

MEET YOUR COMMANDING OFFICER

“There is no ship in the Navy that I would rather be on,” said Cmdr. Leoanrd Leos, commanding officer of the Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyer USS Stockdale (DDG 106). “If I could close my eyes and wish myself in any situation, it would be this ship, and I totally mean that. I have an awesome XO (executive officer), awesome CMC (Command Master Chief), brilliant, hardworking crew with a lot of personality, and a destroyer on deployment with the best namesake.”

Leos shares a unique connection to the ship’s namesake, Vice Adm. James Bond Stockdale. Both Leos and Stockdale were fellows at Stanford University’s Hoover Institution.

“Stockdale did a Masters at Stanford University before he was a prisoner of war,” said Leos. “After he retired from the Navy and retired from academia, he wanted to go back to Stanford, where he was a fellow at the Hoover Institution from 1981-1996. In 2016 I was a fellow and there were people who remembered Stockdale and who had worked with him.”

Additionally, Leos named his son after Stockdale after reading Stockdale’s book “In Love and War”.

“I was touched by the sacrifice and toughness displayed by Stockdale and his wife Sybil,” said Leos.

As Commanding Officer of Stockdale, Leos says his priorities are safe navigation of the ship, operational excellence and preparation for battle.

“We have to be ready to conduct sustained combat operations at sea,” said Leos. “In order to do that, we need to be able to navigate safely to get there and do so while operating at the highest level.”

Twenty-three years of experience in the Navy has taught Leos many lessons.

“One thing I’ve learned from the Navy is that hard work really does pay off, no matter what job you’re in,” said Leos. “It will be recognized. Hard work and a good attitude in the Navy, unlike a lot of other sectors in society, will still take you really far.”

Leos started of his Naval career as enlisted, attending nuclear school and then stationed on the Los Angeles-class attack submarine USS Jefferson City (SSN 759) before getting picked up for an officer program. He attended San Diego State Reserve Officer Training Corps



(ROTC) and was commissioned as an Ensign in 2001. Following commissioning he went to his first ship USS Fletcher (DDG 992). Leos then went on to serve on USS Hopper (DDG 70). He then obtained a master’s degree in Financial Management at Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, California. Following school, he served on USS Chosin (CG 65) as the Weapons Officer and Combats Systems Officer. Leos then took command of Avenger-class mine countermeasures ships USS Chief (MCM 14), USS Gladiator (MCM 11) and USS Scout (MCM 8). He was the aid to the commander of Pacific Fleet, Adm. Scott Swift. Before taking command of Stockdale, Leos was a Federal Executive Fellow at Stanford’s Hoover Institute.

“I owe the Navy for what they’ve done for me, but at the same time I have given a lot and I think that is a good thing,” said Leos. “Sacrificing for the things you love.”





On a Whim: Sailor Tells Story About his Decision to Join the Navy

He held up his arm, tattooed from his shoulder to his wrist in vibrant colors such as teal, red and orange.

"This tattoo, I found out I wanted to get it and two days later I did," said Cryptologic Technician (Maintenance) Seaman Joshua Collazo about his traditional Japanese samurai tattoo. "That's how I like to live my life. I see something I like, and I go and get it."

Collazo is talking about how he likes to live impulsively, without second-guessing his decisions. His approach on decision-making is what led him into joining the Navy.

"Growing up I was always really into military," said Collazo. "I loved the idea. As high school came along, didn't really think about it too much. Well, a year after I graduated, I was working a typical fast food job and I wanted a better life for myself."

His opportunity for something different came one day in 2016, when a Navy recruiter called Collazo.

"The recruiter called, asked if I had any questions, I said 'no,'" said Collazo. "Then he asked if I wanted to do some paperwork and I said 'sure.' Then that same week I had a contract in the Navy. I guess he just caught me in a good mood. It was very impulsive."

After completing boot camp and further training in "A" school and "C" school, Collazo was sent to his first command, USS Stockdale (DDG 106).

"At first I was very scared to come to a ship as an E-1, but they welcomed me with open arms, which really helped with the transition," said Collazo.



Now Collazo has been aboard Stockdale for eight months.

"In a typical day I wake up, go to quarters and check out my daily tasks," said Collazo. "I work on all of the cryptologic gear aboard Stockdale for the ship's collections systems. I make sure the system is running and do whatever maintenance I need to do."

The space Collazo works in is top secret, so people may not be familiar with what his rate does. However, that is one of his favorite parts of the rate.

"My favorite part of what I do is the secrecy," said Collazo. "Not everyone knows what you do. It's also a small knit community."

Even though he joined on impulse, Collazo said he does not regret his decision.

"Being in the Navy, I've learned that there is a lot of different people in the world," said Collazo. "The world is big, so you gotta go out and see it."
