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Infantry OSUT

PHYSICAL and MENTAL Toughness

The last 14-week Infantry One Station Unit
Training (OSUT) graduated 17 January 2020, and
22-week Infantry OSUT is now the standard. Upon
graduation from the 22-week Infantry OSUT,
trainees will have walked over 100 miles of foot
marches, fired over 2,400 rounds with their assigned
weapon, culminating in both Fire Team and Urban
Marksmanship live fires.

22-week Infantry OSUT graduates execute a minimum of 21 days in a tactical field environment and must pass individual day and night land navigation. Trainees are certified medically through the Combat Lifesaver Program and are Basic Level Certified in the Modern Army Combatives Program.

Infantry Soldiers now execute the new four-position combat course of fire per TC 3-20.40. Trainees will have completed four Army Combat Fitness Tests (ACFT) and two Army Physical Fitness Tests (APFT) along with a Combat Water Survival Assessment (CWSA). They execute two crucible events while in training: the Forge at Week 10 and the Bayonet FTX at Week 18 which challenge the Soldiers evolving knowledge of battle drills and tactical operations – transforming them from civilians to Infantry Soldiers who possess the Army Values, fundamental Soldier skills, physical fitness, character, confidence, commitment, and the Warrior Ethos ready to accomplish the mission of the Infantry.

22-week Infantry OSUT graduates are now better prepared to fight, survive and win on today's modern battlefield.



Armor and Cavalry OSUT It's all about SETS and REPS

The 194th Armored Brigade continues to be the premier training organization for 19D Cavalry Scout, 19K Armor Crewman, 91A Abrams System Maintainer, and 91M Bradley Fighting Vehicle System Maintainer programs of instruction to enable the operational force.

With the transition to a 22-week one station unit training for scouts and crewmembers, the Soldiers will be more familiar with the different platforms.

The longer OSUT adds more training repetitions on the assigned vehicle platform including driving, employment, and maintenance, practice with the M4 and M9 weapons, increases indirect fires training, such as call for fire, reinforces anti-tank weapons training with the Javelin and AT-4 and crew-serves weapons. This additional training time increases the lethality of the Armor Soldier and provides a better trained, more disciplined Soldier who exhibits the knowledge, skills and attributes necessary for the operational units' success.

The brigade shapes Soldiers' ability to adapt to complex and emerging threats within the operational environment through physical and mental toughness, combat vehicle proficiency, field craft and discipline. Exposing Soldiers to the emerging technologies that near-peer competitor may employ on the modern battlefield allows them to react, giving them the ability to fight and win the nation's wars.

FM 3-96 UPDATES

With the U.S. Army's shift in focus to largescale combat operations and updates to nearly all Army Doctrine Publications and 12 Field Manuals (FMs), the Maneuver Center of Excellence is updating the publications it provides to the maneuver force. One of the most significant updates is to FM 3-96 Brigade Combat Team.

FM 3-96 provides an in-depth discussion on cyberspace electromagnetic activities teams within the Brigade Combat Team (BCT), information collection planning, engagement area development, and security cooperation stability operations tasks.

The new FM 3-96 acknowledges the Division and Corps headquarters may assign or attach organic BCT enablers to headquarters outside the BCT as well as emphasizes the advisor role that the engineer, artillery, and support battalion commanders have with the BCT commanders.

Final staffing of FM 3-96 is complete; the planned publication date is in late second or early third quarter, Fiscal Year 2020.

Also updated was Training Circular (TC) 3-20.21 Training to Proficiency, Maneuver Company and Troop. TC 3-20.21 provides examples of integration tasks for the associated warfighting functions in force on force and force on target scenarios to build more robust and rigorous mission essential task focused training. Once published, TC 3-20.21 replaces FM 3-20.21 Heavy Brigade Combat Team (HBCT) Gunnery.


