AMC evaluating power-projection capabilities in Defender-Europe 20

WASHINGTON – The Army's strength lies in its capacity to project power, said Army Materiel Command's top officer, who will be evaluating AMC's

ability to move and sustain more than 20,000 service-members and close to 23,000 pieces of equipment during exercise Defender-Europe 20.

"The training event over in Europe, and later in the Pacific, will allow us to see ourselves at all three levels: tactical, operational and strategic," said AMC

Commander Gen. Gus Perna during a Defense Writers Group event Tuesday. "It will reinforce where we think we are in terms of materiel readiness."

Defender-Europe 20 includes the deployment of a division-sized force from the U.S. to locations across the continent. Arriving forces will leverage Army prepositioned stocks for their equipment, and travel to multiple training areas.

The Army has seven APS regions, each designed to improve deterrence and reduce deployment timeliness, officials said. AMC maintains oversight for the program and manages the necessary storage and maintenance of each equipment set.

"Army prepositioned stocks ...

allows the president of the United States to make decisions, and allows (the Army) to execute rapidly," Perna said. "The equipment will be ready ... and capable of going out and executing its mission. That is what Army Materiel Command has been driving (to achieve)."

Earlier this year, Soldiers assigned to the 82nd Airborne Division at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, received a short-notice deployment to the U.S. Central Command area of responsibility. Upon their arrival, Soldiers drew APS equipment stored in the region, highlighting the capability, Perna said.

During the upcoming Defender series of exercises, AMC will evaluate the current equipment at each APS location and make any necessary adjustments, Perna said.

Moreover, leaders at all levels will have the opportunity to "see themselves" and their capabilities, and execute changes to further the needs of the force, he added.

"I see Defender-Europe 20 helping us illuminate and magnify the potential of APS," Perna said. "We have gone to great lengths to ensure that a unit can get on a plane, fly over and then draw that equipment rapidly. And that equipment is going to have all of the (necessary) capabilities so (Soldiers) can get to where they need to be."

Post access policy change

As of Jan. 1, Veterans Health Identification Card and eligible caregivers will now be able to gain access to post. Veterans must register their VHIC at the Visitor Control Center located at Gate 1 on Fort Stewart or at Montgomery Gate VCC at Hunter Army Airfield. Veterans are required to bring their VHIC and a valid driver's license to one of the VCCs for registration purposes. Caregivers with a VA letter can register at one of the VCCs by presenting the letter and a valid Driver's License for registration purposes. Once the registration process is completed, the caregiver will be issued an AIE card to gain access to Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield. Caregivers must renew their AIE cards on an annual basis. Caregivers will be registered as a visitor and anyone traveling with them must either show an approved installation identification card or be screened at the VCC to receive a pass prior to gaining access to the installation.

385th Military Police Battalion upgrades fleet with new vehicles

The 385th Military Police Battalion conducted training with Mine Resistant Ambush Protected All-Terrain Vehicles Feb. 3-7 at Fort Stewart.

The MATV training included two 40-hour courses, one for the unit master drivers and a separate course for the wheeled vehicle mechanics.

The five-day course included vehicle preventive maintenance checks and services along with night and day vehicle operations for the master drivers.

"The training was beneficial because it shows that the Army is progressing toward providing safer vehicles," said Sgt. Jasmine Davis, a master driver assigned to the 293rd Military Police Company.

"We had Humvees before, but I feel more comfortable with the MATVs, because they are a combination of all the vehicles we have used," Davis said.

Davis said the vehicles have better driving capabilities through terrains such as ice, mud, sand and other extreme conditions.

The mechanics trained on maintenance procedures, as well as diagnostics and troubleshooting.

"The first couple of days, we reviewed the vehicle operation in a classrooms setting," said Pfc. Alexander

Utley, a mechanic assigned to the 293rd MP Co. "After that, we worked on the vehicle and learned about how heavy the plates on the vehicle were."

In the latter part of the course, the mechanics removed parts and learned the intricacies of a MATV.

"The MATVs are different from the other vehicles I've worked on because they are taller, heavier, and more complex when servicing them," said Utley.

The vehicles have been used before, but they are new to the 385th MP Bn., and are fully mission capable.

"The MATVs add to our capabilities as a unit," said Sgt. Reed Webb, a master driver assigned to the 546th Military Police Company. "All the armor that they have underneath the vehicle makes it better for our safety if an (improvised explosive device) hits us."

The implementation of the driver's vision enhancer system, which allows drivers to see at night, is among the improved safety features on the vehicles.

"The DVE system is absolutely beneficial because, as a master driver, we have to conduct nighttime driving when we're doing driver's training," Webb said. "It's a way better system and helps us become more combat capable at night."

Both mechanics and drivers took something away from the five-day course

"As a mechanic, working on these vehicles was not

only something new, but exciting," Utley said. "It was a challenge taking the armored plates off of the vehicle, but it was an overall good experience."

The MATVs were selected as one of the Army's enduring requirement vehicles.

"I think the Army is doing a great thing by implementing these vehicles and the rest of the MATVs that have the improved capabilities on them," Webb said.

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Wormsloe offers volunteer opportunity, educational experience

Hundreds of volunteers and thousands of visitors helped relive history at the Wormsloe State Historic Site in Savannah, Feb. 8 and 9 during its annual Colonial Faire and Muster.

The event, free and open to the public, was hosted by the Georgia Department of Natural Resources and local sponsors. It featured music, food vendors and an interactive nature trail complete with demonstrations of historic life from the 18th century.

Musicians performed live period music and dances as hundreds of guests traveled the trail past the ruins of Noble Jones 1730's tabby house. The hike took guests past vendors selling historic memorabilia, militia camps performing musket drills and hourly cannon firings and an authentic colonial village.

Crystal Mindedahl, a GDNR Wormsloe staff member who provided cooking demonstrations there noted the village included a daub house, a blacksmith shop and other wooden structures, recreated based on what would have been found on the original 1730s estate. She said Wormsloe compromised 1,266 acres along Long Island and Pigeon Island. The next stop on educational jaunt was a Native American encampment - complete with a Creek warrior who displayed common tools and skills used for hunting, fishing and related information about early Native American life in the

area. One of the last stops was a cricket field, staffed with volunteers offering to teach one of the colony's earliest sports to modern guests.

Staff Sgt. Micah Hall, a Soldier with the Warrior Transition Battalion on Fort Stewart, was among the volunteers supporting the Colonial Faire and Muster. At the event he portrayed a member of the Georgia South Carolina Rangers who provided a strong hold at Wormsloe to help protect the fledgling town of Savannah, noting Georgia didn't become a state until 1732.

"Many people don't know that Wormsloe was actually part of the defensive works for the town (Savannah)," Hall said. "The city of Savannah was actually under Siege twice. Once during the Revolutionary War – first in 1778-1779, when General (Casimir) Pulaski died. The second siege was in 1782."

Hall said has been supporting historic reenactments in Georgia like the one in Wormsloe, since 2012. He said historic reenactment provides an opportunity for Soldiers and their Families to get involved with the community and learn about the area. He said he plans on supporting another event March 13 at Fort King George in Darien.

Controlled burns improve local training areas

Seven months out of the year, large tracts of Fort Stewart training areas are intentionally set ablaze. The Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield Forestry Branch works around the year to manage the largest forestry program in the Army - 139,000 acres of pine forest, 74,000 acres of forested wetlands, 58,300 acres of forest openings and 9,600 acres of hardwood management areas. Management of these lands result in improved training areas for the installation's Soldiers, improved wildlife habits and a reduction of wildfire hazards.

From Dec. 1 through March 30, the Forestry Branch's burn season, the focus is on clearing out combustible plants from the training areas with prescribed burns, also known as controlled burns.

"We're putting fire on the ground under our terms," said Bryan Whitmore, fire management supervisor at Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield Forestry Branch. "For a wildfire, we don't have control over the weather conditions. However, with prescribed burns, we dictate the behavior of the fire."

A great deal of planning and coordination goes into conducting controlled burns to prevent smoke from blowing into populated areas, such as the Fort Stewart cantonment area, main roads, and nearby towns and cities.

Whitmore explained how fire planners start planning burns up to months in advance, coordinating with range control and wildlife branch to determine training usage and areas that must be avoided due to endangered habitats, significantly, that of the red cockaded woodpecker - a bird endemic to the southeastern U.S. Most importantly, fire planners constantly monitor weather forecasts from the National Weather Service.

"Weather dictates when we're going to burn, where we're going to burn and how we're going to burn," Whitmore said.

Ideal weather for burns, according to Whitmore, calls for clear skies and winds that will not push smoke into the cantonment area, major highways or any training missions. Burns are typically conducted in the early afternoon when morning moisture has evaporated.

Most of the prescribed burns conducted by Fort Stewart Forestry Branch are executed using aerial ignition in which small ignitors are dropped from a contracted helicopter. This is due to the training areas' vast landscapes which require burning, and rough terrain, which includes large bogs and swamps.

Baseline fires are ignited upwind, either by hand using a drip torch, or a terra torch operated from the back of a truck. The wind will cause the baseline fires to move toward the fires ignited from the air. When the fires come together, they burn out as fuel eventually is completely consumed. Equipment operators are posted nearby to extinguish any residual fires.

The morning before an afternoon burn, burn bosses and the helicopter crew conduct a pre-burn briefing to plan what will happen during the day and determine the best route for the helicopter to fly based upon expected smoke dispersion.

"We're responsible for all the resources on the ground," said Nick Seanor, a burn boss with Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield Forestry Branch. "We're also responsible for directing the helicopter from a ground perspective and making decisions based on conditions."

Not all plant growth in the training areas is desirable. In fact, other than fire-resistant longleaf pine, most plant growth in the training areas is potential fuel if a wildfire should ignite and spread. Large swaths of land are designated for prescribed burns to reduce the amount of fuel.

"An open, pine-dominated landscape is ideal for maneuver training; it promotes nesting of the red cockaded woodpecker, and it significantly reduces the intensity of a wildfire if one should ignite," Whitmore said.

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TRICARE expands breast cancer screening

TRICARE is committed to improving preventive health care services for women. On Jan. 1, TRICARE expanded coverage for breast cancer screenings to include digital breast tomosynthesis, or 3D mammography. TRICARE will cover 3D mammography as a preventive health care service through the provisional coverage program.

According to the American Cancer Society, breast cancer is the most diagnosed cancer in women after skin cancers. About one in 10 women in the U.S. develop breast cancer in their lifetime.

"Women's health is a priority at the Defense Health Agency," said Elan Green, chief of the Medical Benefits and Reimbursement Section for the TRICARE Health Plan at the Defense Health Agency. "Currently, the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force hasn't found sufficient information to develop a recommendation for or against this service. However, recognizing that 3D mammography is rapidly becoming the standard of care, the DHA approved provisional coverage of 3D mammograms for breast cancer screening."

Previously, TRICARE only covered 3D mammograms for diagnostic purposes. This means a physician could order them for at-risk patients or for further diagnosis. For breast cancer screenings, TRICARE covered 2D mammograms.

3D mammography uses an X-ray

machine to create a 3D image of the breast. This results in greater accuracy when detecting abnormalities. It also decreases false positives. So, there's less chance of having to return for a second screening and potentially unnecessary breast biopsies.

Beginning Jan. 1, you may be eligible for annual 3D mammography screenings if you're a woman who is:

Age 40 or older. Age 30 or older and at high risk. This means you have a 15% or more lifetime risk of breast cancer.

If you or your doctor prefer 2D mammograms, TRICARE will continue to cover them. But you must meet the above criteria.

3D mammography falls under the provisional coverage program. This means you need pre-authorization. Your provider must first get pre-authorization from your regional contractor.

The provisional coverage program covers certain emerging health care services and supplies. These services or supplies are under clinical trials and ongoing evaluation. TRICARE can extend coverage for up to five years. TRICARE will then determine if the service or supply will become a covered benefit.

Take command of your health.

Women with breast cancer often don't have symptoms. This is one reason why preventive breast cancer screenings are critical. Take command of your health; learn about 3D mammography and your TRICARE benefit.

Expanded TRICARE Coverage for Ambulance Services

TRICARE expanded ambulance services to cover both treat-and-release and joint response services this year. TRICARE now covers:

Treat-and-release: This is when an ambulance treats you, but doesn't take you to the hospital.

Joint response: This is when an ambulance crew needs the help of a paramedic or intermediate EMT to give you advanced life-support services.

Ambulances can be network or non-network providers. In an emergency, sometimes a non-network ambulance may treat or transport you. If a non-network provider bills you for treat-and-release or joint response, they can charge up to 115 percent of the TRICARE-allowable charge.

DPW warns: Don't grease the pipes

Grease, oil, and fat clog pipes and sewer lines just as they block arteries. As with arteries, blocked sewer lines cause serious problems, eventually resulting in overflows and potentially causing health hazards, damage to home interiors, and adverse impacts to our environment.

"Grease-clogged pipes continue to be a cause of sewer spills on Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield – most particularly during the winter months," said Tressa Rutland, Directorate of Public Works Prevention and Compliance branch chief.

"Cooler weather makes the problem worse," Rutland said.

Flushing grease down the drain can

be disastrous. Clogged lines can cause raw sewage to overflow into your home or your neighbor's home, parks, yards,

streets, ditches, streams and other waterways.

Cleaning up after such a mess is not how you want to spend your time, Rutland said. In mass, grease that makes it down the lines from several houses in a neighborhood can result in problems at the lift station once the grease hardens into large chunks. All this means problems for residents, and money for increased operation and maintenance of the

sewer system and spill response teams.

The grease found in plumbing systems typically originates as a cooking

by-product that has been washed down the kitchen sink. Meat fats, cooking oil, shortening, butter and margarine, food

> scraps, baking goods, sauces, and dairy products all contain grease and add to the problem once washed down the drain.

Use of home garbage disposal units only shreds solid material into smaller pieces, but does not remove grease. Like arteries, grease will stick to the inside of the sewer pipes and will build up and block the lines over time.

According to Rutland, "a common mistake is to flush

grease down the sink with hot water, because this will only push the grease farther down the lines where it will later re-solidify and clog lines. Commercial additives and chemicals, including soaps and detergents, that claim to dissolve grease may only do so temporarily and actually just push grease farther down the pipes. When the pipes get clogged it's only a matter of time before everything you put in them – bath water, dish water, and yes, sewage – backs up where it can cause problems both on and in your property and in the streets."

With your help, we can minimize the probability that you will be dealing with the unpleasant annoyance and inconvenience associated with sewage spills. 3rd CAB flight paramedic bridges gap between multinational forces

HOHENFELS, Germany – Soldiers of Company C, 2nd Battalion, 3rd Aviation Regiment, 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division are currently serving in at part of the U.S. Regionally Aligned Force in Europe and one Soldier in particular has found value in bridging the gap in understanding between her and the multinational forces she's training with as part of her unit's first rotation, Combined Resolve XIII.

Sgt. 1st Class Marcia McNeill is a critical care flight paramedic from Chicago, Illinois, with Co. C, 2-3 Avn., 3rd CAB, 3rd ID, known as "Marne Dustoff." The unit has been in Europe for the last several months. Although Combined Resolve XIII was the unit's first rotation, they have been spread throughout Europe since they arrived.

When asked what McNeill personally expected to get from Combined Resolve XIII, she said, "I expected to work alongside our foreign allies and build on the interoperability. I had the opportunity to not only experience a multinational force but also the Role Ones and Role Two that were part of the 1st Cavalry Division."

However, her best moments came when an unexpected aeromedical training event with the Dutch 43rd Medical Company happened.

"The MED 101 training I have conducted before

has primarily been to U.S. ground units," McNeill said. "For the most part, they understand our capabilities as far as medical evacuation is concerned. The Dutch doctors and nurses did not fully understand the level of certification required for a 68WF2 Flight Paramedic. It was great to have an opportunity to bridge the gap, so they understand what our medical equipment, transport capabilities, and patient care involve."

Combined Resolve XIII was also a test of her mettle. Towards the end of the rotation her crew was called into the Role Two to pick up wounded and transport them to a higher level of care. As the HH-60M Blackhawk helicopter approached, the crew noticed gunfire from an OPFOR assault. When asked about the incident, McNeill said, "I would have left the aircraft in an attempt to find my patients," holding true to the Dustoff motto, "When I have your wounded."

"It was a great experience," McNeill said. "I am looking forward to future training and operations with our multinational partners."

Co. C flew more than 12 hours in a multitude of weather conditions, transporting more than 27 patients between roles of care during Combined Resolve XIII.

Combined Resolve XIII is a Headquarters Department of the Army directed Multinational Unified Land Operation exercise with the U.S. Regionally Aligned Force Brigade in support of European Command objectives. The exercise involves more than 5,000 servicemembers at U.S. Army Europe's Grafenwoehr and Hohenfels training areas. Combined Resolve XIII builds readiness and interoperability, promotes regional stability and enhances relationships between allied and partner nations.
