Navy reestablishes Sailor early return-to-sea policy

FROM NAVY PERSONNEL COMMAND PUBLIC AFFAIRS

In an effort to fill critical billets at sea, the Navy announced June 27 that it has increased detailers' authority to transfer Sailors from their shore duty assignment earlier

than their projected rotation date (PRD).

Announced in NAVADMIN 156/18, the Sailor Early Return to Sea (SERTS) policy enables enlisted rating detailers to begin filling high-priority E4 - E9 sea duty billets by using an increased distribu-

tion authority.

"Navy Personnel Command already has a number of programs and policies that provide Sailors an opportunity to volunteer to return to sea duty early," said Capt. Alonza Ross, director, NPC Enlisted Distribution Division,

Career Management Department. "A number of these programs provide incentives such as money or C-WAY deferment."

"When the available number of Sailors for a key rate or with critical skills-Navy Enlisted Classification Codes - NECs- isn't avail-

able due to any number of reasons, the detailers will use the plus or minus six-month transfer window," said Ross. "In those cases, where the transferring population just isn't there, NPC will use the SERTS

Blended Retirement nears midpoint

FROM CHIEF OF NAVAL PERSONNEL PUBLIC AFFAIRS

Navy issued a reminder for all commands to notify Sailors who are eligible to opt-in to the Blended Retirement System (BRS) in NAVADMIN 158/18, released July 2.

Unlike the current retirement system which provides a retirement pension of 2.5 percent of base pay for every year of service (YOS), BRS provides automatic and government matching Thrift Savings Plan (TSP) contributions, a mid-career Continuation Pay and a retirement pension of 2.0 percent of base pay for every YOS.

Command administration departments must contact their supporting personnel office to verify that

the list of opt-in eligible Sailors within their command is current.

Sailors have until December 31, 2018 to opt-in to the BRS and enrollment can be completed via the "MyPay" website.

Sailors who choose not to enroll in the BRS will remain in the current "legacy" retirement system. If a Sailor elects to enroll in the BRS, that decision is permanent.

The NAVADMIN also notes that the BRS mid-career continuation pay rates for 2019 can be found at: http://www.public.navy.mil/bupers-npc/support/21st_Century_Sailor/readiness/Pages/Personal-Financial-Management.aspx.

To receive the mid-career continuation pay, Sailors must have opted into BRS and requested continuation pay before reaching twelve years of service.

Fleet and Family celebrates 39th anniversary

FROM NAS KEY WEST PUBLIC AFFAIRS

The Fleet and Family Support Program marked 39 years of service to Sailors and their families the first week of July. On July 9, 1979, the first Family Service Center (FSC) opened its doors in Norfolk, Va. FSC San Diego opened its doors shortly there-

after.

In 1978, the Navy acknowledged that it was losing some of its very best people because of family issues. Then Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Thomas Hayward, wrote that his number one priority was to improve retention by improving family awareness and implementing a family support program. Shortly afterward, the first

Navy Family Awareness Conference was held in Norfolk. The conference was originally going to be called the Family Support Conference but organizers changed the name to spotlight their goal to develop resilient and self-reliant families, not dependent families. The conference concluded the

Navy was insufficiently attending to family needs and the programs and policies designed to support families were inadequate and fragmented.

“Fleet and Family is a resource for families to come and get confidential support at no cost,” said Danielle Martin, NAS Key West Sexual Assault Response Coordinator. “We help with emotional support, job support, financial services and many other services.”

The Navy Fleet and Family Support program is organized into three functional areas critical to mission success, core family

readiness, sexual assault prevention and response program, and the Navy gold star program.

The core family readiness program is for work and family life. The program directly supports mission readiness by preparing service members and their

families for the physical, emotional, interpersonal, and logistical demands of the military lifestyle. Some of the services this program provides are

deployment support, transition assistance, personal financial management, relocation assistance, counseling, new parent support, and domestic abuse victim advocacy.

The sexual assault prevention and response program provides sexual assault awareness and prevention education, victim

advocacy, response coordination, case management and incident data collection to active-duty personnel, adult members and commands.

The Navy gold star program is the Navy’s official program for providing long-term nonmedical case management, information and referral, education, recognition and support services to surviving families of service members who pass while on active duty.

“I have worked at Fleet and Family for over twenty years,” said Martin. “It has provided me the opportunity to serve military members and give back to them.”

Today, the Fleet and Family Support Program continues to deliver its core mission with a growing number of programs and services focusing on deployment support, crisis response, career support and counseling for individuals, families and commands.



program to identify Sailors who can be moved back to sea duty early to help address readiness issues in the Fleet."

Factors that will be considered as to whether a Sailor is eligible for SERTS are length of time on shore, current or frocked paygrade, fleet experience, NECs held, types of previous sea duty, and remaining obligated service.

Sailors must have completed at least 18-23 months of shore duty, and

will not transfer until they have at least completed 24 months on shore. Further, the impact on a Sailor's shore duty command will be balanced against at-sea priorities. Sailors in special program billets such as recruit division commanders, recruiters, brig duty, instructors and special warfare operators will not be considered for SERTS. Nuclear-trained Sailors will continue to be detailed according to the Naval Nuclear Propulsion Program.

In addition to filling billets at their current pay grade, SERTS candidates

may be selected to fill vacant requirements within their pay band: supervisor (E7-E9), journeyman (E5-E6), and apprentice (E1-E4). For example, E8s and E9s may be chosen to fill vacant E7 and E8 requirements.

Upon selection, the Navy Personnel Command will notify the Sailor and the Sailor's current command of the possible transfer. Sailors and their command may submit an adverse impact statement within 15 days of notification. For more information, read the NAVADMIN at www.npc.navy.mil.
