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GDOT to suspend holiday lane closures

GDOT

ATLANTA, Ga. — To ease Thanksgiving traffic congestion statewide, Georgia Department of Transportation announced the suspension of construction-related lane closures on heavily traveled interstate highways and state routes from 6 a.m. Nov. 25 to 5 a.m. Nov. 30. The statewide lane restrictions help to reduce traffic congestion during the Thanksgiving holiday. Similar restrictions will be in place for Christmas and New Year's.

"In order to provide a safer and less congested roadway, we are limiting construction-related lane closures," said Georgia DOT State Construction Engineer John Hancock. "Although traffic volumes were down earlier this year due to COVID-19, unfortunately, fatalities on our roadways have been up. I urge drivers to watch your speed, put down your cell phones, be alert and make sure you and your passengers buckle-up. Let's make this a happy Thanksgiving for all."

While the road closures will be suspended, the department reminds travelers to exercise caution as crews may still work near highways, and safety concerns may require some long-term lane closures to remain in place. In addition, incident management

or emergency, maintenance-related lane closures could become necessary at any time on any route.

For up-to-date information about travel conditions on Georgia's interstates and state routes, call 511 or visit 511ga.org before heading out. 511 is a free service that provides real-time statewide information on Georgia's interstates and state routes, including traffic conditions, incidents, lane closures, and delays due to inclement weather 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Callers can also transfer to operators to request HERO assistance in metro Atlanta or CHAMP service on highways in other regions of the state.

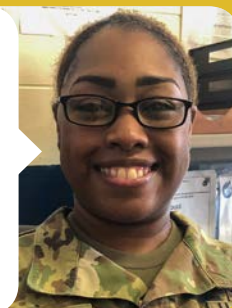

Korean soldiers join the Cottonbaler Family

The Cottonbaler Battalion - 2nd Battalion, 7th Infantry Regiment, 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division - welcomed their new Korean Augmentation to the U.S. Army Soldiers into the battalion through friendly competition and a formal patching ceremony, Nov. 16 on Camp Humphreys, Republic of Korea.

Each company, along with their new KATUSA Soldiers, competed in physically rigorous circuits while wearing their body armor and M50 Joint Service General Purpose Mask. The Soldiers performed multiple iterations of 25 squats, 25 push-ups and five burpees.

Once Soldiers completed the set of exercises, the company commanders read part of the battalion's history before moving to the next station and another round of exercises.

KSgt. Yong Jae Choi expressed his excitement with the Cottonbalers' high motivation during the event, as well as the opportunity to participate alongside his U.S. counterparts as a cohesive team.

Many of the competitors echoed Choi's sentiment of feeling welcomed and part of the 2-7 Inf. Regt. team.

The patching ceremony occurred immediately following the competition. During the ceremony, each companies' KATUSA and U.S. Soldier counterparts stood side-by-side with smiles hidden underneath their face masks.

2nd Lt. Jeremy Tuggle, the battalion adjutant, began the ceremony with an explanation of the history of the 70-year-old KATUSA program.

"The KATUSA Program is a visible symbol of the strength and relationship between our two countries," Tuggle said. "No other nation puts its sons under the direct command of U.S. Army noncommissioned officers."

Following that introduction, Maj. Seth Varayon, battalion executive officer, briefly explained 2-7 Inf. Regt.'s long history and the importance of the KATUSA program.

Lt. Col. Christian Durham and Command Sgt. Maj. James Ott, 2-7 Inf. Regt.'s senior leaders, then welcomed the KATUSAs to the battalion.

After this, each U.S. Soldier removed their KATUSA partner's previous unit patch and replaced it with their personal 3rd ID patch. The KATUSAs then followed suit by reaching over and sticking a replacement 3rd ID patch on the left arm of their fellow Soldier. This brought the ceremony to a close.

The newly patched members of the Cottonbaler team were welcomed by their leaders and peers.

"The rotation may have just started, but the last time I was here, KATUSAs were essential to meeting my unit's mission requirements," said 2nd Lt. Gregory Ulseth, battalion chemical officer. "I think that this mission is even more important and that they will prove to be even more crucial."

The battalion will continue to integrate their new augmentees into their team and look forward to continuing the tradition that was established 70-years ago.

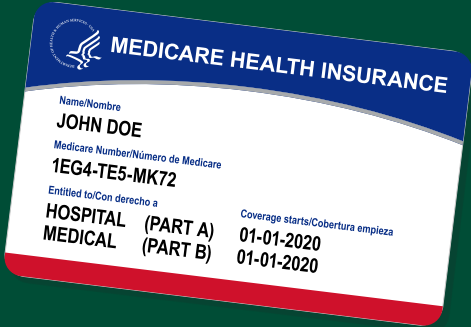

3rd CAB receives the Brig. Gen. Carl I. Hutton award

The command team of 4th Battalion, 3rd Aviation Regiment, 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division, received the Brig. Gen. Carl I. Hutton award Nov. 18 at the Hunter Club on Hunter Army Airfield.

The Brig. Gen. Carl I. Hutton award is given to units who demonstrate outstanding professionalism and made invaluable contributions to the advancement of flight safety in Army aviation. The 4th Bn., 3rd AVN Regt., is one of only two units who have won the Brig. Gen. Carl I. Hutton award twice in the award's 41-year history.

"This award signifies the top safety program in the entire U.S. Army in aviation," said retired U.S. Air Force Lt. Gen. Nicholas Kehoe, the national commander of the Order of the Daedalians and special guest presenter of the award. "This reflects the outstanding quality of the leadership, supervision and performance of all the Soldiers assigned to the unit."

According to their website, the Order of the Daedalians is an organization that advocates for air and space power and honors those who flew and fly in defense of the nation. They recognize exceptional performance by military aviators and work to preserve aviation history.

Every year representatives from the Order

of the Daedalians reach out to the Army chief of staff and tell them about the awards they would like to give out, Kehoe said. The awards then go to the U.S. Army Aviation Center of Excellence at Fort Rucker, Alabama, where a board reviews the packets and selects the winning units.

Chief Warrant Officer 3 Aron Haselbauer, the battalion safety officer, created a packet that documented all the training and operations the battalion conducted. The packet highlighted safety precautions that were in place to allow the unit to transition from one exercise to another without accidents.

In spite of the unit's high operational tempo, they did not suffer any notable or disqualifying accidents. The battalion conducted border support operations, joint force training exercises and a deployment in support of Operation Atlantic Resolve.

According to *safety.army.mil*, accidents are classed by the resulting total cost of property damage.

"During that time, the battalion flew over 4,500 hours with no class A, B or C accidents and drove thousands of miles without any class A or B mishaps on the ground," said Lt. Col. Joseph McCarthy, the commander of the battalion. "These numbers showcase the success of our leadership and Soldiers in instilling and adhering to the Brawler safety attitude throughout the entire formation."

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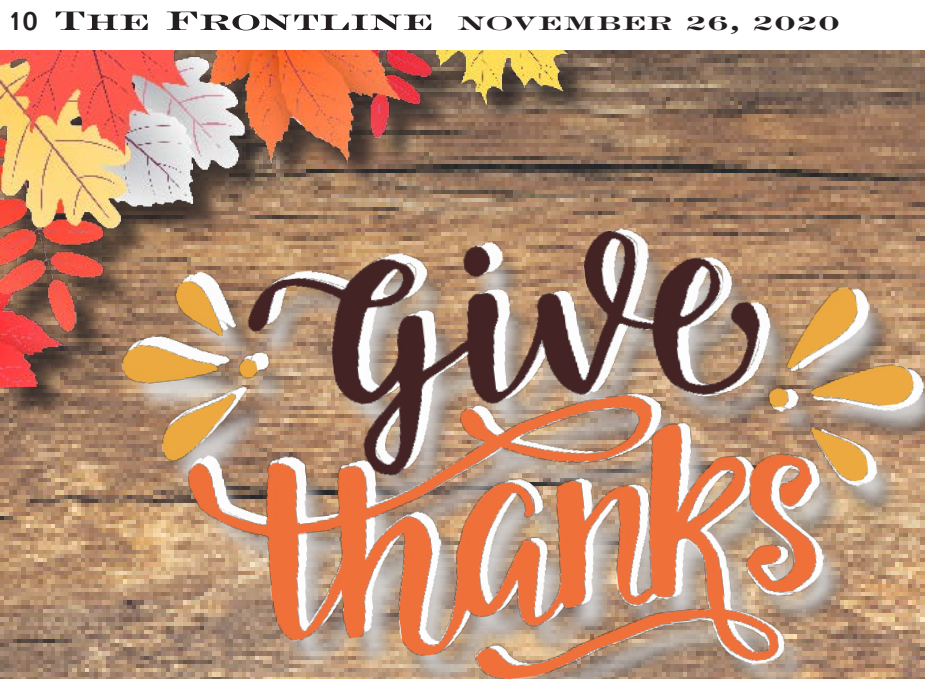

DPW warns: Don't grease the pipes

Grease, oil, and fat clog pipes and sewer lines just as they block arteries. As with arteries, blocked sewer lines cause serious problems, eventually resulting in overflows and potentially causing health hazards, damage to home interiors, and adverse impacts to our environment.

"Grease-clogged pipes continue to be a cause of sewer spills on Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield – most particularly during the winter months," said Tressa Rutland, Directorate of Public Works Prevention and Compliance branch chief.

"Cooler weather makes the problem worse," Rutland said.

Flushing grease down the drain can be disastrous. Clogged lines can cause raw sewage to overflow into your home or your neighbor's home, parks, yards, streets, ditches, streams and other

waterways.

Cleaning up after such a mess is not how you want to spend your time, Rutland said. In mass, grease that makes it down the lines from several houses in a neighborhood can result in problems at the lift station once the grease hardens into large chunks. All this means problems for residents, and money for increased operation and maintenance of the sewer system and spill response teams.

The grease found in plumbing systems typically originates as a cooking by-product that has been washed down the kitchen sink. Meat fats, cooking oil, shortening, butter and margarine, food scraps, baking goods, sauces, and dairy products all contain grease and add to the problem once washed down the drain.

Use of home garbage disposal units only shreds solid material into smaller pieces, but does not remove grease. Like arteries, grease will stick to the inside of the sewer pipes and will build up

and block the lines over time.

According to Rutland, "a common mistake is to flush grease down the sink with hot water, because this will only push the grease farther down the lines where it will later re-solidify and clog lines. Commercial additives and chemicals, including soaps and detergents, that claim to dissolve grease may only do so temporarily and actually just push grease farther down the pipes. When the pipes get clogged it's only a matter of time before everything you put in them – bath water, dish water, and yes, sewage – backs up where it can cause problems both on and in your property and in the streets."

With your help, we can minimize the probability that you will be dealing with the unpleasant annoyance and inconvenience associated with sewage spills. First Army welcomes Korean War veteran home

DAVENPORT, Iowa — Except for his college days and military service, Korean War veteran J.P. Whitaker has spent all of his 92 years in the same home in this Mississippi River town.

So when friends wanted to renovate his house and make it more accommodating to a person with senior needs, Whitaker balked.

"He was not a fan of that in the beginning," said a longtime friend, Army Reserve Lt. Col. Jenö Berta. "He's a child of the Depression and he's one of those who says, 'Everything's fine, we did without for years, I don't need any of this.'"

But after what Berta had contributed to his country and community, his friends weren't about to accept that answer.

"We decided that he deserves a home refurbishing and there were safety concerns," Berta said. "We wanted to get his laundry, bedroom, and shower on the first level."

The process took six months, during which time Whitaker resided in an assisted living facility. When he returned home on Nov. 14, there had

been one final addition: A flag pole. This enabled Whitaker's welcome home ceremony to include the raising of the flag which had been flown over Rock Island Arsenal in his honor. The event also included a drive-by conducted by Patriot Guard riders and a bugler playing, "To the Colors."

First Army Commanding General, Lt. Gen. Thomas James Jr., presented Whitaker with several items, including a First Army coin and a patch of the 3rd Infantry Division, which both James and Whitaker served in.

"Korea is so appreciative of what you did," James told Whitaker. "Seoul

is one of the most advanced cities in the world because of the sacrifice of you and those who fought with you. It's a special opportunity to meet you, sir, and to honor you."

Davenport Mayor Mike Matson, a retired Ranger and command sergeant major, added, "J.P., this is a great day. Thank you so much for your service. The city of Davenport is proud of you."

Whitaker loved everything about the day, especially the flag.

"It's great, everybody should have one," he said. "It shows the strength of the United States."

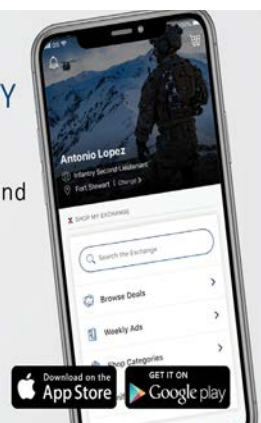

This may have altered how operations are executed, but it has not hindered the Sustainment Brigade's outreach.

Soldiers with the 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade participated in the second annual read-a-thon digitally Nov. 16, on Fort Stewart.

"Teachers need positive role models like our wonderful Soldiers to help educate their students," said Dr. Kathy S. Moody, the Liberty County Executive Director for Student Services.

Some of the Soldiers that volunteered also felt that it was a good idea to keep the read-a-thon going.

"I am a parent of three boys and even though we are going through a pandemic right now I feel like it is still great to continue reading to the children to let them know they haven't been forgotten," said Sgt. Tichina Stout assigned to the 287th Field Feeding Company, Special Troops Battalion, 3rd SB. "Just because there is a pandemic going on does not mean we have to stop the things that we would normally do."

Unlike last year, Soldiers were not allowed to physically go to the Liberty County Schools and read to the

children in their classrooms.

"Due to COVID restrictions, Soldiers are not able to physically be present in classrooms for this year's read-a-thon," said Moody. "The event, however, will be very unique as teachers will have access to the read-a-thon link to 'bring' Soldiers into the classrooms digitally."

Reading digitally reading poses differences as opposed to going to the classrooms of the students like the lack of face-to-face interaction, but presenting a digital read-a-thon also has a couple of benefits.

"Having this access will allow students to watch and to listen to the stories many times throughout the school year," said Moody. "In addition, students who are participating in virtual learning will have wonderful opportunities to participate in the second annual read-a-thon with Soldiers from the 3rd Sustainment Brigade."

The 3rd SB. was able to make this happen with the help of the SD. Public Affairs office and the community relations non-commissioned officer.

"We had to look for creative solutions to continue to engage with our community due to the additional force protection measures in place for COVID," said Staff Sgt. Joel Salgado, the brigade public affairs and community relations noncommissioned officer. "I spoke with the school board and we determined that we would like to keep the read-a-thon going and using a digital format allowed us to do that and reach both in-person and remote schooled children. The digital format also allowed us to expand the read-a-thon to more school districts including the Department of Defense Education Activity schools and Bryan County."

In the future, the 3rd Sustainment Brigade plans to continue recording digital readings and finding ways to engage the community that supports our Soldiers.
