The citizens of Mosul continue to see improvements in security and infrastructure, as Iraqi Security Forces team up with American Soldiers. Mosul and its surrounding areas are on track for significant upgrades before the withdrawal of U.S. forces.

Among the top priorities for Iraqi and American leaders are improvements to the water filtration facilities, sewage systems, and the overall infrastructure, while continuing to counter the insurgency that still plagues one of Iraq's most critically important cities.

Although there is room for improvement, the leaps and bounds Iraq has made over the past few years are noticed by every servicemember who has ever deployed here. "This country has improved dramatically," said Staff Sgt. Wilbert Tynes, 1st Battalion, 36th Infantry Regiment, 1st Armored Division which is currently stationed at Forward Operating Base Marez inside the city.

Staff Sergeant Tynes, who deployed to Iraq in 2004-2005, is greatly impressed with the direction Iraq is headed.

"The presence of both the Iraqi Army and Iraqi Police are everywhere. Their results have been so successful that it has allowed us all to have positive control and results in the area," he said.

The battalion is organized to help support the city. Together, Iraq Security Forces and American Soldiers have been conducting street patrols

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U.S. Soldiers, IP, compare weapons systems

Matthew Stanton, who is attached to the Spartan brigade and helps support the local Iraqi Army Brigade. "[The Iraqi Soldiers] particularly like the high level of mission readiness and skills the American Soldiers bring to them." In the short time the battalion has been operating in the area, Soldiers have been escorting important members of the Army Civil Affairs teams around the city. This mission is important because of the direct and immediate effect it has on all of Mosul's citizens.

"It's good to be directly helping their lives," said Pfc. Jeremiah Richardson, of Bulldog Company, and a member of these patrols. "I like being a part of this; giving back control of Iraq to its people."

Both nations hope to continue these patterns of civil improvement in Mosul while the violence decreases. Regardless of any threat, each Soldier sees the greater goal before them and stands ready.

"It even benefits us because we are here to change their lives so that they can have a better Iraq and a better world," said Staff Sgt. Tynes.


pressed the Meghdad IP put together an efficient and safe range, said 1st Lt. Shnieder. It shows how quickly they are already making progress.

<u>Specialist Adams goes to the movies</u> Cliched '2012' fun, disaster action film

In an era when almost every major movie, from "Transformers" to "Independence Day," seems to have an internationally renowned structure like the White House or the Eiffel Tower getting destroyed in a cataclysmic event, "2012" on the surface seems no different.

This movie, full of film clichés, manages to be entertaining.

John Cusack is the lead in this disaster movie. Here, he plays a downand-out author with two children and an ex-wife who is now with another man. I wish Hollywood could imagine something a little different.

His lead character is a carbon copy in some aspects of Will Smith's character in "Independence Day." The only difference is Smith's character, in the ultra-blockbuster of the 1990s, was happily married and successful. Cusack's character, is divorced, or so the movie implies, and he is down on his luck. But he still has two children and the wife is remarried.

In southern California (again, clichés, how many movies have been set in southern California? Well, yes, "Independence Day" and in part even the "Transformers" series. Why can't they have a movie set somewhere else? Perhaps it can be set in a small town in Iowa, a different big city, like Philadelphia, but anything different.

But that is the least appealing story

line in this solid action movie that manages to be a little intelligent.

The action starts right away with a scientist, Dr. Adrian Helmsley discovering that something bad is going to happen to Earth, not just a small part of Earth, all of it. He reports this information to a person high up in the president's cabinet (Oliver Platt). From there, they begin a plan to monitor the Earth and devise a plan to save the people on the planet.

The movie is surprisingly believable in it's characterizations. Platt is very good as an overzealous aristocrat who cared more about the bottom line than for humanity.

Danny Glover, a longtime character actor/leading man, probably best known to audiences as Detective Riggs from the "Lethal Weapon" series, has a very good turn as the American president. His performance is one of the better acting bright spots in this film. Woody Harrelson plays a conspiracy nut who predicts the global doom from the Mayan Calendar.

He is somewhat the comic relief in this film. Possibly the funniest moment in the movie is when he shows Cusack's character an Internet movie he created of why the world is going to end. That is one of the movie's few attempts at humor. This movie takes the end of the world very seriously.

As the movie progresses, the world has banded together to create a series of spaceships to take people away from the impending destruction.

The movie does make a few attempts at having serious characterizations and drama. Platt's character seems to care only about the wealthy that financed the spaceship project to save a select few. Dr. Helmsley wants to save more of the ordinary people with the spaceships.

Then there is the mandatory movie dog, who belongs to the voluptuous girlfriend of a Russian billionaire, who paid his way to save him and his girlfriend and joins Cusack's journey to the spaceship as he moves along. But this dog is a little dog that Parris Hilton is more likely to carry. I like the big dogs that run and jump over cars. This little dog can't do anything.

The thing that surprises me the most is, despite the clichés, the movie does have nice special effects. The directing and writing did give me a nice sense of urgency and definitely had me wondering what was going to happen next. The pace of the movie is very quick and there are enough story lines and plot twists that had my attention throughout the movie.

Overall, this movie will not compete against "Casablanca" or "In the Heat of the Night" to be the greatest movie ever made, but definitely entertaining and definitely worth seeing. $8 \frac{1}{2}$ out of 10.

Man in underwear uses stick to kill dear

CLARKSVILLE, Ga.- A Georgia man said he knew just what to do when a wounded deer stumbled onto his property: He ran outside in boxers and flip-flops to kill it with a stick. Joel Borden, whose friends gave him the nickname "Country" shortly after he moved to Clarksville from the town of Savannah, said the deer stumbled into his yard with a gunshot wound in its neck the morning of Dec. 26, Gannett Tennessee reported Tuesday.

"I killed it with a stick," Borden said. "My friends are making a big deal of it because I didn't have anything on but boxers and a pair of sandals."

He said he struck the animal repeatedly in the head, breaking off one of its antlers, before it lost consciousness and he used the stick to cut its throat.

Dale Grandstaff, an officer with the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency, said the agency recommends people either put wounded deer out of their misery or call authorities to deal with the situation.

Christmas tree swiped from Texas park

Seguin Gazette-Enterprise SEGUIN, Texas — If Santa loads a little extra coal into his sleigh for the trip to Seguin next Christmas, police Detective Lt. Jerry Hernandez will understand why.

That's because someone early Dec. 27 backed a vehicle up to a Christmas tree in Central Park, threw it in the back and hauled it off.

Police were called to the park located behind the courthouse after a passer-by reported witnessing a red Chevy HHR backing up to a city-owned tree placed there for the holidays.

Three men got out of the vehicle, threw the tree in the back and drove off, Hernandez said.

The witness who reported the theft got the license plate of the vehicle, Hernandez said, which will likely mean that if the three suspects had a good Christmas, their new year isn't likely to start on a positive note.

The investigation is ongoing.
