Solid Curtain Citadel Shield Strengthens Security Aboard NSASP

Exercise Citadel Shield/Solid Curtain (CS-SC18) 2018 officially kicked off aboard Naval Support Activity South Potomac (NSASP) on Jan. 29, with scenarios happening on both sides of the river. CS-SC18 is an annual force protection exercise conducted by Fleet Forces Command and Commander, Navy Installations Command on all Navy installations in the continental United States.

"Citadel Shield occurs during the first week and involves stand-alone tactical events executed at the region and installation level," Bob Brooks, NSASP chief of police explained. "Solid Curtain occurs during the second week and is tied to an overarching scenario at the national level that will involve extensive region and installation anti-terrorism-related activities, to include a threat intelligence build up leading to simulated attacks."

The exercise is designed to help train Navy security forces and establish best practices in actual emergency scenarios and officers aboard both Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahlgren and Indian Head.

The exercise kicked off with a potential "explosive device" at Building 101 on Monday, Jan. 29. Employees

in the historic structure — NSASP Headquarters at Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahlgren- evacuated into the gray morning drizzle and waited as officers swept the location for the "device." Trainers followed the security officers throughout the process, taking notes for follow-up training later.

On Tuesday evening, a "mock" gate runner tested the skills of the NSF Indian Head first responders, who coordinated an effort to locate and neutralize the threat.

Multiple scenarios over the course of the week keep the first responders on points and allow them to identify strengths and weaknesses.

"We emphasize training year round, and SCCS is an opportunity to be able to further exercise our Naval Security Forces in a more complex environment to engage in various scenario driven operations," Stan Chisuk, the N3 security director explained.

The major training event for the exercise took place Jan. 31 with an active shooter drill at Branch Medical Clinic Indian Head.

"These drills allow our officers to demonstrate their "train as you fight, fight as you train" philosophy," Brooks said.

During the event, command staff manned the Emergency Operations Center, monitored the role players, as well as listened in on the communications and made notes where improvements could be made in responses throughout the exercise.

While the primary goal of the exercise is to ensure first responders at all Navy bases are prepared and ready in the event of potential scenarios, it is also a good time for all who live and work aboard installations to check their readiness status. Ensuring your Wide Area Alert Network (WAAN) is up-to-date at the office is critical to receiving timely messages in the

NAVSEA Commander Launches Tour of Navy Warfare Centers, Sees Campaign Plan in Action

Vice Adm. Thomas Moore, Commander, Naval Sea Systems Command (NAVSEA), kicked off his nation-wide tour of the NAVSEA Warfare Centers, announcing that he will keep tens of thousands of employees updated, involved, and informed along the way with online posts.

Moore, speaking at an all-hands meeting, invited Naval Surface Warfare Center Dahlgren Division (NSWCDD) employees to engage with him via the internal online collaboration tool, iNFusion. Such interactive tools encourage employees to share information across the NAVSEA enterprise.

"I continue to be amazed by the incredible work

that you do each and every day," Moore told several hundred military, government civilians, and contractors. The base theater staged the Jan. 16 event, which was recorded for on-demand viewing by the NSWCDD workforce.

The day after encouraging his audience to continue sharing knowledge quickly across the enterprise, he shared the highlights and insights of his Dahlgren trip with 73,000 NAVSEA employees via his online iNFusion report.

Moreover, Moore invited the NAVSEA workforce to read posts that he and NAVSEA Executive Director James Smerchansky will journal over the next several months while visiting the Warfare Center divisions with the theme: "Warfare Centers – The Campaign Plan in Action"

ASBP Blood Drive a Success Aboard NSF Dahlgren

The Armed Services Blood Program hosted its first blood drive of the year for Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahlgren on Tuesday, Jan. 30. Although the wind was gusting outside and the Chapel Annex was chilly inside, donors turned out to roll up their sleeves to donate the gift of life.

Sailors and civilians alike came out to donate whole blood for the ASBP program. All of the blood collected through the ASBP directly supports ill or critically injured service members and their families worldwide. Blood products collected are used for patients of all ages and for many different reasons — from cancer patients to military members with battlefield injuries.

Every single donation benefits three lives, and during this visit, ASBP collected 54 pints of whole blood at NSF Dahlgren.

Despite the fact that the flu and seasonal colds have prevented many from heading out to donate at this time, NSF Dahlgren is recognized for the strong numbers of donations at any time.

Finola Brophy-Houlihan, a registered nurse for the Armed Services Blood Bank shared that they have noticed the fluctuation in donors has

come in waves, however, Dahlgren has always been a reliable source.

"We always have a really good turn out here," Brophy-Houlihan said.

In light of the flu epidemic, donors were asked to contact ASBP if they do contract the flu or exhibit symptoms of cold or flu within the next two weeks so that they can notify the recipient. Navy's 2018 VITA Program is Open for Business

The Navy's annual Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program has officially launched. In anticipation of the kick-off of tax season Jan. 29, VITA tax centers fleet wide are opening their doors. Naval Support Facility Dahlgren's program can be found at the Fleet and Family Service Center (CCSC) located at building 214, 6027 School House Lane behind the NSWC Federal Credit Union.

VITA is a free self-service program available to active-duty and retired service members and their dependents, as well as deployed Department of Defense civilians.

VITA pairs those individuals and their families with trained volunteers and streamlined tax software, called MilTax, to get the job done right — and hopefully a refund in the bank within two weeks.

"It is truly Sailors helping Sailors," said Lt. Alexandra Marin, the Navy's VITA program manager at the Office of the Judge Advocate General in Washington, D.C. "It is an opportunity to work with a fellow Sailor on how to educate yourself on preparing your own taxes."

"It's a lifelong skill and starting out with a Sailor teaching you how to do this, so that the next year you can do it for yourself and help your family members and shipmates, that's critical," she added. "Self-service VITA taxes is the best way to go about doing that"

Run by the Internal Revenue Service, VITA is available to Sailors and other customers through Naval Legal Service Command. Customers can find their nearest VITA tax center via Military OneSource. They also have the option of doing their taxes online.

Those who have taken part in the program have been surprised at how quick and easy filing their own taxes can be.

"The process for filing taxes is fairly straightforward," said Kevin Carey, VITA volunteer. "The tax software uses an interview process, asking questions to fill out the tax forms, and a volunteer is always available to answer questions. For a simple return with

just one or two W-2s a return can be completed in less than 30 minutes"

There are other benefits of VITA, as well. According to the National Society of Accountants, using this free service will save Sailors an average of \$261.

"First of all, it's free, so you can save a few hundred dollars just by coming to a self-service VITA office," said Marin. "And it educates you on how to prepare your taxes on your own. So when your family and friends want to know how to do it, they can ask you and next year you can have your information saved in the software and you know how to do it yourself."

Tax preparers advise Sailors bring the following items to appointments at their VITA tax center:

- * Valid identification for taxpayer/s
- * Social Security Numbers (including spouse and children)
- * Child care provider tax I.D. or Social Security Number and address
- * 2016 adjusted gross income from last year's tax return (if you have a copy, VITA volunteers can show you where this amount is)
- * IRS E-filing PIN (you can get one at irs.gov or call IRS at 866-704-7388
- * Income data (W-2s)
- * All end-year tax documents (1099s)
- * Student loan payment information
- * Receipts for child care payment
- * Receipts for educational expenses

The ticket part is new to me, but it doesn't seem like it's going to be too difficult. I am anxious to learn it — I want to know it already. So that's my challenge — to take my time and know it will come. I want to be as knowledgeable on the ticket side as I am on the community recreation side."

Newman shared that she reflected recently on how her career path seems to be coming full circle. Her first job during high school was as a "Play Pal" at McDonald's.

"I did the birthday parties, and I would set everything up and manage the games, making

sure everyone was having a good time," Newman said. "It's amazing. I thought, I've been doing this since I was in high school [coordinating entertainment and events], and here I am working in that same field with the events and programs here at MWR. It's like coming full circle."

Newman has set a goal for herself to find a way to increase attendance at the events that the MWR office puts on.

"I don't know if I am looking to implement anything new right now; what I am interested in is increasing the attendance numbers. Admittedly it's a small site," Newman said. "Typically, they would have five to 10 in attendance at an event; I'd like to see that increase to 15 or 20."

Newman feels that learning what programs the Indian Head community enjoys and what isn't working is key to helping put together a schedule of events that will bring folks out.

"Everyone seems to enjoy the sip and paint events that we have," Newman said. "I want to make sure that we are providing the kinds of experiences that our community enjoys. Many of the events are free or low-cost and wonderful."

In her spare time, Newman enjoys working out — jogging and Zumba — as well as spending time with her family. Her family includes her husband and two children, a daughter who is a sophomore at Norfolk State University and a son who is a junior at Washington and Lee High School. She is also a massage therapist, having just completed her training and internship with local chiropractor Dr. Shawn Pallotti.

Newman credits former supervisor Chris Bohr, from Naval Air Station Patuxent River, with one of her favorite quotes: every day is a good day.

"Every morning we'd come to work and I'd say, 'Good Morning Chris! How are you today?" Newman shared. "And he would say, 'Every day is a good day!" I picked that up from him. Every day you get up in the morning and you're alive and breathing is a good day."

With such a positive outlook, Newman will bring her exuberant energy to her new role. Future events that Newman is excited about include an upcoming murder mystery play happening at the Mix House with refreshments on Feb. 13, a nosew do-it-yourselffleece blanket at the Community Annex (the old USO building) on Feb. 23 and a trip to the MGM Casino on Feb. 24.

"That's where we are going to start hosting a lot of our upcoming events [the old USO building]," Newman said. "We want everyone to know that we now have the new site where we'll be enjoying events."

mission areas – on-time delivery of ships and submarines, culture of affordability, and cybersecurity – on which he focused throughout his Dahlgren tour following his speech.

The admiral's visit included briefings on a widerange of technologies, capabilities, and topics from the Innovation Lab (iLab), future combat systems, directed energy, cyber security, radar data, human systems integration, future ballistic missile defense, and chemical, biological, and radiological defense.

"Just getting around and seeing all the things that are going on here and everyone's contribution to the NAVSEA Campaign Plan, and the contributions they make to the Navy always exhilarates me – gives me something to fight for and work for in Washington, D.C.," said Moore in an on-camera interview after his Dahlgren tour, posted on the NSWCDD Facebook page.

"That Innovation Lab fits right into our Culture of Affordability and On Time Delivery of Ships and Submarines mission areas," said Moore as he looked into the camera while recounting his meeting with Dahlgren personnel at the iLab who are working on improved Surface Force bridge designs and, "trying to solve some of the real world problems that we have today."

NSWCDD scientists and engineers are exploring transforma-

tional ideas in the iLab, which opened for business last summer as an intensive collaborative environment where experts work to speed up and maximize corporate innovative solutions across the laboratory to further empower the nation's warfighters to fight, win, and return home safely.

The admiral encouraged his NSWCDD audience – including the command's leaders, scientists, and engineers as well as business and human resource specialists – to reflect on the three major mission areas in 2018 and to "think about the 355-ship Navy and how we're going to get there."

"The Campaign Plan itself hasn't changed," said Moore. "We have three core principles and three major mission areas. Number one is the on-time delivery of ships and submarines. Number two remains a culture of affordability, and number three is cybersecurity. You are well embedded in all three of those."

NAVSEA, he said, will enable the Navy to get there by implementing the mission areas while instilling high-velocity-learning principles and effectively managing the flow of ideas, problem solving, and knowledge sharing through the ingenuity and collaboration among the NAVSEA workforce innovators.

Meanwhile, NAVSEA's dynamic, diverse, and innovative workforce is committed to designing, building, delivering, and maintaining ships and systems on time and on cost for the Navy in a high-velocity-learning environment.

"The core foundational efforts of what we do remain high-ve-

locity learning and people," said Moore. "We spend a lot of time focusing on the people side of the house, striving to provide you more opportunity to grow individually and as teams. Our people really are my number one priority. My main job as NAVSEA commander is to provide an opportunity for people to come into NAVSEA and grow individually to get to where they want to get to 10, 15, 20 years down the road." He added that that NAVSEA will continue to be a "fantastic place to work and we'll continue to do incredible things."

NAVSEA – the largest of the Navy's five systems commands – comprises command staff, headquarters directorates, affiliated Program Executive Offices, and numerous field activities. NAVSEA engineers, builds, buys, and maintains ships, submarines, and combat systems that meet the Fleet's current and future operational requirements. The command is also responsible for establishing and enforcing technical authority and standards in combat system design and operation to ensure systems are engineered effectively and operate safely and reliably.

NSWC Dahlgren Division, a NAVSEA warfare center division, is a premier research and development center that serves as a specialty site for weapon system integration. The command's unique ability to rapidly introduce new technology into complex warfighting systems is based on its longstanding competencies in science and technology, research and development, and test and evaluation.


