





7th MSC troops spring into action to help protect the force during COVID-19 outbreak








From disinfecting areas on local Army garrisons to screening vehicle occupants as they drive onto Daenner Kaserne, 7th MSC troops have been out in front working hard to protect the force during the outbreak.

Army Reserve Soldiers from the 773rd Civil Support Team collaborated with Soldiers from the 30th Medical Brigade to test the capability and capacity of the Analytical Laboratory System (ALS). By successfully demonstrating a presumptive identification for COVID-19 from patient samples, the 773rd can provide an additional tool for the local military medical community to use in the fight against COVID-19. The team uses the Joint Biological Agent Identification and Diagnostic System (JBAIDS) within the ALS to conduct rapid testing of suspected COVID-19 patient samples, providing presumptive results in approximately five hours. Although results must be confirmed by a clinical laboratory, this capability gives medical providers a faster response from which to make informed decisions for patient care.

U.S. Army Reserve Soldiers supply the force during pandemic

PIRMASENS, Germany – In the midst of a global pandemic, there's been an increase in demand for supplies at Army hospitals and U.S. Army Reserve Soldiers in Europe are helping to fill that demand.

Soldiers from Medical Support Unit-Europe, 7th Mission Support Command, based out of Kaiserslautern, Germany, are supporting the shipping and receiving functions in the warehouse at U.S. Army Medical Materiel Center, Europe in Pirmasens for 30 days (or more) to help push Class VIII medical supplies to where they need to go – the hospitals.

"A lot of what we've been doing is unpacking and receiving shipments that come in," said 1st Lt. Ava Carter, a clinical social worker with MSU-E. "We receive them and put them on the shelf so that they can then turn around and go back out to fulfill outstanding

orders."

Carter and her team of six Soldiers took on the mission a week ago in response to the COVID-19 outbreak to help with the increase in demand for supplies and support the staff of mostly German local nationals who work in the warehouse.

"The demand has increased, for sure," said Carter. "With people being out sick and being quarantined and being on curfew - us being here, we can step in to support where maybe (others) might not be able to."

MSU-E troops, along with active duty Soldiers from the 8th Medical Logistics Company, 421st Multifunctional Medical Battalion, 30th Medical Brigade, 21st Theater Sustainment Command, out of Baumholder, Germany, are supporting the mission in the warehouse.

"Even if they were fully staffed, this would still be a large enough volume that would warrant additional support," said Carter. "The amount of materials and supply and inventory that's coming to those docks every day — with a full staff, they'd still need someone to help."

USAMMCE plans, synchronizes and provides medical logistics support to service members and their families in the U.S. European Command, U.S. Africa Command and U.S. Central Command areas of responsibility, as well as to the U.S. Department of State.

The USAMMCE warehouse receives and ships Class VIII medical supplies to hospitals throughout these areas and Carter says it's always an important mission, but especially right now.

"For every day that a pallet sits on the dock and doesn't get filled, that's another day that a hospital goes without what it needs or diminishes its current supply," she said. "So I think it's really important because it could be anybody that needs those supplies - it could be me, it could be my family, it could be my friends. It could be anyone in those hospitals waiting on supplies."

As Reserve Soldiers, Carter and her team normally work civilian jobs and only don their military uniforms for oncea-month battle training assemblies or two-week annual training. That has changed quickly for many Soldiers un-



der the 7th MSC, the only U.S. Army Reserve Command stationed in Europe, who have come on orders to help with various missions designed to protect the force during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Right now, we're here for 30 days but we're all willing to support as long as needed," said Carter. "We're willing to do whatever it takes."





361st Civil Affairs Brigade changes command

KAISERSLAUTERN, Germany – U.S. Army Reserve Soldiers from the 361st Civil Affairs Brigade welcomed a new commander to their unit, Col. Carlos E. Gorbea, during a March 7 ceremony, here, and bid farewell to outgoing commander, Col. Bradley A. Heston.

Hundreds of people gathered inside the post gym on Kleber Kaserne for the afternoon ceremony, presided over by Brig. Gen. Michael T. Harvey, commander of the 7th Mission Support Command.

Soldiers and guidon bearers snapped to attention when they heard the bugle call for the opening of

the ceremony. The passing of the colors, a timehonored tradition, signified the responsibility of command passing from the outgoing to the incoming commander.

Heston, who took command in 2017, highlighted the brigade's many accomplishments during his remarks. These included direct support to U.S. Army Europe missions; Saber Guardian, Saber Strike and Cobra Strike.

"I will never forget these past three years," said Heston, while reflecting on the accomplishments of his team of the 361st. The Honorable Nellie Gorbea, Rhode Island Secretary of State, flew to Germany to see her younger brother take command.

"My brother is third generation in our family," said Gorbea, "It's in his blood to lead."

During his remarks, Harvey offered Gorbea leadership advice upon taking command.

"It's the greatest privilege you can ever have to lead this nation's most precious resources, its sons and daughters," Harvey said. "Don't change who you are, what you have done to get here. Do the things which has made you successful in the past."

Gorbea, a Rhode Island native and graduate of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, is no stranger to the 361st, having previously served as commander of its subordinate unit, the 457th Civil Affairs Battalion.

"My first act as commander is for all Soldiers to relax, including the color guard," said Gorbea, to re-

lieve Soldiers standing at attention – remarks met with applause.

Meaning: The new BAH rate for this Soldier's pay grade was reduced in the new calendar year; however, he/she is entitled to the old (higher) rate until a break in active service of at least one calendar day.

Remark: USE TAX CERTIFICATE FILE 2019 TAX RETURN, RULING 79-311.

Meaning: Collections were made during the year against a debt that was initiated in a prior year. Collections against prior year debts of taxable income do not reduce the Soldier's current year taxable income. The Soldier will receive a tax certificate at the end of the year and may be able to use it to reduce his/her taxable wages for the current year. Soldiers who receive a tax certificate should consult their tax advi-

Teachers, students and the local military community gathering together to celebrate diversity.


