Rig brings readiness through fitness

Jordan Fitness Center will soon become the hub for Army combat fitness training on Fort Stewart with the addition of the Alpha Warrior Battle Rig and extended hours of operation.

If you've visited Jordan recently, you've likely witnessed the construction of the new Battle Rig, a 35 foot fitness structure located in the heart of the gym. Similar in appearance to a favorite televised obstacle challenge the rig wasn't designed for celebrities, rather warriors. It focuses on Soldier readiness through functional fitness training with a high concentration placed on the new Army Combat Fitness Training program.


"Functional fitness has become more relevant in day to day operations throughout the Army as seen in the new Army Combat Fitness training requirements." said Randy Ray, program manager for Jordan and Caro fitness centers. "The Alpha Warrior Battle Rig was adopted by the Army to help build and promote the functional fitness program. We can incorporate any type of movement or exercise into the workout on or around the rig to support several levels of fitness requirements."

The rig is set to open to the Stewart-Hunter community in January. In the meantime, a train-the-trainer program is in place for units who would like to learn how to use the rig before its grand opening to the community. "Currently, we can train 39 people at a time on rig basics and safety to include how to conduct workouts." Ray said. "From there we will turn the training over to the units to use during PT hours."

Once the rig is fully operational, patrons will be able to use the equipment any time of day or night as Jordan Fitness center is slated to become a 24-hour fitness center. "We are currently working on installation of the surveillance system as well as getting our patrons registered on-line through the RecTrac system," Ray said. "We are hoping to open our doors as a 24-hour facility sometime in the early months of 2019."

In addition to the Alpha Warrior Battle Rig, Jordan Fitness Center is home to cardio and weight rooms complete with Life Fitness weight machines and functional fitness equipment. The fitness center is open to all Department of Defense identification cardholders to include civilian contractors and guests who are accompanied by a card-holder.

Finance Soldiers deploy to Kuwait

Approximately 20 Soldiers with Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, 24th Financial Management Support Unit, Special Troops Battalion, 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade, deployed to Kuwait on Oct. 28 from Fort Stewart.

The three detachments within the company deploy on a rotational basis at home and abroad. Currently, their Alpha Detachment is in the Republic of Kosovo and Bravo Detachment is part of the Global Response Force. Now it's HHD's turn to support forces in the Middle East.

The team's nine month deployment is in support of Operation Spartan Shield to provide financial management assistance. They expect to perform disbursing, commercial vendor services, internal controls and military pay support to U.S. forces, civilians and contractors, as well as multi-national and joint commands.

"We are in charge of two offices in Iraq, one in Jordan and one in Afghanistan, including the ones in Kuwait," said Sgt. Hali Pasden, an information technology specialist with HHD. "My job is to make sure that all the finance systems are running smoothly and all the Eagle Cash Card kiosks work."

Soldiers in HHD will do tasks overseas that are different from what they are used to at home. They were trained for two weeks in dispersing funds, commercial vendor pay and military pay by the U.S. Army Financial Management Command so that they would be ready to tackle the mission.

"It was a lot of knowledge that we had to intake in a short period of time," said Pvt. Crystal Gonzalez, an invoice receipt processor with HHD. "Here, I was processing and coding leave forms, there I'll be dealing with contractors."

Even though the challenges of learning and applying new skills and leaving their families and homes for nine months seems daunting, the Soldiers look at the deployment as an opportunity to learn and grow in their Army careers.

"They say that you don't really do finance until you're down range, so I'm excited to do real finance and

Combat engineer strikes gold

Pfc. Steven Cosme of 9th Brigade Engineer Battalion, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team recently returned from Fort Huachuca, Arizona after competing in the All Army Boxing Competition, Aug. 26. He ventured across the country in hopes of striking gold.

Cosme first attended the All Army Boxing Competition in 2017. He made it to the finals, but was defeated by split decision. He vowed to come back and take gold. He knew he would endure many early mornings and long nights of training after his duty day to get it done.

"When I wanted to quit, I remembered I promised my son I would bring him home a gold medal," said Cosme.

This time, he went to work immediately upon arriving in Fort Huachuca and established a training regimen to adapt to his new conditions.

The competition proved tiring, filled with constant stressors. Cardio was crucial daily to stay within his light welterweight class. During camp, fighters are on the coach's time. Going home when training's done was no longer an option. The competition's training program differed from Cosme's routine at Fort Stewart and the surrounding coastal areas. Cosme fought through all day, six days a week training demands. The continuous training was a major adjustment from his normal after work routine.

Despite all the challenges, Cosme pushed through and relentlessly pursued his goal. He poured maximum effort into every workout. He took advice from coaches and other competitors, adapting to the changes as the days passed.

"The All-Army Boxing tournament is the toughest amateur boxing competition," said Cosme.

Steven's family also played a key role in keeping him on track, offering words of encouragement when his muscles ached and fatigue plagued his psyche.

"Son, you've come too far to stop now," Cosme's father, Steven Sr., told him during a phone call. His father knew Cosme had the strength, skill and determination it took to go the distance. "I will always be in your corner. You got this," added Steven Sr.

Cosme struck gold at the All Army Boxing Championship, winning by unanimous decision. He concedes that he trained with and fought excellent fighters. Cosme is grateful for the experience.

"It was an honor to compete and gain experience from such elite boxers," said Cosme. Inset, Gold Medalist Cosme was presei a company and battalion coin.

Chef prepares healthy treats

Executive Chef Wanda White and the Humane Society of the United States, partnered with 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, to help Soldiers incorporate more plant-based ingredients into a healthy diet during a Food Forward culinary experience, Oct. 24, at Fort Stewart.

White and food service specialists of 2ABCT created breakfast and lunch dishes for Soldiers at the dining facility administrative center. They used plant-based ingredients in their meals, and watched as Soldiers gobbled down pancakes. The pancakes are normally made with eggs, but this time were prepared with applesauce instead.

Modern warfare requires service members to stay versatile in challenging environments, and eating healthy helps achieve that mission.

"My goal is to persuade more people into consuming lower cholesterol items, which will result in a higher performance in their daily activities," White said. "The hardest part of eating healthy is being disciplined enough to avoid unhealthy food groups."

White travels to more than 100 locations a year, teaching others the importance of a healthy diet.

She started cooking at the age of ten. Her mother taught Wanda and her younger sibling the basic fundamentals of cooking. The Memphis, Tennessee native wore many hats before donning one of a chef. She's established a pattern of service throughout her life, first working as a registered nurse. White went on to contribute to the Art Institute of Dallas as a faculty member and now as an executive chef for the HSUS.

"I plan to get more Soldiers eating healthier by leaving the recipes anonymous. Doing so allows the consumer to judge more effectively without knowing what's actually in it," White said.

The Spartan culinary team plans to incorporate more plant ingredients throughout the dining facility, allowing Soldiers the opportunity to experience a variety of healthy dishes across the 2ABCT.

QUANTICO, VA - The Army community and American public can use their computers and smart-phones to submit tips about crimes, suspicious activity or threats to the U.S. Army's Criminal Investigation Command via a digital crime tips submission system.

The CID crime tips submission system is a web-based and or smart-phone app submission method. The public can access the system via any Internetconnected device by visiting, *http://www.cid.army.mil/*. In addition to the web interface, the app is for submission of tips and is available for free download from the Apple Store and Google Play at *http://www.p3tips.com/app. aspx?ID=325*. The CID Crime Tips app is also approved for download on Government smart phones and devices. Apple users can access the app through the DoD Enterprise Mobility Personal Use Mobile Apps and DoD Apps icons on their device. Android users can access the app using the Mobile@ Work icon on their device.

According to CID's implementation project manager, Special Agent Christopher L. Adams, the system provides users a safe, secure and anonymous method to report criminal activity and security threats without concerns of retaliation or fear. He explained that whenever a person submits a tip online, the completed form is securely transferred directly to Army CID through a Secure Sockets Layer connection, which means that the tips are encrypted, entirely confidential and completely anonymous. Users can also attach images, videos and documents with their tips.

"This new system is the ideal solution for 'tipsters' to report criminal activities or suspicious activity anonymously. Tips received will be seamlessly assigned to various units for further investigation. Additionally, persons providing anonymous tips will have the ability to communicate with the CID Agents," Adams said. "After submitting a tip, a tip reference/ID number is created that allows the tipster to create a password to check the status of the submitted tip or check on the status of a reward – if applicable. So do not misplace your ID number, as it will be needed to check on the status of your tip."

There is also the multi-language feature for global use that allows tips to be auto-converted into English on the back-end regardless of what language they were submitted. Tips will be responded to in English and auto-translated back to their source language during the two-way dialog process.

According to Christopher Grey, CID's spokesman, individuals can report a crime though the CID Crime Tips app, or by contacting your local CID office.

"It is critical for people to say something when they see something and it literally can mean the difference between life and death or someone receiving the justice they deserve or victimizing another innocent person," Grey said. "If you haven't already done so, download the app today or bookmark CID's Report-a-Crime web page."



WASHINGTON -- Over the next year, 26 installations are scheduled to receive the new Squad Advanced Marksmanship Trainer -- with the first potential location slated for Fort Drum, New York, officials said.

The Army has been working on a squad-immersive environment since 2009, but limitations on virtual reality and other related technologies have hindered the development process, according to Maj. Gen. Maria Gervais, director of the Synthetic Training Environment Cross-Functional Team.

Recent advancements in the \$5.2 billion virtual reality and gaming industry, though, have enabled the Army to field the virtual marksmanship trainer as an "immediate solution until a more robust squad-immersive environment is developed," Gervais said.

Tied to the Soldier Lethality Cross-Functional Team, the new trainer is a joint venture with the Marine Corps, helping infantry and "close combat" forces achieve their training objectives, Gervais explained during the Association of the United States Army's Annual Meeting and Exposition Oct. 10.

During a recent demonstration at Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton, California, forces were outfitted with a goggle device synced to the Squad Advanced Marksmanship Trainer. From there, the squad lined up in a four-man stack and went through a series of breach and clear scenarios, the general said.

Through the marksmanship training device, one scenario transported breaching forces to a Middle Eastern virtually-constructed environment, where they engaged with simulated enemy forces. More importantly, Gervais said, the fourman stack was able to do this while navigating through a live training environment.

"Now, we're seeing technology where you can link the squad in, they can move, they can shoot, and keep going," she said. "So, pretty exciting stuff."

One World Terrain

In addition to the virtual trainer, the Synthetic Training Environment Cross-Functional Team, or STE CFT, recently approved an "Army Collective Training Environment Initial Capability Document" to serve as the foundation for all STE support elements.

"We need to be able to provide our Soldiers and leaders the ability to conduct hundreds of repetitions wherever they are located so they can improve muscle memory and increase proficiency," Gervais said. "The STE makes it possible to enhance home-station training and unit performance. Most importantly, the STE is focused on establishing common standards, common data, and common terrain to maximize interoperability, ease of integration, and cost savings."

Additionally, the STE team has increased their industry engagement, leading to the selection of two firms to support development of "One World Terrain" and another two for the Army's air and ground simulation platforms.

Moving forward, the CFT is considering what architecture and industry support is necessary to maintain the STE as a service, the general said. Similar to the way Netflix works, incorporating a "training as a service" business model would potentially keep the STE up to date with the newest tools, providing Soldiers the best possible training without any latency.

"With One World Terrain, we want to be able to pull down terrain at the right fidelity. If you're a squad, the fidelity has got to be better," Gervais said. "It's not a game. If there's latency ... you lose it. And when you're doing ... an exercise in your training, you can't have that."

In addition to the right fidelity, the Army must streamline the material process to avoid slowing the research, development, and acquisition procedures supporting STE, said Retired Gen. Peter W. Chiarelli, former vice chief of staff of the Army.

"This is not a tomorrow problem. This isn't a problem that we need to wait five years to develop requirements, and wait another eight to 10 years to go ahead and field something to Soldiers. We need choice -- we need to turn to industry," Chiarelli said.

Green to Gold program provides opportunity for enlisted Soldiers to earn degree, commission.

2nd Lt. Blake Pickel began his career in the Army when he enlisted in 2007, today he serves as the Executive Officer for the Raider Brigade's support medical company after commissioning in 2017 through the Green to Gold scholarship program.

"When I first came in I had just got my GED and my goals were to get into a medical branch in the Army and then get out and go to college or work in the profession I was doing in the Army," said Pickel. "I found out about the Green to Gold program because three of my friends had gone through it."

The Green to Gold scholarship program offers enlisted Soldiers an opportunity to complete their undergraduate education and become commissioned officers. The 3rd Infantry Division can nominate up to five Soldiers for the 2019 – 2020 schoolyear with applications due by March 1, 2019.

Once the packets are reviewed and submitted,

cadet command will review them and decide who is awarded scholarships said David Sims, the Mission Support G1. Sims added that a key to a successful packet is timeliness.

"Don't wait to put your packet together," said Sims. "Especially in getting the required documents from the schools that you are applying to."

Pickel echoed the importance of beginning the application process as early as possible.

"Luckily I had three people to mentor me through the process but one of the first things they told me is immediately start the physical process because that takes the longest," said Pickel who commissioned from Middle Tennessee State University. "Notify your chain of command early that you are interested so that it's not a last minute thing."

The Green to Gold Hip Pocket Scholarship Program looks to award high performing Soldiers who display the "Scholar, Athlete, Leader" attributes desired of commissioned officers. Pickel, who was accepted into the program as a Staff Sergeant, said his next goals are to complete his key developmental jobs in his field and for his current and future rank.

"I definitely see the bigger picture with the Army and how I can have a larger impact through the organization, said Pickel. "It's also kept things fresh in the Army so as I approach retirement it's given me a new outlook and new challenges."

Soldiers have the opportunity to complete their first baccalaureate or first master's degree while earning their commission through the Reserve Officer Training Corps program. The scholarships are available in two, three, or four year options depending on how many college credits Soldiers have already completed.

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER Do your duty, find fulfillment

"Nothing makes sense! Everything is nonsense, I have seen it all – nothing makes sense!"

That's in the **Bible**. The Preacher of the book of **Ecclesiastes** was said to be very wise, and he started his book with those words. He wraps up the first chapter by saying, "*Everything that happens has happened before; nothing is new, nothing under the sun*. Someone might say, 'Here is something new!' But it happened before, long before we were born. No one who lived in the past is remembered anymore, and everyone yet to be born will be forgotten too."

Pretty depressing, isn't it? It can be especially difficult to read if you've seen the pain, instability and brevity of life firsthand. It's not hard to understand why people give up and say, "Eat, drink and be merry, for tomorrow we die!"

The philosophy of many today might be stated as, "You do what you can and you get along. If you can make money, fine. Do whatever makes you happy because all too soon you will be old and you'll be sick and you won't be able to enjoy life."

The problem is that most folks find that they aren't really satisfied by that way of looking at life, either. For example, money doesn't make people miserable, but if people think money will bring them happiness and fulfillment, they're generally disappointed. Have you ever heard of "a bird in a gilded cage"? If, like Howard Hughes, you can't leave your very posh home because you're afraid, you're still a prisoner.

There has to be more to life than fun, money or power. The Preacher of Ecclesiastes looked at everything around him – wisdom, laughter (including the joy of art and beauty), labor, riches – pretty much all of what people think makes life important – and decided, "*vanity of vanity; all is vanity.*"

So, if nothing really matters over the long haul, what's the point of people's lives? The Preacher decided: "I know that there is nothing better for them than to rejoice and to do good in one's lifetime." We need simply to do our duty, for there we find fulfillment, value and joy. St. Paul wrote, "For we are His [God's] workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand so that we would walk in them (Ephesians 2:10)." If we do what God expects of us, we'll be doing the right things for the right reasons. That's a pretty good way to live.

General Robert E. Lee said, "Duty then is the sublimest word in the English language. You should do your duty in all things. You can never do more, you should never wish to do less." Or, as the Preacher said, "The conclusion, when all has been heard, is: fear God and keep His commandments, because this applies to every person (Ecclesiastes 12:13)."



Services support for Brigade readiness

A team of Soldiers scan their position while looking through the periscopes of a Bradley Fighting Vehicle. Suddenly, they hear gunshots. "Contact three o'clock!" yells one of the Soldiers to their team.

The Bradley's gunner unleashes fire from the M242 Bushmaster, but instead of pushing through a choke-point, the vehicle only lurches forward and slams back. Smoke and an acrid smell fills the fire teams' nostrils. The crew has to call for recovery assets while fighting off a determined enemy.

This training scenario is fiction, but the danger is real. The Soldiers in the fight could get stranded or become casualties due to poor maintenance. These scenarios make it essential for units to perform regular and annual maintenance on all vehicles and systems.

Soldiers and maintenance teams assigned to Company A, 3rd Battalion, 15th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, began annual services on their BFVs this week. Throughout the month of October, the maintenance team has worked to ready the entire battalion's BFVs for their upcoming gunnery training.

Annual services include fluid and filter changes, greasing lube points, and inspecting the track for faults. Key components of the engine, transmission and turret also get inspected.

"Your crew level jobs, your 10-level jobs, are greasing, cleaning, draining, (and) re-filling hubs," said Sgt. Randy Young, a Co. A, 3-15 Inf., 2ABCT BFV systems maintainer. "Then you have the 20-level checks for the mechanics. We change filters, change oils, change hydraulic filters, fuel filters, check linkages, look for missing or broken parts and replace them on the spot or put something on order."

The maintenance team hustled to meet repair deadlines, but no more than four Bradleys are serviced each week. This ensures all faults have ample time to be corrected and no details are overlooked.

"Services are kind of rushed because it does take a while, but no less than a week a platoon," Young said.



"Services keep our machines ready for war. Keeps our lethality up, in not only the company, but the Battalion and the brigade. And it allows us to be ready to go whenever the nation calls," said 1st Lt. Andy Schouten, Co. A executive officer.

Annual services and regular maintenance are critical to keeping Soldiers safe and vehicles in the fight, but operators and mechanics maintain the line.

40 years of aviation service

REDSTONE ARSENAL, Ala. -- The UH-60 Black Hawk has been the Army's front line utility helicopter for the past 40 years, and it shows no signs of letting up.

Now in its fourth decade of service, the Black Hawk was developed as a result of the Army's requirement in 1972 for a simple, robust and reliable utility helicopter system to satisfy projected air-mobile requirements around the globe.

Named after the Native American war chief and leader of the Sauk tribe in the Midwest, Black Hawk, the first production UH-60A was accepted by the Army in 1978, and entered service in 1979 when it was delivered to aviation components of the 101st and 82nd Airborne Divisions. Since that time, the Black Hawk has accumulated more than nine million total fleet hours, and has supported Soldiers in every major contingency operation the Army has executed, including Grenada, Panama, Iraq, Somalia, the Balkans, Afghanistan and throughout the Middle East.

Over the years, the helicopter has been modified and upgraded to support evolving missions and roles, including mine laying, medical evacuation and special operations. Today, the Army continues to integrate emerging technology enhancements into the Black Hawk fleet to increase the performance, reliability, availability and maintainability of the platform through addition of technologies such as the integration of the Improved Turbine Engine; upgrades to the airframe, including an improved troop seat for additional crash worthiness; and a lightweight, composite all-moving tail.

"Developing and fielding an aircraft that has earned and maintained an extraordinary reputation of remarkable service supporting Soldiers over a full spectrum of military operations these past 40 years is the direct result of the incredible efforts of all the government and industry teammates who have supported the Black Hawk program throughout the history of the program," said Col. Billy Jackson, program manager for PEO Aviation's Utility Helicopters Program Office. "I'm exceptionally proud of this team and the herculean effort everyone puts in managing a very complex program with such sustained success."

Today, the UH-60 Black Hawk makes up the Army's largest rotary wing fleet with more than 2100 airframes in the current inventory. As production of the most current H-60M model continues, over the coming years the Army will divest its remaining UH-60A and L aircraft, to

be replaced by 760 UH-60Vs.

With multiple versions of the H-60 Black Hawk in service, the helicopter is considered the "workhorse" of Army Aviation. Besides being the U.S. Army's primary tactical transport helicopter, approximately 1,200 H-60s operate in 30 partner and allied nations, making it a key component to enhancing partner capacity.

For nearly half a century the Black Hawk has served remarkably as the primary medium lift, multi-role helicopter for the U.S. Army. Although it has been around for longer than most of the current generation of Soldiers it supports, don't expect to see if fly off into the sunset anytime soon. With planned major upgrades such as the Improved Turbine Engine on the horizon, the platform will be a key component of the Army Aviation fleet through 2054.

"The Utility Helicopters Program Office, in collaboration with our government and industry partners who support the Black Hawk, have worked diligently for 40 years to provide operational commanders and Soldiers the much needed capabilities the Army's workhorse helicopter provides," said Jackson. "We will continue to adapt to meet current and future needs to ensure the Black Hawk remains relevant in the operational environment over the next 40."
