



The Ziggurat of Ur, located near the modern city of An Nasiriyah, was built approximately in the 21st century BC by Sumerian king Ur-Nammu as a shrine to the moon god Nanna. The step pyramid is thought to have towered 100 feet into the air




### VISITING THE PAST



OF THE 25 ZIGGURATS KNOWN FROM IRAQ AND IRAN, THE ZIGGURAT OF UR IS THE BEST PRESERVED. IT WAS RESTORED IN THE 6TH CENTURY BC BY KING NABONIDUS, LAST KING OF THE NEO-BABYLONIAN EMPIRE. IN THE 1980S, THE FAÇADE OF THE LOWEST LEVEL AND THE MONUMENTAL STAIRCASE WERE REBUILT UNDER THE ORDERS OF SADDAM HUSSEIN.

### THE ZIGGURAT OF UR



From **1922** то 1934, UR WAS THE SITE OF EXTENSIVE EXCAVATIONS BY SIR LEONARD WOOLLEY, WHO WAS WORKING ON BEHALF OF THE UNIVERSITY MUSEUM OF PENNSYLVANIA. WHILE MANY HAD DONE PRELIMINARY WORK, WOOLLEY AND HIS TEAM WERE ABLE TO MEASURE THE ZIGGURAT, FIND OTHER BUILDINGS THAT WERE PART OF THE COMPLEX AND GATHERED INFORMATION ABOUT WHAT THE BUILDING LOOKED LIKE.



### VISITING THE PAST

The ziggurat was damaged in the First Gulf War by some 400-bullet holes and the structure was shaken by explosions, recognizable by four nearby bomb craters.



### THE ZIGGURAT OF UR



AMONG THE RUINS NEXT TO THE ZIGGURAT, ARCHEOLOGISTS FOUND A HOUSE INSCRIBED WITH THE NAME 'ABRAHAM.' IN THE EARLY 1990s, POPE JOHN PAUL II EXPRESSED A DESIRE TO VISIT THE HOUSE, LEADING SADDAM HUSSEIN TO ORDER THE BUILDING BE REBUILT UPON THE ORIGINAL FOUNDATION. THE POPE NEVER MADE THE JOURNEY DUE TO SECURITY CONCERNS.

"Do not walk on top of these rocks.
Keep our history safe."
Since 2003, security of the 5000-year old ziggurat has mainly been under control of Coalition forces.
However, on May 13, 2009, responsibility for the ziggurat was ceremoniously transferred to Iraqi security forces.

The site is now officially controlled by the Dhi Qar Iraqi police and managed by the Ministry of Tourism. "Every citizen needs to have access to this ziggurat because education is not just in the classrooms," said Dr. Anna Prouse, Dhi Qar Provincial Reconstruction team leader.







Soldiers from Contingency Operating Base Basra were greeted by a chorus of little voices singing the Iraqi National Anthem when they surprised the children with school supplies, treats and even guitars at St. Efram Elementary School in Basra. The kindergartners were also eager to make the American Soldiers feel at home by performing a couple of classics in English: "Head and Shoulders, Knees and Toes" as well as the English alphabet. Bishop Imad Al Banna, acting bishop of Basra, explained the two schools sponsored by the Chaldean Church are the only kindergartens in the country to combine children of mixed religions in one learning environment. "When you teach children together they learn to become one nation," said Al Banna. "They learn more about their country and culture and become united.

They learn to love and serve by love and not war."












# PHOTO CONTEST: WHERE YOU LIVE


No one knows the place you're from better than you: the nuances, the beauty, the secrets, and the people.

Give us your photos and stories that tell us about where you live. These can be photos taken here in Iraq or while on leave. If something about your surroundings catches your eye; capture it in a photo.

Put the viewer into the photo. If you're photographing your room, the viewer should feel and understand what it would be like to live under the conditions you do, whether your room is cramped and cluttered or as sterile as an operating room. Let's hope it's the latter.

### WHERE YOU LIVE TIPS

- Remember to use the Rule of Thirds when composing shots.
- Avoid using flash if adequate lighting for proper exposure is available naturally.
- Experiment with different angles to provide a view not normally experienced.
- Move closer to your subject/content. Many new photographers forget to eliminate excess space between the photographer and the subject.
- Hold the camera steady for crisp shots. Avoid blurry, out-of-focus shots with steady hands.
- Capture details. Instead of trying to capture everything, move in and focus on something unique.
