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18th Space Control Detachment One Gather to Memorialize Coworker

Staff at 18th Space Control Squadron, Detachment One (18 SPCS, Det 1), led by Commanding Officer Lt. Col. Erin Dunagan, honored their co-worker Eric Brown at a gathering on May 2 at the Missile Defense Agency Auditorium. Brown, a supervisor in the Advanced Orbital Analyst Cell, passed away unexpectedly Dec. 10, 2017 and his coworkers sought to memorialized Brown's legacy by dedicating their Operations Center in his memory.

It was Brown's legacy of dedication and passion for not only the Space Mission but for life that was the keynote of Dunagan's address to those gathered to honor their coworker and friend.

"Legacy, that's what today is all about, Eric's legacy" Dunagan shared. "We are his legacy, whether from family or work perspective; it's up to us to be his legacy."

Dunagan went on to share Brown's dedication to his family and the space mission and noted that Brown was a naturally gifted mentor and teacher, and that gift was shared not only in the workplace with his peers, but also in his leisure time where Brown was an avid bowler who taught as well as participated.

"Throughout one's career you're lucky if you have one person you remember and say, that's one person I will never forget," Dunagan said. "For me, Eric is that one person. I will remember him my whole career and beyond."

On behalf of the agency, Dunagan presented Brown's wife, Dawn, with a plaque that is the twin to the one that will grace the entrance to the Det 1 Operations Center.

The plaque, constructed of sturdy white oak, proudly bore the emblems of the three services that Brown had served under throughout his life: the Air Force, the Navy and the Army, where he served active duty.

"Two of his co-workers, Sgt. Valladares and Brian McCormick, designed the plaque representing the three services that he worked for," Dunagan explained.

The plaque's inscription read, "The Distributed Space Command and Control Dahlgren Operations Center is hereby dedicated to Eric Maurice Brown for his unwavering leadership and devotion to the men and women of the space community."

Brown got his start at Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahlgren in the mailroom. From there, he applied for positions that better suited his skill set which ultimately landed him his current position as Advanced Orbital Analyst Cell Supervisor. A move that wife,

Dahlgren Students Combine Fun with Function at Beach Cleanup

Earth Day activities culminated on Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahlgren with a beach cleanup coordinated by the NAVFAC and Naval Support Activity South Potomac (NSASP) Environmental Department with "kid-power" provided by students from Dahlgren School. The afternoon of May 1 provided warm breezes and delightful sunshine for the expedition to the shoreline for the group.

The students fought their way through the tall beach grass to pick up nearly a dozen bags of trash and large pieces of PVC pipe, a trash can lid and several buoy markers embedded in the Upper Machodoc Creek shoreline. The students worked together in teams and scoured the shoreline for debris while enjoying the local flora and fauna.

Environmental staff came out in force including Acting Branch Manager Joe Trocchio, Mary Geil, Matt Woodson, Patrick Brown, Dr. Thomas Wray and Adrian Mood from NSF Dahlgren/NAVFAC Environmental and team members Bethany Brown, Rick Neil and Walt Legg from the Naval Surface Warfare Center Dahlgren Dahlgren (NSWCDD) Environmental team to supervise and assist the students as they cleaned, providing gloves, bags and cold water to power their young assistants. Bethany Brown and other employees at Environmental spent time putting together "seed bombs" containing native wildflowers for the students as well so they could carry on their "green mission" at home

Beth Hankins, Dahlgren School 4th, and 5th-grade teacher escorted the students to the location and discussed the area with the students — the Willow Oaks Constructed Stormwater Wetland adjacent to the NSASP Headquarters Building. Hankins provided a bit of background information for the students about the construction of the wetlands in 2013 to remove pollutants accumulated from households and farms from stormwater runoff. These pollutants increase the nitrogen and phosphorous that can cause algae blooms, choking out water and wildlife in the area. The runoff eventually reaches the Chesapeake Bay and further.

"This water [the constructed wetlands] impacts that water [Potomac River] which impacts the Chesapeake [Bay]," Hankins explained. "What they [Environmental] have done to clean up the Machodoc and Potomac has been amazing both here and at Indian Head. They are the real heroes. The water is so much cleaner and healthier because we aren't sending our pollutants there anymore. Marshes are like the sponges that clean up the environment. They are doing their part, and we are going to do our part to help clean up the heach"

The students had to pick their way carefully along the shoreline avoiding the water and

marshy areas along with propelling their way through the dense beach grass to access much of the trash that they removed.

"I thought it would be boring just walking on the beach, but it's been an adventure to find stuff," 4th grader Kaylee said.

"Yeah," agreed Victoria, also a 4th grader. "It's like a tiny adventure tied to cleaning up!"

Hankins appreciates the Environmental Department efforts, creating opportunities for the students to be involved in activities like the annual beach cleanup.

"It's critical that kids have real-world opportunities to see firsthand how litter impacts their environment," Hankins said. "These kinds of events allow them to contribute to saving their environment and be a part of their community. They can come down here and see first-hand all of the trash that has been disposed of in the water and shoreline and understand that impact."

Legg from the NSWCDD Environmental team also shared his thoughts on the day.

"Helping them [the students] to understand the relationships that things on Earth have to each other and the numerous impacts that our actions can have works toward achieving that goal," Legg shared. "It is easy to throw a sixpack ring out a car window, but if you know the impact that might have, tangling a turtle or bird, or becoming part of the great floating sea of plastic in the ocean, you think twice. A dead battery is easy to throw in the water, but

if you are aware of the damage the heavy metals it contains can do to marine life, you think twice. These students' enthusiasm and their commentary on the potential impacts of the different types of trash they collected during the cleanup demonstrated a true appreciation for the environment and desire to make a better world."

Kudos to the students and special thanks to both of the Environmental Department's staff for putting the programming together and escorted the students.

NSWC DD Employees Bring Science to Life at Spotswood Elementary

The next Elon Musk, Cornelia Bargmann, Mark Zuckerberg that's what drives a group of young Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) professionals from Naval Surface Warfare Center Dahlgren Division (NSWCDD) to mentor the next generation. Somewhere in the crowded gymnasium at Spotswood Elementary school in Spotsylvania could be the next Stephen Hawking — only they don't know it yet, because they haven't been introduced to that one "wow!" concept. That is why the professionals take time out of their busy lives to ensure that they bring the wow to this group of youngsters during the April

Along with some other STEM students and professionals from around the region, NSWCDD employees presented experiments and demonstrations designed to elicit the same response from the attendees — "Cool!" "Wow!" Those moments spark interest that is needed now more than ever as the need for STEM professionals continues to climb not just in the United States, but globally.

It's not just the students that are mystified and electrified (sometimes literally!) at these types of events, parents who have brought their budding Higgs and Einsteins are impressed and genuinely grateful that their children have the opportunity to enjoy the STEM exposure.

"It's great for the kids to see this in action. It's more than just what they learn in their classroom; they see that there are practical uses for it and places where they can work in it," Shelby, a mom to three young daughters, noted as two of the girls experimented with a robotic hand.

Indeed, demonstrating those concepts in action and eliciting genuine awe from the children and adults is part of the joy of the job for Jamshaid "J.D." Chaudhry, an NSWCDD engineer who has organized the events for the last several years.

"For me, it's always the reaction from the people," Chaudhry shared. "The liquid nitrogen experiments, the Van de Graaff generator... they are such simple chemistry and physics concepts, but so many folks don't have any idea what creates them. To be able to share that with the kids and see their reactions — it's so worth the time and effort."





Naval Sea Systems Command (NAVSEA) employees from Naval Surface Warfare Center Dahlgren Division (NSWCDD) brought Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) concepts to life at the Spotswood Elementary School Science Evening. Employees demonstrated experiments with liquid nitrogen, a robotic hand and a hair-raising experience with a Van De Graaf generator. Students and parents alike were enthralled with the demonstrations and walked away entertained and educated

Matt Busby, also an NSWCDD employee, sees the importance of spending a few hours on a Friday night with simple experiments. Helping budding scientists or engineers learn more about the field and ultimately pursue the field is rewarding.

"I feel like we are getting the next generation of scientists interested in pursuing those mathematics and science fields," Matt

Youngsters like 5th grader Raylee were impressed.

"It's cool to learn about these things — things we haven't seen in the school yet," Raylee said. "I love this [the Van de Graaff generator]! It's showing us electricity [and] how electricity is produced," Raylee said.

Second-grader Ella agreed as she watched the liquid nitrogen demonstration. "It was really cool watching what they do."

Ella's Dad said she is a big science fan who also enjoys experimenting. A one-time science teacher, he shared that having this sort of program is vital to engaging the youngsters in a lifelong

Many of the adults agreed that STEM was not promoted as much as it is now and the promotion of the sciences has undoubtedly been effective in attracting the younger generation to the field.

"When I was a kid, STEM didn't seem like that big of a deal," Chaudhry said. "I don't know what changed, but I am glad it did. It wasn't until college for me that I really began to realize just how important STEM is."

Chaudhry and his team are helping to spread that message. The seven participants each demonstrated a different concept, and Chaudhry would love to interest more of the Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahlgren professionals in participating in these important events. He hopes that they can attract a diverse team to assist in presenting all aspects of the field to the next generation of science professionals.

"We have seven folks out here tonight, most of them are new hires," Chaudhry shared. "It's awesome to have them take part in this. We'd really love to get some IT folks involved as well We want to get that STEM message out there."

NSASP Police Officers Recognized for Suspicious Package Response

Throughout the year, Naval Support Activity South Potomac (NSASP) security forces and emergency response personnel drill for crisis circumstances that may never occur: active shooters, hurricanes, hazardous material handling. But they train nonetheless, just in case; on March 26, that training paid dividends.

Amidst the suspicious packages mailed out to various military commands throughout the region that day was one addressed to the Joint Warfare Analysis Center (JWAC) on Naval Support Facility (NSF) Dahlgren. Once notified of the incident, that "rainy day" training kicked in and the NSASP Police Day Squad immediately stepped into action mode, securing and isolating the package, and ensuring that everyone involved was sheltered or appropriately evacuated.

"We have countless drills and numerous responses to 'false alarm' suspicious packages so when this real-world event happened, everyone did what they were trained to do," NSASP Police Chief Robert Brooks said. "I was particularly impressed with our supervisors and how they organized and managed the incident. [Police] Maj. Dan Henderson was one of the first responders on the scene and his calm, insightful leadership was one of the main reason out response was so effective."


NSASP police officers coordinated the response with installation Fire, Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) and Emergency Management assets, as well as the Stafford County Sheriff's Office K-9 Unit.

"This was also a great opportunity to work with our Fire Brothers by establishing a joint command post and coordinating the efforts between law enforcement and fire rescue," Brooks noted. "I would also give great credit to local law enforcement for providing in a very rapid manner the use of a bomb-sniffing K-9 and handler. Everything fell into place, which was not surprising, but very satisfying."

Ultimately, the incident was resolved aboard the installation and NSASP forces were able to coordinate with other facilities

around the region, as well as federal authorities and the perpetrator was apprehended quickly.

"Our officers are highly trained and they train for a multitude of scenarios," Stan Chizuk, NSASP security director said. "They handled the situation in a professional manner and it just validates that the training really pays off."

ADMIRAL HAROLD R. STARK AWARD FOR INNOVATION: As the Naval Inspector of Ordnance in charge of the Naval Proving Grounds, Dahlgren, Va., and the Naval Powder Factory, Indian Head, Md., Admiral Harold R. Stark became the Chief of Naval Operations in 1939. This award recognizes an individual or group who advances the state-of-the-art in their field of endeavor. Presented to Kenneth Basom, Robert Breaux, Bryan Milani and Wesley Posey, from the Information Management Division, for their collaboration to create the Homemade Explosives Recognition Tool as part of the EOD Tactical Decision Aid. The HME recognition tool is a significant achievement that has led to advancement of HME identification.

JOE L. BROWNING AWARD FOR MANAGE-RIAL EXCELLENCE: Joe L. Browning was NSWC IHEODTD's first Technical Director from 1962 — 1975. He was renowned for his innovative approaches to recruiting, motivating and developing personnel. This award recognizes supervisors who demonstrate managerial excellence, practice quality leadership principles, and demonstrate coaching and teaming management skills. Presented to Melissa Milani, Systems Engineering Department, System Safety Branch manager, who developed a knowledge base in supervisory requirements

and established routine communication with line management and Labor and Employee Relations to address performance and conduct concerns.

DR. GEORGE W. PATTERSON AWARD FOR **OUTSTANDING ACCOMPLISHMENT:** As chief chemist and powder expert, Dr. George Patterson is remembered for his work accomplished during his 41-year tenure, including developing smokeless and flash-less gunpowders. This award honors an individual for outstanding technical accomplishment supporting the NSWC IHEODTD mission and advancing some area of technology. Presented to Angel Diaz, EOD Department engineer, for leading the Graphically Layered Aiming System Supported by Orthogonal X-ray (GLASS-BOX) effort. GLASSBOX revolutionizes the ability to translate X-ray images into 3-D virtual objects, so EOD technicians can evaluate and dispose of a threat they cannot directly see.

ROBERT B. DASHIELL AWARD FOR EXCEL-LENCE: Ensign Robert B. Dashiell was NSWC IHEODTD's first commanding officer and is known for establishing the facility, including supervision of building and acquisition of staff and materials. He was also a specialist in gun mechanical design and invented the Dashiell rapid-fire breech. This award honors an individual who, within the past year, has made a significant contribution to the command's mission. Presented to Julie Greaves-Jacko, Contracts Department, for her significant contribution to the mission and operation of the command. She provided outstanding support on top priority construction projects for NSWC IHEODTD while providing excellent and consistent support to EOD Department's Demonstration and Assessment Team Program multiple-award contract.
