A show of force for one 'mad moment'

2nd MarDiv. is celebrating its 47th birthday week, but before a Marine aviator reaches the Division near the end of every "grind" training at Camp Lejeune's School of Infantry that is talked about, dated and remembered as one of their lives. The night Defensive Fire Exercise conducted recently by the 305th Infantry Battalion, 305th Infantry Brigade, 1st Marine Division Marines in

line are security patrols and listening posts," explained narrator Master Sgt. A.G. Dunn, SOI senior tactics instructor, as all lights were cut, leaving the area in total darkness. "These patrols first sight enemy movement and a forward observer, who requests mortar illumination, is called in.

"After observing the enemy's strength and size, the security patrols are called back and the forward observer calls for fire. The mortars respond with HE rounds and more illumination.

"At this time, the Marines in the listening posts are called back as the enemy continues their advance," continued Dunn. "The enemy's movement carries them through a hastily set-up mine field, which strips them of their mechanized vehicles. Still the enemy continues their advance toward the Marines' primary defensive position."

On the defensive line are Marines ready to rock-and-roll with two M60

machineguns on the outside flanks, one M203 grenade launcher, four M224 hand-held mortars and 30 M16A2s.

The Marines from Alpha Co. await the command to fire from platoon sergeant Gunnery Sgt. Michael D. Belser, SOI instructor.

"Platoon!" shouts the platoon sergeant for the alert.

"Squad!" answers Alpha company.

"Direct front!"

"Direct front!" comes the reply.

"Enemy troops in open!" Belser cries the description and again the platoon repeats the phrase.

"Range-300 meters!" echoes twice down the line.

Next comes the assignment.

"First squad: right one-third!"

"Second squad: center!"

"Third squad: left one-third!"

"At my command...!"

"At your command...!"

"FIRE!"

The night erupts into flame as tracers race downrange from the rifles and machineguns.

Still the enemy forges towards the Marines, intent on overtaking their position.

Suddenly, a green star-cluster, set off by the platoon sergeant, illuminates the night sky, signaling for the Marine defensive line to begin the final protective fire, or the FPF, commonly called the "mad moment."

The Marines give it all they've got to stop the simulated advance of the enemy, M16s and M60s blazing and mortars blasting.

A second green star-cluster in the sky signals the line to cease fire, as the FPF proves effective and the enemy begins to retreat.

Writer finds movie inaccurately depicts Marine Corps recruit training

In the movie, "Full Metal Jacket," director Stanley Kubrick depicts the Marine training depot at Parris Island as a place where drill instructors, or DIs, convert their charges into blood-thirsty sociopaths. According to the DI in the film, the Marine Corps "does not want robots--the Corps wants killers." He even declares that Lee Harvey Oswald and Charles Whitman (the man responsible for the massacre at the University of Texas), who were Marines, "showed what a motivated Marine and his rifle can do."

In order to demonstrate the sanguinity of Marine training, a simple-minded, corpulent, well-meaning nebbish--the least likely candidate for mean-spirited zealotry--is turned into a killer. This private develops an attachment to his rifle, in part because marksmanship is the only activity in which he can excel. On the night this young man is to leave Parris Island for his next assignment, he blasts a huge hole in the DI's stomach and then fires a hole through the roof of his head. As Kubrick would have it, this is the natural culmination of Marine Corps training at Parris Island. It was therefore with great curiosity and trepidation that I set off to view the activities at Parris Island last month. I wanted to see the sadistic DIs first hand; I wanted

confirmation that this nation's adolescents were being transformed into Kubrick's idea of ravaging killers. What I discovered is what anyone by popular culture already knows: The Marine Corps is the training for the best young people this nation can produce.

The young recruits enter the training depot with swaggering arrogance that bespeaks insecurity. They come from small towns, big cities, farms, the bayous and the prairie. Invariably they are overweight. Some can barely do the minimum physical requirements for admission: two pull-ups, 36 sit-ups in two minutes, 20 push-ups.

Roughly three months after they enter boot camp, these kids are changed into men who are disciplined, hard, patriotic and respectful. The Commanding General, a man with a compassionate spirit and a clear view of his purpose, calls this training "Marine magic." It would be a gross understatement to call it anything else. All one has to do to observe the magic at work is compare a group of new recruits with a platoon of graduates. Words can't do justice to the contrast.

I walked over to the parade grounds for a graduation ceremony that included 240 young men. The band played the Marine Hymn and "This Land Is Your Land." The once swaggering, overweight, out-of-shape youngsters marched as toy soldiers with a clear, firm gaze exuding an air of confidence.

Parents and friends sat in the stands.

These weren't the upper middle class people I see at college graduations who take much of what they have for granted. These were the disenfranchised lower middle class who still believe that opportunity resides in this land of the free. They wear baseball caps they say "USA;" have tattoos that read "God and country;" and drive pick-up trucks with bumper signs like "Love It or leave it."

As these men marched by the stands, faces beamed with pride. When a battalion commander said, "Let me be the first to say you are now Marines," tears streamed down the cheeks of almost everyone in the audience. The graduates raced into the outstretched arms of parents and friends.

I walked through this throng of joyous folks with a former commandant, Robert Barrow, which is analogous to touring the Vatican with the Pope. When Marines see Gen. Barrow, they engage in ritual salutes equivalent to genuflection.

Gen. Barrow walked up to couple admiring their son. He asked the father what he thought about his graduate. The father solemnly said, "My boy was roly-poly when he got here; he didn't have much purpose and he wasn't a person who respected anyone. Now he's lost 31 pounds, he knows what he wants to be and for the first time in my life he called me 'sir.'" The general turned to the young man's mother and repeated the question, "What do you think of your son?" She tried to answer, but couldn't. The tears

spoke for her. The general patted her shoulder. This commander of tough Marines three wars couldn't speak too choked up.

That scene is indelible in my mind. The Marines careen through the errors in the Grenadan aborted Iran rescue, a security breach at the Navy, but if, God forbid, this at war, it is comforting to know young men trained at Parris Island in the face of enemy fire would turn around to make sure following. This is the Marine Corps, young men, like their fathers, who care what their country requires.

These are not the soft, pampered, invented; they are our true guardians of our freedom who test their physical mettle against the toughest wilderness trainers can devise. When they enter the ranks of the Marine Corps, they know that the spirit of the Corps is theirs.

Kubrick's pacifist comes across in his latest film, but his characterization of Parris Island is a lie. Anyone who has the chance to visit the training depot will test my contention. I'm not a pacifist; I'm a fair-minded person who concludes I'm right. Just west of Parris Island, a recent Marine graduate told me, "What do you think of your son?"

Robles, 22, is well suited to represent

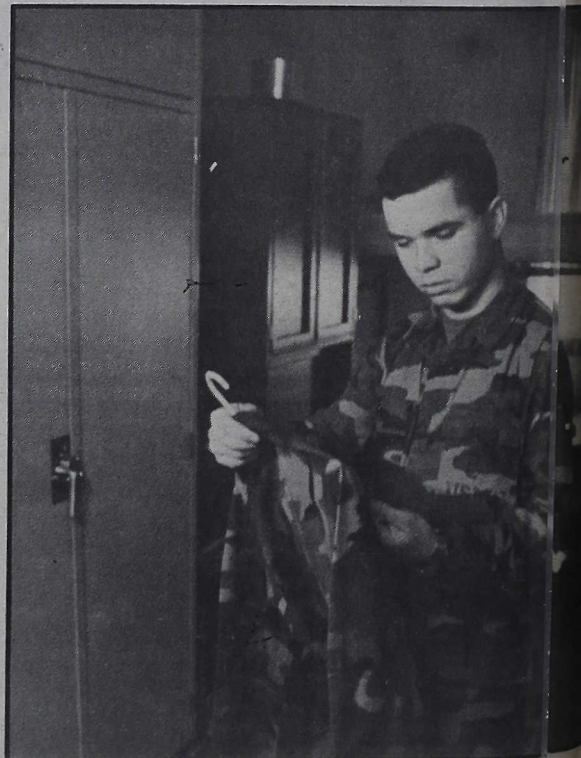
the division, according to 2nd Lt. Daniel O. Ederly, Papa Battery, 5/10.

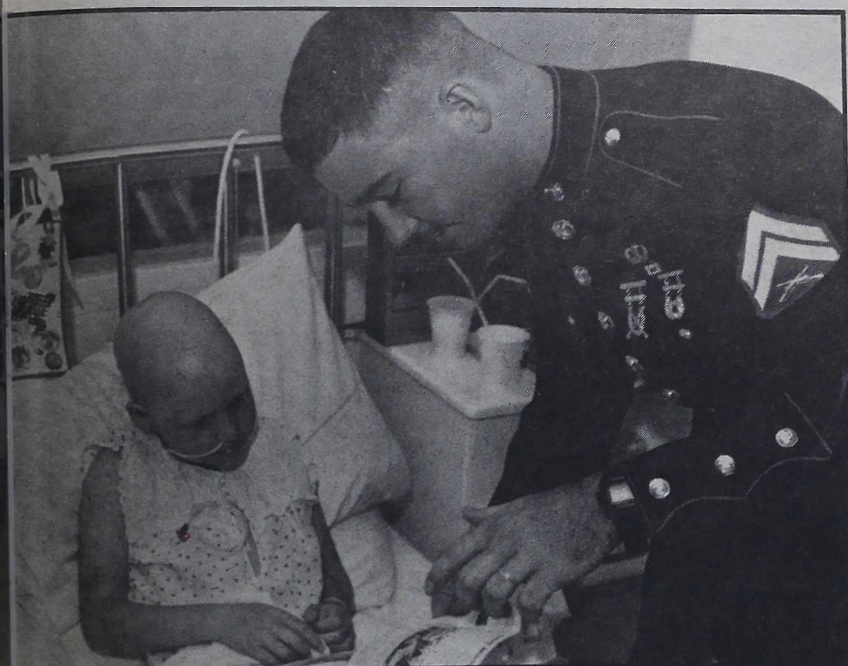

Back for reenlistment

Reenlistment bonuses are back for eligible Marines. In some cases, for those Marines who reenlisted under the program was suspended.

Priority to pay reenlistment bonuses lapsed on Oct. 1 and Dec. 21. With the approval of the National Defense Authorization Act, the program is authorized to pay bonuses to those qualified for, but reenlisted without, a bonus during this period. Qualified Marines must meet reenlistment bonus eligibility requirements that were in effect on Sept. 30, 1987, and, if the money was available, would have been recommended for a bonus.

Officers whose end of active service is before Oct. 1, 1987, now receive a bonus upon reenlistment that is qualified and effective on Sept. 30, 1987, and in effect until Jan. 31, when they will be paid by the multiples listed in 'ALMAR.

Officers with an EAS before Oct. 1 must make a request to request reenlistment soon, since after Oct. 1, reenlistments will only be approved for a few exceptions. These exceptions are limited to those officers in additional obligated service to comply with the order to duty under instruction at DI, MSG Schools. Exceptions may also be granted to those Marines to qualify for aircraft transition employment. Much of this information is contained in 'ALMAR 302-87 which outlines the Reenlistment Bonus Program.

14 ERCs are collocated with most Marine Corps Family Service Centers in the U.S. and Japan.

The videotapes and accompanying workbooks are geared to combat unemployment and to promote self-help job placement by offering the necessary personal development and training to make the individual marketable. The tapes can be used alone or with a group.

The Karli tapes will be integrated into ERC Programs provided to Marines and their spouses who have made the Corps their lives and may have never entered the workforce on their own, according to Nancy Greer Hamilton, ERC Program manager.

The 2nd MarDiv. NCO Course 2'88 will graduate in the Base Theater at 10 a.m. on Fri., Feb. 5. The graduation is open to the public. The uniform is uniform of the day.

Operational forces renamed

Beginning Feb. 1, Marine Corps operational forces will no longer use the designator "amphibious" in their descriptive titles. The term "expeditionary" will replace "amphibious" in all references to Marine Air Ground Task Force organizations. Marine Amphibious Units will become Marine Expeditionary Units (MEU), MABs (Marine Amphibious Brigades) will become MEBs (Marine Expeditionary Brigades) and the largest MAGTF fighting organization, the MAF will become a Marine Expeditionary Force (MEF).

Some colonels to go

A Selective Early Retirement Board will be convened on or about Feb. 22 to recommend that certain Marine Corps colonels be involuntarily retired. This action is necessary to adjust to the impact of the FY-87 officer reductions and imposed fiscal constraints.

The board could review the records of some 112 DOPMA colonels and may select for early retirement up to 30 percent of those considered. All colonels considered must have four years time in grade and must have been considered twice for selection to brigadier general in or above the primary zone.

An officer recommended for early retirement may retire on the date approved by the Secretary of the Navy. This date may not be later than the first day of the seventh month after the Secretary approves the Board's recommendation.

Officers not recommended for service may not be considered again for five years, as long as they hold the same grade.

Officers who request a retirement date before the mandatory retirement date will be considered as having retired voluntarily. There is no difference in benefits for those officers who retire voluntarily or involuntarily.

Job seeker videos coming

The Marine Corps has purchased a series of videotapes to assist separating and retiring Marines and their families in job searching.

The tapes, developed by Karli and Associates, Inc. of Dallas and the Prudential Insurance Company of America, are scheduled to be delivered to Employment Resource Centers (ERCs) in early 1988. The

CEBs set U.S. record for minefield breach

Combat Engineers from the 1st and 2nd MarDivs. became the first U.S. units to breach a minefield in excess of 100 meters.

This feat was accomplished during Tango-1, a joint exercise between 1st and 2nd MarDivs. at Camp Pendleton, Calif., Nov. 20-Dec. 18.

"Tango-1 accomplished three goals," said Lt. Col. James Marapoti, commanding officer of 2nd Combat Engineer Bn. "It provided us with an area where the M-58 explosive linecharge could be fired, the opportunity to refine techniques and procedures for breaching obstacle systems along with tank, AAV, LAV and combat engineer units of two Marine Divisions and it provided our units a chance to exchange combat SOP's."

During the first phase of the exercise, the engineers and attachments went to San Clemente Island off the coast of California and did special demolition operations. They also upgraded an existing bridge to withstand heavy equipment, built a water tower facility and built trenches for a simulated Soviet surface-to-air missile site. Afterwards the engineers flew to Las Pulgas Lake on Camp Pendleton for phase-two of the exercise.

In phase two, the engineers refined their assault techniques by breaching a simulated minefield 200 meters deep. They accomplished this by using together the M-58 linecharge and M-60 tank with track width mine plow.

The M-60 tank pulled two trailer mounted linecharges to the edge of the minefield. The first linecharge was launched and its 1750 pounds of C-4 detonated to create a 10-meter-wide path through the minefield. The tank plowed forward about 300 feet and repeated the procedure with the second linecharge. After the second explosion, the tank plowed forward and connected the two lanes created by the linecharges by clearing any simulated mines missed by the explosions.

"It was hard to fire the linecharges so they fell in a straight line," said Sgt. Jose Gomes, 1st platoon guide, Company B, 2nd CEB. "It's important that the tank doesn't turn at an angle when moving forward for the second shot."

Marapoti said the important thing about breaching a minefield of this depth is that the engineers have gained a means of breaching deep minefields in a reasonable amount of time with equipment already available to them.

"Our doctrine stays pretty much the same, but our tactics and equipment are evolving," said Marapoti. "Future equip-

ment will help us gain time, save lives and reach our objectives faster. But, this exercise has shown us that with the combined effort of combat units and present equipment on-hand, we can keep an assault moving forward."

Unit commanders from both divisions would like to make this an annual event

because of the technical lessons learned during the exercise. Lessons learned during the exercise have been put into an operational draft which the participants will have printed as a reference for future assault breaching operations.

1/6 ices enemy at snowy Verona Loop SMAW shoot

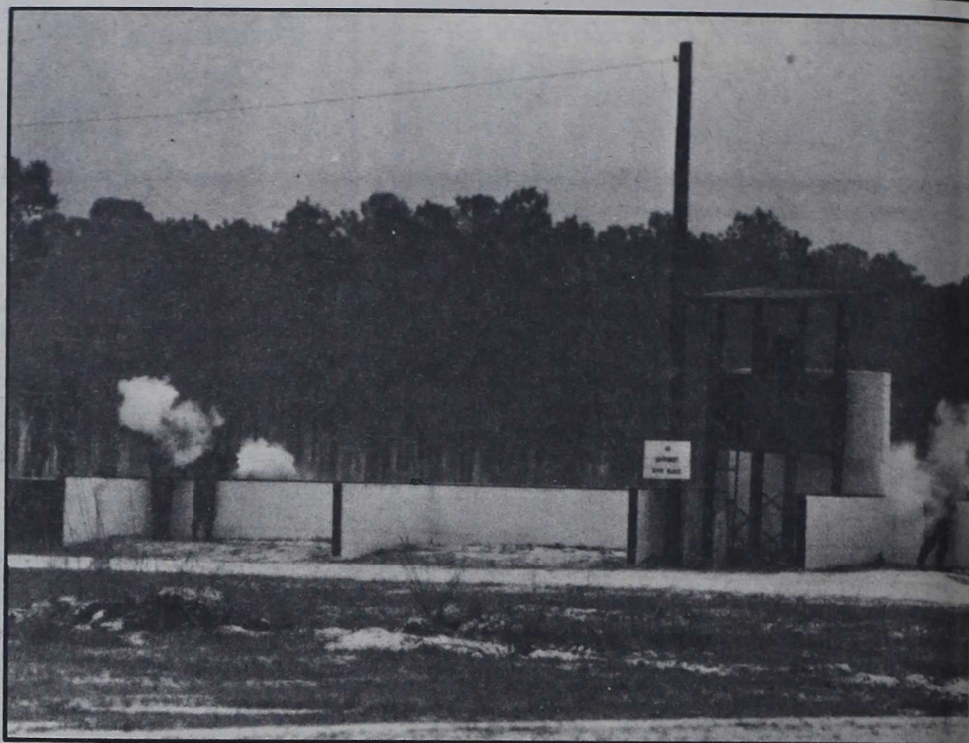

The men of Alpha Company, 1/6, tackled a trial of fire and ice recently during their shooting of Shoulder-launched Multi-purpose Assault Weapons (SMAW) in the first snow fall of the season.

"The SMAW is a rocket launcher that's effective against field bunkers, assault vehicles, buildings and barricades," said 1st Lt. James P. Eagan, Alpha Co. weapons platoon commander. "It's commonly called the 'bunker buster' and the rounds can go through seven feet of sandbags."

Participating in a two-day battalion exercise at the K-300 ranges, the Marine assaultmen of Alpha Co. fired upon imaginary foes in junked vehicles and battled the very real enemy of freezing temperatures, evidenced by the blanket of snow covering the area.

"The SMAW is still a new weapon for the Marine Corps," said Staff Sgt. Steven

M. Dean, Division Schools. "This is the first time in six months the men of 1/6 have had the chance to fire live rounds."

"The men fire a total of six, 9mm spot-

ting rounds to adjust their aim before firing the final live missile," said Eagan. "In the two day period, we fired five live rounds with the explosive warhead and

four inerts, which are the without the impact power."

protective fire is let loose halting the ghost enemy.

"This period of training was designed especially with the headquarters element in mind," said Capt. John L. LeDoux, CO of HqCo., 6th Mar. "Everyone needs to familiarize themselves with as many weapons as possible. The headquarters element is just as deployable as any of its brother battalions and without the proper training they are in danger in a combat situation."

Besides firing the SAW, machinegun

and M16A2 in the defense, HqCo. Marines also got an opportunity to fire five shotgun rounds each.

"This type of training is essential for us," said Sgt. Robert Jones, a radio operator in HqCo., 6th Mar. "You never know when the time will come that your buddy next to you in combat will fall and will have to pick up his weapon, whatever it may be, and continue to march on. Lacking the knowledge could mean death for you and your fellow Marines."

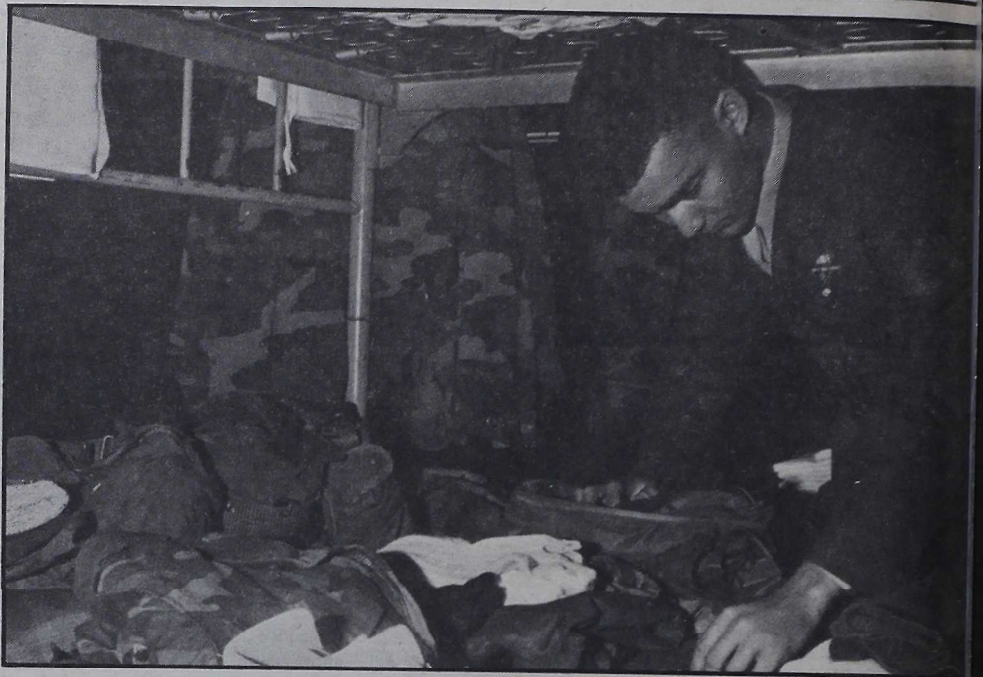

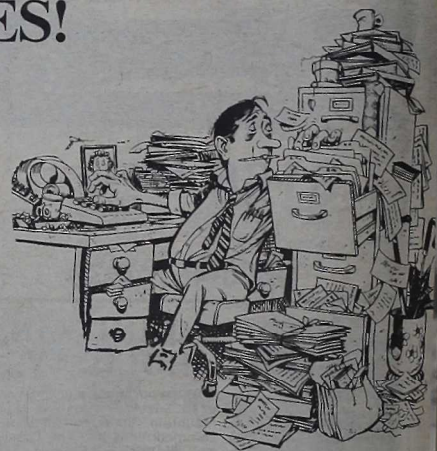

d say alot of things about Jesse B. Cowan, H&SCo., Bn., 2nd FSSG, but one can't say enough about his dedication to clowning that is.

Asheville, N.C. native has been clowning for the last ten years. At the age of 10, he decided to make a living of it. His military service expires in February and he's prepared to make the move to clowning. Now I only clown in 15 minutes or upon special request to serve the public in this manner, mostly and to be with kids."

"I first started out fingerpainting with the kids. After awhile I'd try to come up with something more imaginative and clowning is," he said.

Cowan incorporates singing and dancing into his performances. His performances also include current issues and concerns. Some of these concerns are stranger danger, manners and nutrition.

"I'm working on polishing the characters I have right now. I guess you could say I'm serious about clowning," Cowan smiled.

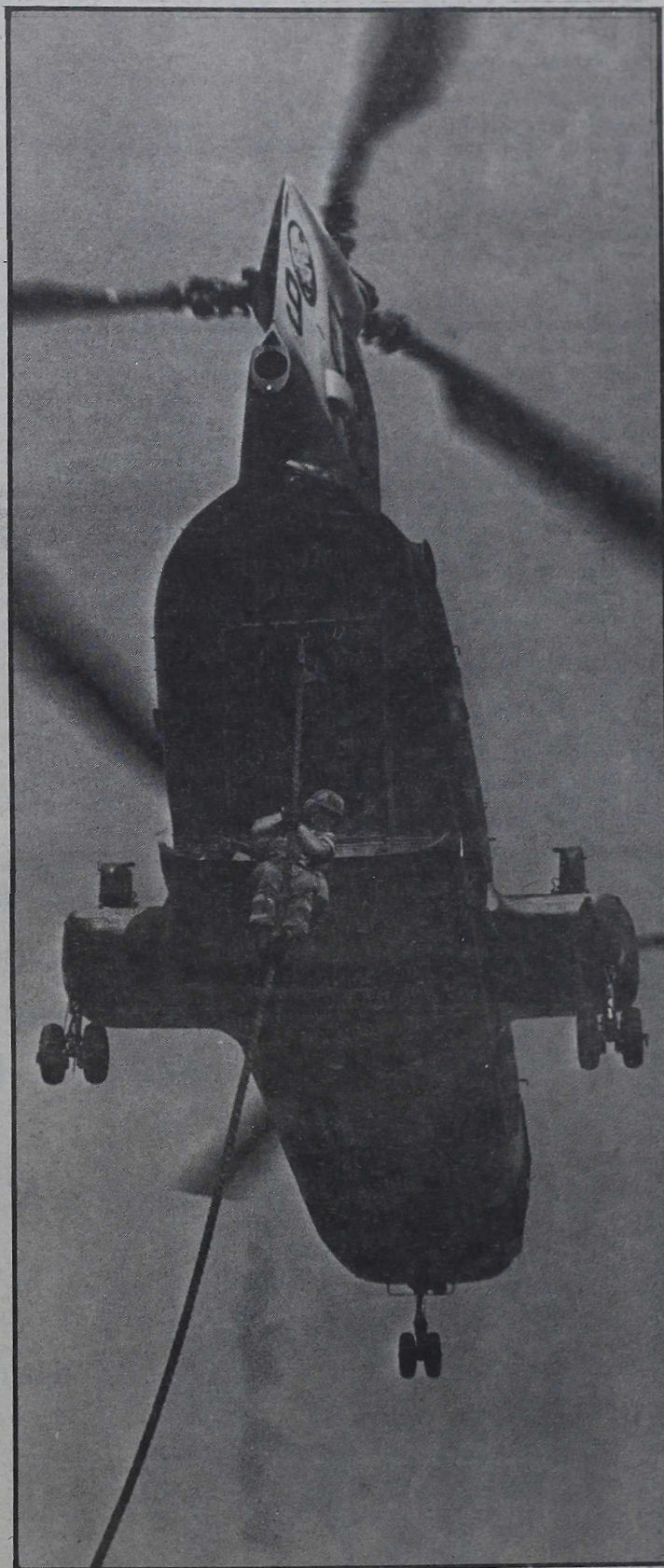

Two careers later, he's still going strong

Pearl Harbor was attacked by the Japanese Dec. 7, 1941 forcing the United States into World War II.

Two days later 16 year-old Clifford Bell enlisted in the Marine Corps and started his career with a small integrity violation—he said he was 18.

“At the time, they needed men and nobody bothered to check on my age. It was a time when everybody turned patriotic overnight, myself included,” said Bell.

The Maine native left his home and was sent to Guadalcanal after schooling in continuous wave communication (Morse code). As a Pfc., he spent his 17th birthday on the sight of the first U.S. invasion of Japanese-held territory.

“When you hit an island you became a basic wireman and that's what I found myself doing for the next three years,” Bell added.

Wiremen were assigned to each company. Their mission was to string communication wire from the command post tent to wherever it's needed.

Fatalities for wiremen were high. When the company stopped moving, the wiremen didn't; their job was just beginning.

Adding to the risk factor was a shortness of supplies.

The next stop was Melbourne, Australia for a rest with the 1st MarDiv., although he didn't get much rest there coping with three bouts of malaria.

“The best thing that came out of being in Melbourne was an exchange of weapons. We had been using (Springfield) O3s and switched them for (Carbines) M1s.

With a new weapon in hand, Cape Gloucester

was his next stop.

“What I remember the most about Cape Gloucester is the rain and mud. It rained everyday the whole time I was there. I saw enough of the stuff to last me a lifetime,” Bell said.

His next stop was no less picturesque. Peleliu was the port of call and the local decor consisted of caves.

Bell's actions in Peleliu earned him a Silver Star medal.

“It was late at night and Echo Co., 2/7, needed a volunteer to string some wire. The Japanese had infiltrated up to the CP tent and the entire company was in jeopardy. Being as young and agile as I was and I have to add, not fully aware of the danger I was in, I volunteered,” confided Bell.

Bell ran a line from the battalion command post to the company in total darkness without exact knowledge of the location. Climbing over precipitous ravines and up an extremely steep hill tangled with undergrowth, Bell risked friendly fire as well as enemy troops in completing the mission.

His mission was successful.

After Peleliu, Bell went back to the states for the first time in four years. He was four years older and many years wiser than the boy who left his job as a Bangor bellhop to become a Marine.

Bell stayed in the Corps and in 1960, he became the youngest Marine ever to be promoted to master gunnery sergeant.

At the of 62 he retired for a second time on Dec. 31, 1987 from the Communication Electronics Office, MCB.

He looks forward to fixing up some properties he's acquired and getting his boat out on the water more often.

His devotion to duty also keeps him involved in several service related associations in the area. Does salty Bell have any sage advice for the current generation of Marines?

“Yeah, tell 'em to keep their heads down and their powder dry!” Bell growled.

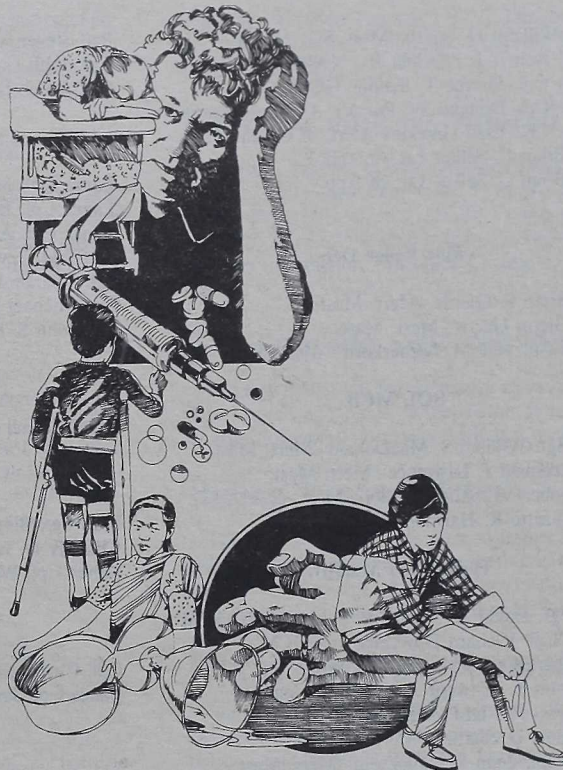
other purposes as well, according to Williams.

The general goals of the skill-building class are to promote good health, fitness and well-being of a Marine's personal life in order to increase his operational readiness. By having the Marines recognize the potential hazards of the adverse life-styles involved with alcohol and drugs, the course will develop a strong sense of personal responsibility.

The course is also designed to intervene at the earliest possible point to reduce existing problems associated with alcohol and drug use in the Marine Corps. This is accomplished by self-contracted learning in the class and self-contracted responsible drinking and/or abstinence from alcohol and drugs outside of class.

"The more a Marine is aware of his body and what alcohol and drugs can do to it, the more he will realize the uselessness of drugs and alcohol," Williams said. "Marines need to understand there are other alternatives besides drinking to relieve stress."

Commands are urged to send their Marines and Sailors to the week-long class. Education stops this problem before it starts. Classes run almost every week. Any interested unit, dependent or individual Marine or Sailor desiring to volunteer for the course should call the NADSAP office at 451-1984.



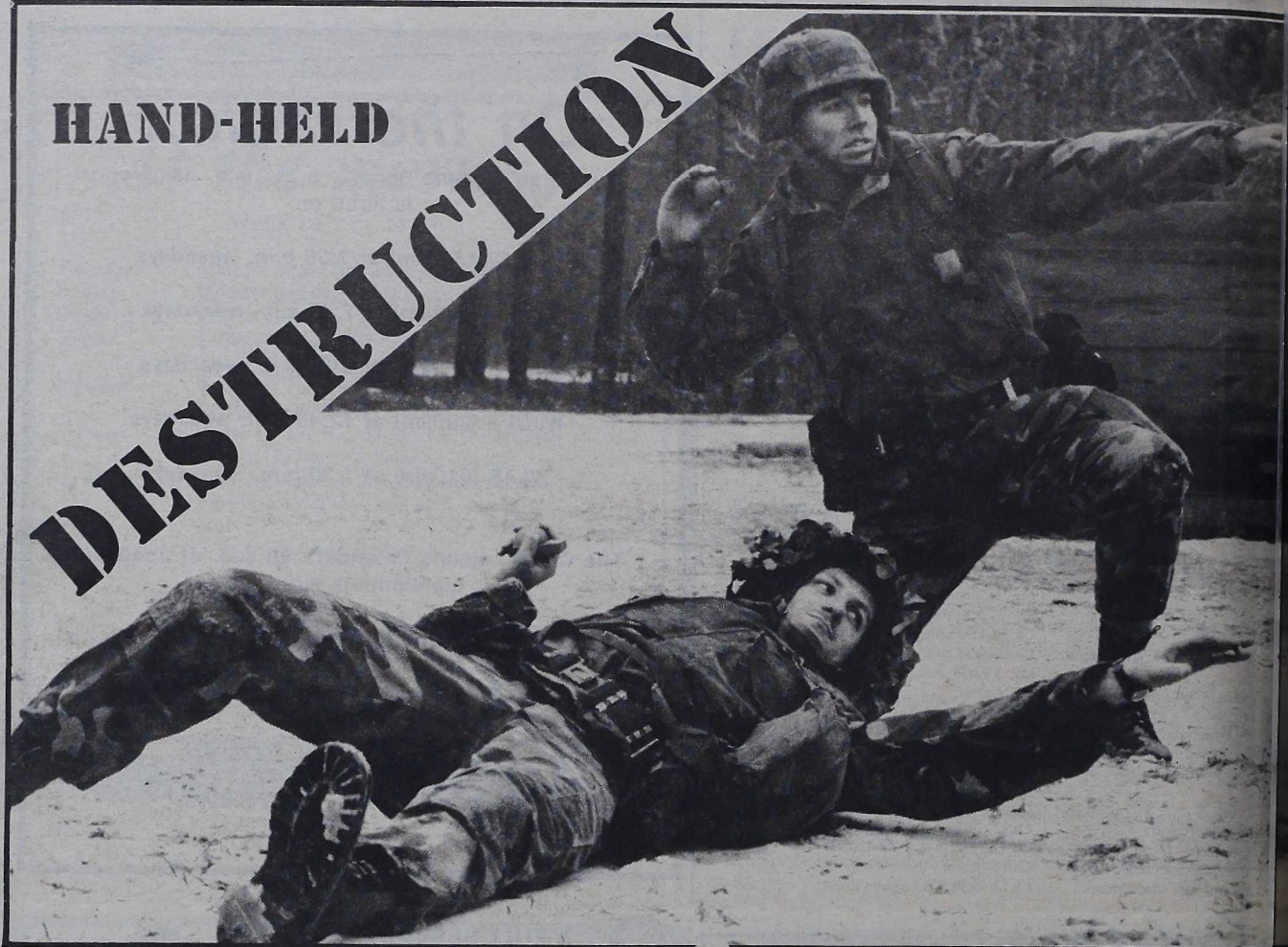

"Thumb clip, pull pin."—words every Marine should be familiar with.

Recently, leathernecks of Oscar Btry., 5/10, 2nd Mar Div., echoed these words as they hurled M-67 fragmentation hand grenades during a training exercise at the F-6 range here.

Handling of grenades and related safety procedures were the order of the day.

Lance Cpl. Allen D. Homeister, a driver from Oscar Btry., 2/10, ties an explosive warning sign to his vehicle prior to transporting live-grenades to the range.

Designed to be thrown at an area target, grenades assist the individual Marine in six missions. These missions are producing casualties, signaling, screening, illumination, producing incendiary effects and riot control.

As required by the Essential Subjects Test, all Marines should be able to identify, by sight and touch (for night employment) the type of grenade required for each mission. Most grenades are different in size, shape and color.

Marines of 5/10 threw the baseball-shaped M-67 fragmentation grenade for training purposes only. The 14 ounce grenade is olive drab in color with a yellow band and printing.

Safety procedure training found several

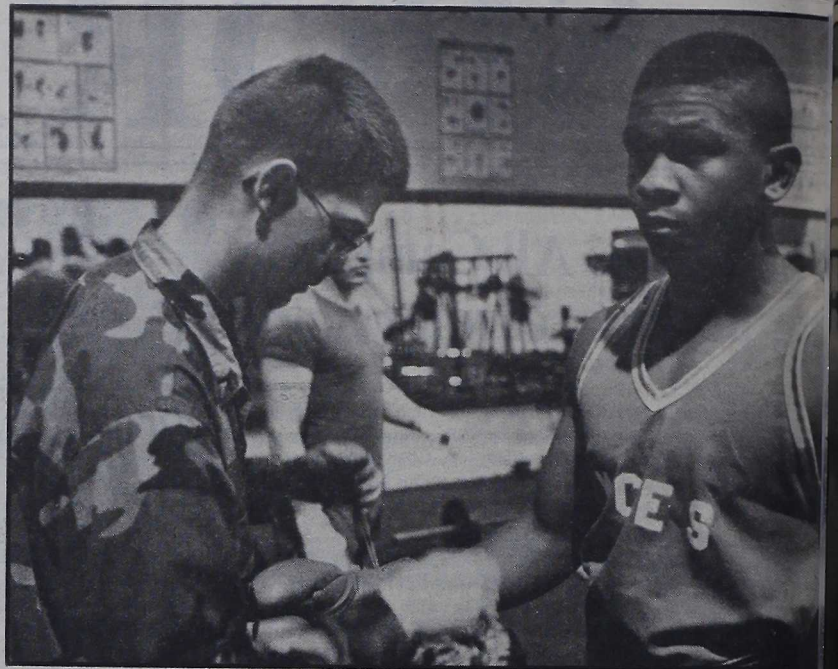
