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Λ s we round out Aour first 90 days in theater, I'd like to take a moment to recap the long road and challenges we have endured as a unit and how these challenges can and will make us a stronger fighting force. Prior to arriving at the mobilization platform, 36ID went



head to head with a pandemic-the likes of which this world hasn't seen in over 100 years. Execution of our premobilization training and 6 months of weekend drills were completed either virtually or under significant constraints. COVID-19 had already sunk its teeth into our formation as we headed to Ft. Hood. Our Soldiers always remained flexible and maintained a mission first attitude.

Upon arrival and execution of our Culminating Training Event, nearly 30% of our formation had contracted and recovered from the "Vid". Entire flights were locked down and populated in the confines of the ISOFAC (Isolation Facility)...Soldiers fought through their 14 days of quarantine-all the while, Soldiers remained highly motivated and ready to conduct the Relief in Place and begin the mission.

We have endured a pandemic, quarantines, restrictions of movements, a loss of one of our own and all the challenges of building our teams standing 6 ft. away, masked and the constant bath of hand sanitizer. Yet through it all, our 36ID Soldiers have outperformed every ARCENT expectation. This is a direct reflection of the tenacity and fortitude of every Soldier in this formation.

I would like to thank all of the Soldiers and their families in Task Force Spartan for the sacrifices both here and on the home front for the defense of this great nation. Take care of each other, remember who is in your squad, and continue your tremendous efforts throughout the theater.

SUBJECT: 36th Infantry Division Shoulder Sleeve Insignia

- 1. Effective immediately, I authorize the 36th Infantry Division 3" x 2" "T-Patch". available at Camp Arifjan, to be worn as an official Shoulder Sleeve Insignia for OCPs. If authorized the 36ID right shoulder Combat Patch, then both patches must be the same size.
- 2. This headquarters is submitting the new design for adoption as the official 36ID shoulder patch insignia to the U.S. Army Institute of Heraldry. The current 2.5"x1.5" patch has lost its definitive character as the arrowhead in production without the scalloped edges of the original design. The new design accommodates the more accurate depiction of the arrowhead.

Tank you for your Service Story by Staff Sgt. Daryl Bradford, Task Force Spartan Public Affairs

When we were children, some of us only dreamed of seeing a tank up close. A lot of people get that opportunity at a museum or military instillation with decommissioned vehicles, but few ever get to drive one.

"Who doesn't like tanks?" asked Spc. Isaiah Cabrera, from Hemet, California, a tank driver with 1st Battalion, 6th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 1st Armored Division. "It's a pretty cool job in my opinion."

Cabrera has only been in the military for year and seven months, but is already living that dream of driving one of those powerful machines in the military for exercise Iron Union 14.

"Iron Union is the joint training operations between the UAE Land Forces and the United States," said Cabrera. "I feel like I'm being a part of something bigger by being here, and it's a huge experience for everyone to train with another nation's army."

Iron Union is a quarterly exercise between Task Force Spartan and UAE Land Forces that is designed to strengthen military-to-military relationships through a joint government approach to future, complex national security challenges.

Cabrera and other U.S. Soldiers from 1st Bn., 6th Inf. Reg., 2nd BCT, 1st Armored Div. out of Fort Bliss, Texas, are the service members participating in Iron Union 14, driving the U.S. Army's primary combat tank, the M-1 Abrams.

Cabrera said he is excited to be at Iron Union and enjoys being in the Army.

Even though it is early in his career, Cabrera is intending to stay in the service for the long haul and wants to use his education benefits to pay for school eventually.

Cabrera feels he is on the right track to meet his goal but also recognizes the work load is sometimes a team effort

"My job with the unit is as a driver for the 3/4 tank," said Cabrera. "I keep it on track, but with the TC and everyone else on the crew, it's making sure everyone is on line — formation wise —and that everything goes smoothly."

Cabrera realizing that his service is about a larger purpose, shows a professionalism that hasn't gone unnoticed. His first sergeant has recognized it, seeing a potential for career growth.

"He used his knowledge and experience to maneuver his tank effortlessly, allowing his tank commander to complete the mission," said 1st Sgt. Merrell Blake, first sergeant for Charlie Company, 1st Bn., 6th Inf. Reg., 2nd BCT, 1st Armored Div. "He has demonstrated the ability multiple times to be an effective leader. I have no doubt that he will make a great Non-Commissioned Officer one day."

Iron Union is about moving, communicating, and sharing ideas with the UAE Land Forces, and Cabrera said he understands the importance of this.

"In the long run, if anything ever goes south they'll be there," said Cabrera. "And the same for us with them."

Cabrera said he has learned some valuable lessons during his short time in the UAE for Iron Union 14.

"I'm able to see from their perspective — be in their shoes," said Cabrera. "Training with another military for long hours builds me stronger knowing they are going through the same thing."

BU DHABI, United Arab Emirates – Soldiers Afrom the United States' Task Force Spartan and the United Arab Emirates Land Forces gathered from Jan. 24 to Feb. 6, 2021, at Al Hamra Training Center in the United Arab Emirates for Iron Union 14, the first bi-lateral training exercise between the forces since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic.

This recurring exercise, designed to strengthen military-to-military relationships, allowed the forces to train how they might address regional security challenges. However, due to COVID-19, this year's event came with its own challenges. "It's been an interesting process," said Capt. Ryan McGovern, the brigade planner for 2nd Brigade, 1st Armored Division, who had a big hand in planning this exercise. "I think the real challenge is being able to accomplish this in light of the COVID conditions. This is really the first bilateral maneuver exercise that ARCENT is doing under COVID conditions. Our mitigation measures have been effective. It's a good indicator that the maneuver brigade supporting Task Force Spartan can conduct further exercises with bilateral partners both here in UAE and across the region."

The UAE is a significant partner for the U.S. within the region, and exercises such as Iron Union demonstrate a commitment by all participating nations to promoting regional stability.

"It's been great to work with the UAE Land Forces," said McGovern. "Throughout the whole process we've taken deliberate actions on both sides, on the UAE Land Forces side and U.S. side, to mitigate the risk of COVID in this exercise."

The training and planning are an opportunity for both countries to build tactical proficiency in critical mission areas, gain an understanding of each other's forces, and support long-term regional stability.

"The benefits for our Soldiers and our partners are building those relationships," said Lt. Col. Bryan Bonnema, the battalion commander for 1st Battalion, 6th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 1st Armored Division. "For our Soldiers in particular it's important for learning the tactics, techniques, and procedures of our regional partners and being able to experience another culture."

This recurring exercise, designed to strengthen military-to-military relationships, allowed the forces to train how they might address regional security challenges.

This exercise is important for many reasons: partnership, security, and interoperability being just a few. The underlying importance of these types of exercises is to deliver a unified message that relationships matter and training alongside partners sends a message of readiness and lethality in an effort to deter potential adversaries.

"We understand that security must be earned," said Bonnema. "It takes hard work. We are putting in that hard work with our regional partners so we can increase our capacity, we can build those relationships, and we can be prepared to address regional security threats together."

As Iron Union 14 came to a close, Maj. Gen. Patrick Hamilton, commanding general of Task Force Spartan, recognized the value in continuing to safely train with our partners.

Even in the wake of COVID-19, the exercise will continue not only to shape security in the region but to continue to grow the bonds of military-to-military partnerships.

"As some COVID restrictions have eased and we're able to conduct more face-to-face training. we're seeing it's as if we haven't missed a beat," said Hamilton. "I am grateful to our Emirati hosts this week and extremely impressed by their professionalism and dedication as a partner in the region. I look forward to many more of these opportunities in the future."





Black History is American History



The Medal of Honor (MOH) is the United States government's highest and most prestigious military decoration that may be awarded to recognize American soldiers, sailors, marines, airmen, and coast guardsmen who have distinguished themselves by acts



of valor. The medal is normally awarded by the President of the United States, but as it is presented "in the name of the United States Congress", it is often referred to as the "Congressional Medal of Honor".

first African-American Medal of Honor recipient

Henry Johnson the first American awarded French Medal

The Croix de Guerre may be awarded either as an individual award or as a unit award to those soldiers who distinguish themselves by acts of heroism involv-

ing combat with the enemy. The medal is awarded to those who have been "mentioned in dispatches", meaning a heroic deed or deeds were performed meriting a citation from an individual's headquarters unit. The unit award of the Croix de Guerre with palm was issued to military units whose members performed heroic deeds in combat and were subsequently recognized by headquarters.





To the Soldiers and Airmen of the National Guard

The story of the National Guard is the story of America. It is the story of the fight for independence, the fight against tyranny, the fight for democracy, and the fight for freedom. In each of these stories, you will find Black Americans, because Black history is American history.

It is the story of Salem Poor, who was born into slavery, purchased his freedom, joined the Massachusetts militia, and distinguished himself at the Battle of Bunker Hill.

It is the story of William Harvey Carney, who was born into slavery in Virginia, joined the 54th Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry Regiment, and ferociously battled the Confederate Army at Fort Wagner, becoming the first African-American Medal of Honor recipient.

It is the story of Henry Johnson, who joined the National Guard in 1917 and became part of New York's 369th Infantry Regiment - best known as the "Harlem Hellfighters." Sent to fight with the 16th Division of the French Army, Henry Johnson would prove himself a hero in the Argonne forest in hand-to-hand combat where he sustained 21 wounds himself and became the first American awarded France's Croix de Guerre with a golden palm.

Since the beginning of history, Black Americans fought for our Nation, even when they were denied rights, opportunities, and even basic humanity in the eyes of the law. They fought for the ideals President Abraham Lincoln named in the Gettysburg Address:"A new Nation, conceived in liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal."

Today, in many ways, our Nation still struggles to give all its citizens equal opportunities. But our story is not finished, and we can work together to write a history we're proud to leave behind. This Black History Month, let us learn the stories of the Black Americans who shaped our Nation, and ultimately became the Nation for which they fought.

An excerpt from "Win the Day: 7 Daily Habits to Help You Stress Less & Accomplish More" by Mark Batterson

Mark Batterson teaches a powerful lesson on the importance of perspective and the gift of a day.

It reads.

"On May 25, 1979, Denis Waitley was desperately trying to catch a flight from Chicago to Los Angeles. When he arrived at his gate, they had just closed the jetway. Denis begged them to let him on that airplane. No luck! Out of breath and out of patience, he made his way to the ticket counter

to register a complaint and rebook his travel. While he was waiting in line, an announcement came over the airport intercom. AA Flight 191 to Los Angeles had crashed upon takeoff.

The engine on the left wing of that DC-10 separated from the airplane right after takeoff. The unbalanced aerodynamics caused the plane to roll, a roll from which it could not recover. All 271 people on board died in the crash. It was the deadliest aviation accident in United States history.

That near-death experience had a life-altering impact on Denis Waitley. Had he been on time, it would have been the last day of his life. Needless to say, he never registered his complaint. In fact, he never re-turned his ticket for Flight 191. He took his paper ticket and put it in a visible place in his office. On difficult days, the days when he felt like throwing in the towel, all it took was one glance at that ticket to regain perspective. That ticket was a constant reminder that every day is a gift."



CITATION

NEAR SALERNO, ITALY, 9 SEPTEMBER 1943

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at risk of life above and beyond the call of duty in action INVOLVING ACTUAL CONFLICT ON 9 SEPTEMBER 1943 IN THE VICINITY OF SALERNO, ITALY. AS A RIFLEMAN OF AN INFANTRY COMPANY, SGT. LOGAN LANDED WITH THE FIRST WAVE OF THE ASSAULT ECHELON ON THE BEACHES OF THE GULF OF SALERNO, and after his company had advanced 800 yards inland and taken positions along the forward bank of an IRRIGATION CANAL, THE ENEMY BEGAN A SERIOUS COUNTERATTACK FROM POSITIONS ALONG A ROCK WALL WHICH RAN PARALLEL WITH THE CANAL ABOUT 200 YARDS FURTHER INLAND. VOLUNTARILY EXPOSING HIMSELF TO THE FIRE OF A MACHINEGUN LOCATED ALONG THE ROCK WALL, WHICH SPRAYED THE GROUND SO CLOSE TO HIM THAT HE WAS SPLATTERED WITH DIRT AND ROCK SPLINTERS FROM THE IMPACT OF THE BULLETS, SGT. LOGAN KILLED THE FIRST 3 GERMANS AS THEY CAME THROUGH A GAP IN THE WALL. He then attacked the machinegun. As he dashed across the 200 yards of exposed terrain a withering stream of FIRE FOLLOWED HIS ADVANCE. REACHING THE WALL, HE CRAWLED ALONG THE BASE, WITHIN EASY REACH OF THE ENEMY CROUCHED ALONG THE OPPOSITE SIDE, UNTIL HE REACHED THE GUN. JUMPING UP, HE SHOT THE 2 GUNNERS DOWN, HURDLED THE WALL, AND SEIZED THE GUN. SWINGING IT AROUND, HE IMMEDIATELY OPENED FIRE ON THE ENEMY WITH THE REMAINING AMMUNITION, RAKING THEIR FLIGHT AND INFLICTING FURTHER CASUALTIES ON THEM AS THEY FLED. AFTER SMASHING THE MACHINEGUN OVER THE ROCKS, SGT. LOGAN CAPTURED AN ENEMY OFFICER AND PRIVATE WHO WERE ATTEMPTING TO SNEAK AWAY. LATER IN THE MORNING, SGT. LOGAN WENT AFTER A SNIPER HIDDEN IN A HOUSE ABOUT 150 YARDS FROM THE COMPANY. AGAIN, THE INTREPID SGT. LOGAN RAN A GAUNTLET OF FIRE TO REACH HIS OBJECTIVE. SHOOTING THE LOCK OFF THE DOOR, SGT. LOGAN KICKED IT IN AND SHOT THE SNIPER WHO HAD JUST REACHED THE BOTTOM OF THE STAIRS. THE CONSPICUOUS GALLANTRY AND INTREPIDITY WHICH CHARACTERIZED SGT. LOGAN'S EXPLOITS PROVED A CONSTANT INSPIRATION TO ALL THE MEN OF HIS COMPANY, AND AIDED MATERIALLY IN INSURING THE SUCCESS OF THE BEACHHEAD AT SALERNO.



FIRST LIEUTENANT ARNOLD L. BJORKLUND

CITATION

ALTAVILLA, ITALY, 13 SEPTEMBER 1943

FOR CONSPICUOUS GALLANTRY AND INTREPIDITY AT THE RISK OF LIFE ABOVE AND BEYOND THE CALL OF DUTY IN ACTION WITH THE ENEMY NEAR ALTAVILLA, ITALY, 13 SEPTEMBER 1943. WHEN HIS COMPANY ATTACKED A GERMAN POSITION ON HILL 424, THE FIRST PLATOON, LED BY 1ST LT. BJORKLUND, MOVED FORWARD ON THE RIGHT FLANK TO THE SLOPE OF THE HILL WHERE IT WAS PINNED DOWN BY A HEAVY CONCENTRATION OF MACHINEGUN AND RIFLE FIRE. ORDERING HIS MEN TO GIVE COVERING FIRE, WITH ONLY 3 HAND GRENADES, HE CREPT AND CRAWLED FORWARD TO A GERMAN MACHINEGUN POSITION LOCATED ON A TERRACE ALONG THE FORWARD SLOPE. APPROACHING WITHIN A FEW YARDS OF THE POSITION, AND WHILE CONTINUOUSLY EXPOSED TO ENEMY FIRE, HE HURLED 1 GRENADE INTO THE NEST, DESTROYED THE GUN AND KILLED 3 GERMANS. Discovering a second machinegun 20 yards to the right on a higher terrace, he moved under INTENSE ENEMY FIRE TO A POINT WITHIN A FEW YARDS AND THREW A SECOND GRENADE INTO THIS POSITION, DESTROYING IT AND KILLING 2 MORE GERMANS. THE FIRST PLATOON WAS THEN ABLE TO ADVANCE 150 YARDS FURTHER UP THE SLOPE TO THE CREST OF THE HILL, BUT WAS AGAIN STOPPED BY THE FIRE FROM A HEAVY ENEMY MORTAR ON THE REVERSE SLOPE. 1ST LT. BJORKLUND LOCATED THE MORTAR AND WORKED HIS WAY UNDER LITTLE COVER TO WITHIN 10 yards of its position and threw his third grenade, destroying the MORTAR, KILLING 2 OF THE GERMANS, AND FORCING THE REMAINING 3 TO FLEE.

HIS ACTIONS PERMITTED THE PLATOON TO TAKE ITS OBJECTIVE.
