# Commandant escorts members of Congress

Dozens of Congressmen, senior ranking now members of Congress. military officials and foreign dignitaries visited the base Friday to view the II Marine Expeditionary Force's abilities. Among the visitors was Comandant of the Marine Corps, Gen Carl E. Mundy, who personally escorted the members of Congress and their aides

Rep. Bill Zeliff believes the proposed defense cutbacks would hinder the military's ability to keep forward deployed troops. The New Hampshire republican plans to continue to be a voice for military interests in Congress. "After watching the exercise and talking with the Marines, I've confirmed my resolve to stand against the proposed cuts in the military," Zeliff said.

"We're working on the economic plan and trying to fund the military at lower levels and after seeing things like we did, it gives us a good idea of what the needs are. We want a capable military. It all reconfirms my thoughts that we need to be prepared for anything that

regarding their equipment and individual missions within the MAGTF. Some Marines were able to talk to former Marines who are


The CAPEX provided the Congressional delegation with a first-hand knowledge of Marine Corps' needs in light of proposed budget cuts and restructuring.

"The show was incredible," Zeliff said. This really gives an eye-opening view to the abilities we have with our military. It also makes us realize we won't be able to keep up the pace we have provided in the past with the proposed budget cuts. I believe we have to revisit the question of military budget cuts and at least scale back or compromise on those cuts. We need to back up the people driving the tanks and flying the helicopters.'

# Task Force begins assault in Ocean Venture '93

More than 20,500 U.S. Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps and Coast Guard personnel conducted a massive assault against a simulated enemy May 10 from the seas and skies surrounding Puerto Rico. The U.S. troops are taking part in Exercise venture April 20 to Tuesday, together with forces from the United Kingdom, France and the Netherlands.

Soldiers from the Army's 75th Ranger Regiment and 101st and 82nd Airborne Divisions staged "forcible entries" by parachute and helicopter at Naval Station Roosevelt Roads and Camp Santiago, while Marines from the 28th Marine Expeditionary Unit, together with British, Dutch and French Marines from USS Guadalcanal sped inland over the amphibious vehicles to seize an airstrip at Camp Garcia.

U.S. Air Force and Navy pilots flew

battlefield interdiction and air superiority missions for the landings.

Air Force aircraft provided command and control for the airborne forcible entry operations, as well as strategic airlift for the buildup of friendly forces

Four U.S. Coast Guard cutters, led by the high-endurance cutter Bear, screened the landing force and provided search and escue service for the Joint Task Force Commander during the amphibious assault on Vieques. The cutters Nuniak and Vashon, homeported at Roosevelt Roads, and the cutter Manitou, from Miami, patrolled areas south of the landing, engaging enemy gunboats and intercepting any suspicious craft. Coast Guard personnel led a Joint Rescue Coordination Center aboard the task force flagship, USS Mount Whitney, and directed a simulated combat Search and Rescue mission for the pilot of a Navy

# Lead in water raises questions

A recent Environmental Protection Agency report about lead in drinking water aboard Camp Lejeune and Marine Corps Air Station New River created many questions. Residents in base housing have questioned the quality of the water and whether it is safe to drink

The water from all wells aboard Camp Lejeune and water coming out of the water treatment plants aboard Camp Lejeune and MCAS New River meet all state and EPA standards for lead

All single-family housing, all schools and child care centers aboard Camp Lejeune and MCAS New River meet current regulations and require-

Testing revealed that less than 20 percent of water samples taken from buildings aboard Camp Lejeune and MCAS New River exceeded state and EPA standards for lead action levels. None of those buildings are in housing areas

Again, only selected buildings in the French Creek Area, Old Hospital Area, Industrial Area and the Marina exceeded the limits. In those areas,

the Facilities Department is taking steps to bring the water samples within the EPA limits.

For anyone using water in the four affected

areas, the following guidelines are provided:
• Anytime water is left unused for six or more hours, run the cold-water tap for about two minutes to flush the system. This allows any affected water to run out.

· Use only water from the cold-water tap for drinking, cooking and making baby formula.

· Hot water causes leaching from pipes and is likely to contain higher levels of lead. If drawing

· Remove faucet strainers from the tap on a periodic basis and clean any debris out of them. Let the water run for 3 to 5 minutes to flush the

Remember, all housing areas, all schools and child-care centers aboard Camp Lejeune and MCAS New River meet the requirements for safe

MGen Beale and BGen Livingston cut the ribbon together, signifying the official opening of the new establishment. It was then time for shoppers to enter and discover 22 check-out registers, a bakery, a seafood department and automatic teller machine-like equipment, enabling shoppers to pay for groceries with their bank cards.

Patrons had the opportunity to sample free food from vendors promoting their

The fully stocked shelves were decorated with coupon booklets that reduced the cost of hundreds of items throughout the store. By the end of the day the commissary was visited by more than 2.600 customers who bought \$150,000 of groceries.



joint command and set up joint armed forces. Itar-Tass news agency said the Russian delegation at a meeting of defense ministers of the six Commonwealth signatories insisted it should have full control over the nuclear arsenal of the former superpower. (Reuter)

Tanzania cuts army size

Tanzania plans to cut the number of its armed forces by 13,000, down from 50,000, Minister of State for Defense Abdulrahaman Kinana said Monday. Western donors who finance more than 60 per cent of the nation's budget have demanded that Dar Es Salaam spend less on defense, Kinana said. Some army units will be phased out, while officers of retirement age will be asked to leave immediately. (Reuter)

U.N. to reduce guards in Iraq

The 236 U.N. police guards in northern Iraq wull be reduced by 50 because of dwindling financial contributions from members of the international community, a spokesman said. The guards protect Kurd refugee camps in Iraq as part of a humanitar-ian program. U.N. spokesman Ahmed Fawzi said the organization is running out of money for replacements. The guards are paid through the regular U.N. budget. (UPI)

> Haiti rejects peacekeepers

BGen Philippe Biamby, the Haitian army chief of staff, spurned the notion that a peacekeeping force might help resolve Haiti's political crisis, and swore fierce resistance Monday to any foreign intervention. The U.S. State Department and U.N. officials say an international peacekeeping force may be proposed as part of a negotiated settlement, but that Haiti would have to give permission before deployment. (AP)

Hungary makes NATO request

Hungary asked NATO for antiaircraft missiles and security guarnatees to defend itself against possible reprisals from Serbia for its role in helping the alliance in the Yugoslav crisis, diplomats said.

The reason Hungary requested the security is Hungary shares a border with Yugoslavia.

The diplomats said the U.N. reacted coolly to the request, telling Hungary only that it would be covered by the U.N. charter if it were attacked. (Reuter)



DDP promotes dental health and helps prevent future health-related problems. The new plan, in addition to benefits covered under the current plan, includes root canal treatment, treatment for gum disease, crowns, bridges, dentures, oral surgery and orthodontic treatment. As with commercially available dental insurance plans, DDP limits annual maximum-permum-per-patient limit for orthodontic care. The sponsor's service branch pays most of the premium cost, so the monthly payroll deduction is only \$9.65 for a single-family member, or \$19.30 to cover an entire family. Because the plan provides 100 percent coverage for two regular checkups each year, people can save at least \$80 a year if they have one family member or more than \$160 a year

Enrolled members can make regular appoir ments with any licensed dentist they choose waiting for space available care. DELTA dentis have agreed to certain limits on fees and will tal care of submitting claim forms. They accept pa ment directly from DDP and will not require pa

ment up front for covered services. Enrollment in the new DDP was automatic for a CONUS-assigned service members with eligib family members, who are known to have 24 month remaining in service. Those who intend to remain j the service for 24 months or more, and who wer not automatically enrolled in the new plan, ma enroll at their personnel center by completing DI form 2494. The Health Benefits Advisor in th CHAMPUS office here can explain DDP coverage in detail and a list of participating dental offices.



# Base housing recycling do's, don'

Because reduction of solid wastes at the Base Sanitary Landfill is essential, a family housing recycling program was started April 1, 1992. North Carolina law requires said wastes taken to landfills be reduced 25 percent by the end of 1993 and the Marine Corps wants to reduce said wastes taken to

landfills 50 percent by 1995. Overall, Camp Lejeune has reduced the amount of solid waste it disposes of by six percent through the recy-cling programs. While that is an improvement, Randy Futreal, quality assurance evaluator, said some residents are still confused about what they can and cannot recycle.

"We get hundreds of calls from residents saying their recycling bins have not been emptied," he said. "Since we only recycle marketable items such as certain plastics and paper products, our contractors will not empty a bin that contains any nonconforming item.

A recycling guide was issued to each resident that lists materials the base recycles and how to prepare items for recycling.

The biggest misconception the residents have is that we recycle anything that has the recycling emblem,' he said. "That is just not true."

The base recycles paper products such as newspapers, magazines, telephone books and paper bags.

However, cereal, detergent, milk,

food, shoe and beverage boxes will not be recycled. Shipping boxes are acceptable, but pizza boxes are not because the food and grease contaminates the box for recycling purposes.

The only plastics recycled by the base contractor are ones stamped with the code "PET 1" or "HDPE 2," these categories include most beverage bottles, water jugs, bleach and detergent bottles. These containers should

be empty and rinsed with the lids removed before being placed in the bin. If the lid is on any of these containers, the contractor will leave

Clear, green and amber container glass is recyclable and should also be emptied and rinsed out. The labels may be left on the container but the lids cannot be.







# Marine fire fighters form lifesaving connection Cpl Lance M. Bacon function of the department. W

The work day ends for many Marines once they leave Camp Lejeune. For Marine members of the Bear Creek Volunteer Fire Department, however, another workday is just beginning.

The department has 33 volunteers including seven active duty Marines and nine retired members of the armed

"The volunteer Marines really show the dedication and loyalty of Camp Lejeune Marines," said Don Bishop, corporation president. "They hold positions from fire fighters to officers. Beyond fighting fires, though, their care and assistance greatly increases community relations. We've passed the 'us' versus 'them' mentality and entered a very exciting friendship of military and civilian cultures. This is happening at all volunteer fire departments with Marine members. Even without responding to any fires, accidents or disasters the departments still have a positive impact on military and civilian relations.

The department supports the community in fire fighting, serious car accidents and natural disasters. "We have occasional fires, but nothing major in quite a while," said Fire Chief Jim Baker, a retired gunnery sergeant. "We responded to the storm March 13. Each volunteer put an excess of 14 hours in

fires. More than 75 percent of our responses are to car accidents, though, and we only respond when there's fuel spilled or an overturned vehicle. Road conditions are bad and there are sharp curves in the area, but the number one reason is speed. People need to slow down out here."

Every year the department is inspected by the Insurance Service Office of North Carolina to ensure they're capable of these missions. "On a rating scale of 1 to 10, we must be at level 9S to pass," Baker said. "Onslow County is the only county in North Carolina to have every volunteer fire department pass inspection, which says a great deal for our communities and their support. This department has a goal of level six, which is nearly complete proficiency. It will be hard and take a minimum of six to nine months, but we have faith. If we qualify level six, home owner's insurance will drop about 25 percent for the area." Being a volunteer fire department, they must rely on fund raisers for finances and volunteers for manpower to achieve their goal.

"We have an auction every year for fund raising," said assistant chief Donald Dahms, retired gunnery sergeant. "We also conduct two barbecue dinner sales a year at the department and run a concession stand weekly at the Bear Creek Mud Bog. This money is important for the daily

# Marine Corps dedicates \$12 million facilit

MCCDC, Quantico, Va. - The Marine Corps leaped into the information age May 6 during a formal dedication ceremony of the Marine Corps Research Center, a \$12 million facility that provides Marines around the world with instant computer access to its comprehensive repository of the art of war-

The 100,500-square foot facility, which faces the scenic Potomac River, played host to more than 400 distinguished guests to include:

Commandant of the Marine Corps, Gen Carl E. Mundy Jr.; Commanding General Marine Corps Combat Development Command, LtGen Charles C. Krulak; President of the Marine Corps University, BGen Peter

Pace; and special guest of honor former Commandant of the Marine Corps, Gen Leonard F. Chapman Jr.

According to William Greenup, director of the research center, the new facility provides Marines with a comprehensive repository and research center covering the full spectrum of evolving concepts, doctrine, tactics, techniques and procedures of amphibious and expeditionary warfare.

The state of the art facility was the idea of Gen Al Gray, former commandant of the Marine Corps. His intent was to make MCCDC the true "Crossroads of the Marine

The architectural firm of Shepley, Bulfinch Richardson and Abbott, helped make that dream a reality.

The firm, which specializes in hospital and library facilities, began designing the

> center in 1990. The firm is known for its work on such prestigious projects as the Columbia University Library, Harvard University Law School, and the Fordham University Library. 'We are extremely fortunate to

have gotten this architectural firm. The research center is as beautiful as it is functional," Greenup said.

The research center consists of three components. It houses a library wing with both a professional military library and a family An archives section is located

# Military police conduct vehicle safety inspection

Those who were in violation of state laws and base regulations received a surprise as they came aboard Camp Lejeune April 29. Many who stood the Provost Marshal Office's vehicle safety inspection were infringing upon

The inspection, designed to find unauthorized vehicles aboard base, took place from 0600 to 0800 at the Triangle Outpost, Sneads Ferry and Main Gates, Holcomb Boulevard, Stone Street, Sneads Ferry Road and the industrial area

Although 93 people were issued traffic citations, the number of violations totaled 103, according to MGySgt Dwayne Cook, provost sergeant.

While Department of Defense safety regulations require the use of seat belts and child restraints on installations at all times, unrestrained drivers and passengers accounted for many of the violations.

"Often we find out people aren't wearing their seat belts when they fly out of their vehicles. Then it's too late," said SgtMaj Richard A. Shuler, base sergeant major.

Citations were also issued for expired base and vehicle registrations and state inspection stickers and lapsed insurance.

The MPs cited 12 people for driving with

"We, by no means, caught every violator aboard this base. However, having this spot check, hopefully some people who are in violation will have gotten the word and corrected their deficiencies," Shuler said.

Staff noncommissioned officers from Marine Corps Base, 2d Marine Division and 2d Force Service Support Group were on hand to observe the inspections. In some cases, SNCOs issued minor offense reports to personnel in violation of Marine Corps and base uniform regulations.

According to Cook, a minor offense report is nothing more than a chit that notifies the Marine's command he was stopped for being out of uniform. While more than 150 minor offense reports were issued, Marines not wearing covers and blouses accounted for many violations.

"If wearing your cover interferes with the operation of your vehicle you do not have to wear it. Covers, no matter what, however, must be worn while operating government vehicles," Cook said.

"Contrary to popular belief, Marines weren't pulled over merely because they weren't wearing their covers," Shuler said.

'Marines were pulled over for having something wrong their vehicles. If at that time they, or anyone else traveling in their vehicle had a uniform violation, they were issued a minor offense report," Shuler added.

While violations of uniform regulations are traditionally on the rise during the summer months, SgtMaj James H. Raiford, 2d MarDiv sergeant major, SgtMaj Douglas E. Berry, 2d FSSG sergeant major, and Shuler take these regulations seriously

During the inspection, SNCOs issued a minor offense report to a Marine they found wearing a green T-shirt, utility blouse, shorts and shower shoes

"We get a number of complaints from people out in town about Marines wearing uniforms improperly," said Shuler. "It was an eye-opener for many SNCOs to see exactly how their Marines were dressed. It was a reinforcement of what the three sergeants major have been telling them all along

The "opposing forces" resisting the assault included the Army's 10th Mountain Division, the 2nd Marine Aircraft Wing, and Naval Air units.

Joint Task Force Commander VADM William J. Flanagan Jr., explained the importance of Ocean Venture and similar exercises by noting that, "Maintaining readiness is the key to our success in battle. If called to use our military forces, we will do so with a sharp, highly trained force that is capable of quickly taking control of the situation and limiting casualties. Our joint forces will be able to do this because they have worked together on exercises like this

Ocean Venture '93 is designed to demonstrate the ability of U.S. forces to carry out joint operations in support of U.S. security interests with little or no notice.

The exercise is being conducted by the U.S. Atlantic Command, headquartered in Norfolk, Va. It includes joint amphibious, airborne and helicopter assaults and follow-on opera-

The exercise is not aimed at any specific potential threat, but is intended to evaluate and demonstrate the many capabilities of the United States to respond on short notice to a developing situation which threatens U.S. interests.

One unusual aspect of this year's exercise is that the Joint Force Air Component Commander, who controls the aircraft involved in such an operation, has been operating aboard a Navy ship, USS Mount Whitney

The Mount Whitney is an Amphibious Command Ship specially designed to function as a command and control center. It is also the headquarters of VADMFlanagan, the Joint Task Force Commander.

Ocean Venture '93 is an opportunity for U.S. forces to come together and focus on a common warfighting objective under realistic and relevant conditions. Each service component brings its own expertise and unique capabilities to the exercise. According to VADM Flanagan, "The forces have been melded together to take advantage of individual strengths to create a force with unmatched capabilities. Joint operations are the way we will operate in any future contingency. Jointness works."

Ocean Venture takes the lessons U.S. forces have learned from past operations and melds them into a vigorous, realistic exercise to strengthen all services ability to work together to accomplish national military objectives.

According to VADM Flanagan, 'With every joint interaction we become a more capable force. To maintain relevance in a world where our military forces are undergoing reductions, we must get the most out of every element — joint operations accomplish this."

Major U.S. units participating in the exercise include the 2d Marine Expeditionary Force, the Army's XVIII Airborne Corps, aircraft and ships of the U.S. Second Fleet, components of the Air Force's 8th, 9th and 12th Air Forces, U.S. Coast Guard assets and forces from the U.S. Transportation Command.



# Bow hunter lines up challenges in sights

Deep in the woods a hunter scanned the brush from his stand. Barely visible within the foliage, he fixed his eyes on his target. An eight-point deer stepped toward the stand, unaware of the the hunter. Patiently, the hunter waited. As the deer continued within 40 yards of the stand, the hunter slowly raised his bow. Knocking an arrow, the razor blades of the broad head tip glimmered in the morning sun. He slowly drew back the string and lined the sights on his target. With a quiet "twang", the arrow found it's mark and the hunt had

begun.
"If I were to say there were one reason why I bow hunt, I'd have to say, without a doubt, it's because of the challenge," said Sgt. Laurence Yuhas, Battalion Landing Team, 3d Bn, 8th Marines. "With bow hunting, it's not the shot that makes it like a gun. Whenever a bow hunter picks up his how, he has to carefully plan out everything he needs to do to get close enough to that deer to make a shot. That hunter has to know the deer he hunts. Knowing where it eats, sleeps, the paths it's using to move and the time of the day it moves are all part of the hunt. That's the challenge. It's not to

jump a deer by accident and have a quick reaction. It's being able to outsmart the animal in it's own environment."

Yuhas, who began hunting 23 years ago at the age of 16, prefers to never go on a hunt without his bow. "It's now to the point where I'm as proficient with the bow as I am with the shotgun. For myself, the every part of bow hunting makes being out there worth it, because the hunt isn't over after you make the shot. Part of the responsibility of the hunter is to track the animal. That takes skill, patience and a keen eye for subtle signs of blood and tracks.

That responsibility is an essential part of bow hunting, according to Yuhas. "The bow hunter has a greater responsibility to maintain discipline than a gun hunter. The gun will more than likely drop the deer where it's at. In the the same thought, bow hunters need to make a clean shot because it takes longer for the deer to die. It's a code of ethics we try to live by that dictates that responsibility."

Yuhas knows the discipline and responsibility he describes doesn't always come naturally. "To be that good bow hunter, it's up to that individual to decide that maybe the shot he wants to take is out range. The hunter has to know when to make that good

shot. These are the types of the lessons we teach at the Eastern Carolina Bow Hunter's Association"

The Eastern Carolina Bow
Hunter's Association is the local
chapter of the North Carolina
Bow Hunter's Association, Yuhas
said. "The groups is set up to
help young, avid bow hunter's
with the techniques and skills
that are necessary for the sport.
We also hold classes on hunter
safety, tracking and training.
Beside the emphasis on the

Beside the emphasis on the sport of bow hunting, the Eastern Carolina Bow Hunter's Association also participates in archery matches and actively attends North Carolina Wildlife Commission meeting to have a say on regulations and restrictions proposed for hunting. Aboard base, the club is pushing for mandatory classes for turkey season.

"The class we're trying to push is basically a refresher on rules and etiquette," Yuhas said. "We enjoy some advantages on base that other hunter's don't have out in town. We just want it so we don't wear out our welcome."

# New and glorious style that blends classic Greek cookery and new American cuisine

Periyali Restaurant's enticing Greek fare has dazzled New Yorkers for years, proving that though Hellenic cooking may be as old as civilization, its appeal is timeless. And, with the unmistakable Periyali touch, Greek recipes are perfectly in tune with today's concerns about health.

The Periyali Cookbook: New Classic Greek Cooking (Villard Books), by noted culinary writer Holly Garrison with restaurant proprietors Nicola Kotsoni and Steve Tzolis (who own Periyali, Il Cantinori, and Aureole in Greek cookery adapted to the freshness, ease, versatility, and practicality demanded by the new American cuisine. The more than 150 recipes feature olive oil and garlic and emphasize fish and fresh vegetables to produce a glorious bounty of flavorful and healthful foods.

Many of the recipes in *The Perivali*Cookbook are quick to prepare, as the authors adapted the recipes with busy American cooks in mind. from The Periyali Cookbook. Skordalia is a garlicky dip for bread. The Oven-Grilled Chicken comes close spit-roasted over an open fire.

PERIYALI'S ALMOND SKORDALIA

This is luxury skordalia, since it is made with almonds, an ingredient that most Greeks can't afford for every day.

ounces (about 5 slices) firm homemade-style bread cup whole blanched almonds, coarsely chopped or 3 large garlic cloves, put through a garlic press (about 1 teaspoon garlic puree) small (about 3 ounces)

all-purpose potato, peeled, boiled until soft, and drained

tablespoons lemon juice tablespoons white-wine

tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil teaspoon sugar

Trim the crusts from the bread and spread the slices out on a tray to dry or about 24 hours

In the container of a food processor, place the almonds, garlic, and cooled potato. Process until smooth.

Mix the lemon juice, vinegar, olive oil, salt, and sugar in a small bowl and set aside. Fill a large bowl with cool water. Drop the dried bread into the water, I slice at a time. When it is soaked, squeeze about half the water from the bread between the palms of your hands. Add the bread to the ingredients in the processor, alternating with dients in the processor, alternating with the lemon-juice mixture, and process until smooth. Since the skordalia has a tendency to stiffen and become too pasty as it chills, the mixture should be quite loose at this point. Taste and adjust the seasoning. Scrape the mix-ture into a bowl. Cover and refrigerate for several hours to allow the flavors to mellow and blend. If the mixture seems too stiff, beat in a little water

OVEN-GRILLED CHICKEN

The chickens one tastes in the souvlakia places in Greece are almost always crisp-skinned, deep-flavored, and, for the most part, plenty juicy, with a distinct lemony tang. However, none of the cooks will ever give you even the tiniest clue as to how the chicken is marinated. Greek restaurant owners tend to be very close-mouthed about their recipes. Nevertheless, the method that follows for grilling chicken in the oven comes very close to the en in the oven comes very close to the flavor of a chicken that has been spit-roasted over an open fire. By the way, if you want to add a clove or two of crushed garlic to the marinade, go ahead, although it is not customary to

broiler-fryer chicken, weighing 2½ to 3 pounds tablespoons lemon juice tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil

teaspoon salt teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

Preheat the oven to 500°F. Rinse the chicken and pat dry with paper towels. Pull out and discard the lumps of fat just inside the cavity. With poultry shears, cut out the backbone. Spread shears, cut out the backbone. Spread the chicken out, skin side up, and flat-ten it as much as possible with the palm of your hand. In a small bowl, mix the lemon juice, olive oil, salt, and pepper. Use this mixture to brush the chicken on both sides. Arrange the flattened chicken on the rack of a broiling

tened chicken on the rack of a broiling pan, skin side up.

Roast, without turning, for 35 to 40 minutes, or until the chicken is dark brown and crusty and the juices run clear when the thigh is pierced with a fork or the tip of a knife. Cut the chicken in halves or quarters to serve. Spoon off and discard some of the fat left in the roasting pan and serve the remaining juice with the chicken. Serve with Potato Salad and Horta or Beets with beetgreens.


