IRONHORSE

On October 28, 2018 at the National Training Center, Blackjack Troop, 1st Squadron, 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment was charged with attacking towards the Colorado Wash. Blackjack Troop traveled into the enemy support zone from the Rotational Training Unit from 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 4th Infantry Division. They were successful at destroying the enemy outright in their attack.

Demon MIBN, a Mechanized Infantry Battalion, consisting of Blackjack Troop and Dealer Company, relentlessly attacked into the Colorado. Demon MIBN's combat power is split into three separate Mechanized Infantry Companies. The first MIC was tasked with fixing the enemy, the second MIC was tasked with assaulting, and the third MIC was tasked with support by fire. Their mission was a success as one platoon from Demon MIBN was able to maneuver into the enemy support zone.

"Through syncing our combat power and executing the mission as we rehearsed, we were able to push a good amount of our combat power through the support zone close to the RTU's Brigade TOC" said Christian Peralta, Commander of Demon MIBN.

Although Demon MIBN was successful, the odds were stacked heavily in the RTU's favor. The RTU's forces were arrayed in a strong defense. However, Demon MIBN was able to find a solution. "We were able to locate a seam in their defense and exploit it." Said Peralta. "It was remarkable what these MIBN Troopers were able to do being grossly undermanned. CPT Williams and I are extremely proud of these troopers, because we ask them to do the impossible, at which they excel."

The teamwork of Blackjack Troop and Dealer Company resulted in destroying a company of armored vehicles. "Their relentless effort and determination to better our Army was proven that day. Allowing the RTU to identify weaknesses in their plan will better prepare them for future operations," said 1st Lt. Stephen Pavlick, Blackjack Troop Executive Officer. "This perfectly highlights the purpose of the NTC where Brigades are brought in and tested on their ability to execute combat missions in future deployments."

By day four, I realized that many of the people I spoke to were right, The Box certainly had its negative aspects. I am sure that a majority of Soldiers would rather be sleeping in their own beds, eating their own food, and at home with their families. But on that same day, I realized that there are many lessons that can be learned out in The Box if many of us decided to focus on growth as opposed to being focused on the negative things we have no control over.

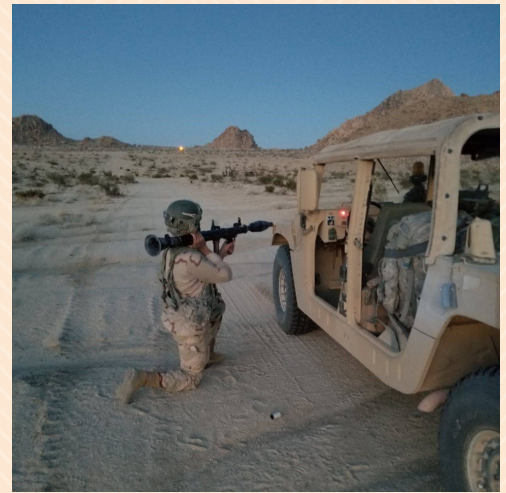


For instance, The Box gives us a chance to learn and develop with the people we work closest with. In the experiences I had throughout my life, it has been made apparent that the teams that work best together are the ones that bond together on a personal level, creating shared experiences and understanding. For that reason, I used this rotation, my first as a new Platoon Leader, to make sure that I got the chance to sit down and converse with each one of the Soldiers in my Platoon. This effort was made, because I feel that it is not only important to know WHO my Soldiers are, but it is just as important to know WHY they are, meaning their purpose here on Earth. As a team, the members of the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment should strive to use the down time we have in The Box, to learn about the men and women to our left and right. Although it seems like a minute task, it will help the overall performance of the unit as a whole, by creating a team that is founded on trust. We can also learn why it is important for us to take advantage of the training opportunities we are provided each time we roll out to the box. At least ten times a year, Rotational Units from all over show up to Fort Irwin. This means that ten times a year, we are offered the chance to compare and contrast our unit tactics to that of the RTUs. It may not seem that exciting, but as a new Platoon Leader, I believe it is important for me to see what works and what does not work for the RTU for two reasons. The first encompasses the fact that we are the OPFOR, so picking up on their tendencies can help us stay one step ahead of them. More importantly, I know that I have soldiers that will PCS to those units one day, and I feel that is my job to prepare them and make sure they at least have a solid foundation of knowledge upon arrival to their next unit. The Box provides plenty of opportunity for growth and development personally, and as a unit. It is on us to take advantage of the change of pace from Garrison life, and to implement a culture that see's going out to The Box as a positive occurrence instead of a nuisance we must deal for nine days each month.

Wind whips across the desert as the three M113A3 Armored Personnel Carriers and a single M1097 HMMVW of Task Force Vapor roll through the hills and wadis of the National Training Center. Their mission; to replicate the signature of a Mechanized Infantry Battalion, and threaten the mountain passes that protect the northern flank of the Rotational Training Unit. By moving across the expanse, TF Vapor will kick up enough dust that, from a distance, will appear to be an entire battalion on the move.

The Taskforce, drawn from the RSS's Regimental HQ and Headquarters Troop and Maintenance Troop, had been given their mission less than a week before execution. Carrying out missions with minimal preparation time is something the RSS excels at.

Led by CW2 Steven Gill, TF Vapor rolled ahead towards the RTU. As they entered the pass complex, they discovered a blocking obstacle. CW2 Gill crept slowly ahead to decipher the obstacle, noticing a deployed Armored Vehicle Launched Bridge spanning the road and rendering it impassible.

Although this sealed the pass, CW2 Gill ordered the force to move through a secondary pass to bypass the obstacle. As the Task Force was negotiating the final turn needed to exit the canyon, they encounter a mechanized infantry company stringing concertina wire across the mouth of the pass with two Bradleys pulling security.


Before the RTU's realized what was happening, the 50 Caliber Machine disabling Soldier after Soldier. CW2 Gill positioned his HMMVW for SPC Johnathan Johnson Jr. to engage the tracks with his RPG. SPC Johnson has scored a direct hit on one Bradley disabling it forcing the last Bradley to withdrawal. With the enemy armor gone, the gunners of the three M113A3s were able to freely engage the RTU Soldiers as they too attempted to break contact and withdraw.

TF Vapor learned that they destroyed one Bradley, one HMMVW, and eliminate 10 RTU Soldiers without taking any casualties themselves. Furthermore, the RTU had responded to their attack by dispatching two infantry companies to guard the northern passes, taking pressure off the rest of the 11th ACR as it decimated the RTU's main attack.

TF Vapor had fought hard and well. Their eagerness to respond to challenges, improvise, and take the initiative when put in an alien situation are indicative of the cavalry spirit that still resides in the Troopers of the RSS, 11th ACR.
