



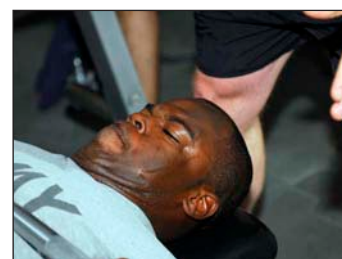

## Korea War Veterans commemorate 'three hard nights' of battle

Waving flags, school children and Republic of Korea and U.S. Army Soldiers in full dress uniform greeted veterans of a little known but pivotal battle of the Korean War – the battle of Chipyeong-ni, a small town about a 90-minute drive east of Uijeongbu.

These French, Korean and American veterans, many of whom haven't been back to Korea since the end of the fighting, gathered nearly 60 years later on May 26, in the small town whose name gave title to the battle, along with their Families to commemorate the desperate battle that took place there February 1951.

"It was absolutely wonderful to be greeted by all these nice people. We were pleasantly surprised and even thrilled that the people in Chipyeong-ni were happy to greet us. We did not expect anything like this," said retired French Army Col. Jacques Bouttin, who served as a junior officer in the battle.

"In many ways 60 years seems like a long time ago, but in other ways it seems like it was yesterday," said retired Col. William G. Gallivan of the Korean War Veterans Association, who served as a platoon leader with A Company. "It was three hard nights here, and we were successful and turned the Chinese back. It was the most important battle I participated in."

A ROKA honor guard and band honored the veterans with presentations of the national anthems of all three nations. With iron straight precision the veterans presented hand salutes as the lyrics of each national anthem echoed off the lush green hills that surround the now peaceful battlefield.

However, the scene was anything but peaceful in

1951. In mid February of that year, then Lt. Gen. Matthew Ridgway, Eighth Army commander, was concerned that a potential seam in United Nations lines might develop if the rail and communication cross-roads of Chipyeong-ni fell to attacking Chinese forces. He needed the ground held and he ordered Col. Paul Freeman and his 23rd Regimental Combat Team of the 2nd Infantry Division to hold with his unique force of American, French and Korean troops.

Freeman ordered his relatively small command of about 5,400 Soldiers to dig deep and prepare their positions as he organized the perimeter defense around the town.

Ridgway promised close air support, illumination, aerial resupply and quick relief from the 5th U.S. Cavalry that was attacking from the south. Meanwhile, the Chinese Phantom Army under Gen. Lin Pao with nine divisions and 90,000 Soldiers had quickly surrounded the town.

Lt. Col. Lynn Freeman, no relation to the regimental CO, who was then a 1st Lt. and company executive officer of B Company, the regimental reserve, provided some personal insight into the battle.

"Upon arrival to the town, we were ordered to take a hill on the outskirts of the town. As we attacked up the hill we immediately ran into Chinese and we fought with them for the better part of a day until Col. Freeman ordered us back into the perimeter defense he was developing," said the battle hardened veteran who earned a battlefield commission in World War II.

The ability of the 23rd RCT to defend against an aggressive and well organized Army was quickly put to the test.

"We had mines placed in front of our positions and we used a lot of foo gas (a mixture of explosives and napalm usually set in a fifty-gallon drum) in our line,


and the Air Force dropped napalm on the last day, attacking Chinese very effectively," said Freeman who wrote the official after action report, March 13, 1951, which is now in the 2nd ID museum on Camp Red Cloud.

Nearly 60 years later, more than 900 Korean Soldiers from the ROKA 20th Division, put on a dramatic 30 minute re-enactment of the three day battle on the actual ground in which the French took position. Waves of Soldiers dressed in period quilted Chinese uniforms, carrying flags, poured out of the wood line while some 800 men stood at the French line. The Chinese were immediately hit with simulated direct and indirect fire. UH-1 helicopters, simulated the aerial resupply that took place during the battle and brought needed supplies to the French re-enactors, after each phase of the attack failed and the fight continued. The field was littered with re-enactors posing as dead Chinese Soldiers providing a stark sense of what the battlefield looked like following each attack.

One local Korean who visited the battlefield a few days after the battle shared that he saw thousands of dead Chinese Soldiers. "They were everywhere, piled in great heaps," he said.

# Warriors scout out Korean culture

The Gyeonggi Provincial Government Office took more than 30 2nd Infantry Division Soldiers on an overnight tour of the most populous province in South Korea May 27-28. The Soldiers were treated to numerous sights and events in Seoul and Suwon that highlighted the long history of Korea as well as its global reach as a modern economic powerhouse.

The tour started with a look back in history at The National Folk Museum of Korea located on the grounds of Gyeongbok Palace in northern Seoul. The museum is organized around scenes and objects from everyday life in the past and shows how the average Korean would have lived. The palace, built during the Joseon Dynasty in 1394, immersed the Soldiers in architecture that is older than the discovery of their continent.

"The sense of history here is so great. It is hard to wrap your mind around the fact that these buildings have been here for nearly 600 years," said Pvt. Kyle Lamarine, of 4th Chemical Company.

Next on the itinerary was an afternoon performance of "Nanta," known in English as "Cookin." It is a popular musical that debuted in 1997 in Korea and has since traveled the world, having been performed in 37 countries and 231 cities. The musical tells a simple story of four chefs trying to create a wedding banquet within a strict timeline. The musical emphasizes the use of traditional Korean samul nori, percussion music, which is performed with improvised instruments, such as cutting boards, water canisters and kitchen knives.

"I thought the performance was really cool. It combined traditional aspects of Korean culture like percussion, dancing and food with a modern story. I'd really like to see this again," said Pvt. Crystal Javalera, B Company, Division Special

Troops Battalion.

The next morning the Soldiers visited the Myung-In Kimchee Factory in Suwon, the provincial capital of Gyeonggi province. After the tour of the on-site kimchee museum and the production floor, Soldiers were given aprons and bandanas and tried their hands at making kimchee themselves.

"I still don't care for kimchee all that much, but the tour of the factory really made me think about how hard the Korean people have worked to create this industry. I guess that only a generation ago most of the kimchee people ate was homemade but to see this world-class facility up close was eye-opening," said Pvt. Kevin Hoff, 4th Squadron, 7th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Heavy Brigade Combat Team.

Hwaseong Fortress was the next stop on the tour. Built in the late eighteenth century, the innovative design of the fortress was used as a model for future fortified construction in Korea. It was designated a UNESCO

World Heritage site in 1997.

On the fortress grounds, the Soldiers had an opportunity to try traditional Korean archery.

"It was a lot harder than I thought it would be. The targets didn't seem that far away, but I think all my shots ended up in the ground," said Pvt. Richard Dinges of 4-7th Cav.

"I have the privilege of organizing this tour about four times a year and I really enjoy it. I love to see the Soldiers' reactions to new sights and experiences. They always seem so excited that it makes each tour feel like my first one," said Kim Soo-Jin, director of the Gyeonggi Province outreach program.

The tour let Warriors engage in a wide range of activities and cultural experiences and ultimately broadened their understanding of their host nation.

"I found this to be very educational. I had read about these sites but this tour actually got me off the base and experience them for myself," said Hoff.

# Warrior Division wages war on excess

War is difficult business. It takes ingenuity, creativity and drive to win. That is exactly what 2nd Infantry Division logisticians are using to combat the elusive enemy of excess equipment and parts within the division, draining needless funds from training and operations.

To help fight this war on excess, the Division logistics staff created the Excess Consolidation Point. With wires, mechanical parts and boxes as far as the eye can see, it looks more like the 70s sitcom *Sanford and Son's* junkyard than a supply room. But, what looks like chaos is really a weapon against waste.

The ECP, which is located on Camp Hovey, is a central location where units within the Division can bring their serviceable excess tool sets (Class II) and repair parts (Class IX) so that they can be re-distributed to other units in need of those particular items.

"The commanding general saw the need to create a consolidation point because a lot of excess Class IX was just put off to the side instead of in the proper supply channel to the supply support activity. He saw the need of just having one point where the Division could put these items and re-distribute it from there," said Chief Warrant Officer 2 Reynaldo Nunez, the 2nd ID supplies and services technician.

In March, nine Soldiers began turning an empty motor pool on Camp Hovey into the home for the ECP.

"This was an empty motor pool. We began going around post and finding empty bins, shelves, cabinets and putting them into locations to make space for the items that were going to be brought in. We even began building some of the shelves ourselves," said Sgt. Robin Houle, the noncommissioned officer in charge of the ECP.

Shortly after opening, units began bringing in their excess equipment.

Once units make an appointment and bring in their excess items, the ECP staff identifies the equipment

by stock number and nomenclature. Once the item is cross-referenced and properly labeled, it is stored in its appropriate location in the ECP. The item's stock number, nomenclature and quantity available is listed on a spreadsheet which is later sent to unit maintenance officers and noncommissioned officers and other key leaders so they can see if a part they need is available at the ECP instead of unnecessarily spending money to order it.

As a rule, the ECP only collects serviceable Class II and Class IX items that are not listed as sensitive items. When equipment is turned in, it undergoes a thorough technical inspection.

"If we find that a part doesn't function properly, we give it back to the units to be turned in to their supporting SSA as unserviceable. We only accept serviceable parts," Houle assured.

The procedure to obtain a part from the ECP is as simple as the turn-in procedure.

"Once customers identify what is needed, they come in with the stock number and nomenclature and quantity that they need of that particular item. The ECP personnel just pull it off the shelf and give it to them right on the spot, if they are located on Casey or Hovey. They don't get charged or anything. If a unit from a different installation, for example 2nd CAB on Camp Humphreys, requires a part and it is small enough to be sent through the postal service, we will send it to them. Otherwise we make arrangements with transportation within 48-72 hours," Nunez explained.

The ECP has proven to be beneficial in more ways than one.

"The SSA sometimes only accepts a certain amount of items. At the ECP, once customers make the appointment, they have the liberty to turn in a lot of Class IX items they would otherwise have to wait to turn in," Nunez said.






Instituting the ECP allowed units in the Division to identify more than \$1.5 million worth of excess equipment so far. The Division has also saved

more than \$260,000 by re-distributing excess items instead of giving away money by re-ordering parts that were already on hand.

## Korean students sit in the flyers' seat

Korean high school students got a chance to experience a moment that only an elite group of Army Soldiers ever gets, that's to sit at the controls of an Army combat helicopter.

"I am surprised that there are so many

instruments on the inside of a helicopter that a pilot must use. I was actually worried a little bit, because I might touch something by accident," said Huh Sung-Eun, a student from Shinmok High School, Seoul. "But overall it was a really great experience."

Soldiers from 2nd Combat Aviation Brigade set up various aircraft on the flight line at Camp Humphreys for Ko-

rean high school students to explore May 19. The students were participants in the Good Neighbor English Camp sponsored by the United States Forces Korea.

The students climbed into the helicopters and took pictures with the Soldiers. Following the morning events, pilots came out to explain their aircraft and answer questions.

"I liked the Chinook the best," said Ahn Byung-Hyun, a student from Wooshin High School in Seoul, "because it is the biggest and has two propellers."

The 3rd Battalion, 2nd Aviation Regiment, 2nd CAB provided the CH-47 Chinook that Byung-Hyun was so fond of, and a UH-60 Blackhawk.

The 4th Attack Battalion, 2nd Aviation Regiment, 2nd CAB allowed the students to tour the AH-64 Apache Longbow. During the tour the children were allowed to go inside the helicopters and sit in the pilot seats.

While the tour was an exhilarating experience for the children, the Army personnel involved got a chance to show off their Army aviation pride.

"It's a great chance for us to come out and allow the kids to view the Apache helicopters," said Chief Warrant Officer 3 Ronald Zuber, an instructor pilot from

B Company, 4-2nd Avn. "Not too many civilians have a chance to see real helicopters. I really hope the students enjoyed themselves and at the same time learned something about Army aviation."

USFK runs the Good Neighbor English Camp to teach Korean students about American culture and show them the various roles the USFK plays on the Korean peninsula. As part of the camp, the students were able to visit the Demilitarized Zone the day before they came to Camp Humphreys and they were also scheduled to visit Osan Air Base. The program is designed to help students understand the relationship between the United States and Republic of Korea and see what the U.S. Army does in their country.

"The static display is a very important part of our trip because students actually have a chance to see U.S. Army aircraft and equipment. This is the only chance for them to really get to do that," said Stephen M. Tharp, chief of strategic outreach public affairs office, Headquarters, United States Forces Korea and a coordinator of Good Neighbor English Camp.

"We think this is very important to let students know why we are here, what we are doing, and that we are a good neighbor," he said.

*The PBC offers monthly cultural tours where we all go out as a group. It would be great if they were offered more often.*



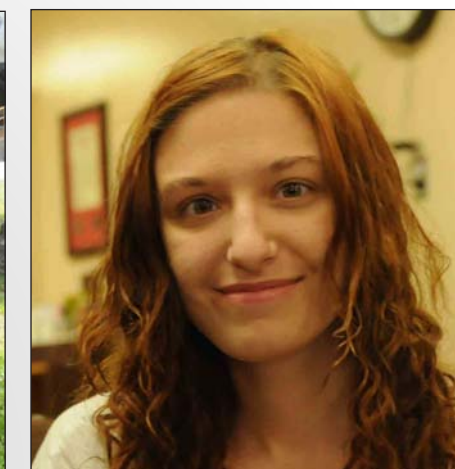

## 'Team Raider' out-lifts defending bench-press champions

**CAMP LIBERTY, Iraq** – Part of being ready to “Fight Tonight” is being physically ready for the demands of war. Soldiers must always maintain a certain level of fitness, but there are some Warriors who take fitness to the next level taking part in events such as the Ultimate Warrior Competition and 1st Heavy Brigade Combat Team’s “Ironhorse” PT Challenge. Soldiers with 2nd Infantry Division deployed to Iraq take part in similar events, challenging each other in friendly competitions.

Soldiers gathered around a bench at Scorpion Gym May 13 as four teams warmed up and readied themselves for a showdown of strength and stamina.

Members of the 4th Stryker Brigade Combat Team, 2nd Infantry Division “Team Raider” waited anxiously to begin this month’s 225-pound bench-press competition.

Each team was comprised of four members; each member had to push out as many repetitions on a 225-pound barbell in four-minutes. Competitors were allowed to swap out and return for more repetitions as often as they wanted within the time limit.

The spotlight that day was on the Soldiers from 1192nd Engineer Battalion, who had won the top spot the previous month and came back to defend their title.

“We’re gonna strip ya’ll’s title,” said Sgt. 1st Class Alfred Jackson, a member of Team Raider and the communications non-commissioned officer in charge for 4th SBCT, as he sat on the bench before the event began.

By no means a small individual in his own right, Jackson still appeared to be one of the smaller competitors that day. His reputation around the gym, however, overshadowed appearances.

“He’s the one on the board for the 400-pound club,” whispered one spectator to another about Jackson being one of the few individuals to have bench-pressed more than 400 pounds.

Taking the bar first for his team, Jackson let loose with a burst of intensity, but like all the competitors, eventually the weight took its toll.

“You’ve got to do as many reps as you can before you’re tired,” explained Pvt. George Fuller, with the 38th Engineer Battalion, 4th SBCT also with Team Raider.

As fatigue began to set in, Team Raider members swapped places seamlessly, yelling words of encouragement to one another as they heaved the bar into the air.

With fuel still in his tank and time running short on the clock, Lt. Col. Darron Wright, 4th SBCT deputy commanding officer, stepped in to finish off the last 38

repetitions – more than any other single competitor. The only other competitor who came close was Jackson with 35.

“We came here to compete and we brought our best to take the title,” Wright explained, still catching his breath while he waited for the announcement of the winner.

In the end, Team Raider won the competition with a combined 134 repetitions. The defending champions trailed in second with a distant 117 repetitions.

Covered in sweat, Jackson held his medal and grinned as the crowd faded from the gym: “Feels good to be the winner.”

## Casey school progress on track for August opening

Casey Elementary School Principal Shelly Kennedy and Department of Defense Education Activity Pacific officials met with garrison leaders May 20 to talk about logistics issues and check on progress of the new school, which will open for the 2010-2011 academic year.

The visit included stops at a temporary administrative space on the second floor of the building adjacent to American Forces Network Casey, the school construction site, Hanson Field House, and the former garrison training room, which will serve as the cafeteria until the second wing opens the following school year.

“There is no project hotter than the school right now,” said Brent Abare,

Camp Casey deputy garrison commander, to school officials. “People are excited; they are pumped up in a positive way.”

While DoDEA Pacific officials from Okinawa receive ongoing progress reports, they felt it was important to get a “boots on the ground” look at the progress that has been made since ground was broken for the school in February 2010.

“From afar we see spreadsheets and briefings, but when we arrived here we saw it’s really happening,” said Christopher Siler, a program analyst in the DoDEA Pacific Director’s Office. “The bottom line is that we must get it right for our children.”

Kennedy shares that sense of purpose. Since arriving on peninsula March 29 from Yokosuka, Japan, where she was the assistant principal of Nile C. Kinnick High School,

Kennedy has been working to hire staff, order equipment and books, and more. She’s planning to move from Yongsan to Dongducheon in June and will work out of the temporary space in preparation for the opening.

As school officials surveyed the four-story building and walked the grounds with Lt. Col. Richard Fromm, Casey Garrison commander, Abare told them that the contractor has been working on the project seven days a week to meet the completion deadline.

Work on the project was 55 percent complete as of May 21, according to construction progress report tracked by the Directorate of Public Works’ Engineering and Services Division. Once the building is finished in July the furniture will be assembled in preparation for the first day of school.

Affectionately called the “heart of the community” by Jack Martin, chief

of logistics for DoDEA Pacific, the school is located in the area behind the Gateway Club, which will also be home to Child, Youth and School Services and the Child Development Center.

Martin is impressed with the community planning and progress.

“I was here for the original citing, but from what I can see, the progress being made is absolutely phenomenal,” he said. “It’s definitely going to meet the needs of the community and the students and families, especially when the entire site is completed. This is going to be an outstanding learning facility.”

The stop at Casey Elementary School concluded a five-day tour of DoDEA schools at Yongsan Garrison, Osan Air Base, Humphreys Garrison and Daegu Garrison for Pacific officials.

# 미 2 사단 장병들, 서울과 경기도 문화유산 관광

지난 5월 27일부터 5월 28일, 경기도청이 미 2 사단 장병들에게 경기도 1박 2일 여행 기회를 제공했다. 약 30여명의 미 2 사단 장병들이 참여했고 장병들은 서울과 수원의 명소들을 탐방하고 여러 행사에도 참여하며 유쾌한 시간을 가졌다.

람들이 먹는 김치는 거의 전부 집에서 만들어 먹던 것이었을 텐데 어느덧 세계적인 식품이 돼 놀랐고 세계적인 김치를 생산하는 세계적인 공장을 둘러보니 참 좋았다”고 덧붙였다. 그 다음으로 일행이 방문한 곳은 수원 화성이었다. 화성 안에서 장병들은 한국 전통 활을 쏘 보기도 했다.
