EACH POINTED BARB:

Becoming a CHIEF

Every year, thousands of Sailors anxiously await the end of summer; and not because of NFL games and Halloween candy. These Sailors are waiting for the start of what's known in the Navy as the Season of Pride – a six-week training period where selected first class petty officers are trained to be chief petty officers.



For the 58 selectees aboard Truman, the season has been full of change and personal growth.

“We use the training to change their mindset,” said Chief Yeoman Renee Bass. “The mindset of a first class petty officer is to get what they need done so that they can make chief, and a chief’s mindset is figuring what they can do to help their Sailors before themselves. First classes don’t always work as a team, but as a chief they have to be able to.”

Since April 1, 1893, the rank of chief petty officer has been a revered title for many Sailors and comes with new challenges, experiences and responsibilities. According to the Chief Petty Officers Creed, the rank “carries with it unique responsibilities and privileges [Chiefs] are expected to fulfill and bound to observe.” And for some, that means having to step up to the challenge.

“We stepped up as first classes to take care of our Sailors – teach them, guide them,” said Chief (Sel) Machinist’s Mate (Nuclear) Noah Raybon. “But now we’re going to inherently have a lot more responsibility where we can actually help them more by reaching out to our fellow chiefs.”

The annual training begins after a selection board announces the selectees. From then until Sept. 16, selectees from every command must learn to work as a team to undertake every task presented to them.



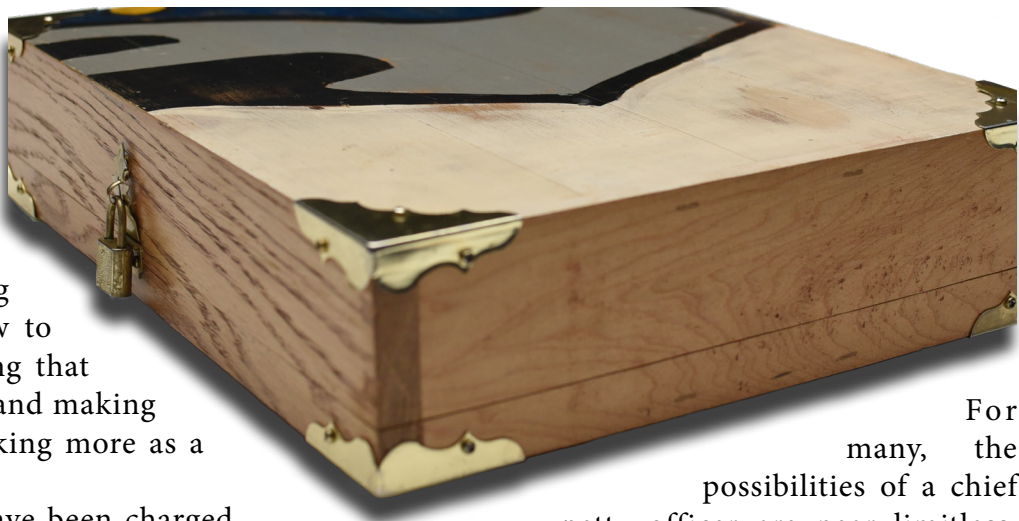
“I think it was mostly trial and error,” said Chief (Sel) Hospital Corpsman Beth Hicks. “In the beginning, we were a bunch of first classes and still headstrong on how we got to where we were before, so we kind of stayed our course. But over the past couple weeks of butting heads with each other, learning how to communicate, work together, learning that we all have a piece in this big puzzle and making it work properly is what got us working more as a team.”

Historically, chief petty officers have been charged with a number of vital tasks, including the development of enlisted Sailors and junior officers, as well as the keepers of Naval history and traditions. Effectively, Sailors transition to a Navy career as the subject matter expert, team manager and, most importantly, advisor.

“Sometimes that means mentoring them to get them the education and qualifications they need,” said Bass. “Maybe you see them going down a path that isn’t necessarily going to help them and try to guide them the right way. It doesn’t matter if they plan on getting out of the Navy in one, four or 20 years – we set them up for success no matter what.”



For many, the possibilities of a chief petty officer are near limitless, because to be a part of the Chief’s mess reinforces what it means to be part of something greater, not just an individual.

“We are a brotherhood, a sisterhood, a fraternity because the percentage is small but the abilities that we have are great,” added Bass. “I can help a Sailor that’s stationed in Hawaii from here [aboard Truman] just by networking through the Chiefs Mess. We can get their qualifications or maybe they lost an evaluation and we can help get it to them – because that’s what it’s all about. We network to take care of each other and our Sailors.”

A lot can happen in six weeks and for the selectees aboard Harry S. Truman, the memories and experience gained from this adventure will be something that will last forever.

“I’m always going to remember the people – the good and the bad,” said Hicks. “There’ve been situations and things where I just won’t want to think about them later, but it’s been the people that made this experience.”

FY-19 CHIEF SELECTS HOST 9/11 REMEMBRANCE

At a 9/11 remembrance ceremony in the ship's forecandle, Truman Sailors spent time reflecting on the lives lost to the Sept. 11, 2001 terrorist attacks on U.S. soil.

8:45 a.m., Sept. 11, 2001: The first hijacked commercial aircraft hit the World Trade Center's north tower, causing widespread casualties and catastrophic damage to the integrity of the building.

"I remember turning on the television and seeing the first building already ablaze," said Master Chief Aviation Boatswain's Mate Robert Stumm, Truman's air department leading chief petty officer. "At first, the sight did not register in my brain; it was surreal...It was one of the most stirring and decisive moments of my life. I knew then, I would be in the Navy for as long as they would let me stay."

A second aircraft would later hit the south tower, forever

changing an iconic skyline. This claimed the lives of 2,996 innocent Americans and first responders. The impact of these brazen attacks was felt around the U.S., especially New York.

"It forever changed the way Americans [live] and unfortunately let us know that there are enemies that are willing to target the innocent to promote hate and violence at any cost," said Chief (Sel) Damage Controlman Christine Doleman, a Brooklyn, New York native and guest speaker at the 9/11 remembrance ceremony. "My father was a New York Police Department officer at the time, and he lost his canine and partner that day."

The U.S., a country that stood mostly untouched by foreign terrorism for years, had to come to a resolution.

"Sept. 11, 2001 changed our world and country forever,"



said Stumm. "It showed vulnerability at the heart of our Nation and created a resolve that will strengthen us forever. Our nation, in the storm of those events, joined together as one."

The Nation responded quickly, deploying military detachments to the heart of our adversaries.

"[The attacks] reminded us of the importance of keeping our guard up and always protecting the homeland," said Chief Warrant Officer Clarence Hall, Truman's communications officer. "Never forget the pain felt throughout the country. Respect the innocent lives lost, the brave first responders and countless lives lost fighting the war on terrorism."

The attacks on the World Trade Center, Pentagon and Flight 93 led America to rebuild and recover.

"Amidst the devastation of the attacks on 9/11, America became a nation of patriots," added Stumm.

More than 300 Sailors joined 58 chief petty officer selects during Truman's ceremony. Like Doleman, the ceremony gave Sailors a chance to speak about how these events forever

changed the lives of friends and family.

"To tell the story of my father to Team Truman is a great honor," said Doleman. "It allows for my fellow chief selectees and shipmates to connect to the realism of the 9/11 events. Time has flown by, but the [wounds] have yet to heal. It takes the day of the 9/11 remembrance to remind Americans to take care of one another because we all bleed red, white and blue."

BABY, IT'S COLD OUTSIDE!

THE ORDER OF THE BLUENOSE

Walrus, huskies, foxes, wolves, whales, polar bears, reindeer and all other living denizens of the frozen north – friend or foe, knowingly or not, they all recognize the distinguished title of those who belong to a special breed of sorts - a Bluenose.

A Bluenose is no ordinary Sailor, but rather a Sailor revered by those who share the misfortune of missing out on a ritual that christens a rare group who braved perhaps the most challenging operating environment in this world of seas.

“Crossing the line ceremonies, such as the Bluenose ceremony for crossing the Arctic Circle, are customs [of the Navy] which harken back to the earliest days of seafaring,” said Lt. Christopher Giglio, who became a Bluenose in 2016. “They are a direct link not only between us and the early Navy of the age of sail, but also mariners of every era and every nation. Keeping those traditions alive help us to preserve an immensely rich shared maritime culture.”

Giglio said crossing the line ceremonies are an opportunity for the crew to build comradery by participating in a shared ordeal; all in the spirit of good fun.

“Sailors go through several different steps throughout the day on their way to earning their Bluenose. Doing so, shoulder to shoulder, with their shipmates helps to add to a sense of teamwork and accomplishment,” said Giglio.

Approximately 15 to 20 Sailors aboard Truman (not scientific) can call themselves a Bluenose, those who can identify as such will lead the ceremony for the rest of the crew.

“I have no idea what becoming a Bluenose will entail,” said Intelligence Specialist 2nd Class Alexandra Saldana. “I’ve only heard rumors, but I’m equally anxious as I am excited. It’s a once in a lifetime experience and when all is said and done I’ll get to say I am a part of a small group of Sailors that Blue-nosed aboard an aircraft carrier.”

Carrier Strike Group (CSG) 8 Master Chief Michael Bates, a 30-year Bluenose, says these events are special and something Sailors will remember forever, especially this one.

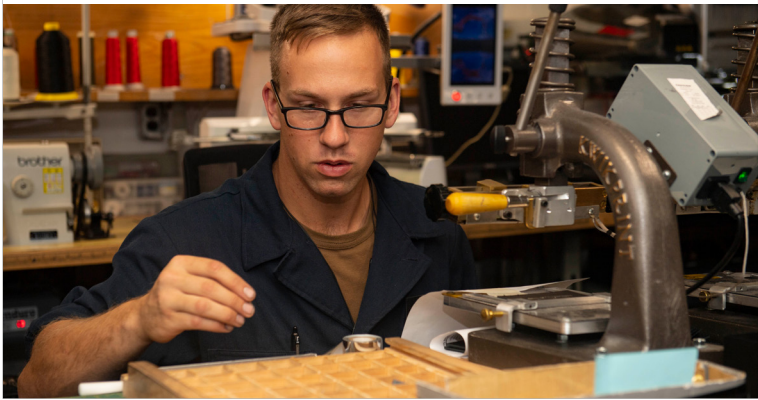
“This Bluenose ceremony is unique to us because it has been thirty or so years since aircraft carrier has operated this high north,” said Bates.

Aside from submarines, ships just don’t get up to the Arctic that often, added Giglio.

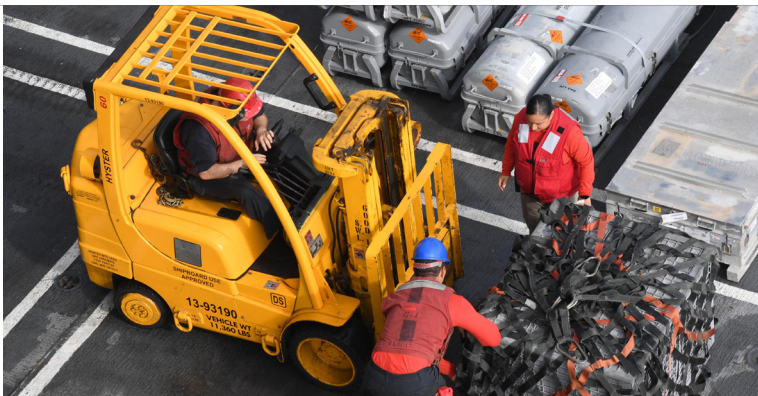

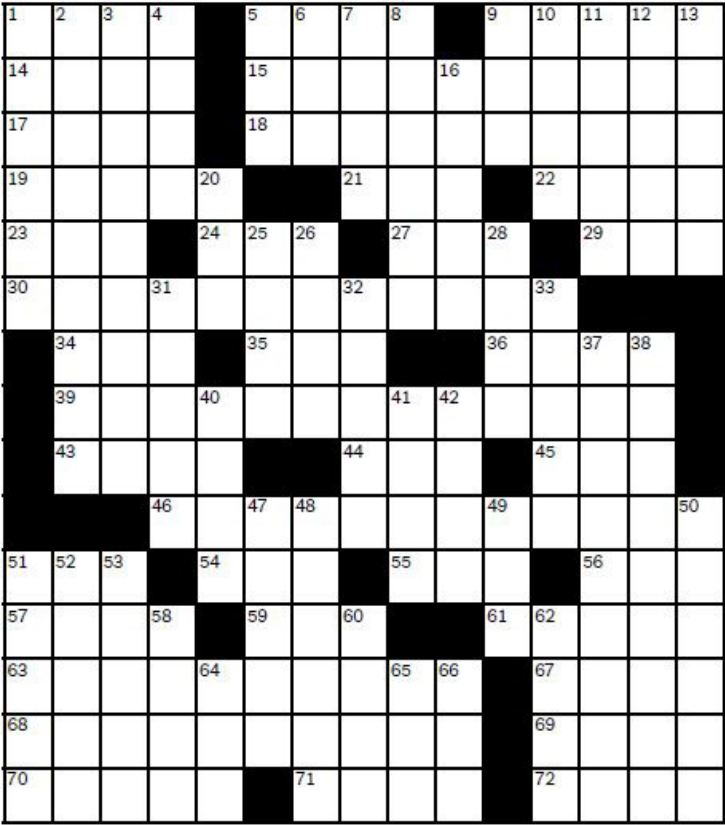

GROCERY START-UP LETS YOU WALK RIGHT OUT

SAN FRANCISCO — One recent afternoon, the city’s newest grocery market was trying to figure out whether I would buy, steal or leave behind a bag of white Cheddar popcorn — and so was I.

On its side: 27 cameras along the ceiling and a wealth of behavioral data. On my side: indecision.

Last week, San Francisco got its first completely automated cashierless store, Standard Market. Shoppers who have downloaded the store’s app can go in and grab items and simply leave. There is no check-in gate, and there is no checkout swipe. Cameras identify the shopper and the items, and determine when said items leave with said shopper.

The start-up behind this operation is Standard Cognition, which has raised \$11.2 million in venture capital and formed partnerships with four retails chains around the world. This first market is a prototype to showcase the technology and work on the bugs. The ambitious goal is to add the tech in 100 stores a day by 2020.

Standard Market is the latest entry in the emerging fray of retail automation, where companies are throwing cameras, sensors and machine learning into grocery stores to replace the checkout line.

Standard Cognition’s approach relies exclusively on the ceiling cameras and artificial intelligence software to figure out what you are buying.

The goal is to predict, and prevent, shoplifting, because unlike Amazon’s Go stores, which have a subway turnstile-like gate for entry and exit, Standard Market has an open door, and the path is clear.

Once the system decides it has detected potential theft behavior, a store attendant will get a text and walk over for “a polite conversation,” said Michael Suswal, Standard Cognition’s co-founder and chief operating officer.

Predicting theft requires a lot of data about shoppers, much of which does not exist yet — “or at least no one is willing to give it to us,” Suswal said.

The growth of cashierless technology could hurt the American labor force; there are nearly five million retail sales workers in America. But as Suswal has pitched Standard Cognition’s technology, he said, he has found most shop owners are not looking to replace workers. They want their workers wandering the stores more, in hopes of luring shoppers back into brick-and-mortar retail.

“They all talk about new services, making shopping more fun, making it worthwhile to shop offline,” Suswal said.

And they talk about data. While a store owner can look at receipts to see who bought a generic ketchup, cashierless technology can help tell if the shopper first picked up a Heinz bottle and how long he or she looked at it. Basically, now an owner can see what a customer did not buy.
