Here are some of the wing's top stories that showcased the excellence, achievements and readiness of the wing in supporting the Air Force Reserve mission.

Wing members deploy to Southwest Asia

The year kicked off with the wing, family members and friends bidding farewell to approximately 150 Airmen who deployed to Southwest Asia in Support of Operations Freedom's Sentinel and Inherent Resolve in January and welcoming them back in May. The Airmen, along with several of the wing's C-130J Super Hercules aircraft, were assigned to the 379th Air Expeditionary Wing based at Al Udeid Air Base, Qatar. Aircrew from the 815th Air-

lift Squadron, maintainers from the 803rd Aircraft Maintenance Squadron and support personnel from the 403rd Wing provided airlift, airdrop and aeromedical evacuation support to operations throughout the U.S. Central Command Area of Responsibility.

Another active hurricane season

Another active storm season kept 53rd Weather Reconnaissance Squadron crews busy. The Hurricane Hunters flew more than 655 hours and 83 missions into 12 named storms over the Atlantic and Pacific oceans. The unit flew Alberto, Beryl, Chris, Gordon, Kirk and the season's most destructive storms, Hurricanes Florence and Michael, which caused significant damage to the southeastern United States. While this year's Atlantic hurricane season wasn't as active as 2017, the hurricane season in the eastern Pacific Ocean was a record setter with 22 named storms. The squadron deployed to Hawaii three times to fly Hurricane Hector, Lane and Olivia.

Wing welcomes two new recruiters

For the first time since 2012, the 403rd Wing Recruiting Flight has a full recruiting staff.

Master Sgt. Young D. Chambers and Tech. Sgt. David J. Hutson are the wing's two newest recruiters, both began their duties with the "Keesler Recruiting Krewe" in September 2018.

Chambers, a native of Warner-Robins, Georgia, initially served four years of active duty in the United States Marine Corps as a M1A1 tank gunner before joining the Air Force Reserve in 2003. He is replacing Tech. Sgt. David E. Rau, who retires in February 2019, in the Hattiesburg, Mississippi, office.

Hogan said Chambers' experience in a different branch will allow him to provide potential prior-service recruits with comparisons between the benefits of joining the Air Force Reserve versus other branches.

From experiences in the aeromedical field to the safety field to being a first sergeant on the squadron and group levels, Chambers has a wealth of knowledge of what it takes to be a reservist to pass on to potential Reserve Citizen Airmen.

Despite having attended multi-

ple Air Force technical training schools, Chambers said that the recruiter's school was by far the most challenging. He proved he was up to the challenge and looks forward to serving the 403rd Wing from his Hattiesburg zone.

Chambers' own favorable experiences with his Marine and Air Force Reserve recruiters set the foundation for the hands-on approach he plans to take in his own recruiting career.

"The thing to take away from both of those recruiters was to treat people the same way they treated me," said Chambers. "They were respectful, honest and open with me, and that is what I want to be for the people I serve here."

On the opposite end of the recruiting experience was Hutson's experience when he was

enlisting.

Hutson lived a few hours away from the office he was recruited into the active duty Air Force from Tallahassee, Florida, and said the only times he saw his recruiter were to do initial paperwork and when he shipped to basic training. He uses his own experience to provide a better one than he had for incoming recruits.

"I like more of a hands-on approach and being able to contact and talk to my people more throughout the process than what I had," said Hutson.

Hutson, who is an addition to the New Orleans recruiting office, will cover Baton Rouge and surrounding areas. He comes to the wing with a multitude of recruiting experience already under his belt, as he had been an active duty recruiter for the

seven-and-a-half years prior to joining the Air Force Reserve. He served four years as an active duty recruiter in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, and three years as a training and marketing specialist for an Air Force recruiting squadron in Arlington, Texas.

Hogan said Hutson's recruiting experience will be beneficial to both the office and the wing as he is able to provide a new perspective and as the Air Force transitions to a total force recruiting strategy.

Both Chambers and Hutson credited close proximity to home and the positive things they heard about the 403rd as determining factors in their decisions to come to the 403rd Wing.

"The team dynamic with Sergeant Hutson's and Sergeant Chambers' experience and knowledge will add measurable value to the 'Krewe,'" said Senior Master Sgt. Dominique Hogan, 403rd Wing Recruiting Flight chief. "Having a full staff enables us to reach out to the community and recruit viable candidates who will continue to make the 403rd Wing, the wing of choice."

Meeting with a recruiter is the first step in building a military career. Their job is to determine whether a person has the attitude and skills necessary to integrate into the Air Force Reserve and contribute to mission accomplishment. They make this determination by coordinating physical fitness screenings, Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery tests, reviewing work and educational history and conducting background checks. 403RD HEADLINES

C-130J WASHES NOW SAFER

The C-130J Super Hercules fleet here is a workhorse. The 403rd Wing aircraft deploy to the desert, land in austere locations on almost any surface, and fly into hurricanes and winter storms.

From Southwest Asia dust to oceanic salt spray, the hardworking aircraft need an occasional bath to remove all that grime to prevent corrosion from exposure to these harsh environmental conditions.

That bath happens every 30 days for each of the 20 Keesler aircraft because of the base's location to the Gulf of Mexico, said Lt. Col. Cody Whittington, 403rd Maintenance Group deputy.

Contractors wash the aircraft, and will now be able to do it more safely and more thoroughly as the 403rd Wing had safety harnesses installed in the Wash Rack Dec. 10-13, 2018.

"The original fall protection was deteriorated which forced the contractors to use a lift (cherry picker) to wash the top of the aircraft. However, not all areas can be reached by that method," said Whittington. "Now we will have the appropriate safety equipment, in compliance with Air Force requirements, so we can protect the contractors, complete a thorough wash, and prolong the life of the aircraft."

DAY OF INFAMY: PEARL HARBOR

The 77th Anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor was Dec. 7, 1941. This day has special meaning for one Air Force Reserve Citizen Airman here.

Chief Master Sgt. Amanda J. Stift, 403rd Wing command chief master sergeant, is the granddaughter of Joseph S. Pesek, a World War II veteran who served in the U.S. Army Air Forces and U.S. Air Force. Her grandfather was a technical sergeant stationed at Hickam Field, Hawaii, during the attack on Pearl Harbor, Dec. 7, 1941. OCP guidance approves current subdued patches

WESTOVER AIR RESERVE BASE, Mass. (AFNS) --Airmen wearing OCP uniforms are authorized to add their former Airmen Battle Uniform subdued patches until the mandatory brown subdued ones go into effect.

Also, according to Air Force Instruction 36-2903, the U.S. flag patch is mandatory and will be subdued using the spice brown color criteria, centered at the top of velcro and worn while in-garrison and deployed.

Current subdued black and green U.S. flags may be worn until June 1, 2020, then spice brown will be the only accepted version. Infra-red U.S. flags are not authorized.

The higher headquarters patch is mandatory and will be subdued using the spice brown color criteria and centered under the U.S. flag patch. The current subdued version of the higher headquarters patch may be worn until the patch color conversion has been completed or until April 1, 2021, whichever is sooner.

A maximum of two patches may be worn.

Uniform Code of Military Justice changes

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -- Effective Jan. 1, 2019, the Military Justice Act of 2016 will in-state the most reform to the Uniform Code of Military Justice and Manual for Courts-Martial in decades, modernizing dated aspects of the military justice system while also providing transparency.

Among its major reforms, the Act will establish fixed numbers of members for courts-martial, expand judge-alone sentencing, expand the opportunity for convicted service members to appeal their convictions and require most court-martial documents be made publicly accessible under a system similar to those used in civilian criminal justice systems. Additionally, the Act adds some new offenses such as retaliation against a person for reporting or planning to report a crime, fraudulent use of credit cards and debit cards and sexual activity between military members in a position of trust and specially protected junior members. While these offenses were prohibited in the past, they are now specifically enumerated crimes under the UCMJ.

AES ASSUMPTION OF COMMAND SUNDAY

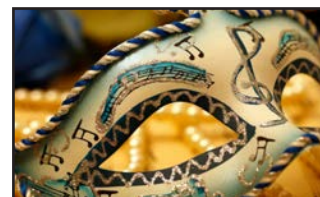
