On August 30, U.S. forces concluded our military mission in Afghanistan. This brings an end to the two-decade mission that significantly degraded the threat posed by Al Qaeda and brought Osama bin Laden to justice. More than 800,000 U.S. Service members and 25,000 Department of Defense civilians served in Afghanistan since 2001. 2,461 U.S. service members and DoD civilians paid the ultimate price and more than 20,000 were injured. We will forever honor the sacrifices made by them and their families.

In August and September NAVFAC EURAFCENT supported Operation Allies Refuge, the largest non-combatant evacuation operation (NEO) ever conducted by the U.S. military, assisting the transport and temporary housing of U.S. civilians and vulnerable Afghans seeking special immigrant visas. Thanks in part to your support, thousands of refugees are now on the path towards freedom and new lives in the United States.

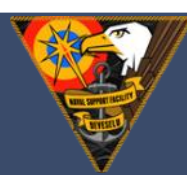
Our Public Works Departments at NSA Bahrain, NAVSTA Rota, and NAS Sigonella with support from the Core and other PWDs all worked with their installation leadership, tenant commands, contractors and host nation partners to support movement of personnel out of the theater. This special edition of our monthly newsletter includes photos, statistics and information on just some of the activities our colleagues engaged in to support this effort.

September marks the official end of summer, the beginning of the school year, and the end of the fiscal year. It also commemorates many significant events and people in the history of our Nation. 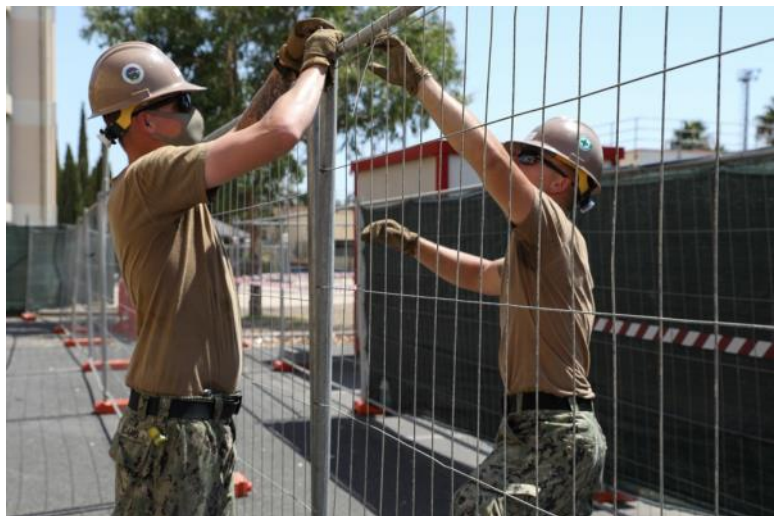

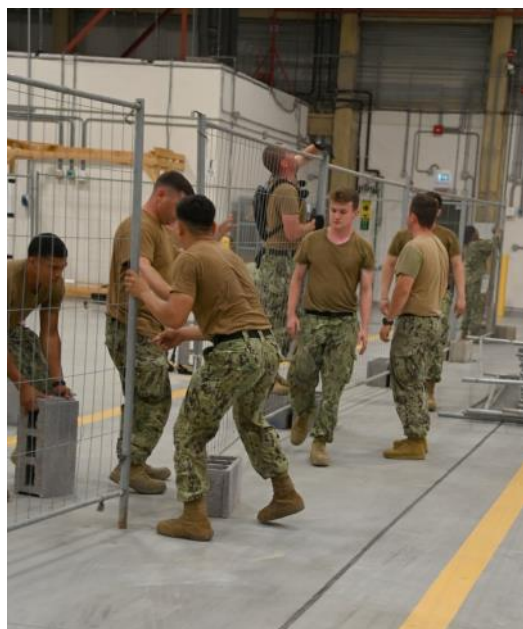

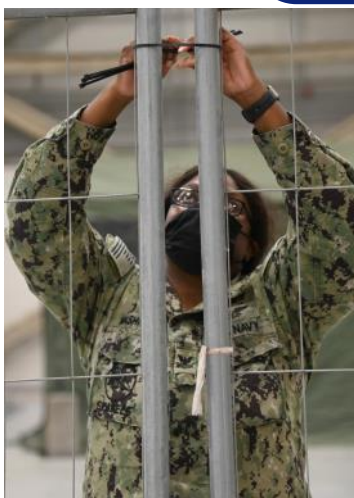
