Unit Ministry Team: Chaplain David Rhee

With the rise in violence against Asian Americans recently, I felt it necessary to speak out. But what do I say? I'm not entirely sure, but I know that I cannot stay silent as I see different elderly citizens being assaulted for no other reason than because they are Asian.

Why are Asian Americans, especially the elderly, being attacked and targeted? For the life of me, I cannot come up with a good reason. Are we being blamed for the pandemic? How logical is that? Why is it right for others to tell us to go back to where we came from? Last I checked, everyone, except Native Americans came from somewhere else.

I understand that everyone is pandemic weary. But is the way to vent this frustration to find a scapegoat? Are Asian American's being scape-goated for the past year's troubles? While I think we can all agree that beating up on elderly people is categorically wrong (I'm hoping), I wonder if the need to blame and vent our frustrations on others is just something that modern people do.

Here's what I know. I did not join because I was over the top patriotic. Don't get me wrong, I love my country. I joined because I saw a need, and thought that my gifts and talents could be used to meet those needs. I was a civilian pastor for over 14 years before I joined. After being in for almost 8 years, I've met some of the best people. I am compelled to give all that I am and all that I have to those who sacrifice so much for this country. And I think typically what would follow after this is how, Asian Americans have been model citizens, or the model minority and how we deserve to be treated with respect and dignity. This is the message that we have been saying for generations. It has fallen on deaf ears.

It seems to me that these days, so much in society is driven by hate and anger. To be honest, I am angry after watching another viral video of an elderly Asian woman assaulted while onlookers did nothing. But my anger needs to be balanced by justice, which seems to be the key ingredient that many extremists are missing. We as a society need to intentionally move away from the patterns of hatred and anger that has been stirred. Otherwise, hatred without bounds within our society is a scary proposition. In the end who will be safe from it? Is this what we want for our country? I choose to live by the principles of love, peace, goodness and courage and not hate and anger. I would want the same for my country. I am tired of the country riding the waves of hate and anger. It starts with the individual. We need to look within and identify if we have any sources of hate and anger. And instead of keeping those inside and hidden, explore those feelings in a safe environment (behavioral health, Chaplain, mentor).

I am afraid for my parents. My parents were immigrants from Korea and have spent 50 years in this country as loyal, tax paying citizens. They are retired now. They go on daily walks. Part of my commitment to my country is to protect people like these. I am powerless to directly contribute to that protection. I am pleading with my brothers and sisters in arms to assist me in this endeavor. Let us stomp out hatred among our ranks. These are the people that we go to war to protect. We all need to be involved in the safety of all our citizens now more than ever.

And to all my Asian American teammates, if you are having a difficult time dealing with this like me; please feel free to reach out to me by phone or email. My hope is that we can look to each other for support through these troubling times.


