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New quality of life task force tackles six priorities to help Soldiers, Families

WASHINGTON — The Army's new Quality of Life Task Force has reached full operational capability, the service announced Thursday, as it continues to tackle six priorities to improve conditions for Soldiers and their Families.

Lt. Gen. Jason Evans, the Army's G-9, and other Army leaders make up the task force, which was formally chartered in March to also improve housing, health care, spouse employment, permanent change-of-station moves, and upgrading the quality of living for Soldiers stationed in remote locations.

"We're focused on making life better for Soldiers and Families wherever the Army takes them," Evans said during the task force's first media event to discuss its ongoing efforts. "We still have more work to do."

Despite challenges under the COVID-19 conditions, task force leaders remained confident they can continue Family members arrive at Child Development Center, improving quality of life standards for Army Families.

Winn ACH welcomes new commander

Winn Army Community Hospital broadcasted a live change of command ceremony July 16 on social media to help mitigate the threat of COVID-19, to welcome their new commander – Col. Julie Freeman and farewell outgoing commander, Col. Michelle Munroe.

Brig. Gen. Paula C. Lodi, the Regional Health Command - Atlantic commanding general was the reviewing officer for the day's event. Lodi is familiar with supporting 3rd Infantry Division Soldiers and Families as she started her career with the unit in the early 90s. Later serving the region in 2011 from KeyWest and serving at Fort Benning from 2012-2014.

Lodi said the ceremony was remarkable as it witnessed the transition of two of the Army Medicines finest leaders. She said they were an example of the right people, in the right spot, and the right time. Especially with the continued threat of the coronavirus and ongoing reforms and reorganizations of the military health system.

Lodi said Monroe's success was attributed to her focus on mission, readiness, Soldiers, and the community. "As a visionary leader and role model, Michelle (Munroe) transformed Winn Hospital into one of the highest performing hospitals in the MEDCOM," Lodi said.

Lodi mentioned some of Munroe's achievement including the establishment of the Medical Simulation Training Center. She said the effort restored a derelict building into a state of the art battalion aid station complete with an indoor training suite and medical training validation center.

"Colonel Monroe appropriately focused on quality, safety, and all the metrics associated with high reliability," Lodi said. "She oversaw a \$30 million investment in infrastructure improvements that enhanced patient care and expanded green initiatives and resulting in nearly 30% of the main hospital operating under solar power reducing energy costs by 14%, and overall improving efficiency across this entire installation."

Munroe said she will not forget serving at Winn ACH.

"The last two years have been incredible. And the pinnacle of my career. 733 days - sounds like a large number, and yet the days flew by so quickly," Munroe said.

She spoke about challenges and how

they were overcome by coming together as a team and working with community partners.

"And of course I must mention our COVID response," Munroe said. "The efforts that were accomplished across this entire installation, have been incredible feats of teamwork, collaboration and communication. We developed a plan of attack and an effort to lead the installation and our community through this fight. Major General Tony Aguto (3rd ID commander), and Col. Bryan Logan (garrison commander), together, we put processes into place to protect the community and keep everyone safe."

Lodi thanked Monroe for her achievements; but noted Winn ACH remained in good hands with Freeman. She said Freeman brings a strong strategic perspective from her previous role as the Assistant Deputy for Medical Affairs, Office of the Assistant Secretary of the Army (Manpower and Reserve Affairs) at the Pentagon.

"I've known Julie (Freeman) since she worked in the Army Nurse Corps chief's office," Lodi said. "She has amazing drive and passion for what she does and will be instrumental in the continued success of when Army Community Hospital" She said Freeman's husband, Bill; her son, Colby; and daughter Ellie, would also be an added bonus to the community.

Freeman thanked Munroe for her efforts and Lodi for her comments. She said Winn ACH was her first choice for command. She said the hospital staff, Marne Community and supporting community have an exceptional reputation.

"I'm honored and humbled to join this team," Freeman said. "I look forward to working with the talented professionals that when partnering across this community with our civilian health care systems, the Fort Stewart hunter community, our sisters MTS to provide the best care to our patients. I'm confident that we can continue to build on the extraordinary accomplishment that when to support patients, Soldiers, Families, and the readiness of the Stewart-Hunter communities."

Freeman is a native of St. Mary's, Pennsylvania.

ILLESHEIM, Germany – 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division, transferred authority of the Operation Atlantic Resolve mission to 101st Combat Aviation Brigade, 101st Airborne Division on July 17at Illesheim, Germany.

After supporting missions around Europe with multinational partners and Allies, the ceremony marked the end of 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade's 9-month rotation. It participated in 12 multinational exercises including Combined Resolve, Hawk Strike, and DEFENDER-Europe 2020.

"Over the last nine months, this unit has executed over 10,000 flight hours under all the adverse conditions Europe has to offer," said Col. Michael McFadden, 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade commander. He added the unit has executed over 900 hours of interoperability training with its NATO and coalition partners and Allies to include the United Kingdom, Greece, Macedonia, Switzerland, Poland, Hungary, Romania, Bulgaria, Albania and Slovakia.

During its rotation, the 3rd CAB positioned approximately 80 aircraft, including Sikorsky UH-60 Black Hawks, Boeing AH-64 Apaches, and Boeing CH-47 Chinooks, between Germany, Poland, Romania and Turkey. The assets allowed them to provide maneuverability to forces within Europe to participate in exercises, and for medical personnel and equipment to be moved across the continent to combat COVID-19.

"We took decisive, and well calculated measures to protect and secure our formation," McFadden said. "By doing so, we never reduced operations."

He said in addition to ensuring its deterrence mission succeeded, the brigade facilitated critical movement of personnel and equipment to combat the coronavirus.

The mission of a combat aviation brigade may look different in the current state of the coronavirus response, but its essential function of moving people and supplies

around the European theater remains the same.

The 101st Combat Aviation Brigade accepted responsibility for the mission during the transfer of authority ceremony. It is scheduled to apply its resources over the next nine months to maintain operational readiness.

"Our Soldiers are trained, lethal and motivated," said Col. Travis Habhab, 101st Combat Aviation Brigade commander. "We are excited to make the most of our opportunities throughout Europe to deter threats, increase readiness with our partners and get better every day."

After seeing the capabilities and readiness of the 926th during the wet gap crossing event in front of some of the Army's premier commanders and leadership, Shubert said he is looking forward to being the most combat-ready brigade in the U.S. Army Reserves.



Pandemic delays start of school, begins wave of virtual options for students

With the traditional school year set to begin next month, Families across Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield have many questions regarding how their students will return to school amid the second surge of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Local superintendents were on-hand Wednesday evening during the Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield commanding general's COVID-19 virtual town hall to explain their re-opening plans and ad-dress concerns from the Stewart-Hunter community. Liberty, Bryan, Savannah-Chatham, Long and Fort Stewart DoDEA school districts were represented during the event.

Topics discussed included re-opening plans, in-person versus virtual learning, and the overall safety and well-being of the Stewart-Hunter communities students, Soldiers and Family members.

"School districts on and surrounding Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield have opted to push back their start dates to prepare for either in-person learning with the option of virtual learning or in some districts, full virtual learning," said Gregory Cooke, school liaison officer for Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield. "The main reason for the decision to delay the school start date is to assure the proper implementation of learning options due to the current state of COVID-19 within the local area."

The delay allows the local districts to train faculty and staff on e-learning and prepare technology options for students who choose or are required to utilize the virtual learning option as their primary means of education for the start of the school year.

"As of right now the individual school districts are still developing

their plans while continuing to follow the State of Georgia department of education, department of health, and CDC guidelines for COVID-19 mitigation within the school districts," Cooke said. "For specifics regarding individual schools, it is highly recommended to visit the facts page of your respective school district's website to find the information required for your student to safely enter their school environment."

With the uncertainty of how schools will operate after the start of the school year, parents are asked to maintain close communication with their students' teachers and school administration.

"The educator is first line of contact for both in-person and virtual learning," Cooke said. "If there are questions or concerns, or if your student is having issues please contact the assigned teacher. School districts are aware that students and families may experience challenges due to virtual learning and are available to assist when needed."

Parents are also encouraged to reach out to the School Liaison Office for assistance.


"I am available daily to help Families navigate through this trying and uncertain time in their student's education," Cooke said. "As the SLO, I am here to help bridge the gap between our military community and local school districts as an additional advocate for your student and your Family."

Families who are new to Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield can now register their students for school virtually through their zoned school districts' respective websites.

Those who are interested in private or home school options are asked to reach out to the SLO for further information and guidance.

Spartans bid farewell to O'Neal, welcome Tillis

GRAFENWOHR, GERMANY — The 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, currently assigned to 1st Calvary Division Forward, a part of the U.S. Army Europe's Regionally Aligned Forces mission, Atlantic Resolve, hosted it's change of command ceremony where Col. Scott O'Neal relinquished command to Col. Terry Tillis on Tower Barracks Parade Field, Grafenwöhr, Germany July 20.

Keeping up with a long line of tradition, the Ceremony was held on a parade field, this was the first time that the brigade hosted one in Germany. Due to the ongoing world-wide pandemic COVID-19, the ceremony was condensed to small formations of battalion commanders, their senior enlisted advisors, color bearers, and members of the brigade staff.

The reviewing officer for the ceremony was Brig. Gen. Brett Sylvia, commanding general of the 1st Cavalry Division Forward.

"At this point, some of you may have noticed that I am not wearing the same patch as the esteemed men and women of the Spartan brigade," said Sylvia. "Maj. Gen. [Tony] Aguto, 3rd Infantry Division's commanding general, would have loved to have been here, but COVID restrictions on international travel keeps him from being physically present. After a thorough vetting process, I was deemed minimally sufficient to fill the task."

O'Neal took command of the spartan brigade June 8, 2016. While in command he accomplished many tasks like converting an Infantry Brigade Combat Team to an Armored Brigade Combat Team.

"Scott took command of the Spartans as they were converting from an IBCT to an ABCT," said Sylvia. "This is significant in every regard. The personnel are different, the equipment is different, and the training progression is different. The Spartans not only did all this but then deployed to the National Training Center and set records for operational readiness rates above 90%, lethality in live fires, and accomplishment against the world class opposing forces."

Sylvia commended O'Neal for his accomplishments as the brigade's commander, highlighting O'Neal's leadership and innovation during the unprecedented early days of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Through his 25 months in command, O'Neal, and the Spartan brigade partook in several command post exercises, war-fighters, gunneries, and deployed the organization to Europe during a pandemic, while keeping the unit safe and contributing to DEFENDEREurope 20, an exercise unlike any other of its kind in 25 years.

"Ladies and gentlemen, not a single Soldier in this brigade expected to be here today," said O'Neal. "But here they are, after months of living in tents and taking care of equipment in dust and mud. Never a complaint and ready to fight."

As he reflected on the brigade's history, going back to 1917, where the brigade first flew it's colors on a field outside of Charlotte, North Carolina, and the challenges that the Soldiers and Families of the brigade faced this year back in Georgia. He commended them with applause on their resilience during each new added chapter.

O'Neal closed out his remarks "My name is O'Neal. I am a Soldier and am proud to call the Soldiers represented by these colors, my credentials."

In addition to the Sylvia remarks on O'Neal, he greeted Tillis to the Spartan Brigade.

"As we farewell one great leader, we also welcome another into the Family," said Sylvia. "Terry your reputation precedes you in the best way possible and I am excited to see one great leader follow another. I am confident you will continue the trajectory towards excellence of this great brigade.


Tillis opened his remarks thanking Sylvia for presiding, 7th Army Training Command and United Service Organization staffs for assisting with the ceremony. He reiterated O'Neal's thoughts saying the ability to execute at such a high level of readiness does not come by accident.

The Army defines a gap as a ravine, mountain pass, river, or other terrain feature that presents an obstacle that may be bridged. For a maneuver unit such as the 1st armored brigade combat teams, 3rd Infantry Division, reaching an objective quickly takes the initiative away from the enemy and enables decisive victories on the battlefield.

Key objectives on the battlefield are often situated near rivers. When alternative avenues of approach are heavily defended, a water crossing, or what the Army refers to as a wet gap crossing, can be a critical course of action for the battlefield commander to consider. In nearly all of the conflicts that the Army has fought in, successful wet gap crossings resulted in seizing key terrain. In World War II, it was the allied forces crossing the Rhine River. During the initial invasion of Iraq in 2003, a wet gap crossing was established to allow tanks from 3rd ID to cross the Euphrates River on its approach to Baghdad.

Wet gap crossings provide the capability to quickly move tanks, heavy vehicles, equipment and personnel from one river bank to the other is essential for the success of maneuver units. The 3rd Battalion, 69th Armor Regiment, 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, teamed up with Raider Brigade's 10th Brigade Engineer Battalion and reserve units of the 926th Engineer Brigade, planned and executed a wet gap crossing of Pineview Lake, July 17, on Fort Stewart. Senior leaders from throughout XVIII Airborne Corps, which included Lt. Gen. Michael "Eric" Kurilla, XVIII ABC commander and Maj. Gen. Tony Aguto, 3ID commander, observed, in the building of an improved ribbon bridge and rafts capable of transporting M1 Abrams tanks and M2 Bradley Fighting Vehicles.

"We were able to demonstrate the lethality of the Raider Brigade; our attack to seize the far side and keep the fight going against our enemy," said Maj. Gary Brooks, 10th BEB operations officer and planner for the wet gap crossing. "The bridge companies allowed us to get our armor from the near side to the far side as fast as possible to maintain tempo, regain contact with the enemy, and continue with our objectives."

For a wet gap crossing to be successful, the far side must be secured, first with indirect artillery fires, and ultimately from infantry who, in the wet gap crossing training scenario, were ferried across in Combat Rubber Raiding Craft piloted by Soldiers of the 310th Multi-Role Bridge Company. The 310th MRBC also constructed a raft using interior bays and ramps to ferry two M2 Bradley Fighting Vehicles across the wet gap.

"This is what we do in the real world," said 1st Lt. Sara Burke, MRBC commander. "When we deploy, we are going to be integrated with maneuver units. We're proficient at building bridges, but with joint training such as today, we're experiencing the timelines set by the maneuver unit, we're receiving enemy fire; we're learning how to get all their Soldiers across safely and keep our soldiers safe. Without joint training such as this, the mission will not be possible."

Lt. Col. Andrew Lembke, commander of 3-69 AR, was pleased that his Soldiers were able to experience what it is like for an entire battalion's worth of M1 Abrams tanks and M2 Bradley Fighting Vehicles to conduct a wet gap crossing and the amount of coordination and preparation that goes into it.

"Wet gap crossings are one of most complex operations that we do in the Army, just because of the amount of synchronization that is required," Lembke said. "In reality, it's a lot of what we train on a normal basis. As long as we're solid in our fundamentals, we can implement them into whatever mission we're selected to do."

Col. Ross F. Nelson, USAWOCC commandant, presented the award to Letendre, who then addressed the physical and virtual audiences.

"During the last decade of my career, I was honored and privileged to work with many fine senior warrant officers – and each and every one of them are just as deserving of this award," Letendre said. "In fact, eight of my former cohorts are already members of this society.

TRICARE to host webinar for new members

TRICARE will host a webinar on July 30 for those who would like to learn more about their elegibility.

The webinar will explore the differences between TRICARE Prime and TRICARE Select and will explain eligibility, enrollment, care, costs, and other key features of the plans.

"TRICARE offers comprehensive and affordable health care, dental, and pharmacy coverage to meet your needs as they change," said Mark Ellis, webinar presenter and chief of the Policy and Programs Section of the TRICARE Health Plan at the Defense Health Agency. "Now more than ever it's important to understand your TRICARE options and how your plan works."

These health plans may differ in terms of the providers you can see, how you get care, and how much you have to pay. Generally, you'll have the same covered services with TRICARE Prime and TRICARE Select. But you may have to pay copayments or cost-shares for certain covered services depending on your TRICARE plan and beneficiary status (for example, active duty sponsor, retiree, or family member). For plan costs, you can refer to the TRICARE Costs and Fees Sheet or the TRICARE Compare Costs Tool.

TRICARE Prime is a health care option for active duty service members (ADSMs), retirees, family members, and certain others. If you're in an overseas area,

TRICARE Overseas Program (TOP) Prime is available to ADSMs and their command-sponsored family members.

TRICARE Select is for eligible beneficiaries, including active duty family members, retirees, and retiree family members who aren't enrolled in a TRICARE Prime plan. TOP Select is available overseas to eligible beneficiaries. To see what health plans you may be eligible for, you can use the TRICARE Plan Finder.

As described in the TRICARE Plans Overview, you can only enroll in or change your enrollment to TRICARE Prime or TRICARE Select during TRICARE Open Season or after a Qualifying Life Event. If you aren't enrolled in a TRICARE health plan, you can only get care at a military hospital or clinic if space is available.

"Before you choose or change your health plan, there are questions you and your family should consider," said Ellis. "In this webinar, we'll explore some of these key questions to help you decide which plan you may be eligible for and which plan best serves your health care needs."

Army to attract gaming industry with training simulations

FORT MEADE, Md. — The Army's Synthetic Training Environment Cross-Functional Team soon plans to unveil new labs where it can tap into the innovation of vendors that could one day improve individual and collective training.

At its headquarters in Orlando, the team will open a renovated Technology Integration Facility this week. The facility creates a secured setting, where vendors with promising technology can run it on a military test network. "We really want to revolutionize the way the Army trains," said Maj. Gen. Maria Gervais, who leads the STE CFT, one of eight modernization teams under Army Futures Command.

The team's goal is to establish a common synthetic environment, where live, virtual and constructive training can be converged, she said. The Army currently does that at 12 permanent sites, but they are mainly for the active-duty component and require long planning timelines and lots of resources such as contractors to operate the event.

"We're trying to get after common standards, common data, common terrain and an open archi-

tecture" to enable rapid integration of future plugand-play trainers, she said Thursday during the Austin Dialogue on Innovation in Defense online event.

The team, along with its Navy partners, will also open a "Technology Grove" in early August. It will serve as an incubator lab where vendors, particularly small businesses, can demonstrate their technology.

"We'll look under the hood and give you feedback right there if you're on the right track or not," she said, adding that promising technology may then move to the Technology Integration Facility for rigorous testing.

The Army's STE information system, which is currently in development, will serve similar to an operating system on a smartphone, she said.

When the iPhone was first released, she said, it only had a handful of standard applications developed by Apple. The company then created its App Store, which now has over 2 million apps available to download on iPhones.

The STE information system will have three baseline apps: training simulation software that will drive simulations; training management tools to plan, execute and assess training; and One World Terrain that will be 3-D and readily accessible either on hand or pulled from a commercial asset into simulators in less than 72 hours, she said.

Her team aims to build on those apps by leveraging the work of vendors in the \$100 billion-plus virtual, gaming and telecommunications industry, she said.

"We've seen that the gaming technology is advancing at a rate far faster than we can probably keep up with," she said. "We want to understand what is in the realm of the possible, and work with innovative small businesses and academia."

The team has already had success with the Squad Immersive Virtual Trainer, which will begin to be fielded next year as part of the Integrated Visual Augmentation System. The IVAS is a mixed-reality, heads-up display that overlays simulated imagery within a Soldier's view of the real world.



Tradition continues with Army 10-mile qualifier

"Last year's team placed fourth in their division out of 65 teams."

Since its inception in 1985, the Army 10-Miler hosted 420,478 runners, and as a category-B Army MWR event, it's open to the public for participation.

"I started training on April 1st after COVID-19 moved the spring semester at Georgia Southern University to online," said Capt. Christopher Bucci, a competitor at the 10-mile run on Fort Stewart, and an assistant professor of military science at Georgia Southern University-Armstrong Campus.

"My cadets and other cadre motivated me to join them on an app called Strava, where we could motivate each other while social distancing," said Bucci. "This pushed me to get back into running, and now I am trying to accomplish some fitness goals I have had for a long time."

As a repeat competitor of the Army 10-miler, the motivation payed dividends for Bucci, as his focus and dedication to training helped him come in first place with a run time of 1:07:45. His time cemented his slot for the main event in Washington.

Coming in second place was Capt. Jenny Metzler, a plans officer for the 83rd Chemical Battalion. She was right behind Bucci with a run time of 1:10:14. She said she has previously competed in the Army 10-miler numerous times.

"I love running, and so, trying to run a new personal record every time is motivating," said Metzler.

The COVID-19 pandemic has changed a lot of things

"I love the camaraderie that comes with training for an event like this," said Bucci. "Preparing for the event, combined with strength training, will make me a more-fit and combat-ready Soldier."



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
