





Public Works Seabees participated in a Norwegian Foot March on July 30th, 2021 in NAVSTA Rota. This event was organized and hosted by USO Rota and CPT Jaime Hanley. The challenge is the complete 18.6 miles (30 kilometers) of foot march while carrying 25 -lb ruck sack, which must be weighed before and after completion of the event. Participants were required to wear a working uniform as well. Participant time standards varies by age, but if completed within allotted time (for 18-34 year-olds, 4 hours and 30 minutes), the participant would be awarded the Marsjmerket, the Norweigan Armed Forces Marching Badge.





Public Works Department Rota Seabees and Civilians were busy in-action from late-August until September 9th, 2021 supporting the NAVSTA Rota efforts in Operations Allies Refuge, during which the installation took in almost 3,000 evacuees consisting of certain at-risk Afghan civilians, particularly interpreters, U.S. embassy employees, and other prospective Special Immigrant Visa (SIV) applicants from Afghanistan. PWD Rota played a big role in the mission, with Cdr. Joseph Dunaway, Public Works Officer, serving as the Camp Architect/ Engineer and PWD Rota personnel forming special internal organization and watch bills in order to define the mission requirements for the camp (with ability to support up to 3000 personnel), as well as the inprocessing center at the airfield. This required Seabees, especially the equipment operators, to immediately commence cleaning/clearing operation in BLDG 580 hangar, which was full of dilapidated bird excrements and other hazards in order to make space for efficient processing/ acceptance center for Afghan Travelers arriving into NAVSTA Rota. Jordan Kass, the Asset Management Branch Head, developed camp layout with assistance from Jose Maria (Chema) (continued on next page) Delgado.




(continued from last page) The camp plan development was further assisted through support of CM1(SCW/EXW) Andres Henriquez, serving as electrical engineer, and UT1(SCW/EXW) Scott Nullmeier (joined by Craig Hooper and John Harris) who oversaw major construction of tents and perimeter security fencing, as well as rental services of basic sanitary items. LT Chanhan Lee, the Assistant Public Works Officer, worked closely with Fleet Logistics Center Sigonella—Rota in order procure all of the necessary contracts. PWD Rota Seabees all took part in setting up the organic tents in softball fields, as well as assisting the set-up of Spanish Marine Corps Infantry Unit tents and cots in preparation for the arrival of the evacuees. Within a week after initial coordination meeting, the installation was ready to accept the evacuees on August 27th, thanks to the hard work and efforts put on by everyone in PWD Rota. The Seabees, joined by the additional manpower from NMCB 1, continued to serve throughout the 24/7 operation providing camp maintenance and equipment operation support in order to ensure a good quality of life of the Afghan evacuees during their stay at NAVSTA Rota. 

Public Works Department Rota successfully demonstrated the utilization of the newlyprocured shore power mound assemblies on USS Arleigh Burke on September 24th, 2021. These shore power mounds were shipped recently from the Naval Facilities Engineering and Expeditionary Warfare Center (NAVFAC EXWC) after three years of coordination between Public Works Department Rota Utilities and Energy Management Team, more specifically CE1(SCW/EXW) Christopher Arlen and UT1(SCW/EXW) Christopher Watkins (both of who have now PCSed out of Rota). Having these power mounds on-hand will enable much shorter 100-ft electrical cable to be utilized to provide shore power to the ships, eliminating the need for crane support for the shore power connection/disconnection. Construction Mechanic 1st Class Petty Officer Andres Henriquez, the PWD Rota's MUSE expert and electrical crew supervisor, coordinated the acceptance of these power mound assemblies and its demonstration on this day.



NATIONAL HISPANIC HERITAGE MONTH

Hispanics: One Endless Voice To Enhance Our Traditions



As of today, there are approximately 60,000 active and reserve sailors/troops of Hispanic heritage serving in the US Navy. The first recorded time period of Hispanic Americans in the US military service dates back to the Civil War.

The observation of the National Hispanic Heritage Month started in 1968, when then-President Lyndon B. Johnson designated a week in September as National Hispanic Heritage Week. In 1988, President Ronald Reagan turned that week into month-long observance, from mid-September to mid-October.

The dates of this observance coincide with the Independence Day anniversaries of many Latin American Countries (Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua on Sep. 15th; Mexico on Sep. 16th, Chile on Sep. 18th).

UT2(SCW) Victor Gonzalez is from Salt Lake City, UT. When he was growing up, Hispanic culture was not well-known in his hometown. Growing up as an Mexican American in a strict household, he learned to respect his parents. He also had a super tight-knit family community, where his cousins were his best friends. He is a proud to be Hispanic, and is gracious of the fact that his family worked so hard to raise him. Now, he gets to proudly represent their hard work by serving honorably in the US Navy.

Victor Guerrero is a Peruvian American born in Long Beach, CA. Growing up Hispanic American, Victor understood that there are uniqueness in Hispanic culture that is very distinct from majority culture in the US. He learned to navigate through these differences and become culturally flexible. This, he believes, gave him whole new perspectives as an engineer by giving him multiple ways of looking at problem. One awesome thing he learned was that the way/mannerism of acting or speaking, which he thought was unique to his family, actually had roots in the Hispanic culture.





UT2(SCW/EXW) Josue Ochoasevilla was born in Los Angeles, CA and was raised in Las Vegas, NV. He has served in the Navy for 6 years. Both his parents migrated from Mexico around same time (his mother from Guadalajara; his father from Michoacán. Growing up, his mother showed him all ropes of life, from cooking, cleaning, working, maintaining his car, etc. Also from young age, he enjoyed boxing (which he still does to this day), as well as soccer and rugby. He is fluent in Spanish, and first in his family to go to college/join military.

Issis Long is born in Oxnard, CA. She considers herself a mixture of Spanish/Mexican (her father being 100% Spanish and her mother being half Spanish and half Mexican). Growing in a large Hispanic household, she felt responsibilities starting at a young age. Being a Hispanic Engineer made her realize how important it is for her to motivate young girls in STEM activities. The confidence and communication she learned have been valuable traits of her Hispanic American identity. She says she feels AT HOME in Spain (much better than California:))





CE3 Daniel Morenolombera is from East Palo Alto, CA. He is "100% brown and proud". He comes from strong-willed parents who are both from Aguililla, Michoacán, Mexico. He learned at an early age about discipline/composure from his parents and he now carries that lesson with honor and pride. He is fluent in Spanish and enjoyed his opportunity to use his bilingual skills here in PWD Rota. His favorite quote, from Cesar Chavez, is "Preservation of own's culture does not require contempt or disrespect for other cultures."

UT1(SCW/EXW) Juan "Mike" Selvera has served 14 years in the US Navy. He is Mexican American, born and raised in Harlingen, TX, a town that is also predominantly Mexican American. He learned a lot of family values growing up (for example, don't mess with mom or face the "chancla"). He shared with the team that he's faced some racism as a Mexican American especially during his time in Tennessee, where he lived before joining the military. He is proud, not just as a Hispanic, but as an American honorably serving in the Navy.
