Robert Nivelle, ends in dismal failure.

Nivelle, who had replaced Joseph Joffre in December 1915 as head of all French forces, had tenaciously argued for a major spring offensive in spite of powerful opposition in the French government, at one point threatening to resign if the offensive did not go ahead. He was convinced that by implementing the tactics he had used to considerable success at Verdun during the French counter-attacks in the fall of 1916, on a greater scale, the Allies could achieve a breakthrough on the Western Front within 48 hours.

1918

April 21 - In the skies above the Somme River in France, Baron Manfred von Richthofen, the notorious German flying ace known as the Red Baron," is killed by Allied fire.

Richthofen leads his squadron deep into Allied territory on a search for British observation aircraft. The flight draws the attention of an Allied squadron led by Canadian Royal Air Force pilot Captain Arthur Roy Brown. As Richthofen pursues a plane piloted by Brown's compatriot, Wilfred R. May, the Red Baron ventures too far into enemy territory and too low to the ground. Two miles behind the Allied lines, just as Brown catches up with Richthofen and fires on him, the chase passes over an Australian machine-gun battery, whose riflemen open fire. Richthofen is hit in the torso; though he manages to land his plane alongside the road from Corbie to Bray, near Sailley-le-Sac, he is dead by the time Australian troops reach him. Brown is often given credit for downing Richthofen from the air, though some claim it was actually an Australian gunner on the ground who fired the fatal shot; debate continues to this day.

World War II

1939

April 25 - The Chinese counter offensive toward Nanchang, Jiangxi Province, China reaches the outskirts of the city.

1940

April 24 - British forces, along with Australian, New Zealand, and Polish troops, begin to withdraw from Greece in light of the Greek army's surrender to the Axis invaders. A total of 50,732 men are evacuated quickly over a six-day period, leaving behind weapons, trucks, and aircraft.

1941

April 19 - Erwin Rommel personally inspects the front lines in the Libyan-Egyptian border area.

1942

April 23- In retaliation for the British raid on Lubeck, German bombers strike Exeter and later Bath, Norwick, York, and other "medieval-city centers." Almost 1,000 English civilians are killed in the bombing attacks nicknamed "Baedeker Raids."

1943

April 19 - Heinrich Himmler sends more than 2,000 Waffen SS soldiers to combat the Jewish resistance. German tanks, howitzers, machine guns, and flamethrowers are met with Jewish pistols, rifles, homemade grenades, and Molotov cocktails. The Jews fend off the German assault for 28 days. Finally, SS General Jurgen Stroop sets the entire ghetto block on fire and blows up the synagogue. By May, 56,065 Jews are dead.

1944

April 22 - Allied forces land in the Hollandia area of New Guinea. The Japanese occupiers, only 15,000 in number, many of whom are on administrative duty, fight for more than three months against incredible odds at great cost: When the battle for the northern coast of New Guinea is finally won by the Allies, 12,811 Japanese are dead, compared with 527 Americans.

1945

April 20 - Allied bombers in Italy begin a three-day attack on the bridges over the rivers Adige and Brenta to cut off German lines of retreat on the peninsula. Meanwhile, Adolf Hitler celebrates his 56th birthday as a Gestapo reign of terror results in the hanging of 20 Russian prisoners of war and 20 Jewish children: Of these, at least nine are under the age of 12. All of the victims had been taken from Auschwitz to Neuengamme, the place of execution, for the purpose of medical experimentation.

April 21 - Soviet forces fighting south of Berlin, at Zossen, assault the headquarters of the German High Command. The only remaining opposing "force" to the Russian invasion of Berlin are the "battle groups" of Hitler Youth, teenagers with anti-tank guns, strategically placed in parks and suburban streets. In a battle at Eggersdorf, 70 of these Hitler teens strove to fight off a Russian assault with a mere three antitank guns. They were bulldozed by Russian tanks and infantry.

'Travel the Benelux'

The area where three countries are one step apart



The three countries area close to Vaals, the Netherlands, is the area where Belgium, the Netherlands and Germany come together.

The area has been a strategic, political and economic highlight for its residents since the Roman empire. Throughout the centuries, Vaals has been tied to Aachen, Germany. Rich factory owners were building their secondary residence in the Vaals area.

A hundred years ago, the three countries area was a four countries area. After Napoleon's defeat in 1815, the European borders had to be re-established. The border between Prussia and the Kingdom of the Netherlands was not easy to set because both countries wanted to incorporate the zinc mine in Kelmis, near Moresnet. Eventually, the

area around the zinc mine remained a neutral area with an 11-km border under the name Neutral Moresnet. In 1830, when the southern part of the Netherlands became a self-governing state known as Belgium, the area became a four 'countries' area.

During World War II, as the borders were closed, Vaals got isolated and part of the three countries area was also destroyed. In September 1944, the Wilhelminatower, which offered a nice view over the Netherlands and Germany, was heavily destroyed during the battle of Aachen but later rebuilt. The period immediately following WWII is the time when the economy of Vaals thrived with countless Germans crossing the border to come shop in the Netherlands and this is also the time when the black market flourished in the area. The numerous walking trails in the area are some of the trails used by the smugglers of the time.
