


CHARLIE COMPANY

Drill Sergeant Class 017-18 entered Phase 2 of the course on 23 August with PRT evaluations. The candidates were evaluated on their ability to conduct an Endurance Mobility (EM) session and a Strength Mobility (SM) session. They continued on with a student lead APFT, where they were in charge of administering an APFT which include set-up, demonstration, and grading each other to gain an understanding of what they will be required to do in the IET environment. Other major events conducted during this phase were Combat Lifesaver Course, presentation of classes on Rifle Marksmanship, Land Navigation, and CBRN. During Week 5 the candidates

were given the opportunity to put their research and hard work on their rifle marksmanship classes into action by conducting ranges throughout the week. They were mentored on how to set up a range in an IET environment, as well as zeroing and qualifying with their assigned weapons. The candidates closed out Phase 2 with tactics classes in preparation for the scheduled FTX.

Phase 3 began with the End of Course APFT, which the candidates must achieve a minimum score of 210 with 70 points in each event. They then went into the



the tactics classes they learned the week prior. Week 7 was closed out with a Battalion level embedment with 3-34 Infantry Regiment (BCT). The candidates got a firsthand look at what a pickup of a new cycle would like, along with mentorship from the drill sergeants of that unit. Basic Combat Combatives was the focus of week 8 of the cycle. The candidates learned all aspects of combatives and then were evaluated at the end of the week to become certified. The final activity for this class was a 12k foot march that culminated in a Rights of Passage (ROP) Ceremony welcoming them into the storied fraternity of the Drill Sergeant. Class 017-18 graduated on 3 October, 2018.



The Drill Sergeant Leader of the Cycle (DSLOC) is the Drill Sergeant Leader who had the biggest impact throughout the cycle. He set the example for his peers and subordinates alike and was voted on by the other DSLs. The DSLOC for Class 017-18 was SFC Kaid Lacroix.
